




Science (pictured right)






LOCKINGTON TO BE RESCUED

The Ten Towns initiative is Rural Aid's way of supporting small rural communities and highlighting the impact the drought is having on them. Lockington will receive \$100,000 to be spent over five years on renewing their town.

The \$100,000 includes \$10,000 for town leaders to workshop with experts in rural/regional town renewal with the aim of developing a long-term renewal strategy. These facilitated workshops will support the long-term sustain ability of the town and local community.

\$90,000 will be spent on materials for maintenance projects identified by the town leaders, that fits within our scope of work. If available, materials will be sourced locally to support local businesses.

Rural Aid's Farm Army of volunteers (usually between 50 - 100) will spend a week in the town in the first year, possibly in July 2020, bringing a welcome financial injection to the town's local businesses. Lockington was selected because of it's vision for the town's future and it's leadership capabilities.

LOCKY POOL OPENING ON SATURDAY 9TH NOVEMBER

The Lockington Pool has had a makeover! The long awaited painting of the pool has occurred and the water is sparkling. The ducks are loving it too! So it all adds up to being another great season. Nearly time to hit the pool, cool off and enjoy some time with friends, away from other life pressures!

The pool is opening on Saturday 9th November, from 3-7pm everyday except Christmas. Come along, let the kids get tired in the pool and renew the seasonal Outdoor Pools pass. There are many different ones to suit everyone.

Book review - 'The Da Vinci Code'

'The Da Vinci Code' is a conspiracy thriller written by Dan Brown. We follow the protagonist Robert Langdon, a professor of religious symbology. In Paris he is awakened by the French authorities to view a murder of the current curator of the Louvre. Little did he know about the insane sequence of events that follows. After discovering he is now a suspect in the murder investigation he befriends a French Cryptologist, Sophie Neveu, they embark on a harrowing journey and race against time discovering and deciphering clues the curator left for them to find the true murderer and an ancient piece of history. The book has also been adapted into a successful and well known film.

Dan Brown is a 55 year old American author best known for his thriller novels such as 'Angels and Demons' and 'Inferno'.

When the book was released there was an immense amount of controversy surrounding it. A lot of this has come from both the apparent misrepresentation of Christianity and the Catholic Church, as well as criticism about the inaccurate depiction and descriptions of European art, history, architecture, etc.

Before I began the book I was a little skeptical, I thought perhaps it's been overhyped like a quite a few other novels I've read, for example 'To Kill A Mockingbird'. Boy, was I wrong. I was only a few chapters in and I was absolutely hooked, I devoured it. The story is intense, fast paced, fascinating and hectic but in a good way. Dan Brown goes into so much detail and explains everything incredibly well. Without giving away spoilers, the plot twist that occurs towards the end was amazing, it was such a mind spin. Seeing it all come together was interesting and satisfying at the same time.

As for the characters, I loved the three main characters. Robert Langdon, the protagonist and professor. Sophie Neveu, the Cryptologist, and Leigh Teabing, the antagonist and history buff. I thoroughly enjoyed his character, regardless of the twist, he was intelligent and calculating.

All in all, I LOVED this book. I 100% recommend to read it if you haven't already, it's earned a place on my favourites shelf.



Can I or can't I?



This guide gives you general information about what you can and can't do during declared Fire Danger Periods and on days of Total Fire Ban, when fires in the open air are legally restricted.

CFA declares Fire Danger Periods by municipalities in the country area of Victoria during periods of increased fire risk. Refer to the CFA website cfa.vic.gov.au for further details about your location.

In state forests, national parks and on protected public land, fire restrictions are in force all year round. Contact the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) for advice on fire restrictions in these areas.

Also, always check with your municipality as some have restrictions in place all year round.

Total Fire Bans are declared by CFA on days when fires are likely to spread rapidly and be difficult to control.

The penalties for lighting fires illegally during the Fire Danger Period and on Total Fire Ban Days include large fines and possible imprisonment.



Total Fire Ban (TFB)

Total Fire Bans are declared by CFA on days when fires are likely to spread rapidly and be difficult to control.

Fire Danger Period (FDP)

CFA declares the Fire Danger Periods by municipality during periods of increased fire risk.

The following activities are subject to restrictions, in the open air on days of Total Fire Ban and during the Fire Danger Period.

- BBQ / Campfires
- Commercial Catering
- Solid Fuel BBQ
- Scaring Gun
- Burning Off
- Driving Vehicles
- · Chainsaw / Lawn
- · Hot Work / Bees
- Incinerator
- Farm / Road Machinery

To report a fire **DIAL** 000

It is the responsibility of every individual using fire to ensure they comply with the fire restriction laws. Anyone using fire must ensure that their actions do not cause a fire to spread to other property. Severe penalties apply under the Crimes Act 1958 (Vic) to anyone who intentionally or recklessly lights, maintains or fails to contain a fire and allows it to spread on to other property.

I'm planning a burn-off on my property. How do I notify emergency services?

If you have been issued with a burn-off permit by CFA or a Municipal Fire Prevention Officer, you need to give the Emergency Services Telecommunications Authority (ESTA) prior notification by phoning 1800 668 511 and any other person identified in the permit conditions.

How can I find further information or apply for a permit?

For any clarification or further information about this guide, or to obtain a permit application form, visit cfa.vic.gov.au, contact your local CFA district headquarters or phone (03) 9262 8444. A list of contact numbers for CFA district headquarters is available on the CFA website.

In many municipalities north-east and east of Melbourne, DELWP fire restrictions also apply within 1.5km of the public land boundary. Check the DELWP website for details.

CFA HAYSTACK WARNING AFTER SPATE OF FIRES LAST SUMMER

Dry conditions in some parts of regional Victoria similar to those seen last year have led to a warning to all farmers to exercise extreme caution with the cutting, baling and storage of hay.

CFA Chief Officer Steve Warrington said firefighters responded to a record number of haystack fires last fire season.

"Over the previous fire season CFA crews responded to . close to 90 haystack fires, more than any season before.

"North West Victoria was a hot spot last fire season and remains a concern for CFA. Dry conditions have meant some crops have failed with farmers having to cut crops for hay raising the potential risk of haystack fires.

"It is important for farmers when you're preparing your property for the fire season that your haystacks are . prepared, put away and stored safely.

CO Warrington emphasised that haystacks can pose a . great danger and occupy crucial firefighting resources for days during a potentially extreme fire season.

"What people don't realise is that when a haystack catches fire, it continues to smoulder over a long period and CFA crews need to continue monitoring it for several days to make sure it doesn't spread and get out of control.

"Haystack fires can start quite easily from lightning, equipment and machinery, but another major source is spontaneous combustion.

Spontaneous combustion can occur when hay is either not properly cured before baling, or not stored to protect it from rain or damp conditions which means moisture content in the bales is higher than the recommended level.

They are then stored in environments with high temperatures and little airflow which triggers a chemical reaction that leads to fire. This can happen to any bale regardless of size.

"The advice is clear and simple; cure your hay properly and then store it in multiple locations and away from assets to avoid large losses if a fire occurs," Mr Warrington said.

"If you're storing hay in a shed, make sure air can circulate around the haystacks, monitor stacks on a

regular basis, check for heat levels and avoid walking on stacks in case they collapse due to internal heating.

"Please make sure to keep your haystacks out of the rain to avoid fluctuating moisture content.

"Since 2008. **CFA** has responded to more than 1500 haystack fires, by storing your haystacks properly.

"You can avoid adding to those statistics and save yourself from the costly impact of a fire."



Important tips

- It is important to ensure hay is well cured before baling
- Know the history of the hay you purchase
- Keep haystacks to a limited size
- Monitor moisture and temperature of your hay regularly
- Watch for unusual odours such as pipe tobacco, caramel, burning or musty smells
- Store hay in separate stacks or sheds away from farm equipment and other buildings
- Keep your hay dry. Protect it from rain, leaking rooves or spouts, and runoff. Cover stacks with tarps or hay caps
- Don't stack hay right to the top of a hay shed. Allow some air to circulate at the top, this helps to carry away moisture.

Temperature guide - what to do when your hay is overheating

Use a thermometer in a probe or insert a crowbar into the middle of the stack for two hours

- Less than 50°C (can handle bar without discomfort): Check temperature daily
- 50°C 60°C (can only handle crowbar for short time): Check temperature twice daily. Remove machinery from shed
- 60°C 70°C (can touch bar only briefly): Check temperature every two to four hours. Move hay to improve air flow
- Over 70 °C (bar is too hot to hold): Potential for fire. Call 000 immediately. Avoid walking on top of haystack.

Less than 50°C ✓ Check temperature daily

50°C to 60°C

Check temperature twice daily. Remove machinery from shed

60°C to 70°C

Check temperature every 2 to 4 hours. Move hay to improve air flow

EMERGENCY WATER INFRASTRUCTURE REBATE


The On-Farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme is now available for the purchase and installation of emergency water infrastructure for livestock.

The scheme is available to eligible farm businesses in a number of local government areas, including: Campaspe, Gannawarra, Greater Bendigo, Greater Shepparton, Loddon, Strathbogie, Swan Hill, Mildura and Buloke.

Farm businesses outside of the above local government areas can make an application if they can demonstrate a critical water need for livestock resulting from current seasonal conditions.

These applications will be assessed on a case-by-case basis.

TAPPING INTO VICTORIAN CRAFT PRODUCE

Victoria's small-scale and craft producers are being supported to grow in a bid to create new jobs and attract more visitors from interstate and overseas to enjoy locally-made food, beer and spirits.

Minister for Agriculture Jaclyn Symes has this week launched the \$10 million Small-Scale and Craft Program, encouraging all small-scale producers across Victoria to apply.

Two streams of funding are available under the new program:

Stream One – Small-scale and Craft Business Development: Grants up to \$25,000 are available to eligible small-scale and craft producers for projects that support businesses to scale up, expand their operations and diversify their products – with applications closing on 6 December.

Stream Two – Job Creation and Economic Development: Grants of \$25,000-\$200,000 will go to eligible small scale and craft agribusinesses for significant projects that will deliver benefits to the community and generate jobs.

Projects involving multiple businesses are particularly encouraged to apply, with Expressions of Interest, which close on 31 December. This new program follows on from the successful Artisanal Sector Program, which delivered grants to businesses in Victoria's highly valued and diverse artisanal produce sector, helping them grow production, enhance their farmers' market potential and take their local produce to the world.


