LOCALS RECOGNISED ON AUSTRALIA DAY

Annette Brereton was presented with Rochester Australian Day Committee "2017 Sportsperson of the Year" at their dinner celebrations.

The nomination included: 'Annette who has always been a keen sportswoman has won 21 out of the last 26 Women's Lockington Golf Club Championships. She played tennis, netball and basketball until her early 30s, then took up golf in 1982 at



Lockington, winning her first Women's Club Championship 10 years later in 1992 and hasn't looked back. 

John again introduced Sister Shirley, a retired Catholic Nun who had spent more than fifty years as a missionary teacher in Papua New Guinea. Her presentation related to events and Australia's influence leading up to the granting of independence. She spoke of her first day there, arriving into a very remote area, having to assist with a difficult child birth, of the lack of basic amenities, the wonderful welcoming and friendly native people. Sister spoke of numerous lighter moments as well as some of the difficulties she encountered, and of the trouble the people there had understanding the concept of self-government and independence, only knowing their own family and tribal laws. Sister Shirley said that at the time of the hand- over, Papua New Guinea was one of very few countries in the world to gain independence without bloodshed, thanks to their own people and the Australian Government. They still carry on a good and co-operative relationship. A good and interesting morning was had by all, finishing with Sister Shirley being suitably thanked. Well done Lions

Fae and Andrew gave a very interesting talk, and showed pictures on the different types of country and how shifting the sheep off certain areas by a certain time in the year gave the wild flowers a go, such as the red and blue sweet peas, billy buttons, pussy tails to name a few, that were prevalent around this area some 60 to 70 years ago, are still there, and could come back if the land is managed properly. Pictures were shown of the now endangered bird the "Plains-Wanderer", and the type of habitat they like, with no tall trees to house predators such as hawks. Most people had left before the real storm hit, what a sound and light show, only two people got wet through while shutting up.


