Former Lockington Football Under 17 Premiership Captain of 2010 Hayden Chappel wins best on ground in 2018 Grand Final in the North West League A.F.L of N.S.W.

After Captaining the Lockington Under 17 to the 2010 Premiership Hayden was poached by Mitiamo in the Loddon Valley League, where he went on to win the Rising Star award for the Loddon Valley League 2011.

Work took Hayden north to Inverell N.S.W not far from the Queensland border, where he joined the Inverell "Saints" in 2013.

Hayden played in the 2013 and 2014 Grand finals where they got pumped by Armidale.

Hayden said "It was good to get out there and have a 16 point win over Gunnedah.". Chappel's job wasn't easy in the final when Gunnedah "Bulldogs" captain was sent out to tag him, "It changes the game a little bit." Hayden said. Hello Everyone,

A hundred years ago, people living here in our district would have been hoping each day to hear that the long months of the Great War had finally come to a conclusion. All indications were that an armistice was inevitable; only the formalities needed to be addressed but, as late as 29 October, 1918, it was still uncertain whether Germany would accept President Wilson's terms. These terms - a list of fourteen principles for peace negotiations - had been outlined by United States President Wilson in January, 1918. They had now been put to the Germans in a strongly worded document, commended by Allied leaders for its use of "language that [was] becoming necessary in dealing with people who insist on being evasive." However, on 31 October, the *Bendigo Independent* reported that the Versailles Conference had agreed on an armistice, the terms of which would be considered by the military. Final peace terms were to be submitted to Germany simultaneously with the armistice.

A peace declaration was confidently expected; so much so that, on 21 October, a public meeting convened by Cr Jas. Martin was held in the Bamawm Hall to decide what was going to be done in Bamawm by way of peace celebrations. According to the Rochester Express of 26 October, those present unanimously resolved that the proceedings would take the form of a procession of decorated vehicles, etc., round the reserve grounds. This would be followed by a picnic, with a concert in the evening, and the night would conclude with a bonfire. "The date of the event was left in the hands of General Foch, though he was not present at the [Ferdinand Foch was the French general who meeting." served as the Supreme Allied Commander during the First World War.] The committee decided to hold the celebrations on the day following the announcement in the daily papers of the declaration of peace, unless that should be a Saturday, in which case the celebrations would be held on Monday.

On Thursday, 31 October, 1918, the Bendigo Independent published a report, relayed by Reuters on Tuesday, from Washington, United States, that "the terms on which Germany may contain an armistice have been concluded and have been signed by the Allies in Paris... If accepted, the reply suggesting the settling for peace, or the desire to fight on, may also be received in 24 hours." And so the long wait went on. Though the weather was fine, entries were slightly down on the previous year but all were of high quality. Results published by the Bendigo Independent on 7 November, show that some entrants from our area did very well. John Mitchell of Piavella was particularly successful in the sheep section, while P Mitchell

enjoyed similar success with his entries in the poultry section. Others who won awards were the Worner Family of Tennyson, who exhibited their pigs, and T O'Brien of Pannoobamawm, who entered his dog. Quoting from an article published on Monday, 4 November,

1918, by The Times, of London, the Independent had reported on 6 November, that, whilst twenty-four leaders of Europe and America sat at the Conference table, drawing up terms whereby the foundations of the new Europe were to be laid, it would be folly to predict that the delegates to the Versailles Conference were agreed on all guestions. But it still gave cause to hope. The Cohuna Farmer's Weekly suggested that that week might "prove to be one of the most memorable and momentous in the military and political history of the world."

It is not surprising that people were in a highly excitable state and, on Friday, 8 November, 1918, there were celebrations yet again! - at false news of the signing of the Armistice. Once more the news came via Vancouver to Melbourne, and it was then conveyed by telegraph and telephone to Bendigo, where it caused "wild rejoicing". Local residents flocked to the heart of the city; a "scratch" band played and marched through the streets; and patriotic addresses were delivered. The arrival of special editions of two Melbourne daily newspapers, featuring scare headings announcing peace, appeared to confirm the news which was, by then, being denied by people from the Bendigo Advertiser. The Advertiser had received an official message of denial of the rumour from the State Office, Washington. Finally, this news, coupled with the recall of the special scare editions of the Melbourne dailies, convinced most people that their merrymaking had been premature, as the Advertiser reported in its edition of Saturday, 9 November.

That same edition of the Advertiser carried the news that Rochester had been similarly misinformed, and had been once again carried away by a false report. "The rumours that the German envoys had accepted the armistice terms spread early, and caused unlimited joy and enthusiasm in the town. Bells were rung and kerosene tins banged. Local lassies paraded the streets wildly ringing table bells and blowing kazoo noise-producers. Staid citizens joined in the rejoicing, and the town went mad with enthusiasm... At about 11 a.m. Mr. Patrick Keogh, president of the Rochester Shire, who had corroboration of the rumours on the 'phone before taking civic action. Eventually Cr. Keogh, addressing a large and excited crowd from the steps of the Shire Hall, stated that the news lacked confirmation."



BREAKING DOWN COUNTRY STUDENT BARRIERS Thursday, 27th September 2018

Rural students choosing to study away from home at the completion of their secondary schooling will be better supported to settle into tertiary education under a Liberal Nationals Government.
