MEL RUNS MARATHON IN MEMORY OF MONI.

One step at a time is the motivation to strive Mel Haines to run for Monique (Moni), a precious little girl who lost her life at only 5 years old to a very aggressive brain cancer. Monique Squires was diagnosed at 4 years old with DIPG (Diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma.) and her parents Danielle and Darryl were told that there was nothing that could be done for their little girl. Sadly Moni passed away in October 2016, only 13 months after her diagnosis. This prompted Danielle and Mel Haines to start running in order to raise awareness and much needed funds to help others fight a battle with some hope. Team Moni ran in Run for the Kids earlier this year, a 15km run in Melbourne that raised over \$13,000 dollars for the Cure Starts Now. This is an organisation that is investing a lot of time and money into the research and treatment of this horrific disease that affects 300 children in the world each year. Mel believes that more can be achieved to hit a target of \$20,000, so she has put her sneakers on and starting training on the back roads of Lockington to run a full marathon on June 30th this year. Running 42.2 km is probably one of the hardest

things I will do, but I am motivated by Moni who never gave up in her fight and never complained. Some days of training are tough, but never as tough as what Moni and her family went through. Every step I run, I do it in honor of Moni and it reminds me that life is a journey, but we can make a difference if we can raise awareness and financial support and it helps one child, then it is worth it.

Hello again everyone,

In March, 1918, a century ago, the *Bendigo Advertiser* reported that Shire Councils across the nation were receiving letters from the Public Works Department, asking that wherever possible, returned servicemen who had arrived home from the Great War in Europe should be appointed to any vacancies. In addition, Members of Parliament had written letters to the various shires, urging them to try to obtain offers of share farms for returned men. It was also being reported that as many as two thousand Australian servicemen had married young women from the United Kingdom; recently, at the rate of eight hundred marriages per month. These men were now applying for concessions in fares to bring their wives home to Australia.

History records that more than 15,000 war brides travelled to Australia after World War I, the first of them arriving from England in 1919. However, the *Rochester Express*, on 29 March, 1918, tells of some earlier arrivals, with 250 of these young ladies having arrived in Melbourne by steamer at about that time. Nearly fifty of these brides were to make their future homes in Victoria, and many were being met by their husbands, or fiances, or by their future families. Others were being accommodated by the Melbourne YWCA prior to travelling on interstate. For many it had been a difficult trip – Even arranging passage presented problems. Understandably, priority was given to the sick and wounded soldiers, hospitalised in England and/or waiting to be sent home. Most of the brides, some accompanied by babies born to them in England or during the sea voyage, were warmly welcomed. For others there was a mixed reception; thinly-veiled jealousy from young Australian women who had been left to wait at home, and disappointment from families who had wanted their boys to marry local girls. Sadly, some of the young ladies were already widowed, their Australian soldier-husbands having been killed at the battle front.

In Europe, the war still raged and the following report could have been read by our families as it appeared in the *Weekly Times*. It had been sent by cable on 5 April, 1918, by special correspondent, Keith Murdoch, and it read in part: - "It is almost impossible for people in Australia to visualise the battlefield. It extends for many miles on each side of the line of battle, on a frontage of 50 miles. You must think in millions of men, thousands of guns, and hundreds of aeroplanes and sausage balloons. It has energised all Europe and the whole of America like a great whirlpool drawing everything into its vortex ... It is sheer folly to imagine that the Allies can easily, or even certainly, hold the German onslaught. A grave crisis must be met before the enemy's designs can be frustrated. Among the most immediate and pressing needs are new crews for guns. There is confidence in the air that the Allies

will prevent a rupture at the front. This does not mean more than that the Germans will settle down to a prolonged hammering process like the battle of Verdun, relying upon their ruthlessness in methods, recklessness in losses, efficiency and rapidity in movement, and unified command, to bleed, exhaust, and defeat the Allies ... In view of this prospect of desperate and weakening struggles the Allies are getting every possible soldier into the combatant ranks, drawing all the trained men from America. The crying need of the moment is trained men. An equal need for the future is recruits."

The need for new recruits was undeniable, but a source from which they might be drawn was not as obvious. On 18 and 19 April, 1918, Australia's Governor General called a recruiting conference to decide what measures could be taken to encourage more eligible men to enlist. On 23 April, the *Rochester Express* reported that "At the close of the proceedings the following resolution was passed unanimously: 'That this conference, meeting at a time of unparalleled emergency, resolves to make all possible efforts to avert defeat at the hands of German militarism, and urges the people of Australia to unite in a whole-hearted effort to secure necessary reinforcements under the voluntary system.'" In the meantime, an intense recruiting campaign was underway right across the country.

In an effort to "arouse military enthusiasm", a recruiting team which included a medical officer and a "Soldiers' Band" visited rural centres. The *Express* reported how it happened in Rochester. First, a meeting was held at the Shire Hall on 19 April, 1918, to form a local committee to assist with arrangements for the proposed visit. The recruiting team would be tendered a civic welcome, and a patriotic concert would be held; the 'Band', comprising a company of soldiers (men about to go to the front – trainees – and returned soldiers) would perform drill and military evolutions to convey to the general public an impression of camp life; and, in the hope of enlisting the sympathy of school children, prizes would be presented to the winners of an essay competition. During that three-day rally, eligible men who had not yet enlisted would receive a visit from a recruitment officer, accompanied by a trainee and a returned serviceman, to demand a reason for their refusal to enlist. "If their effort to secure such men for service failed to-day it would be tried to-morrow, as well as still again". The proposed rally took place as planned, on 3, 4 and 5 May, 1918, and a full report was published by the *Express* on 7 May. As a result of this effort, eight volunteers came forward, but all except one man were declared unfit for enlistment.

**EULOGY
FRANCIS BERNARD DULLARD

Frank Dullard was born at Nurse Goldie's in Echuca on March 29 1928, the second son to a farming family in Pine Grove East, Northern Victoria.

He was educated at the local Pannoo State School from 1933 – 1939, attaining his Merit certificate at the age of 11 years, before heading to Assumption College Kilmore as a boarder in 1940.

He left ACK to come home on the farm after one year at 12 years of age. He worked with his father and brother Jim for 4 years before his father passed away in 1945 when dad was 16 years old.

Frank and Jim continued to manage the family farm with their mother.

This was the beginning of 52 years of running a mixed farming enterprise in Pine Grove East.

Frank married Mary Slattery from Diggora on November 8th 1952.

They had nine children who they raised on the farm. Gerald, Catherine, Margaret, Bernard, James, Kieran, Leo, Paul and Frank. Their second son Bernard passed away as a young boy in 1960 and their beloved eldest son Gerald died as a result of an accident in 1973.

Mary, like Frank left school at a young age to care for her 13 siblings in the Slattery clan of Diggora. Both Mary and Frank had a shared priority in life to ensure that their children's educational needs were met and developed.

This dedication has seen them commit to having eight children attend Secondary Boarding Schools at Echuca and Kilmore for a combined total of 37 years. In all Mary and Frank sent their children to Catholic Education for over 100 combined years.

While farming the land, this commitment to give the best

education to their children, often became tough when seasons as they invariably do, didn't produce the crops that were expected. However, they stuck to their guns and all of their children are extremely grateful for their sacrifices.

Over the years Frank developed a strong sense of community and a desire to become involved in civic duty within and beyond his district of Pine Grove East and Lockington. He saw the need and accepted the challenge.

In a typical small community, the key leaders are invariably associated with many committees and movements. Frank's role in local government, the service groups he was associated with, his faith and his core business of farming all intertwined and crossed over.

Frank's role as a leader in the Pine Grove and Lockington community and beyond has transcended barriers and divisions of age, religion, socio-economic status and vocations to ensure maximum involvement and outcomes for the community.

Frank's seventeen year commitment to the Rochester Shire Council from 1978 to 1994 is something his family is very proud of. During this time, he was elected Shire President three times and served on several Planning Committees within the Loddon Campaspe region.

Frank's contribution to local government has impacted on the wider community through his ability to connect council decisions with the broader community. He was very much a face-to-face councillor who travelled widely to meet rate-payers on site to see the issues first hand especially in his ward that took in the less populated Terricks, Patho Plains and the Gunbower regions.

This endeared Frank to the people as they felt heard and much progress was made because of his style of personable governance.

Frank continued to be involved in civic duty within the shire as a member of the Lockington Tidy Towns Committee in the late 1990's.

The Lockington and District Lions club has been a passion of Frank's for over 45 years and the club has played an enormous role in the district through fundraising, youth advocacy, supporting those in need, and improvements to facilities in the town.

Frank is a charter member of the Club. He and several colleagues saw a need for such a service group within the district in 1974 and worked with the foundation committee to establish the club.

He has been an active member serving as President for two consecutive years and secretary for eleven consecutive years.

Frank's contribution to Lion's Club movement was recognized in 2001 when he was awarded the Melville Jones Fellowship Award. This is the highest form of recognition within Lionism and embodies humanitarian ideals consistent with the nature and purpose of Lionism.

In 2013 Frank was awarded Lions Life membership. Frank is well known within the Lockington and Pine Grove districts as the historian. He is the author of two publications that capture the history of the community.

His historian work has had a lasting impact on the district and the wider community through the written record of the history of the district. This has enabled new residents to be better connected and informed.

Frank has been associated with the establishment of the Lockington Historical society working on the committee as well as the construction of the Lockington and District Heritage Centre. He assisted with the sourcing of funding, relocating buildings as well as refurbishing existing buildings. He has also been instrumental in donations of historical items and machinery.

Similar to Frank's passion for the history of the district, he has also had a lifetime dedication to recording and publishing his family history. Generations of family now have detailed and updated records of where they fit into the family picture as well as those tales and reflections on key family members and events over the past century. He has researched, compiled and published key documents and family trees for the Dullard family as well as other descendants of the family tracing back to 1826 in Ireland.

The latest edition of the family tree is referred to by relations in Ireland as 'Frank's Book' such is its value to them.

Frank travelled to Ireland for the first time with his daughters Margie and Cate in 2010 at the age of 82 to connect with the Dullard family in Durrow, Co. Laois. This trip gave him much satisfaction and confirmed much of his research and findings.

Frank has worked on the land all of his life. Even after he and Mary moved into Lockington in 1991, they maintained connection to the farming community, the happenings of the seasons and the news of the day.

There were not too many mornings when he didn't rise before the sun and walk the entire farm checking the sheep with up to 4 dogs. This must have been a special time of the day for him for sure.

Frank was a strong advocate for salinity management, native tree planting, dam filling schemes for the Terricks and soil conservation. His care and wellbeing for his animals was paramount at all times.

It is a very honourable quality to have been prepared to invest in the environment, not take from it throughout his life. Something he instilled in us all.

Frank has always been an active member of the Pine Grove community where his farming enterprise was for so many years.

Sixty years with the Pine Grove CFA.

He was on the Pine Grove Cemetery Trust for 20 years and gravedigger for many of those with assistance from his sons.

He was Lockington Pony Club foundation member in 1969.

He served as the last chairman of the Pine Grove Racecourse Committee before it was disbanded.

He was Secretary of the Pine Grove, Tennyson and Milloo 'Back To' committees

Frank's role in all of this kept the Pine Grove community groups active. He has been a consistent voice in the Pine Grove Community for the multiple organisa-

tions that exist and a strong advocate for succession within each of these organisations and groups.

Frank and Mary have demonstrated a strong commitment to their faith all of their life. Frank has been a life-long member of St Joseph Catholic Parish, Rochester encompassing the original Catholic Church in Lockington, St Augustine's and later St Canice's, There was a growing Catholic community in the Lockington area and the construction of a bigger church became a priority.

Frank worked closely with Fr William Treacy to form a building committee and he was instrumental in organising fundraising events to build St Canice's, a new church in Lockington, which opened on 1958. It was quite a significant contribution to the community.

Frank was again an active committee member and hard worker in the renovation of the same church in 2008 for its fifty-year anniversary.

Frank became a member of the Rochester Knights of the Southern Cross in April 1959 serving as President and then as District Chairman in mid 70's. He was honoured as a Life Member on September 22, 1997.

In 2016 Frank was awarded the Order Of Australia Medal in recognition to his Service to the Community and other Organisations.

Frank was able to have such a positive impact on his community due to the unflinching support from his wife Mary. Theirs is a great story of 66 and a half years marriage, a great partnership and one that has had a huge impact on so many.

Well done Mary on how you have lived out these vows especially how you have loved and cared for Frank.

Well done Frank you have fought the good fight, finished the race, kept the faith.

Rest in Peace Frank Dullard.
