Hello again, Everyone,

As the Fourth Anniversary of the outbreak of World War I approached, the Federal Ministry here in Australia announced that Sunday 4 August would be observed as a day of special intercession and prayer. Our servicemen overseas were never far from the minds of their families at home, and every effort was made to alleviate the discomfort they might be encountering at the Front. For example, on 23 July, 1918, the Annual meeting of the Milloo sub-branch of the Red Cross was held at the home of Mr R G Forsyth on 23 July, 1918, and the following details were reported in the Rochester Express. Reviewing work done in the previous twelve from recent severe frosts, though older trees had suffered months, items produced for the forces included 281 pairs of pyjamas, 73 pairs of socks, 9 scarves, 7 pairs mittens, 2 Balaclava helmets, 1 cholera belt, 1 dozen pillow slips, 1 dozen In more news on the local scene, the Rochester Express handkerchiefs, and 1 dozen bags. An amount of £40/4/11 was raised for the war effort, and the following items were sent to the trench comforts appeal: - 6 cans of fish, 10 packets of maizena, 5 cans of jam, 2 cans of cocoa, 3 tins of bloater paste, 3 tins of sweets and 1 plug of tobacco. The group also sent parcels of books, old linen, sugar bags, trea- School. There was a report that Mr James Cahill, of Rochcle tins, nugget tins and kerosene tins. This was no doubt ester and formerly of Warragamba, had been informed that typical of every sub-branch throughout Australia.

In other news, the *Express* reported that on 15 July, Captain Ackroyd (Late AIF), the current Inspector of State Schools, addressed a group of people at the MIA Hall in Tennyson, on the subject of gasses used in the war overseas; the different Sheaf's brother. It was also reported that, on 17 July, Ballendella residents had gathered at the local Public Hall to welcome home from On 31 August, 1918, the Weekly Times published a report service overseas, Private John Frances Kellett, son of water bailiff, Mr George Kellett; that Mr Robert Helmore, of Bamawm, had heard from his son Sergeant Fred Helmore, currently serving at the Front, to say that he was okay, but had experienced many narrow escapes; and that local Wharparilla soldier, Harry Neale had been seriously wounded. the local High School. Mr and Mrs Green already had one son, who was also a teacher, fighting overseas.

Hare shoots were in the news across the district. A shoot held on 31 July, 1918, to aid the Pine Grove Red Cross, bagged 381 hares and some rabbits. Gus Pieper was the top scorer, and had been so at every shoot he attended that year. Another shoot, this time held by Pine Grove and Wanurp gunners, resulted in 884 hares being shot, while one held at Milloo achieved 356, and one at Ballendella yielded a bag of 539 hares. It was reported that young lemon trees in the new settlements were suffering considerable damage, largely due to the numerous hares in the district, but also less.

reported that a school concert was held at Bamawm on 24 July, 1918, to aid the School Patriotic Fund. It was announced that in future, dances would be held fortnightly at the Bamawm Public Hall, until sufficient funds had been raised to build shelter sheds at the Bamawm North State his son Corporal Michael Cahill, had suffered a severe wound to his right arm. Corporal Cahill's brother, John had recently been invalided home from the front. Also invalided home to Australia, was Private Ben Mew of Bamawm, Mrs Passchendale, after previously having been gassed.

The people at home were very aware of the sacrifices made by those of their family and friends who had volunteered to fight overseas, and thought of them with pride. On 9 August, 1918, the Rochester Express reported that there were about prepared at the Kotta Railway Station for the planting of 220 native trees to honour Australia's fallen soldiers. Mrs Johnson, who had been a resident at Pannoobamawm for forty years was to plant the first tree.



Victorian communities and community groups across the state will now be aware of **Australia's-first home energy rating program - Scorecard**, that is targeted at all Victorians.

Just to refresh your memories, under the Scorecard program, householders can arrange for an accredited assessor to come to their home and assess how they can improve their home to use less energy.

The assessors use the government-supported Scorecard webtool to rate the energy efficiency of the home's construction, fixed appliances and other key features such as solar PV energy production. The two-page rating certificate then recommends upgrade options to improve the home's rating.

During Scorecard's statewide public awareness campaign, the public have asked how Scorecard is related to their community or their community group and what it does.


