Hello again Everyone,

In recent weeks, we've been looking back at the ways that people, mostly in our district, sought to honour the memory of those from the area who had given service, and sometimes their very lives, for Australia and the British Empire in the course of the Great War – the conflict that we later came to know as World War I. I thought that this week we might take a look at what was happening in Rochester, as that town seems to have been our community of interest at that time. (Coincidentally, in researching the news items being submitted from Rochester to newspapers with a wider coverage, such as *The Argus* and the *Weekly Times*, most of the articles concern Bamawm and its surrounds.)

Like the people of Lockington, the Rochester residents decided to erect a Memorial Hall. On 13 May, 1920, Melbourne's *The Age* newspaper reported that the matter had been discussed at a joint meeting of the committees of the proposed Memorial Hall and the public library. It was stated that a new building would be erected on the site of the existing library and, with furnishings, would cost about £3000. It would be used as a library "while remaining a lasting memorial of fallen soldiers". A sum of £650 was already in hand and it was proposed to begin fund-raising in the hope of setting the scheme in motion within six months.

Early in July, 1920, a public meeting was held at the Shire Hall to inform the local people about the plan. By this time an amount of £800 had been raised and a committee was formed to assist with the appeal. *The Argus*, published a report of the meeting on 7 July, relaying the Shire President, Councillor White's description of the proposed building which would "consist of two stories, the clubrooms to occupy the first floor." Next day *The Ballarat Star* also reported the meeting, stating that a queen competition would be part of the fund-raising program, and that Bamawm and Nanneella had promised to assist.

On 4 August, 1920, there came another report from *The Argus*. A second public meeting had been held, at which the fund-raising committee made it known that they anticipated difficulty in raising the amount of £3000. The Rochester community was already well served with its large and commodious Shire Hall, and it was suggested that some other form of memorial, such as a memorial hospital might "find more sympathy with the public." This suggestion was put to the Soldiers' League and the Memorial Hall Committee

but they held to the original proposal for a hall, "to be used as club rooms for returned soldiers."

In its edition of 9 November, 1920, *The Argus* once more mentioned Rochester's planned Memorial Hall. There had been a change of mind concerning the proposed site for the building. The Rochester Shire Council had now granted to the Returned Soldiers' League, a site "on high ground, reserved for park purposes, near the centre of the town." It was expected that building would begin shortly. A report in *The Age* that same day stated that the original site, "near the Campaspe Bridge, was condemned for being liable to floods." The next news item concerning the proposed hall also appeared in *The Age*. On 1 December, 1920, it reported that "Mr H W Raleigh" had offered a prize for the best design of a hall, and when this had been chosen, plans specifications and estimates would be prepared.

The name of the prize-winner, a Melbourne architect, Mr Inches, was published in *The Argus* on 14 February, 1921, and in *The Age* two days later. Mr Inches was awarded the £5 bonus offered by Mr Raleigh, and was commissioned to call tenders for the structure to be built on the "high and commanding site ... presented by the shire council." It was not until 13 August, 1921, that *The Age* reported that the tender of Messrs Knight and Wells, for the erection of the Rochester Soldiers' Memorial Hall, had been accepted and most of the estimated cost of £1030 was already in hand. Four weeks later, on 9 September, one reads in *The Argus* that, despite a contract having been let for the erection of the hall, there was still some indecision at the time concerning the proposed site. "The position [had] now been fixed on a piece of high ground west of the railway line, and facing the town" or, as *The Age* reported "on a prominent site, commanding a view of the town." The shire council "promised to use its efforts towards obtaining a satisfactory title for the trustees of the hall." So building began, and fund-raising continued. Throughout the winter of 1921, "women, next of kin of fallen soldiers" had organised socials which realised an amount of £52/14/- to benefit the Memorial Hall fund.

There is still a little more of the story, but we will return to it in a later *Locky News*. In the meantime, it seems a pity that nowadays, the local swimming pool somewhat interrupts that "commanding view of the town."

COUNTRY WOMENS ASSOCIATION OF
VICTORIA INC - 50 YEARS

December the eighth 1969 Group President of the Echuca Group of the Country Women's Association of Victoria Mrs Edna Stewart from Deniliquin chaired a gathering of 31 women from the Milloo, Tennyson and Piavella districts in the Milloo Hall to ascertain if there was sufficient interest to form a branch of the Association. All present indicated that they would become members Mrs Joy Weller was elect president, Mrs Annise Jensen Secretary and Mrs Lilian Mitchell Treasurer.

As four of the ladies present were already members of the Bamawm a night time branch, there was a preference to follow this lead of the dairying district, but some who lived in further out in the cropping area, preferred a daytime slot for meetings, a compromise was struck meetings would be held alternatively between 1pm and 8 pm this arrangement lasted a couple of years then reverted to all daytime meetings as it was evident that the branch was becoming divided in attendance the second Thursday in the month at 1pm became our meeting day.

Not having a town to fall back on for street stalls raffles etc we had to come up with some novel ways of raising funds the occasional clearing sale and catering opportunities are always welcome.

One of our early fund raising nights was instigated by Doris Rankin a talented seamstress. two or three lengths of dress material were purchased and a dress making demonstration advertised. The raffle (Lucky door) was drawn prior to the commencement and the winner chose which material she preferred and Doris commenced to cut out and make a A-line frock to fit, altering the pattern here and there as she progressed and the frock was completed over the evening with a running commentary of how and why you did this and that; Thelma Elliott was the lucky winner. There were numerous casserole lunches and teas, a Home Sellers Fair, an Angus Breeders World congress tour involved a large coach load of visitors for morning tea and show casing our talents to them and selling CWA goods all was going well, except for an American woman who had been out to a dinner the previous evening and had had Pavlova for dessert she was raving about this to all and sundry and the CWA cook book on sale at the time did not have a recipe for pavlova. We did arrange to have a tried and true recipe forwarded onto them so we didn't lose face completely.

Milloom branch was able to pull their weight in the group of then 16 branches competing in handcraft/home industries competitions, debating, public speaking, performing skits and being represented at everything including promoting CWA at the Elmore field days. Over the years we have been successful in the Dorward trophy competition, best conducted annual meeting and best secretary's report. The Branch syllabus still has items on it to challenge us out of our respective comfort zones to create interest on meeting days in fact without CWA craft schools and the competitions many of us would not have done many things making craft articles which adorn us our children or our homes making them a special "my" place and perhaps family heirlooms. Many would not outside the normal meals do any creative cooking if it was not for CWA and are thankful for the variety we have brought to our kitchens. The family's often complained that the best went

to CWA but they may never have had the chance to sample even the flops let alone the prize winning culinary delights if it had not been for Mum's commitment to CWA.

In early years we had some wonderful fun trying our acting talents having a go at skits. Do you remember one of the first the "Bush Christening", with a body up a hollow log and the parson after him and in the times when Jean Brophy and Sue Mc Lean and Annise Jensen were about we even sang. Our last drama a few years ago was Mr and Mrs at the Cricket and Elaine was awarded on stage for the day.

Three members Julie Chapel, Elaine Mitchell and Joy Weller all accepted the challenge to serve the group as group president, this opened up horizons to the greater CWA endeavours and fellowship, many lasting friendships were made, Julie went onto be Show Catering Chairman for two years and Joy repeated a term as group president in 1997 when the Group President elect became ill and couldn't take on the roll and in a weak moment she uttered the words "I won't see you stuck" well, she must have enjoyed being back in office because she went on to be elected State President in 2001 - 2003 Although we did have to miss some branch meetings / activities to the credit of all members of the branch we were supported through the respective positions with loyalty and help in many ways.

Milloom branch up until the last 3 or 4 years has had at least one delegate at State Conference and for many years even through lean times Milloom supported their delegates financially.

At the first meeting after the office bearers had been elected I recall Mrs Gladys Phillips (Julie's mother) put up her hand and said we must have "a keeper of the scrap book" and volunteering to be that person the very old and large book is displayed on the table today Mira Sims followed her we thank them for their dedication, there are several scrap books on display some I don't know where they came from they just turn up in the cupboard please take time to browse through them they bring back some wonderful memories not just of Milloo branch but CWA in general and of a time that is fast being forgotten in today's fast moving digitized world.

Australia Day has been recognised at Milloo for some years. Activities commenced with a flag raising and morning tea, later moving to an evening time slot with cold meat and salad and desserts for tea, open to all who wish to attend. We attempt to vary the topics covered by the speakers for the evening but the most important thing is the opportunity for all in the community to come together for a social time out.

We now have 2 life members, 9 members, 2 of whom are foundation members with continuous membership over the fifty years but we are a scattered group; 3 live-in Bendigo 2. in Lockington, 5 in the district and 1 at Calivil. Through thick and thin we have supported CWA aims and objectives ,district interests and not afraid to put pen to paper with complaints or opinions to relevant authorities.

Agnes Cant is a foundation member and has been a member over the fifty or should I being correct say as of today 49 years and 8 months and is our best attending member, Agnes has rarely missed a meeting, although never president or secretary she has been treasurer and competition steward for a fair share of the time and is usually last out the door making sure we haven't forgotten anything a regular delegate to State & Group conferences, attendee and worker at Group Functions

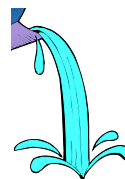

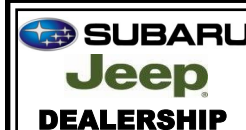

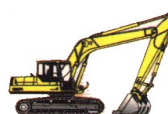

WALSH SAYS NO TO BIRTHS, DEATHS & MARRIAGES AMENDMENT

Leader of The Nationals and Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh will oppose the Births, Deaths & Marriages Registration Amendment Bill 2019, which is scheduled to be debated when State Parliament resumes next week.

The bill has been introduced to the Victorian Parliament by the Andrews Labor Government.

Its primary purpose is to allow birth records of gender to be altered to a gender descriptor nominated by an applicant.

"Birth certificates exist to record the gender of a person at birth, and should remain so," Mr Walsh said.

He said the law currently requires an individual to undergo general reassignment surgery before their birth certificate can be changed.

"If passed, the bill will give applicants the right to choose their birth certificate gender as male, female or another non-binary option," Mr Walsh said.

"I have been contacted by a large number of my constituents who have expressed very genuine concerns with this bill.

"They see the proposed changes as having little regard for the silent majority who choose to live their lives identifying as the gender to which they were born.

"Those men and women seek legally safe and comfortable access to their own spaces and privacy in a broad range of social, living and sporting environments."

Mr Walsh said he acknowledged the rights of individuals to live their lives according to their identified gender, but this bill leaves far too many questions unanswered.

"I thank the people of Murray Plains who have sent me their considered thoughts on this piece of legislation."



HAVE YOUR SAY ON NEW SAFETY STANDARDS FOR BACKYARD POOLS AND SPAS

The Leader of The Nationals and Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh has encouraged all homeowners with swimming pools to have their say on the drafted Building Amendment (Swimming Pool and Spa) Regulations 2019.

Mr Walsh said the proposed regulations include the mandatory requirement for owners of private swimming pools and spas to register them with their local council, as well as to engage a registered building surveyor or inspector to inspect and certify the compliance of safety barriers every three years.

"The new regulations will commence on 1st December 2019 and the proposed implementation period will require owners of existing swimming pools and spas to take action by 14th April 2020."

Mr Walsh said the regulations, as well as a Regulatory Impact Statement (RIS) that examines the costs and benefits of the proposed regulations and alternative options that were considered, are now available for public consultation.

"This is an opportunity for anyone interested to have their say on the proposed regulations before they are finalised.

"Given the vast numbers of home pools across the Murray Plains electorate and the significant requirements that are proposed for those pools, I urge all stakeholders to take part in the public consultation process."

Submissions will be accepted until 5 pm on 6th September 2019.

PREVENTION IS KEY - VACCINATE AGAINST ENTEROTOXAEMIA

The new season is just around the corner and hopefully with it comes some spring growth. Unfortunately, good conditions can sometimes produce some extra worries. With lush spring growth, losses due to enterotoxaemia and bloat can be a distinct possibility.

Enterotoxaemia is caused by a toxin produced by Clostridium bacteria, which is found in the bowel of normal, healthy cattle and sheep.

Enterotoxaemia occurs when a large amount of readily fermentable feed is present in the bowel, leading to rapid multiplication of the bacteria and a lethal level of toxin production.

Due to the rapid progression of the disease, an animal affected by enterotoxaemia will typically be found dead in the paddock.

On post-mortem, rapid decomposition of the carcass is seen.

Young stock in good condition up to two years of age are most commonly affected, however deaths may also occur in older stock.

Little can be done to treat an animal already affected by enterotoxaemia, therefore the emphasis should be on prevention.

The key to prevention is to ensure all livestock are adequately protected through vaccination.

As with any vaccination program, adult cows and ewes should be vaccinated approximately one month prior to calving, to give their calves and lambs maternal or passive immunity through colostrum.

Passive immunity lasts approximately six weeks after which calves, and lambs need to be vaccinated to gain an active immunity by two injections at least four weeks apart.

Most vaccines provide around 12 months of protection and should therefore be given annually.

A feature of the enterotoxaemia vaccine is that the duration of immunity that it provides may be quite short. It may only give three or four months of protection.

Therefore, a booster dose should be given before a high-risk period i.e. the beginning of spring.
