LOCKINGTON & DISTRICT BUSH NURSING CENTRE HAVE THE POWER! AND ITS SOLAR.....



Lockington & District Bush Nursing Centre are doing their bit towards sustainable power following the installation of a 7.56kw solar system in mid July by Norlec Contracting & Solar.

The fruition of this project was possible with Community Grant Program funding generously provided from the Lockington Community Bank and the Shire of Campaspe.

The Community Bank kick started the project with funding of \$5,000 in May 2018 and the Shire of Campaspe Mayor, Adrian Weston, presented a cheque for \$4,000 on 12th July. This enabled the Centre to get the project completed guickly.

Grant recipient Darren Carnie from the Lockington & District Bush Nursing Centre Inc. said

"It's going to make a big difference to us in terms of cost - decreasing our electricity bills. It's a win for the environment as well."

The Centre is in the ideal situation that the main operating hours are when the solar system will be generating the majority of its energy.

Hello again, Everyone,

We have been looking back a hundred years to learn how the War of 1914-1918 would have been felt by the people who lived in our district at that time. In news coming from Europe in the last quarter of 1918, it became obvious that local men at the Western Front right then had to contend with more than the battles. The arrival of Autumn in the northern hemisphere that year, brought with it the second wave of the dreaded "Spanish" 'flu. It struck all the armies on both sides of the battle, and possibly caused about 100,000 fatalities among Sunday 13 October. I've not seen any mention of the 'flu having effected any of our local servicemen, but it seems very likely that it could have. Just possibly however, the two Fiedler boys from Warragamba, who were then serving at the Western Front, were among those lucky enough not to contract the illness. On 16 October, 1918, the Bendigo Independent reported that their parents had received a letter from them furlough. Back in Australia, the *Independent* of 12 October, 1918, had reported that "the world-wide epidemic of influenza [was] much in evidence in Rochester and disindeed the "Spanish" 'flu, as it is not documented as having been diagnosed in Victoria before December, 1918. However, undoubtedly a 'flu-like illness was occurring lothat month by its Wanurp correspondent supported this, locally, including "influenza". The Independent went on to opportunity to attend the day's celebrations. say that Rochester's Dr Lease had been having "such a harassing time of it that he was compelled to take a restful holiday of about ten days", spent at Mount Macedon.

In other Wanurp news reported by the *Express* in October 1918, it was learned that the district had received almost another inch (25 mm) of rain, and that J Mitchell of Piavella, had been "as usual", a prominent winner in the sheep That's all for now, section at the Bendigo Agricultural Show. Elsewhere, the Express reported that Corporal W J Haisman, in a letter to his father from "somewhere in France", wrote that "a fine

young fellow named Pender, from Pine Grove", had been fighting on the same gun as he, in a recent engagement with the enemy. And there was sad news from Dookie, of the death, due to appendicitis of Mrs Park, the wife of Mr Henry Park of Dookie College. Mr Park was well known locally, being the youngest son of the late Mr Park, Head Teacher of the Warragamba State School. Mrs Park left a seven-month-old daughter.

seems to have begun with a message that originated in Vancouver and reached Melbourne in the evening on mation. In the meantime, the message was sent on to country Victoria where it was published unquestioned by some of the regional papers. Rochester received the news on Monday morning and, to quote the Express, "the intensest excitement prevailed."

The firebell was rung long and loud, and the church bells ioined in; fireworks exploded and the band struck up 'patriotic airs". People gathered quickly around the Shire and both were well. At the time of writing, George was on Hall, where the National Anthem was sung before an impromptu meeting was held to plan activities for the rest of the day. All the schools and most of the local business houses were closed, and committees were hastily formed trict." At this distance in time, it's difficult to say if this was to arrange a sports festival for the afternoon, and an evening bonfire, to be followed by a concert held in the Shire Hall. "The Rev. E. L. Slade Mallen thought that they should give thanks to God for the good news, then ancally, and an item sent to the Rochester Express earlier nounced that services would be held in the churches." Car owners generously volunteered to use their vehicles stating that there was "much illness" being experienced to ensure that the parents of soldiers in the district had the place as arranged, despite the arrival of contradictory news midway through the day. Any embarrassment was allayed by the knowledge that Rochester was not the only town misled. To quote the Express again, "Several other centres, Kyabram amongst the number, had a mild "maffick" on the occasion."

We remember

MAVIS LILLIAN JENKINS

22/9/1926 ~ 19/8/2018.

(A condensed version of the Granddaughter's tribute.) Mavis Lillian Burgoine was born to parents Ernest William and Eva Burgoine, in Rochester on 22 September, 1926. She had one brother, William (deceased). Mavis attended school in Rochester where she was the dux of her year, perhaps in part due to her gift for numbers. Always attending Sunday School in her early years, during her teenage years, Mavis was a member of the Methodist Youth Fellowship and Red Cross Service, where no doubt some of the strong values that she came to be characterised by; care for others, communitymindedness and charity, were honed. After school, she worked part-time on her family's mixed farm at Nanneella for two years, whilst not surprisingly, going on to study a commercial course. She soon gained employment at the Rochester Shire Office where she worked for 8 years.

At aged 26, on the 25 October 1952 Mavis married the man who was to be her life-long love of 66 years, David Charles Jenkins, and lived on his farm at Bamawm. Mavis a hard-working and supportive wife on the farm whilst having her hands full raising 3 children, Marlene, Peter and Lance, also having Ernest Burgoine living with them for 2 weeks a month. A master in the art of bottling fruit, making jam and short pastry.

Sundays were more often than not spent fishing where Mavis would sit and read, knit and make sure the kids didn't drown! Family annual holidays to Rosebud, a tradition that continued long after the children had left home, when Mavis and David would head north to Forster. Mavis and David welcomed the arrival of 8 grandchildren.

Christmas became a sizeable family gathering. 16 or more people would-be jam-packed into the small, but lovingly decorated loungeroom. Mavis' generosity would abound and you would rarely leave her home without a bunch of cut flowers from her garden, a jar of something preserved or a cutting from the paper about something she thought you might be interested in. We hope she has written down the recipe for her fig and pineapple jam and plum pudding, so we too can pass on and continue the traditions she began.

Mavis was also a woman who loved fashion. It felt like

you rarely saw her in the same outfit twice (just like the Queen) and her shoe collection rivalled that of Imelda Marcos. Having said this, always practical, nana had a flat-peaked trucker cap to block the glare from the overhead light while she read the Woman's Weekly or Herald Sun. Mavis had strong links in the community. Her affiliation with the Uniting Church, Probus and Country Women's Association tells us a lot about who Mavis was. Always one to take a plate, make a cake or make a donation, she was well-respected for her contributions and deep consideration of others.

How fortunate we had Nana to teach us all manner of things. Perhaps most significantly, how to cook. You could always rely on there being sweets for afternoon tea and sweets after dinner and we knew how to make them. When staying with Nana, part of the bargain was that you would go to church with her on a Sunday. She would proudly introduce us to all of her friends before settling us in to the cold, hard pews for an hour, but Nana was prepared and armed with sticks of fruit pastille life savers, such was the importance she placed on sharing her faith with us. She taught us to sew, knit and crochet with the patience of a saint. She took us on excursions in nature – fishing, picnics and long walks down the 'track' after dinner, quality, uninterrupted time when you could talk.

Nana was loyal to her family, and had a memory for detail to rival an elephant. She could remembered everyone's birthday, which by now was no mean feat given there were 15 great-grandchildren. Nana's children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren brought her immense joy. But most importantly, Nana taught us be thankful. She would insist on saying Grace at the table, reinforcing for us all - that we must be grateful. We are so grateful that we had such a good role model in our lives, and grateful that our own kids had a chance to know Nana Mavis.

Waking up at Nana's listening to her bustling around in the kitchen was so comforting. Everything would always be just right. The wood-fired stove or later, the heater, would already be on warming the kitchen and the radio or TV on providing the updates for the day. Grandad would have already had his breakfast, Nana would have already washed her floor, and breakfast would already be laid out for us. Things happened efficiently, and you felt safe and happy. This helps to explain the strength of her relationship with her own children with whom she always had very strong bonds and positive relationships.

In retirement, Nana and Grandad enjoyed simple pleasures together. Grandad knew exactly how to make Nana grin or chuckle with his wicked sense of humour. His partnership with Nana over 66 years is truly inspirational, staying true and firm to the wedding vows, and care for Nana when she needed it most. Modelling what respect, love and selflessness really looks like.

Nana's belief in God and the teachings of the Bible have no doubt brought us all great relief over the past week. Knowing that Nana's faith was very strong has been comforting. At the age of 92, Nana's physical presence has now gone, but her spirit will remain very much alive in us all, in our memories and our storytelling. She was a wife, a mother, a grandmother and great-grandmother and will leave behind an extraordinary legacy, in her family. She will be profoundly missed by us all but not forgotten.

Nana would recite this bedtime prayer with each of us grandchildren over the years when we would stay, and I share it now in memory of – Mavis Lillian Jenkins:

Now I lay me down to sleep, I pray the lord my soul to keep, And if I die before I wake, I pray the lord my soul to take. Amen





Mr Walsh said the 2019 AgriFutures Rural Women's Award identifies and supports emerging female leaders who want to create impact, innovate, and make a difference to rural and regional Australia.

He said that applicants can live in rural and regional Australia or in the city but their applications will be measured on the impact and benefits to rural and regional Australia.

"I encourage women in the Murray Plains Electorate who are

actively contributing to rural industries and regional communities to apply for the award," he said.

The winner of the award will receive a \$10,000 bursary to bring their idea or project to life, access to professional development opportunities and national Alumni networks.

Nominations for the 2019 Rural Women's Award are open now and close on 31 October 2018.




IN THE... LIBRARY

Community fruit fly efforts ramp up **Key reminders for winter**

- Remove all fruit left hanging on tree from autumn e.g. apples, pears, quinces, pomegranates etc
- Dispose of fallen fruit e.g. citrus seal it in a plastic bag and kill any larvae by leaving it in the sun for several days, freeze it for two days or zap it in the microwave
- Think about how much fruit you need and only keep as many

trees as you can manage

- Prune your trees down to head or chase height. This way you have a greater chance of protecting all the fruit during the season
- If you haven't been able to control the fruit fly consider removing the trees
- Help older family, friends and neighbours to prune or remove trees
- Contact GSPFA for free removal of unwanted fruit trees from domestic gardens by phoning (03) 5022 0327
