Lions Club Final of Junior Public Speaking



The Competition was held in the big hall at the Lockington Consolidated School on Wednesday June 12 in the evening.

Year 3/4 students kicked off the show with their three minute prepared speeches on the topic of "The day I went into space and met an alien....." The speakers all showed vivid imagination and the general consensus was that space travel is dangerous and aliens should be avoided.

The topic for the 5/6 students was complex. Their four minute prepared speech was about immersing themselves into the story of their favourite book. This is a precis of a much longer question. The four speakers did an excellent job of this. We learned about the life of Geronimo Stilton, Little Red Riding Hood, Hatchet and a Horse called Spartan. There was plenty of detail and the speakers showed a lot of confidence in their presentations. A ten minute break and then the 5/6 students had the added challenge of composing a short speech on the topic "what is your main concern for the future"? The responses were that the most important thing to worry about is security- social and financial. Finish education and find employment.

The task of deciding who would go on to represent Lockington at the next stage of the competition went to our three judges, Christine Sebire, Leanne McInnes and Bernie McManus. Deliberations took a little time and then the presentations were made by Christine and Lion Bill Roberts. Winners on the night were 3/4 level, Ziah H with runner up Patrick K. In 5/6 Chloe P won with Charlie B second. Chairman of the judging panel, Christine congratulated and encouraged all of the speakers and thanked them for their participation. Lion Bill also thanked the members who organise the event and the school for their continued enthusiastic assistance of the Lions Club. The other students competing at this level were Lily D in year 3 and River S year 4. Nicholas M in year 5 and Chelsea R year 6. Hello again Everyone,

In recent editions of the Locky News, we've been looking at the various ways the people of our district sought to memorialise those who had fought on their behalf in the war of 1914-18; among other efforts, they drew up Rolls of Honour, planted trees, built a church with a memorial window, and constructed a Memorial Hall. In some of the larger centres across Australia, hospitals, schools and secondary colleges were erected as memorials. Though this didn't happen here, there was one other memorial that we haven't yet reviewed, and in which the local schools were very much involved. This was the Memorial Shield. It was initiated in 1919 and was the inspiration of the people of Bamawm. From that time, athletic competitions contested by the district schools were held annually. A shield, given by the Bamawm memorial committee "to commemorate the Armistice, and to foster loyalty", was awarded to the winning school and was held by that school for the succeeding twelve months. On 23 November, 1923, The Argus reported that Bamawm Central had won the shield for the second successive year, adding that "Bamawm won the shield in 1919-20 and 1920-21, and Bamawm Central in 1921-22." On 14 November, 1927, the Age reported the event: - "The Bamawm Memorial shield sports were a success. Bamawm school was again successful in winning the shield. Result:-Bamawm school, 861/2 points; Bamawm Central school, 49 points; Bamawm Estate school, 38½ points; Bamawm Extension school, 37½ points; Lockington, 32½ points." On The appeal went on for a number of years with people from 18 November, 1936, the result was reported in the Goulburn Valley Stock and Property Journal. It read: - "BAMAWM Memorial Sports; Organised seventeen years ago, the Bamawm memorial scheme school sports, held in honour of the fallen soldiers, were again held on Armistice day. Six schools competed in the events and Lockington (401/2 points) won the shield by a margin of 11½ points from the Ballendella and Bamawm Estate schools both of whom scored 29½ points. Since the sports were first held, Bamawm have won 12 years, Bamawm Central three years and Lockington last year and this year." (I haven't yet followed the story of the shield through more recent newspaper reports, but possibly there are readers who know for how long it continued to be contested. If you have any further information about it, please let me know through the Locky News, and I can pass it along to other readers.)

A competition was launched to provide a design for Victoria's national war memorial, and the result was That's it for this time, announced in the Weekly Times on Saturday, 22 December, 1923: - "Victoria's national war memorial will be erected on the old Grange site on St Kilda road, from designs prepared

by Messrs. P. B. Hudson and J. H. Wardrop, of Melbourne-These returned soldier architects share the £1000 prize offered for the best design. The cost of the memorial will be £250,000." Sir John Monash, who was the chairman of the assessors, and nominee of the Executive Committee of the Memorial, said that the judging had been difficult, with six months having passed since the first of 83 designs was submitted. All were of a high standard and "assuredly works of love." The article went on to describe the winning design at some length, explaining that the proposed elevated site had been selected so that the shrine would be "a landmark from the sea and nearly all suburbs... The memorial is spaced to permit the attendance of many thousands of people for ceremonials and at night, flood lights will keep it brilliantly illuminated. On the eastern and western walls of the central shrine appear the words: — Let all men know that this is holy ground. Neither Decay nor Time shall ruin this Shrine, for it is built not only in stone, but also in the of men. Therefore, instead of tears, remembrance; instead of pity, praise. The sacrifice of a nation lies here." ... The article continued: - "The State Government and the City Council being expected to approve of the selected design for the National War Memorial, a public appeal for subscriptions will be launched immediately. Some thousands of pounds are already in hand, in addition to the £100,000 promised by the City Council and the State Government."

across the State contributing towards it. In carrying out other research recently, I came on a relevant local item: On 11 August, 1928, The Argus reported that "A successful social gathering and dance in aid of the Shrine of Remembrance Fund were held by the Milloo State school." By January, 1929, state school children throughout Victoria had contributed £6,000 towards the fund, but it was expected that it would be a further three years before the Shrine would be complete. Even so, it was not until 11 November, 1934, that the Shrine was ready for dedication. The impressive ceremony, in which the visiting Duke of Gloucester took part, was attended by some 30,000 returned servicemen from all parts of Victoria. A feature of the ceremony which was mentioned in the news reports at the time, was the release of 20,000 pigeons from the upper gallery of the Shrine. It's sad to think that the peace that was symbolised was to be shattered just five years later.

Lockington was represented at this competition by Ziah Haines and Chloe Portwine. Sixteen speakers in total and and this is a very interesting way to spend a Sunday afternoon.

The year 3/4 students gave their three minute prepared speech on the subject "the day I went into outer space and met an alien". They all proved capable of writing science fiction. The most popular destination was Mars. One had a teleporter which malfunctioned but still managed to reach Mars in 15 hours! Many of the talks started with a countdown to blast off which commanded the audiences attention. Most of the aliens turned out to be fairly unattractive, being slimy, short, goggle eyed and gooey though most were reasonably friendly and even helpful!

Some of the speakers were good at sound effects which contributed to the entertainment. The winner of this level was Timothy Oswald from Numurkah, one of only three boys in the whole competition. Second place went to Hesando Ambalangodage from Moama.

The 5/6 level speakers had to give a four minute prepared to the families who turned out in support. speech where they were asked to immerse themselves

into their favourite story. These talks were complicated, most involved fantasy and one was about a chocolate factory. Rural Tree Scheme

Council's Rural Tree Scheme is now open, providing rural IMMUNISATION SESSIONS landowners the opportunity to purchase plants at a subsidised rate. All rural zoned ratepayers within Campaspe Shire are eligible to purchase plants at a Monday, 23 September subsidised rate through the scheme. The offer is currently available until 1 November or when the allocated funds have been spent. Community Grants Program

Round 2 of the 2019/20 Community Grants Program is now open and all not for profit groups are encouraged to apply. Grants are available as follows:

Community Support Grants - supporting the delivery of programs, projects and activities that benefit residents of the shire with amounts available up to \$4,000.

e-waste ban

Effective from 1 July, electronic waste (e-waste) is no longer accepted in kerbside bins or landfill sites across Victoria. Instead, it must be recycled. Any item with a plug, battery or cord that is no longer working or wanted is e-waste and can be taken to any of council's transfer stations for recycling free of charge.

SEEKING COMMUNITY FEEDBACK ON TWO OPTIONS FOR CAMPASPE SHIRE COUNCIL STRUCTURE

The community can have its say on the two options proposed for Campaspe Shire Council's 2020 electoral structure, following the release of a report from the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) today.

The preliminary report is part of the VEC's electoral representation review of Campaspe Shire Council, which commenced in June 2019 with an information session and a month-long public submission period. The VEC asked community members to consider the number of councillors and whether the council should remain subdivided into wards.

Three preliminary submissions were received, all of which were carefully considered in drawing up the options. The VEC also analysed demographic, geographic and electoral data and trends.

Campaspe Shire Council's existing structure is subdivided into two three councillor wards and three single councillor *Option A* wards. The options are:

- Option A: Nine councillors elected from five wards councillor wards and three single councillor wards) (two three councillor wards and three single councillor wards) retaining the current model with adjustments to ward boundaries.
- Option B: Nine councillors elected from an unsubdivided electoral structure.

Electoral Commissioner, Warwick Gately AM, encouraged community members to get involved by reviewing the report and making a submission.

'We want to ensure all voters are represented in a fair and equitable way, so now's the time to speak up,' Mr Gately said.

'You have one month to consider the options and make your submission supporting or opposing the options.'

Submissions responding to the preliminary report should address the options and must be received by the VEC by 5.00 pm Wednesday 4 September. Submissions can be made online at *vec.vic.gov.au*, by email or by post.

A public hearing will be held at 5.30 pm on Tuesday 10 September at Campaspe Regional Library, 310 Hare Street, Echuca for anyone who has requested to speak in support of their submission. If there are no requests to speak, the hearing will not be held.

The preliminary report is available at *vec.vic.gov.au*. Copies are also available for inspection at Campaspe Shire Council offices.

Background and scope

The Local Government Act 1989 (LG Act) requires the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) to conduct an electoral representation review of each local council in Victoria before every third general election of that council (or approximately every 12 years).

The reviews ensure the electoral structure of a local council provides fair and equitable representation for all voters.

Under the LG Act, the VEC must consult with the local community to seek their input on the review.

Electoral representation reviews consider:

 whether the local council has the appropriate number of councillors

- whether the local council should be unsubdivided, with councillors elected from the whole local council, or subdivided into wards and
- if subdivided, the number of wards, ward boundaries, and the number of councillors per ward.

Electoral representation reviews cannot consider:

- a change to the external boundaries of the local council
- whether the local council should be divided
- whether the local council should be combined with another local council.

The 2019–2020 program of representation reviews will involve 31 reviews and seven subdivision reviews across the State, commencing in January 2019 and concluding in April 2020.

References to 'preferred' and 'alternative' options in preliminary report

The VEC is required by the Act to include a preferred option and may include one or more alternative options for the electoral structure in the preliminary report. The VEC considers that all options provided offer fair and equitable representation for voters in the local council.



BE AWARE WHEN PURCHASING FODDER AND LIVESTOCK FEED

Movement of fodder and grain as stockfeed can potentially introduce new weeds into Victoria and poses a serious risk to both our plant and animal industries.


Victorian farmers sourcing fodder or livestock feed from new or different places to help them manage through winter are reminded to observe good biosecurity practices.

To minimise risk, farmers and land managers can implement some simple actions which could save money, improve environmental values and avoid future stress.

For stockfeed and fodder on-farm, consider the following:

- Check the origin of your hay or grain stockfeed, has it come from a known weed-infested area?
- Ask the supplier for written certification on any potential weed content
- Where possible source locally grown feed to reduce the chance of introducing new weeds that are not already present and known in your locality
- Keep records of purchased hay or grain stock feed: location sourced, producer, content, purchased, transporter and feed-out area
- Feed-out in a confined area away from drainage lines (stock containment areas) to reduce the likelihood of weeds being spread throughout your property
- Monitor feed-out areas regularly and be suspicious of unfamiliar plants that germinate
- Contact Agriculture Victoria staff for assistance with identification of suspect plants.
- Ensure vehicles are thoroughly cleaned inside and out in designated areas to avoid the spread of weeds onto road reserves and adjacent land after deliveries.
