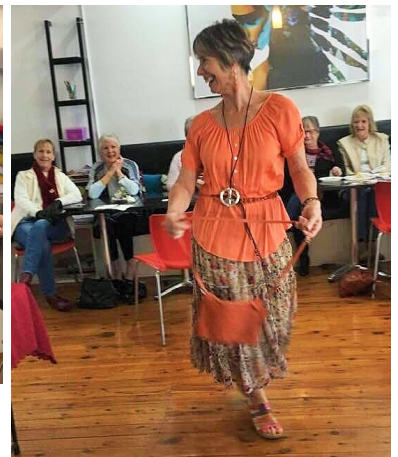
PRE-LOVED FASHIONS MODELLED WITH STYLE.

Hello again Everyone,

The following letter appeared in the *Weekly Times* on 8 February, 1919, and tells us a little about Mitiamo's peace celebrations. It also indicates how soon after the Great War of 1914-18, our local residents began collecting funds to erect monuments to honour those young Australians who had taken part in the fighting, and especially those for whom it had cost their lives. "Herbert Mancer, who lives in Wanurp, writes: — I go to the Wanurp State School, and am in the fourth grade ... I will take for my subject the procession held in Mitiamo on January 15. It consisted of a decorated motor car and vehicles, and two carts drawn by goats. After the procession, followed speeches by Parliamentary members. The picnic was held to raise funds for a monument for our fallen soldiers, and all who left the district. All their names will be on it. Then all partook of afternoon tea. A concert and dance ended the programme for the day... I am 8 years old."

One of the earliest memorials to be built in our district was at Milloo. At the end of World War I, the number of young men in the Milloo district had been drastically thinned. The loss of these men prompted the secretary of St David's Church, Mr G H Wallace of Kamarooka, to suggest that a new, more spacious and more substantial Church be erected to the memory of those who had lost their lives. Mr Wallace also gave a handsome donation to set the project on its way. The new St David's Memorial Church was built just north of the original church building. It was constructed of red brick at a cost of £900, and could seat 150 people.

A Memorial Stone was laid on May 14th, 1919, by St. David's first preacher, Rev. David Ross Hewton, who returned to the district specially for the occasion. A scroll, stating the history of St. David's and the names of those from the congregation who had enlisted in the war, was read aloud at the ceremony before being placed in the cavity under the stone. 'It is a Memorial Church, erected in memory of those who served the Empire in the great war of 1914-1919'. At 3 pm on 10 September, 1919, the new St David's Memorial Church was officially opened, with a service conducted by Bishop John Douse Langley, of the Anglican Diocese of Bendigo. Bishop Langley stated the three reasons for the erection of the Church as: - 1. For the Glory of God; 2. To the memory of the fallen – Brave men who had made the supreme sacrifice; and 3. As a perpetual memorial of the grand work done by the soldiers

who had gone to the war from the Milloo district. At the eastern end of the church was a commemoratives stained-glass window, said to have been unveiled by Rev Hewton. It was the gift of Mrs G H Wallace, and inscribed on the window were the names of the young men who had given their lives - C. Aitken, V. Holland, E. Jasper, P. McCormack, C. Douglas, W. Sargeant, A Wilson and H. Haverfield.

The Wallace family of Kamarooka Estate took a special interest in St David's Church at Milloo, where Mr George Hugh Wallace had been a vestryman. Mr Wallace died on 4 February, 1926, and left a considerable estate to his family, "subject to a gift of £600 to the Church of England Trusts Corporation for the diocese of Bendigo, £200 of which is allocated to the diocesan central fund, and the balance as to income, to the board of guardians of St David's Church, Milloo."

St David's Memorial Church and its commemorative stained-glass window have been recorded in the Vic. War Heritage Inventory and the Heritage Council of Victoria Database, but there is no image of the window or details of its inscription. A Heritage Study of the Campaspe Shire was carried out in 2014, and noted that the Church is "of local historic, social and aesthetic cultural heritage significance to the Campaspe Shire...as a place for Anglican worship since 1886 for over 119 years. The existing red brick church was constructed in 1919 in memory of the fallen and as a perpetual memorial to the soldiers who had gone to the first world war from the district, as evidenced by the pedimented stone plaque fixed to the front of the entry porch. The chattels and stained-glass windows were donated by members of the church community... It is of social significance as it is recognised by the Milloo Anglican community as having public value and is held in high esteem for its social associations as a symbol of community as a memorial church and is one of only two community buildings remaining that evidence the Milloo community... It is of aesthetic significance as a very good example of a Federation/Edwardian Period (1902-c.1918) Gothic brick building with an unusual northern European stepped gable applied to a conventional Early English Gothic design." Again there is no image of the memorial window. Since the study was conducted, the former St David's Anglican Church has been sold into private hands.

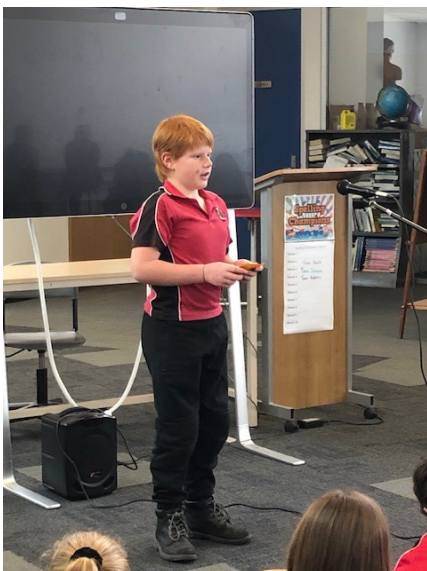


Echuca Netball Tournament

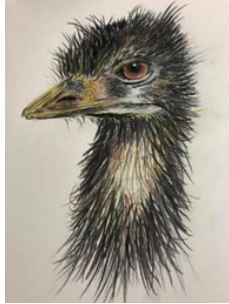

What is a Men's shed do you ask?

It is a safe and friendly environment for men of all walks of life to join together and be able to address health and wellbeing, share activities, common interests, create projects at their own pace amongst the company of other men.

If you look inside a Men's shed, you may see men making furniture, painting, fixing lawn mowers, bikes or anything needing tool assistance. Men could be doing woodwork or metal work, or some men could be sitting enjoying a free tea or coffee and even use the kitchen area to create a meal or snack.

Having a Men's shed can help men talk and discuss their emotions or problems that they may find hard to deal with. 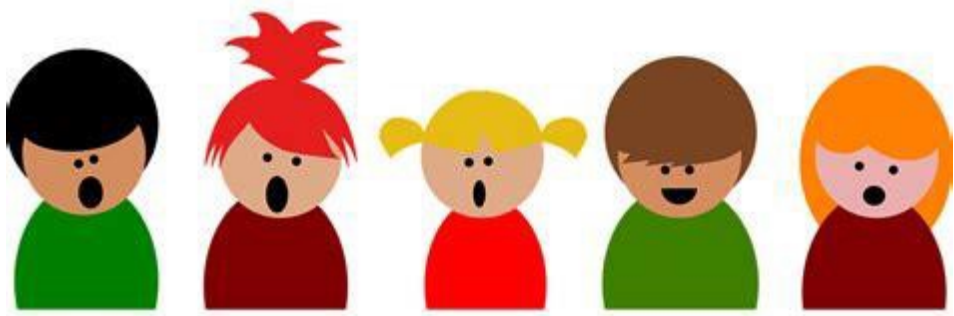

LIVESTOCK CONFERENCE TO BOOST YOUR BUSINESS

The program for Agriculture Victoria's annual beef and sheep conference has been finalised and registrations are now open.

The combined BetterBeef and Bestwool/BestLamb conference, to be held at the Bendigo Showgrounds on Tuesday 18 June and Wednesday 19 June, is Victoria's biggest annual gathering of beef and sheep producers.

The program includes a beef cattle focused conference on the Tuesday, a sheep focused conference on the Wednesday, and a combined industry dinner on the Tuesday night, so attendees can choose which days of the program they would like to attend.

This year's program will cover a range of topics designed to motivate producers to adopt best management practices and improve productivity.

Holbrook Veterinary Centre's Dr Shane Thomson's presentation at the beef conference 'What does a fertile herd look like?' will provide strategies for pursuing higher fertility rates as a key driver of enterprise profitability.

Learning from the New Zealand experience to increase reproductive performance from 100 per cent lamb marking to 130 per cent will be the keynote address from New Zealand sheep scientist and Massey University's Dr Paul Kenyon.

Dr Kenyon will also address the most effective management of triplet-bearing ewes and joining ewe lambs during one of the popular concurrent sessions of the conference.

Inspirational speaker Peter Davidson, the paramedic who was lowered into the seas to rescue eight survivors of the tragic 1998 Sydney to Hobart yacht race, will be the keynote speaker at the conference dinner on Tuesday night.

He will explore what ordinary, well-trained and motivated people can achieve.

Other program highlights include Frank Archer from Landfall Angus, Tasmania on 'Running a profitable and sustainable beef business', Michael Crowley from Meat & Livestock Australia on 'Harnessing value in the lamb supply chain', Greg and Jo Bear from the Canary Islands on 'Building the business, resilience in tough times' and Mark Inglis from JBS on 'What makes a quality beef product'.

JUNIOR LANDCARE AND BIODIVERSITY GRANTS NOW OPEN

Grants are also available for programs that engage or educate young people to value and actively care for Victoria's natural environment.

The grants will encourage young people to connect with nature and learn more about the environment through outdoor, hands-on activities, while creating better places for plants and animals to flourish.

In its second year, the pilot program is part of an \$18 million investment over four years to increase support for Landcare and implement recommendations of the Victorian Landcare Program Review.

The grants will be administered by Landcare Australia as part of their Junior Landcare program, in partnership with the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning.

FREE SHEEP FAECAL EGG COUNT TESTS

Sheep producers are being urged to submit worm samples for an AWI research trial to validate a more sensitive worm test.

They are asked to collect dung samples from a mob of wormy sheep on the day of drenching, then again 14 days after the drench.

Producers who submit worm samples will receive the results from the traditional faecal egg count (FEC) test for free, saving them hundreds of dollars.

RECENT RAIN BRINGS POSSIBILITY OF NITRITE POISONING

With the recent rain and flush of growth, Agriculture Victoria is alerting producers of the possibility of nitrite poisoning in livestock during the coming weeks.

District Veterinary Officer Jeff Cave said when an animal is poisoned by nitrite, the ability of its blood to transport oxygen is reduced.

"As a result, an affected animal will have difficulty breathing, followed by becoming weak and staggery before collapsing and dying. If clinical signs are noticed early enough, veterinary treatment is possible," Dr Cave said.

“Many weeds, crops and pasture plants have been associated with nitrite poisoning.”

“Capeweed, variegated thistle, marshmallow and pigweed are well known accumulators, along with many of the major crop plants including maize, rape, soybean, linseed, sorghum, millet, wheat, oats and barley have also been associated with nitrite poisoning.”

The factors that typically lead to nitrite poisoning include:

- rapid uptake of soil nitrate following rain after a prolonged dry spell
- moisture stress and low temperatures
- the use of nitrogenous fertilisers
- spraying with hormone-type herbicides such as 2,4-D

“Furthermore, cattle and sheep can tolerate a certain amount of nitrite. A way of preventing nitrite poisoning is to ensure cattle and sheep are not overly hungry when introduced to a new feed, so their intake of nitrite is moderated to a tolerable level.”

“If nitrite poisoning is suspected, animals should be removed without delay from the suspect paddock and placed onto feed containing less toxic herbage,” Dr Cave said.

FOX BOUNTY COLLECTION

The Victorian Government’s fox bounty resumed in March and has been running since 2011.

Agriculture Victoria is again collecting until the end of October, which is consistent with previous years.

Eligible participants can submit entire fox scalps for a \$10 reward.

CANOLA SPRAY COMPLIANCE AN INDUSTRY-WIDE EFFORT

Canola growers are being reminded to adhere to label application directions on herbicides containing haloxyfop as part of an industry-wide effort to avoid unacceptable chemical residues, National Working Party on Grain Protection (NWPGP) chair Gerard McMullen said.

For herbicides containing haloxyfop as the active ingredient, label directions stipulate they must not be applied to canola and other specified oilseed crops:

- After the eight-leaf growth stage; or
- After the stem elongation growth stage has commenced (this may occur before the eight-leaf growth stage, so determine the crop growth stage before application); or
- Under or between windrows (this is not a registered label use and could result in chemical residues).

Of the haloxyfop herbicide products available in Australia, Verdict™ 520, Asset™ and Inquest® herbicides are examples of those commonly used by canola growers.

Highlighting the importance of complying with label directions, Mr McMullen says residue testing by the National Residue Survey has detected haloxyfop residues above the Australian maximum residue limit (MRL) in canola traded domestically, which is of concern.

Also, the European Union (EU) – Australia’s main canola export market – is implementing new, tighter import controls.

Mr McMullen says the EU has indicated it plans to lower its current haloxyfop MRL for canola to 0.05 milligrams per kilogram.

Although still to be finalised, this revision reducing the haloxyfop MRL for canola sold into EU markets is expected to occur before the 2019/20 harvest. The haloxyfop MRL for Australian canola exports to Japan, another major market, remains at 0.1mg/kg.

“Australian grain growers have a very good history of compliance with product label directions and, as an industry, we need to ensure that haloxyfop continues to be used in accordance with label directions,” Mr McMullen says.

“Growers are also encouraged to consider other herbicides containing products with different active ingredients for in-crop control of grass weeds in canola.”

Tackling the trade risks that haloxyfop residues pose to domestic and export canola markets, the Australian grains industry has established a Haloxyfop Working Group, the need for which was flagged at the annual NWPGP Conference in Melbourne in June 2018.

Also chair of the Haloxyfop Working Group, Mr McMullen says the new group has developed a series of steps, supporting previous industry measures, with the aim of further reducing haloxyfop residues in canola.

GRDC crop protection officer – west, Georgia Megirian, reiterated the importance of adhering to label directions when applying herbicides containing haloxyfop.

“Applying haloxyfop to canola after stem elongation will result in chemical residues that exceed maximum residue limits,” Ms Megirian says.

“This, in turn, can lead to the rejection of canola shipments in export markets and create ongoing market access issues.”

“Following label directions is not only a regulatory requirement, it is also important in preserving haloxyfop herbicide chemistry as a cost-effective grass control option for canola growers across the country.”
