In July 1923 in Lockington a Masonic Lodge was borne to a great fanfare from both Masonic and non Masonic sources.

To house the lodge a building was erected in Burns Street; it was erected solely by members of the lodge in that very hot summer of 1922/23.

Grand Lodge of Victoria members from Melbourne attended to open it as well as many visitors from all over Victoria; all converging on the little town of Lockington.

The first officers of the lodge had names like J.M. Cowley. J. Mundie, H & J Barwood,G.J. Rankin, G.H.Levick, and T. Pentreath, as well as other well known local identities.

The Stability lodge was ablaze in the first 15 years of its existence with members who joined its ranks from near and far. At one stage it grew to over 120 members in the 1930's

It even sent food parcels to England during the second world war, receiving thanks after the war from a lodge in Bristol and a set of gavels made from the wood of a Pear Tree dating back to 1650's.

The Lodge became stronger and stronger in the 1950's to 1970's having members with names like A.I. Londey, R. Bickford, J.McMinn, R.Harry, T. Davis, the Shawcross Bros. and many, many more whose names have sadly slipped away into antiquity.

The Lodge carried on from year to year doing it's work of endeavouring to make good men better until 2012 when it, itself like so many other institutions, slid away to antiquity.

It sadly closed it's doors and returned its charter to Grand Lodge of Victoria ending a time of 89 years of

wonderful brotherhood and everlasting friendships.

Like Norman Crumpler, whose story appeared in our last Locky News, some of the Anzacs would not be returning to For those who were arriving home, there would have been Australia for some time, possibly "six months or a year." Some hundreds of Australian servicemen served in Russia as part of a British force fighting Bolshevik forces, and some of our light horse units were involved in suppressing a revolt in Egypt, in early 1919. On 21 November, 1918, the Bendigonian reported that the secretary of the Australian Comforts Fund in Melbourne, wanted it known that the signing of the armistice did not end the urgent need for the comforts that had been so much appreciated by the fighting forces throughout the previous four years. Military authorities, including General Monash, had made a special appeal for the Comforts Fund to continue its work until the ' successful termination of the war, and Australian withdrawal." With a promise that there would be no waste or extravagance on the part of the military, the article in the describing the conflicts that were occurring in naming the newspaper urged the co-operation of the public in not various railway stations along the Elmore-Cohuna railway slackening in any way until all the units of the Australian line, but "Lockington" was not mentioned. In late November, 1918, the Bendigo Independent reported that the Rochester Shire Council had received a letter from the 3rd Military District Headquarters "re the reception and entertainment of Anzacs." The 3rd Military District was an administrative district of the Australian Army, and covered all of Victoria and the portion of New South Wales south of the Its headquarters was located in Murrumbidgee River. Melbourne. The letter, read at the monthly meeting of the Shire, stated that the department would endeavour to give notice of the names of Anzacs returning to the district as soon as lists became available. Anticipated dates of arrival would be published in the daily papers. Because an official, civic welcome would be tendered in Melbourne to all returning service personnel, local men would not be given leave immediately they landed on Australian soil. However, following the official function, they would be given a 60-day

leave pass enabling them to travel to their country homes.

At the Council meeting, it was decided that the local Anzac Association would welcome individual soldiers as each further complicated by the spread of influenza, which meant quarantine stations. Despite these precautions, by February, the influenza epidemic was filling hospitals across the country and plans for many of the welcoming events had to be abandoned.

much that was unfamiliar, particularly in our own area. Where Lockington would later stand, according to the Rochester Express on 14 September, 1914, there had been "compact farms, intense culture, and homes within neighbourly distance of each other", but no township. By November, that year, construction of the Elmore-Cohuna rail line [was going] ahead, and a party of surveyors began work setting out the township that would surround 'Bamawm Railway Station'. And, by August, 1915, the Elmore-Cohuna rail line was complete as far as Gunbower and, on 17 August, 1915, a Mr Kellaway from the Melbourne Railway office visited the district to check on proposed sites for the railway station that was to be provided near Tennyson. About that same time, an article appeared in The Bulletin

On 28 April, 1916, the Express reported the auction of township lots, though "there were not many present" and "the bidding was not spirited." However the report added that the "township [had] been nicely laid out, and it [was] anticipated that Mr Elwood Mead's dream of a picturesque township [would] yet eventuate at Bamawm in close proximity to the railway station, where a number of township blocks were disposed of for business and residential purposes about 12 months ago. The irrigation channel runs in front of the proposed township."
