SIMS FAMILY REUNION - 140 PLUS YEARS

A very successful day was held on Saturday 3rd June when over 70 descendants of Samuel Sims returned to the Pine Grove Recreation Reserve to celebrate Sims family being associated with the Pine Grove district for over 140 years.

In 1873 Samuel Sims selected a block of land at Pine Grove, the official documentation for this was not lodged until January 1877. He applied for 150 acres in the block south of where Adam and Georgie Sims now live. The Sims children attended the 'old bark hut' school and then the new school that stood at the corner of Pine Grove and Pine Grove South road. In 1877 he bought T Healy's block (173 acres) then in 1879 James Parker's block (160 acres) that included a house and a shop. In 1881 Samuel took over a block of 270 acres from the O'Briens and in 1884 the lease of John O'Brien's block (185 acres) that included a hotel, a store, a detached kitchen, a blacksmith shop, an underground tank and a bricked well. The Pine Grove hotel is thought to have burnt down in 1894.

For 80 years from 1883 to 1962, the Sims family operated the post office at Pine Grove. From the 1880's Samuel established a creamery and butter factory on the farm, and as there were no commercial power driven butter churns on the market, Samuel built his own churn. Butter was sent by ship to England from Pine Gove and won second prize at the London Fair in the 1880's.

Samuel moved to Kerang and his son Charles remained at Pine Grove to run the farm, store and butter factory. Together with his brother Bert, established the Sims Bros

Charles' son Cliff, took over the running of the farm, but unfortunately died at 41 years of age, leaving his only son Gordon to assist his mother to buy the share of the farm from Cliff's brother Chas. Gordon's two sons, Ken and Neville – went on to farm together for over 20 years. Expanding the farm with the purchase of neighbouring land. When their sons came home to farm, Ken and Neville ended their successful partnership. Ken and son Grant

now farm trading as "Sims Pastoral" and Neville and son Adam farm trading "Pine as Grove Farming". Both Grant and Adam have sons, so maybe we will eventually get to celebrate 200 years of Sims at Pine farming Grove!!





EQUIPMENT GRANT BOOSTS ROCHESTER EMERGENCY SERVICES

Leader of The Nationals and Member for Murray Plains congratulated the Rochester CFA on their successful application to the Emergency Services Volunteers Sustainability Grant Program (ESVS)

The fully volunteer Rochester brigade has been allocated \$4,470 to help with the purchase of new lighting to bolster their operational equipment," Mr Walsh said.

The ESVS Grants program is an ongoing government program to ensure emergency management volunteers can continue to deliver their crucial work to keep Victorians safe.

"Volunteer emergency services play a crucial role right across the Murray Plains electorate in the face of difficult and quite often extreme circumstances," he said.

"The services they offer provide a level of comfort to the community in that skilled and immediate assistance that would not otherwise be available is always at the ready.

"They are selfless in their efforts to protect lives and property and it is incumbent on any government to make sure the volunteers are well equipped to protect the community.

Crime up 25 per cent in Campaspe

Daniel Andrews refuses to take action to fix the violent crime rate in Victoria, Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh has said.

New figures released by the Victorian Crime Statistics Agency today show crime across the Campaspe region has risen a staggering 24.65 per cent since December 2014.

Total offences were up to 3,686, from 2,957 in December 2014.

"Our community has been abandoned by the Premier for Melbourne while the crime rate spirals out of control," Mr Walsh said.

"Offenders have been encouraged by the Andrews Labor Government's watered-down bail laws, weakened sentencing and no increases to frontline police numbers."

In Echuca, there was a 38.7 per cent increase in crimes against the person between March 2016 and March 2017, while property damage is up 29.9 per cent, from 164 of-fences in 2016 to 213 offences in 2017.

Theft in Kyabram rose 19.5 per cent, from 128 offences in the 12 months to March 2016 to 153 offences a year later.

"Country people are seething with anger about what is evolving in their communities when it comes to law and order," Mr Walsh said.

"Their families and businesses are vulnerable and they feel powerless.

"Daniel Andrews has dismally failed country communities in what should be the first priority of any government – law and order.

"Only the Liberal National Coalition has a plan for stronger sentencing, tougher parole conditions and a return to the principle that **bail is a privilege not a right** for violent offenders."
