The honour roll contained the names of 64 local and district brave hearts at the front, who were members of the Rochester charge congregation.

In the meantime, progress towards producing a Shire of Rochester Honour Board had been slow. At the June, 1917, Shire meeting, a letter was received from D W Patterson, Melbourne, sending samples of soldiers' certificates and prices. The *Express* reported that the Shire Secretary then recalled an offer of an honour roll, made about a year earlier, which he thought might be more appropriate. "There would be about 500 names on it. Cr. Rankin approved of the honour roll but the price was rather prohibitive, for it might run into £100. It was suggested to defer the matter till the end of the war, but March at 3 p.m. and "A large attendance [was] desired." Cr. McMaster thought that patriotic enthusiasm would On 19 March, news of the upcoming unveiling appeared then wane. Cr. The Shire's Honour Roll was in the Shire Hall, and it is expected that there will be a at last going ahead.

Shire Councillors met in October, 1917. Among the correspondence then received was a letter from Berne Marcollo of Eaglehawk, stating that an honour roll for Rochester, with flags of the Allies and inscription, with motto or text and to contain 400 names, with room for 100 more, would cost £16 12s. Additional names over 400 would be one shilling each. This offer was accepted on the motion of Cr A W H White, seconded by Cr. J Martin.

The people of Ballendella were among those who had already subscribed to, and erected an Honour Board of their own, and now they looked to do something more. On 26 October, 1917, the Rochester Express and the Bendigo Advertiser both carried a report of that month's Rochester Shire meeting at which a request was received Marg O'Brien.

It was stated that the roll would contain "close on 500 names of soldiers who have responded to the call to the colours" and was to be placed in the Shire Hall at Rochester. Details of the February meeting of the Shire of Rochester published by the Bendigo Advertiser on 1 March, 1918, included the receipt of a letter from B.Marcollo to say that he was forwarding the honour roll.

On 12 March, 1918, the Shire of Rochester placed an advertisement in the Rochester Express to state that the Honour Roll of the Shire would be unveiled by the President (Cr Rankin) at the Shire Hall on Tuesday, 19th shire will be unveiled by Cr J. Rankin, shire president, large attendance to pay a tribute of respect to those who Nothing further was reported in the local press until the have obeyed the call to arms, and especially to the memory of those who have fallen in the cause. All business places will close during the ceremony-from 3 to 4 p.m." The editor added the following: - "The roll is a handsome piece of workmanship, executed by Mr B. Marcollo, of Eaglehawk, and contains, in gold letters, the names of 490 of our young soldiers, most of whom have already fought and bled for the cause, and some, alas! have fallen, never to rise again till the last day. The picture measures 10ft. by 6 1/2 ft and as there is no suitable place in the main hall for its reception, it will probably be placed in the vestibule facing the southern main entrance to the building."



<u>BLUEY,</u> <u>THE OLDEST DOG IN THE WORLD,</u> <u>TO BE IMMORTALISED</u>

Rochester Business Network (RBN) is proud to announce the launch of their latest art project, Bluey the oldest dog to have lived.

This project continues with Rochester's great engagement in the art world with the recent mural festival in March and the amazing silos that were painted last June.

Bluey, was an Australian cattle dog, who holds the world record for oldest dog at 29 years and 5 months of age. **Les Hall** of Victoria, Australia, got Bluey as a puppy in 1910, and the dog worked with cattle and sheep for nearly 20 years before being put to sleep on Nov. 14, 1939.

"We are so very excited", said RBN president Glenda Nichol. "Anything that is good for our town we are thrilled to be part of. We are already very proud to be part of the Silo Art Trail and this gives our visiting public something else to see whilst in Rochester", said Mrs Nichol.

The project is unique in that the local community will be supporting the project. "We are one very resilient community. The way this project has come about is

fantastic for town", said Kate Taylor, local Rochester Business Network member.

"We want to invite all Victorians to come to our town, see the artwork of Bluey, visit our silos and our murals, have a coffee or a beer and check out the other great things we also have to offer in Rochester", said Kate.

As part of the announcement, the RBN confirmed the services of Echuca resident, John Stevens. "John is well recognised in the art world and with his recent works at Rochester Mural Festival. We are thrilled to gain someone of his calibre for our town", said Kate.

Painting has now started and is scheduled to take one week. Edna Staley, local Rochester resident, is very excited about the painting. "Bluey was my father's dog – I am so proud this painting is going up especially at the pool where I go past every day", said Mrs Staley.





WHY I LOVE LOCKY

My name is Garth Matthews and I live in Southampton in England. During my recent 2 week stay with my dear fourth cousin Bernie Crumpler and wife Diana, one of the undoubted highlights was a visit to Lockington. Bernie always told me that Lockington was special but I wasn't quite sure why that was.

Obviously one could just say that Lockington was in the middle of nowhere but given that I just loved the wide open flat landscape with the trees shimmering in the distance, Lockington was ideally situated.

However when we first pulled in to Lockington on a weekday, rather than a weekend, my initial thoughts were 'love this but sad that it is probably dying on its feet'. There were not many people about and I imagined that the cafe we stopped at was going to be struggling to make ends meet. However, my first surprise came when we received great coffees (Bernie's was a Gaffe latte) and my Honeycomb milkshake was second to none. Moreover the menu choices were really good for food. The service was fast and efficient and so friendly. Obviously this cafe was certainly not a dead duck!

Having eaten and drunk well, Bernie then proceeded to take me to the Lockington Business Centre. From the outside it looked like a shop, but this belied the inside, which was in truth a vibrant little community centre, with (amongst other things) a bank and a library and a central communal area.(see photo above). This was such a great idea and I even found that could earn 1% more interest on a fixed term investment at Bendigo Bank in Lockington than I could get back in the U.K!

Before long the incredible 'Des' appeared and the three of us proceeded over to the Lockington Heritage Centre. Note: at this stage I should point out that Des appears to be at the beating heart of the Lockington Community and I believe has been responsible for organising the construction of many of the community features which Lockington now enjoys.

The Heritage Centre proved to be a veritable treasure trove of Lockington memorabilia, housed in traditional buildings which were themselves full of character. In addition there was a superb exhibition of vintage farm equipment and even the odd classic car thrown in for good measure.

For me though the highlight was a fully restored Melbourne cable tram from the 1880s, restoration of which had in fact been largely carried out by cousin Bernie. (See below for photo of tram plus Bernie and Des).

As if this weren't enough Des then proceeded to take us on a memorable tour of Lockington , so that we could enjoy the sights and sounds. Amongst other things there was a fantastic community hall , which housed a fully fledged theatre /cinema and an amazing full-size polished dance floor . Lockington still boasts a good school, am pleased to say . With regards natural amenities , Lockington also boasts beautiful public gardens together with lakes and bridges and invariably these have been constructed by the local people themselves.

So , my perception of Lockington was transformed from the initial one of a sleepy and dying country outpost to that of a thriving community full of ideas and visions of the future.

I understand that it can be very busy at weekends and during rallies held there, there are literally thousands of people thronging the streets.

I can only say a hearty 'Well Done' to all concerned .

My only criticism is that I had set my heart on purchasing an 'I LOVE LOCKY ' tee-sh irt , however none was available. All the same I did come away with a Lockington bag and later a book on Lockington (thanks to my dear cousin), so I do have things to remember Lockington.





BLACK SPOT PROJECT SET TO START ON LOCKINGTON ROAD

Campaspe Shire Council is about to start road safety improvement works on Lockington Road, between Diggora and Settlement Roads.

Mayor, Cr Adrian Weston said council received a Federal Government grant of \$502,000 through the Black Spot Friday, Funding Program.

"The funds will support two intersection upgrades and centreline road marking along Lockington Road, to RECEIVE YOUR RATES NOTICE VIA EMAIL improve road safety," Cr Weston said.

"The two intersections with Lockington Road, at Diggora Road and Dingee Road, will both be upgraded to make the intersections more exposed to vehicles. Road centreline marking will be installed along Lockington Road to also improve safety along the section of road."
