
BAMAWM'S EMMA FEATURES IN "BROADWAY AND BEYOND"

Eulogy -**Ruby Maud Parsons (Wolfe)**

Trevor Parsons shared, "Mum died peacefully on April 16 was privately cremated on April 24." He thanked all who passed on kind thoughts and comments about Mum's life and connections with her. "Many comments have been very similar, describing her as a "lovely lady". That description we think best At Lockington she took up golf and became a "lovely golfer". Her game sums up Mum's qualities and is a theme we will keep returning to in referring to was based on finesse and style. She had a beautiful sweet swing and her life over the past 95 years.

Ruby, Rube even Ruby Duby to some, was born on December 10 1923, the first born to Kathleen and John Wolfe. She was born in Herberton on the Atherton Tableland FNQ. Mum's grandparents had been early European pioneer settlers of the Croydon Queensland district.

Brother Ray was born in 1929, and Des in 1933 passed away 1983.

We do not know a lot about Mum's early childhood but we know that during WW 2 she and her mother were living in Cairns. Mum was working at Harris Brothers, a Drapery Store during the day and when she finished that, she headed to the picture theatre to work as an usher, working two shifts a day. It was while working as an usher that she met Dad and their romance of nearly 65 years began. Dad asked mum to marry her so in 1946 Mum set off from Cairns on a long train journey to Melbourne, not knowing a person and no one in Victoria knowing what she looked like. Dad was still in the Air Force not having been discharged.

Due to War rationing Mum learnt to become a "lovely skilled seamstress" making all her clothes with what was available. Her love of sewing continued. At 90 years of age she made a pair of slacks for herself.

Mum and dad were married on September 7, 1946 and took up life in Lockington. They first lived with Brother Tom and Aunt Hazel behind the Lockington store which Tom and Dad jointly managed.

By 1948, Tom and Hazel, with daughters Elaine and Sue and Mum and Dad along with Carol were all living together. When I was born in 1950 Mum and Dad shifted into their own home in Burns Street, Lockington.

Mum was a very resourceful person. She and Dad quickly established the garden. She was particularly proud of the hydrangeas at the front of the house, a beautiful Camellia on the north side of the house and a Daphne near the front porch. At Burns St she became a "lovely" cook. As a teenager Mum didn't have to cook, as her mother worked as a cook so cooked at home. Mum's tapioca pudding is memorable to this day as are her roasts; including baked tomato and onion as well as tomato and onion salad. She wasn't afraid to experiment and change with the times. When Tiramisu became popular she produced first-rate versions.

When Mum and Dad moved into Rochester in 1966 Mum started again to create "a lovely" garden. It was always colourful and picturesque. There was always a tropical plant growing. She loved her roses and even in recent times, when she went to PAG, Mum would have a bunch of colourful flowers, from her garden.

My enduring memory of Mum's influence is to do with handkerchiefs. Each time as I was leaving the house she would ask if I had a handkerchief. Usually it would be no so I'd have to go back and get one. Now, when I leave the house I don't carry just one handkerchief but two! Just to make sure. So if you get caught short I will always have a spare!

Mum made us aware of her QLD heritage so when Jen and I decided to shift to Cairns it was no big deal it was just returning home.

The last "a lovely" lady description describes her appearance, how she conducted herself and how she presented herself. Mum's whole adult life was spent practicing diligently the motto "you never left the house

unless you looked your best". That was the constant message she stressed to us as we were growing up. Always immaculately dressed. even out gardening at the Rochester house she would look smart, her best. She was a lovely lady who lived a lovely life and we will miss her greatly. Thank you."





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ANZAC's Well Remembered

Lockington Community Centre was filled to capacity on ANZAC Day and were rewarded with a great program after several marched from the Supermarket, led by students of the school as the Colour Party. Guest speaker, Air Commodore Michael Bennett CSC, after being introduced by Wing Commodore John Glover RFD, noted that it is 104 years since the landing at Gallipoli, but it ingrained a sense of nationhood. Sadly many did not survive, and for some who did return home, an influenza plague throughout the world caused 15 million casualties. 600 out of 750 got the flu. Then for some they were traumatised and difficulty in settling back into home life, whilst those who didn't or couldn't go to defend their country felt bitterness. The women at home were the ones relied upon. Children were scared their father's would go away, and then scared of his temperament after he had come home. The Air Commodore continued, "All decisions to go to war are justified, and deserve to be supported. Commemorate what brings us together and not what divides. Fear and division lead to terrible outcomes. Lest We Forget." Anthems, hymn "Abide with Me", Poems, and wreath laying preceded the excellent Lockington Consolidated Primary School Audio Visual Presentation which was in the theme of the horrors of war, and our wonderful service personnel who work to keep us in a safe and peaceful country.



FARM SUPPORT FUND DETAILS

Northern and North West Victorian farmers impacted by dry seasonal conditions can access more support with the opening of the Farm Support Fund.

The \$1 million fund is being delivered through an expansion to the Farm Business Assistance program which provides one-off payments to farmers who are most at risk of financial stress due to ongoing dry conditions.

All Farm Household Allowance recipients in 20 eligible Local Government Areas, can now access the Farm Business Assistance program for a one-off payment of \$2500 to assist with costs.

DAM SAFETY UNDER THE SPOTLIGHT

The Victorian Government is warning farmers and earthmoving contractors to be safe around dams following two serious incidents in April, including a fatality.

Victoria has around 450,000 dams, many of which are on farms and private properties and have been significantly impacted by a lack of rainfall this year.

The soil around dry dams can be prone to collapse, particularly when digging or using machinery.

Tragically a man in his 20s died last month when he became buried at the base of a dry dam at a property in East Gippsland. It's believed he was excavating a trench at the base of the dam when it collapsed on him.

To reduce the risks associated with working around dry dams, farmers and contractors should:

before commencing work

- Only use equipment they are competent with and only - be aware of chemical residues, and use it within its operating range

- Avoid driving machinery over slopes and embankments to reduce the risk of a roll over

- Ensure a hard stand area for excavators is stable and not undermined by vermin

 Seek assistance when recovering bogged equipment and/or animals

Ensure they have access to a of means communication, either a phone or radio

Avoid working alone, and have others check in on them.

Dry dams are as dangerous as trenches and the risk of collapse must be considered when they are being dug out.

ALTERNATE STOCK FEEDS: KNOW THE RISKS

Livestock producers who are using alternative feed sources as a strategy to manage dry seasonal conditions are urged to be aware of potential risks.

Agriculture Victoria Animal Industries Development Officer Richard Smith said with the reduction of available fodder sources due to dry conditions, producers may be turning to alternate feed sources.

to feeds containing unacceptable and harmful levels of chemical residues, or feeds which could contain restricted animal material," he said.

- Inspect the environment and identify unstable ground Mr Smith said there are three simple things for producers to think about when purchasing alternate stock feeds:

ask for and provide the required vendor declarations.

Mr Smith said producers should make certain that purchased feed does not contain restricted animal material.

"This is any material taken from a vertebrate animal and includes rendered products, such as blood meal, meat meal, meat and bone meal, fish meal, poultry meal and feather meal, and compounded feeds made from these products," he said.

"Gelatin, milk products or oils are not included in the ruminant feed ban."

Producers should undertake their own due-diligence about the suitability of the feed being purchased, as some chemicals registered for use in crops, fruit, and vegetables may not be registered for use in stockfeed or for livestock.

"Some chemical labels prohibit the grazing and/or feeding of stubbles, wastes, and products to livestock, while others might have no maximum residue limits (MRLs) set for animal products and so any detectable level of the chemical in the livestock product could breach food safety standards," Mr Smith said.

"Other chemicals may not have prohibitions on use of treated crops as stockfeed however, stock may still accumulate unacceptable residues as they can eat larger volumes of treated crops than humans.

"This risk can be addressed by appropriately rationing treated stockfeed."

To meet obligations under the Livestock Production Assurance (LPA) program, and Primary Production and Processing Standards for Dairy Products, producers need to obtain a vendor declaration (e.g. Commodity Vendor Declaration and/or Fodder Vendor Declaration) for all stock feed/fodder purchased.

As dry seasonal conditions continue, and traditional fodder or roughage sources are expended, producers may seek by-products to feed stock.

By-product material, which is defined as 'any plant material not produced primarily for livestock consumption', such as citrus pulp, fruit pomace, grape marc, and outer leaves can have concentrated levels of agricultural chemicals which could increase livestock residue levels.

Mr Smith said producers need to declare if they have fed by-products on their National Vendor Declaration (NVD) within 60 days of selling livestock, with details of what produce was fed.

"Care should also be taken around root vegetables and cucurbits (cucumbers, zucchini, etc.) as they could be grown in soil contaminated with organochlorines," he said.

"Organochlorine residue builds up in the animals' body fat, when these vegetables form a major part of the diet and/ or are fed for prolonged periods."

BREAK THE PEST CYCLE BEFORE SOWING

With challenging and dry conditions prevailing this year, Grains Biosecurity Officer Jim Moran recommends staying one step ahead of pests by using farm biosecurity practices before and during sowing.

"Simple things can save you money in the long run by reducing the introduction and spread of pests, diseases and weeds on your property," explained Jim.

Eliminate the 'green bridge'

He recommends eliminating the 'green bridge' before planting by controlling weeds and volunteer plants from previous crops in your paddocks to break pest breeding cycles and reduce weed seed banks.

"It's the easiest and most effective practice to protect this year's crop as it will help to control insects, fungal diseases and weeds that are hard to kill or herbicide resistant," said Jim.

"Removing the green bridge can also reduce the ability of rust spores to infect emerging seedlings."

"Don't forget to control areas along the verges of fences and roadsides. They're often overlooked but are an ideal spot for diseases and pests to multiply and infect your crop."

Clean machinery before sowing

Jim says it's also important to clean your farm machinery, so you don't spread weeds, pests and diseases around your property.

"The nooks and crannies in your farm machinery are good hiding place for weeds, pests and diseases as they can easily trap seed, plant material or soil," he said.

"As this is the easiest way to move pathogens, pests or weed seeds around your property it is best to ensure that your machinery is thoroughly cleaned before planting starts."

He also suggests getting any contractors or agronomists you use for pre-sowing spraying, spreading of fertiliser or planting to make sure their machinery is very clean before working.

"It may be necessary to provide a dedicated wash down area with equipment. Watch this area for anything unusual emerging in the following weeks," said Jim.

"Also tell contractors about any weed or pest issues on your farm and where they are to reduce the risk of spreading the problem to other areas of your farm or to someone else's."

Continue to keep things clean during sowing

While planting, Jim recommends having an air compressor or a high-pressure washer so you, or the contractor, can clean machinery, including clearing seed from planters, between paddocks and properties.

"It is essential to maintain farm hygiene practices on your property during sowing," said Jim.

"Giving things a quick clean before leaving one paddock and moving to the next can significantly reduce your risk of spreading soil-borne pathogens and weed seed throughout your farm."

"It's also a good idea to leave the weedier paddocks until last in your planting cycle to reduce the risk of spreading the weeds into uninfected areas."
