REMEMBRANCE DAY HAS A SPECIAL SIGNIFICANCE

IN 2018.

Sunday, 11 November 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of the Armistice which ended the First World War (1914-18).



One hundred years ago, on 11 November 1918, the guns of the Western Front fell silent after four years of continuous warfare. With their armies retreating and close to collapse, German leaders signed an Armistice, bringing to an end the First World War. From the summer of 1918, the five divisions of the Australian Corps had been at the forefront of the allied advance to victory. Beginning with their stunning success at the battle of Hamel in July, they helped to turn the tide of the war at Amiens in August, followed by the capture of Mont St Quentin and Pèronne, and the breaching of German defences at the Hindenburg Line in September. By early October the exhausted Australians were withdrawn from battle. They had achieved a fighting reputation out of proportion to their numbers, but victory had come at a heavy cost. They suffered almost 48,000 casualties during 1918, including more than 12,000 dead.

In the four years of the war more than 330,000 Australians had served overseas, and more than 60,000 of them had died. The social effects of these losses cast a long shadow over the postwar decades.

Each year on this day Australians observe one minute's silence at 11am, in memory of those who died or suffered in all wars and armed conflicts.

Hello again, Everyone,

When the signing of the Armistice on 11 November, 1918, brought an end to the hostilities of the First World War, there was general rejoicing throughout the Allied nations, and thousands of people attended Peace Celebrations, marches and victory parades in Australia's state capitals. At the official level, in Europe and in Australia, there was great relief that hostilities were at an end at last, and messages of gratitude and congratulation were sent to and from the King, various Prime Ministers, Presidents and other Heads of Government, and military leaders. Detailed terms of the final Peace Settlement were still being discussed, and arrangements were being made for the distribution of food and other much-needed supplies to the people living in the devastated areas where most of the fighting had taken place. It would still be some time before life could resume its normal course but now there was hope for the future. Across the allied nations, people demonstrated their joy and, in London, members of the Royal Family processed through the streets amid cheering crowds, before the King made an address from the balcony of Buckingham Palace. All this was reported by the *Weekly Times* in its edition of 16 November, 1918, and may well have been read by our family members.

On the local scene, peace celebrations were under way. Bamawm was off to a head start, having held their organizing meeting three weeks earlier, formed their sub-committees and planned their event. Everything was ready and at 11 o'clock on 13 November (44 hours after Germany signed the surrender) the crowd began to gather. Their procession – "a thing of beauty, ingenuity and humour" – was led by the Rochester band, and drew the crowd around the grandstand for the singing of the Doxology and the National Anthem, and to hear the official opening address by Councillor Martin. Other speeches were made, followed by cheers for "the King, the Allies, the Empire and the French nation, coupled with Marshal Foch." Then, an afternoon of sports and side-shows was followed by an evening concert, after which some returned men mounted a platform, received a hearty cheer, and set ablaze the bonfire which they had built earlier. Dancing in the local hall brought the successful celebrations to a close.

Ballendella's festivities took place on the following Saturday, 16 November, 1918, in the "beautiful school grounds." The proceedings began with the flag-raising and the singing of the National Anthem, followed by a

short opening speech by Mr W T Williams, chairman of the local committee. A "sumptuous luncheon" was then enjoyed, and an afternoon of sports activities followed. All those attending then had a wonderful surprise when the Rochester Band turned up, and an impromptu procession formed. Commemorative Badges were then presented to the two returned soldiers present, Privates Hansen and Kellett, and to all of the local school children. Afternoon tea was served, and the gathering dispersed at about 5 pm, to reassemble at the Ballendella Hall at 8 pm for a concert and dance. A memorable day was had by all.

As the *Weekly Times* reported on 16 November, a message of congratulation had been sent to the King on behalf of the Australian people. It was also reported that the Governor-General, Sir Ronald Munro Ferguson had despatched the following message to the Secretary of State for the Colonies: - "On behalf of the Government and People of the Commonwealth, I hasten to express the profound feeling of satisfaction and joy prevailing throughout Australia at the conclusion of the armistice, symbolising, as it does, the surrender of Germany. I congratulate His Majesty's Government upon the wise and resolute statesmanship that made and preserved the Great Alliance which confronted and finally defeated the enemy. I desire to express the deep gratitude of the Commonwealth to the Allied nations, whose inflexible adherence to the cause of humanity has re-established safety and liberty. To the men of the Navies and Armies of Britain and the Allies, Australia renders profound and grateful thanks for their unparalleled valour and service. I trust that ere long a righteous and enduring peace will rest upon all the nations smitten by this dreadful war."

It had indeed been a dreadful war. On 19 November, 1918, the Department of Defence published details of the number of casualties suffered by the Australian Imperial Forces up to 16 November. They totalled 296, 773; the details being as follows: - Dead, 55,554; missing, 66; prisoners, 3,432; wounded, 160,191; sick, 77,314; and not specified, 216.

There is more to be recounted next time. 'Bye until then,

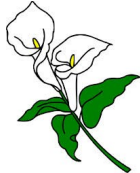

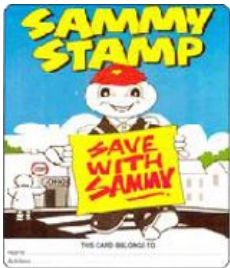

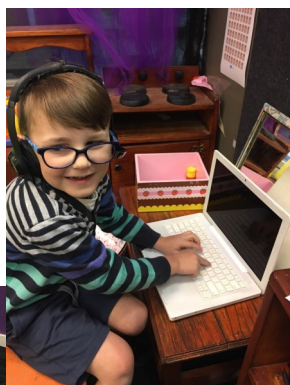
Congratulations

On Friday we had a 7 hour drive on the way back. We also stopped at the dog in the tucker box. It was really fun.

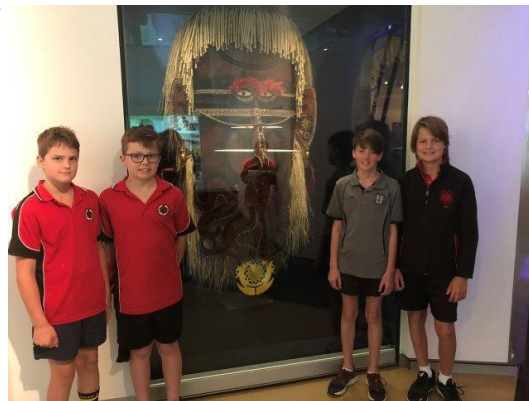

Glenda Nichol of Ballendella is one of the Bendigo Embroiderers Guild members entering in their exhibition "Embroidery For All Seasons" to be held on November 16th-18th. Glenda has been a member for 8 years and with the exhibition held biannually, is her fourth. "We do so much more than embroidery", visitors will see a huge variety of techniques of textile art, felting, beading, fabric embossing, too many to mention. Members make a large collection of items for sale and the trading table is very popular. Whether you enjoy making craft or just looking, it is a wonderful display and we have people travel far and wide to see our collection and shop.

Exhibiting 12 entries, the last six months Glenda has focused on using recycled materials and has created

hand bags using hay baling twine, string and raffia. After reading about the lady in Kerang who is renowned for her tea bag string scarves, Glenda started collecting strings and has just finished her fourth scarf. "I decided the natural strings don't go with my silver hair so I experimented dyeing them. Blueberries give a lovely purple and strawberries a nice dusty pink. People think I'm mad but it is very relaxing tying and knitting. And now that I've started saving the strings it has become a habit so I am thinking of new ideas for the 2020 exhibition".

My favourite piece I've made over this two year period is an embroidered portrait of my mother – Gwen Houlden, who coincidentally went to Sunday School in St Andrews Hall and was married in their church next door.

Rochester & Elmore District Health Service (REDHS) auspiced by the Campaspe Shire were awarded a \$51,000 grant as part of the \$200 million Regional Jobs and Investment Packages supporting the Australian Government's commitment to stimulate economic growth in Australian regions.

The funding package awarded will be responsible to conduct a feasibility study into models for aged care accommodation for the district including assessing current choices alongside future opportunities including the potential use of vacant land to the south of the current REDHS site.

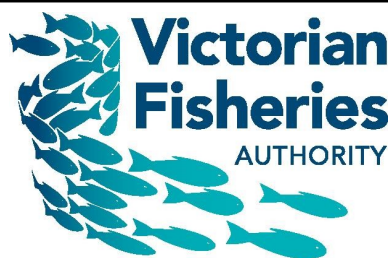

MORE YABBY NETS ARRIVE FOR FREE SWAP

Wednesday 24 October
2018

Recreational anglers are being encouraged once again to swap their opera house yabby nets for free wildlife friendly open-top lift nets at any one of 60 tackle shops that have just received their second delivery.

Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) CEO Travis Dowling said there was an incredibly positive response from anglers in September to the first offer that saw 4,000 nets swapped in only a few weeks.

"Some tackle shops ran out of stock in days given the overwhelming support for the program and widespread willingness to embrace wildlife friendly ways of yabby fishing," Mr Dowling said

"Our second delivery of 6,000 nets has now arrived with tackle shops so we're keen for anglers who missed the first offer to return and swap over up to three opera house nets for three open-top lift nets.

"The yabby net swap program is raising awareness of the impending ban on opera house nets in all waters, public and private, from 1 July 2019 and is funded by the State Government's *Target One Million* plan, which is investing a record \$46 million to get more people fishing, more often.

"Open-top nets are permitted in public and private waters, so the rule change next year will make it simpler for fishers who will be able to use the same nets regardless of location.

"Opera house nets are associated with drowning wildlife such as platypus, turtles and native water rats, which can be avoided entirely if open-top nets are used instead.

"Unlike opera house nets, open-top nets feature a gap at their top, which enables air-breathing animals such as turtles to escape.

"Research shows open-top lift nets are very effective at catching yabbies when compared to opera house nets.

"A limited numbers of open-top lift nets will also be available at selected VFA regional events and handed out by Fisheries Officers on patrol in northern Victoria."

Mr Dowling encouraged anglers to first contact participating stores before dropping in because this second delivery is expected to go like hotcakes. We have ordered another 10,000 nets given demand, which are expected to arrive in early December.

FIX COUNTRY ROADS - SAVE COUNTRY LIVES

Tuesday 30 October 2018

Murray Plains will benefit from safer roads under a Liberal Nationals plan to invest \$1 billion over ten years to fix country roads and save country lives.

If elected, the new Road Fix Blitz program will restore our neglected country and regional roads and will also see the proper investments made to improve roads before they begin to break down.

Shadow Minister for Regional Victoria and Decentralisation and Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh said our roads were less safe under city-centric Labor's neglect of Regional Victoria.

"The Premier for Melbourne's and Labor's neglect of our regional roads is putting the lives and safety of local people at risk," Mr Walsh said.

"Reducing the speed limit on dangerous roads or rushed patch jobs just doesn't cut it. We need real investment and to plan for better roads for the Murray Plains electorate.

"Only The Nationals in government will make the investment needed to fix country roads and save country lives."

In 2017 there were 156 road fatalities on rural and regional roads which made up 60.2 per cent of all Victorian road deaths that year. In the year to date, there have been 84 road fatalities in regional Victoria which is just over 50 per cent of fatalities across the state.

As well as boosting funding to fix country roads, an elected Liberal Nationals Government will also improve

response times for urgent repair works, commissioning a new smartphone app for real-time reporting of road hazards.

Mr Walsh said the \$1 billion Road Fix Blitz will inject significant funds upfront to fix our country and regional roads properly

"No more patch-up jobs, but proper fixes to get back in control of regional road maintenance," Mr Walsh said.

"Before the last election Daniel Andrews claimed the East West Link contract wasn't worth the paper it was written on and that lie cost taxpayers \$1.3 billion.

"It's unforgiveable that Daniel Andrews wasted \$1.3 billion that could have been spent on improving the safety of regional roads."

Funding for the \$1 billion Road Fix Blitz will be made up of \$400 million for the Country Roads and Bridges program, another \$400 million for targeted road restoration and a \$200 million boost for general road maintenance.

The Road Fix Blitz program will be in addition to existing road maintenance and restoration initiatives delivered by VicRoads.

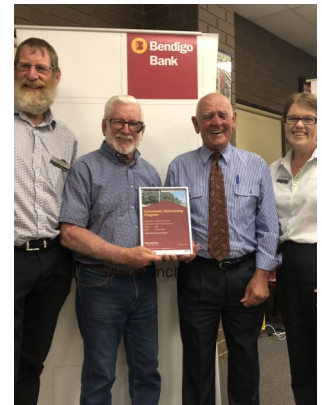
