Hello again, Everyone

While the First World War was being fought in Europe, the Closer Settlement areas around Rochester, particularly those in our district had been continuing to develop. The following is part of an article that appeared in the Age newspaper on Monday, 17 March, 1919, and it gives some indication of just how well the district and its prospects must have looked to the servicemen returning to Australia after peace was declared.

ROCHESTER DISTRICT TRANSFORMED.

A journey by road across the country which lies between Shepparton and Rochester affords striking evidence of the value of irrigation. Like so many steel bands glistening in the sun are to be seen miles of artificial waterways branching off in all directions. These demonstrate in no uncertain measure the triumph of man over nature ... [T] here are beautiful green paddocks, with luxuriant crops shimmering in the breeze and acres upon acres of orchards, which with their heavily laden trees are a delight to the eye. [Travelling westwards] fruit-growing becomes less, and mixed farming is the main pursuit. But in both cases the results of irrigation have been the same. It has not only led to increased settlement, but it has tremendously added to the productivity and land values of the district ... In the pre-irrigation time the whole area from Rochester to the Murray, embracing no fewer than 60,000 acres, had upon it only two homesteads, and it was used almost exclusively for grazing. There are now 167 families on that same land, 61 of whom are on irrigation blocks and 103 engaged in dry farming ... Many other such cases could be quoted ... Ten years ago, only 500 out of 128,800 acres in Rochester district were irrigated. Now water rights have been apportioned to 32,148 acres, while 51 properties, embracing 27,700 acres, have been purchased for irrigable closer settlement. These broad acres, which were previously occupied by 31 families, have been subdivided into 321 farm allotments, and there now live and prosper upon them 276 families.... Dairying and the growing of lucerne for sheep-fattening purposes are the most popular [farming pursuits], and apparently, the most successful industries in this particular district. A lucerne paddock which was cut ten days ago has another crop coming on, already over 6 inches high, one of the almost unbelievable results due solely to irrigation. The dairy herds have increased by 75 Marg O'Brien per cent, during the past twelve months....

Mr. W. Hall, who is on the Bamawm Estate, [says] that since October last [his] 45 acres of lucerne have carried

1000 sheep continuously. In its natural state that same land would have carried one and a half sheep to the acre, or 67 instead of 1000 for the whole area. ... A former mechanic in a Glasgow foundry, who came to the district seven years ago, is doing well with pears, apricots, peaches, oranges and lemons; and a Lancashire weaver, who was totally unused to farm work, is flourishing on an excellent dairy allotment, with 1000 head of fowls as a side line. Both are on the Bamawm Estate. An excellent future is predicted for citrus fruits in this area. One settler made £100 off 106 trees "THE DRY NORTH, WHAT IRRIGATION HAS DONE, on an acre and a quarter of ground this season. The cultivation of lemons is rapidly expanding. There are other such records as £123 off an acre of peaches and £300 from an acre of tomatoes. These are, of course, exceptional cases, but they demonstrate the possibilities under irrigation. As to the added value irrigation gives to the land, a striking case is on record. Fourteen years ago 160 acres of what is now the Bamawm Estate was sold for £6 10/ per acre. On 14th December, 1912, an American settler bought the property for £20 per acre, greatly to the amazement of many of the local people, but two years later he disposed of 96 acres of it at £44 cash per acre, and he afterwards sold the remainder of the 160 acres, which he had converted into orchards, at £62 per acre. That the town of Rochester has reaped much of the benefit of this development round about it goes without saying. It now supports two butter factories, where there was only one before; a cattle market, four banks, eight hotels and about 50 shops. The town is electrically lighted. The main feature, however, is the establishment of three or four additional small railway townships in the area, a form of decentralisation of which the State is so much in need."

> Though most were un-named in this newspaper article, the settlers who were relatively recently arrived from overseas in 1919, possibly had surnames that we would recognise among fellow local residents today. I wonder if any reader can claim an ancestor or two in that report. comparison, an inch is equal to 2.5 centimetres; 1 acre of land is equal to slightly less than ½ a hectare; and 1 pound (£) converts to 2 dollars (\$), but it would need some further adjustment to calculate just how much those 1919 pounds would be worth in our 2019 dollars. I'll leave it to you until next time.

LOCKINGTON DISTRICT PLANNING GROUP 21st January 2019 Summary of meeting

Channel:

Barry Graham spoke about discussions they are having with the Shire re Traveller's Rest versus Caravan park status. They wish to remain a Traveller's rest. Shire suggested that they rezone the area as "Public Use Zone". The public loading ramp will not be effected by the rezoning. This area is currently zoned as 'township'. This new development will be for sites for self contained vans during special events such as tractor rally, swap meet and music festival weekend. After general question and answer session.

Motion: "That all present, representing the clubs, businesses and organisations, they agree with the rezoning of the land which includes the Lions Park, travellers rest and the area known as common ground on the east side of Market Street from "township" to "public use zone". Carried unanimously.

Sam Campi:

Shire looking at overall project / plan for the district.

Consultant coming in over the next 6 months to ensure where Lockington will be in 5 – 10 years time. Looking at employment opportunities. Theme for the town. – dependent on funding received

Need to look at the 'big picture' goals, how do we maximise what we already have. Personality, goodwill of the town

How does Locky survive in years to come, keep challenging ourselves to go further.

Shire will get Government agencies to come in and talk to you about your ideas, eg. Vic Roads

When asked about plans for future housing development, replied need to look at cost and desired value of land – what are people willing to pay

How do we get festival or some other event to a sustainable level that then only requires assistance from local volunteers

Need to work together to clearly identify goals and that proposals put forward by different groups meet with the town's objective and plan

Shire will help you find funding that suits your projects **Pool:** Early morning swimming between 7 and 9 on a Tuesday / Wednesday well attended

Hall: Sam Campi and Judy Sims to have meeting after this meeting to ensure that the complete kitchen project can begin shortly.

Senior Citizens: Sam – spoke to Robyn (Shire) and Vic Roads will not let us put a speed indicator sign on their roads, especially during holiday periods where they are regularly damaged. Sam will follow up with the maintenance request for the road shoulders to be fixed. Sam will also see if he can organise a flashing "50" sign like the ones used for school crossings.

Ice Cream Shop:

Sign on leader roads to town. Can have sign with three symbols so after discussion decided to put Toilet, Café and Caravan park (travellers rest) symbol on sign.

EMFM radio will be happy to promote our town via a town spokesperson. They are happy to promote our brand - John to follow this up.

Ice cream shop will be holding some sort of competition over the tractor rally weekend to help provide entertainment for those coming to town

Sam - look at Wikki camps as a means of getting

your town noticed.

Wendy had asked for a quote from Hammer Graphics to put a sign on the existing notice board at both the south and north entrance to town. This sign will have Fuel, Eating, Toilet and Caravan symbols on it.

Mov: Wendy Sec: Colin B "That two signs be purchased from Hammer Graphics at the cost of \$70 and that the money from the Shire's sign funds for Lockington be used to pay for the signs." Carried

Keeping Skin safe

Changes to look out for when checking your skin

- New moles
- Moles that increase in size
- A spot that changes colour from brown to black or is different
- A spot that is raised or develops with a lump within it
- When surface of a mole becomes rough, scaly or ulcerated
- Moles that itch or tingle
- Moles that bleed or weep
- Spots that look different to others

Protect your skin

For best protection when in the sun, we recommend a combination of sun protection measures:

- Slip on sun-protective clothing, that covers as much skin as possible
- Slop on broad spectrum water resistant SPF30+ sunscreen. Apply 20 minutes before going outdoors and reapply every 2 hours whilst outdoors
- Slap on a hat that protects your face, head, neck and ears
- Wear sunglasses that meet Australian standards

Be extra cautious in the middle of the day when UV levels are most intense.



FOSTERVILLE GOLD MINE EXPLORATION ACTIVITIES NOTIFICATION TO LANDHOLDERS



This notification is to inform landholders about Fosterville Gold Mine's upcoming regional exploration activities.

In recent times, Fosterville Gold Mine (FGM) has experiencing record production and continued growth, with a prosperous outlook for the future. Kirkland Lake Gold, the owner of the Fosterville Gold Mine, is using this opportunity to increase FGM's exploration activities. During 2018, FGM progressed exploration in and around its current mining and exploration licenses (MIN5404 and EL3539). This included campaigns of soil sampling, electromagnetic surveys, ground gravity surveys and drilling.

Further to these activities, FGM will soon be undertaking Airborne Gravity Gradiometry (AGG) and Airborne Electromagnetic (AEM) surveys within several of our exploration licences and other areas as permitted, as outlined in the adjacent map.

Airborne Gravity Gradiometry Survey

What is an AGG survey?

The survey is completed using a fixed wing aircraft flying over an area of interest and maps geological features.

Why use an AGG survey?

The AGG survey is being undertaken to gain improved resolution of subsurface density features that correspond with geological domains. This program will enhance ground based survey data that has previously been collected at various locations.

What is involved in the AGG survey?

The fixed wing aircraft will fly in an east-west direction across 200m intervals over the areas of interest.

The aircraft will fly at a height of 80-100m above the ground at speeds of up to 220km/h.

The aircraft will not fly directly over buildings (in accordance with Civil Aviation Safety Authority regulations).

When will the AGG survey occur?

The AGG survey is planned to commence in early-February 2019 and should take approximately 2 weeks to complete, pending weather conditions.

Airborne Electromagnetic Survey


What is an AEM survey?

The survey is completed using a helicopter with electromagnetic equipment attached. The helicopter flies over the area of interest and maps geological features.

Why use an AEM survey?

Airborne Electromagnetic surveys are commonly used for geological mapping applications to assist with exploration for gold deposits. The survey allows for the mapping of geological features to be undertaken at depth and will help determine potential areas for further exploration work, such as drilling from the surface.

"By understanding the lifecycle of Queensland fruit fly and how it behaves, Victorians will have a better chance of community effort we will controlling it in gardens so that they can enjoy their home- hardly make a dent in the grown fruit and vegetables.

"With Queensland fruit fly now in most parts of Victoria, throughout our region it's important that everyone understands they have an

important role to play to keep numbers down."

Queensland fruit flies become more active as the weather warms up and they will target ripening fruit and vegetables including stonefruit, tomatoes, capsicums, eggplants and

Home gardeners can monitor for fruit fly using traps and by inspecting fruit and vegetables for sting mark, rot and maggots, which may be hidden inside.

"Other tips for managing Queensland fruit fly in home gardens include netting host plants, removing unwanted fruiting trees and plants, picking up and disposing of unwanted and fallen fruit and applying baits and cover sprays," Ms Mansfield said.

APPLY NOW DAIRY FARMERS WORKSHOP. FEEDPADS, FREESTALLS AND BARNS

Agriculture Victoria is hosting a two-day workshop with industry experts and dairy farmers discussing effective infrastructure planning and development.

The workshop will include visiting farms, via buses, to inspect new infrastructure and listen to dairy farmers outline the reasons behind their investment and the key people they engaged to plan, design and build their infrastructure.

Agriculture Victoria Dairy Extension Officer Michael O'Keefe said with current dry conditions and increasing seasonal variability, many farmers are looking at ways to manage their farm risk.

"The host farmers and their respective dairy builder(s) will discuss what is working well and with the benefit of hindsight what they would change,"

Mr O'Keefe said. "The construction of concrete feedpad or freestall facility typically results in cows spending large parts of the day in a confined area. Farmers then need to consider cow comfort, the accumulation of manure and production of effluent Day 1 - Tuesday 12 February from 9am-4pm, at Rochester from cow alleys. "These features need to be part of the early planning phase, therefore day one's morning session will include best practice knowledge in effluent system design and management; bedding options to optimise cow comfort and how to integrate automatic milking systems into new dairy developments.'

Fast facts

- A mandatory dairy code was a key recommendation of the ACCC's Dairy Inquiry
