Our neighbour's grandchildren would come down for a swim or bring their kayaks on the hot summer days. Their shrieks of laughter livened up the air as they splashed around or fell out of the kayak!

There was a soothing and refreshing sound of the waterfall in the channel that ran along the side of our home that added to the peaceful ambience. I would sit and reflect that the Goulburn River stretched up here via the channel. It flows past my home town where I grew up and it gave me a sense of being connected to family. Many childhood memories of family picnics and fishing expeditions came flooding back.

Hello again Everyone,

When the 'Great War' finally came to an end with the signing of the Armistice on 11 November, 1918, there was rejoicing around the world and the people of this district joined in the general merrymaking. Residents from throughout the region came together to participate in several Victory/Peace celebratory functions which were held; the first at Bamawm, on 13 November, the next at Ballendella, on 16 November, and finally an event at Tennyson, on 18 November. This last celebration was reported in full by the Rochester Express, on 23 November, 1918, and read as follows: - "On Monday at the M.I.A. Hall, victory celebrations were held, and, although everything was done hurriedly, the gathering was a great success. A programme of sports was held for the kiddies, and presents were made to all under 16 years. The procession was led by two returned men, Ptes Wright (M.M.) and Kellett, on grey horses, with the Rochester Band, followed by lorries for each of the Allies, flags of the Allies and Red Cross, with buggies and jinkers representing Peace, Spring, etc., and seven young ladies on horses, each with a letter which, when lined up spelled 'Victory'. The riders were the Misses Singer, Helmore (2), Rake, Smith, Druce, and Martin. Then a varied collection of comic characters, one being the absentminded beggar who carried his dog and led his swag. We must not forget the tin band formed by the boys of Bamawm Railway Station State School. [This school was later renamed as Lockington.]'

The Echuca and Moama Advertiser also carried a report of the event in its issue of 26 November, 1918. It stated that the procession was one that would long be remembered, and to use the words of Mr. Allan, M.L.A., it "was the finest he had seen outside of the large cities." The committee was fortunate in securing the attendance of the region's representative, Mr Allan, M.L.A., who was motored there by Mr Ben Cox. The chairman, Councillor Ham, introduced him to the gathering which he addressed, and then formally declared the celebration open. Councillors Martin and Rankin, also spoke. The *Express* went on to report that "The sports were concluded by races for adults. The Gretna Green, race was won by L. Oliver and M. O'Brien, potato race W. Slattery, cigarette race C. Bain, stepping chain L. Oliver, sheep guess H. Bolshaw."

In the evening the hall was crowded at a concert, presided over by Councillor Ham, which the *Echuca and Moama Advertiser* reported "opened with the singing of the Doxology and National Anthem. The Misses Clancy rendered an overture, children of the Bamawm Central State school (pupils of Mrs. Hubble) danced pleasingly the sailors'

hornpipe, a vocal duet was contributed by the Misses Helmore, a quartette by the Misses Cunningham and Sinclair, recitations by Miss L. Elliott and Miss A. Scurrah, and songs by Mrs. Cobbet, Miss Walsh, and Messrs. N. Ham. K. Shotten, G. F. Long, and . I Whinfield. At the close, Mr. G. Turvey moved a hearty vote of thanks to all who had assisted during the great functions. This was carried by acclamation and the concert closed with the singing of the National Anthem and 'God Bless Our Splendid Men." The rest of the evening was given to dancing, with music provided by Mr O'Brien, Mrs J. Y. Anderson, and Misses Anderson, Clancy, and Sinclair. The organising committee (for whom Mr. W. Joyce was chairman and Cr. Ham secretary) were congratulated upon the success of the celebrations, all profits from which were devoted to the Soldiers' Memorial Fund.

The first party of returning ANZACs disembarked on Australian soil on 18 November, 1918, and on 19 November, the Echuca and Moama Advertiser was able to relay the welcome news, received from the guarantine authorities, that there was no influenza among the first large batch of returning Anzacs who had arrived at Fremantle. "The men of the leave draft were all well, and their vessel was granted pratique for all ports to Melbourne". The quarantine measures were proving effective, and it was noted as a promising sign that the vaccine prepared in the Commonwealth serum laboratory had been giving very satisfactory results in the treatment of cases in Sydney.

The Rochester Express reported on 30 November, 1918, that influenza had prevailed in Rochester for a considerable time, and the two local private hospitals could hardly accommodate the patients. The local doctor was having difficulty coping with the situation, but it was expected that Dr Campbell, who had been at the Palestine front, would return to the district soon thus providing some relief. The worst cases were those in which pneumonia supervened and many district residents had been attacked by it including some who were advanced in years. Just possibly this was the case for Mr. James Wright, one of the pioneer residents of the Bamawm district who, the Echuca and Moama Advertiser reported, was then an inmate of a Rochester private Mr. Wright was an hospital, suffering from pneumonia. octogenarian.





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EULOGY Kathleen Olive Cobbett (nee. Helmore) 6 September 1921 – 28 October 2018

Kath was the eldest of three, sister to Bob and Vernon. Her father, Frederick Helmore, was a WWI soldier on the Western front in France. He married Lorrie Gee before he enlisted and returned from the war to establish a soldiersettlement farm in Bamawm where Kath and her brothers were born.

Kath did well at school but had to take on greater family responsibilities when Vernon, as a teenager, required extensive medical care at St Vincent's Hospital. These events clearly had a big effect on her. She decided she wanted to become a doctor but found her education and resources (and possibly her gender) were not sufficient. Instead, she became a nurse.

Kath trained at St Vincent's during the war years, 1941-1944. She chose St Vincent's largely because of a connection with Sister Mary Oliver who was charge sister in the neurosurgical ward where Vernon had been a patient. She proudly remembered one day the class being asked an unlikely question by a lecturing consultant; "How many teeth are there in the upper jaw of a cow", and being the only student to know the answer. She completed her midwifery during 1945 at St Vincent's and the Mercy and delivered many dozens of babies during

her training. Kath was highly respected as a nurse and by 1946 had become charge sister in the neurosurgical ward at St Vincent's. She then worked as Staff Midwife at Calvary Hospital in Hobart and in 1950 returned home where she was Tutor Sister at the Echuca hospital.

Kath married Martin Cobbett in June 1951 and left the nursing workforce to become a dairy farmer on the Cobbett family farm in Lockington and raise a family. Theirs was a lifelong loving and equal partnership in making important decisions about the farm and in raising a family. They became loving parents to Will (born 1953) and Chris (1955) and made significant sacrifices to ensure they received an excellent education.

Kath and Martin were always community-minded contributors. They were involved in St Mary's Anglican church, the Lockington Bush-Nursing Centre, swimming pool and school and were always engaged in the life of the community. One of Kath's enduring pastimes was golf and she was proud to be a founding member and, later, a life member of the Bamawm Golf Club for which she served as President and Secretary and occasionally was club champion.

Eventually they sold the farm to John Hewlett, next door, but continued to live in the farmhouse and tend an extensive garden and be part of the community for many years. In 1987, so as to be close to their sons, they moved to Clifton Hill in Melbourne. They brought their country ways with them and within weeks had met dozens of local residents. Martin died in 1992 but Kath continued living in her own home and was the centre of a circle who met daily for coffee (or a glass of red) in the local Café Quince. Kath is remembered fondly by many Clifton Hill residents.

Kath was a warm and generous mother-in-law to Jonathan and in 2006 she was delighted to become Nana to Eva. Kath was a kind, loving, independent, and outspoken woman who saw in Eva a kindred spirit.

WHEELIE???

Regular household waste collection is one of the many important services provided by council for our local community.

We are lucky to have such good services provided to us, especially green waste bins, so please ensure that you are fully aware as to what goes in which bins.

Ordinary household waste is collected weekly and recycling is collected fortnightly across the shire. A garden waste collection service is also available for a small extra fee.

Waste bins are provided by council:

Waste bin (red lid), picked up Weekly

Recycling bin (yellow lid) picked up Fortnightly

Green Waste bin (green lid) picked up Fortnightly

(opposite fortnight to Recycle)

Correct bin placement

Remember to place your bins at your kerbside the night before they are due for collection. Bins should be placed out on the nature strip:

parallel to the kerb with the lid opening onto the road

- away from overhead trees
- away from power poles or street signs
- away from parked cars

spaced at least 30 cm away from other bins.

Recycling

There are many items you can now recycle including: glass bottles and jars, milk and juice cartons, aluminium/tin/steel cans including aerosol cans, plastics with recycle symbols 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 including milk, juice, soft drink, detergent, shampoo bottles, margarine, yoghurt and ice cream containers, paper products including letters, envelopes, advertising material, newspapers, magazines cardboard, telephone books, work and school papers

Remember DO NOT place the following items in your recycling bin (yellow lid bin)

YABBY NETS FOR FREE SWAP

The Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) plans to change the types of yabby nets that can be used by recreational anglers The changes, to be introduced from 1 July 2019, will simplify yabby fishing rules and ban the use of opera house nets in all Victorian waters.

Many fishers who have purchased opera house nets to fish for yabbies are unaware that these nets are currently banned in all Victorian public waters. The opera house nets were banned because their use has been implicated in the drowning of air breathing wildlife, such as water rats (rakali), platypus and turtles. VFA's research has shown alternative 'wildlife friendly' yabby nets, such as open top lift nets, are just as effective at catching yabbies.

The VFA's yabby net swap program will enable fishers to trade in their old opera house nets for free 'wildlife friendly' open top lift nets (while stocks last). Open top nets can be legally used in both public and private Victorian waters.

RED P PLATERS TO GET DISCOUNT ON CAR REGISTRATION

Tuesday 6 November 2018

Red P-Platers will receive a \$295 discount on

their car registration under an elected Nationals Government.

Leader of The Nationals and Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh said the initiative was part of The Nationals' plan to tackle cost of living pressures for local families.

Mr Walsh said households costs had skyrocketed over the last four years under the Andrews Labor Government.

"Families have been slugged with sky-rocketing electricity and gas price hikes as well as 12 new or increased taxes in the last four years under Daniel Andrews," Mr Walsh said.

"Recent reports by the Essential Services Commission show that some Victorians may be paying as much as \$1,000 more this year for their electricity or gas.

"For young rural Victorians, owning a car is essential when starting in the workforce, taking up a trade or further studies.

"About 50,000 Victorians get their red P-Plates each year. This commitment will make a real difference to young people struggling with the extra costs of buying and owning a car and other costs of life after school."

Mr Walsh said The Nationals would ease the cost of living through better economic management and a series of programs to put more money in the pockets of Victorians.

"We have already announced free school books for all secondary students at public schools which will save families around \$2,800 a student throughout secondary school," Mr Walsh said.

"We have also announced that Victorian households will save up to \$100 a year on their water bills through better management of the water corporations.

"We are also committed to delivering cheaper gas and electricity bills for over 900,000 low income earners by using 'people power' to deliver cheaper gas and electricity costs for over 900,000 low income earners that could mean annual savings between \$250 and \$530.

"Rural Victorians can't afford four more years of Labor taxes that will put even more pressure on household budgets."

The \$295 discount for red P-Platers is the non-TAC component of registration of car registration. Red P-Platers will effectively only have to pay for the TAC component including compulsory third party insurance.

LIBERAL NATIONALS TO EXPAND COMMUNITY ICE ACTION GRANTS PROGRAM

Sunday 18 November 2018

An elected Liberal Nationals Government will expand the successful Community Ice Action Grants program, giving communities in the Murray Plains electorate and across Victoria more opportunities to implement community solutions to tackle the scourge of Ice.

Figures from the Australian Criminal Intelligence Commission show Ice use is rising in regional Victoria.


