



Hello again Everyone,

I had thought of returning to our story of the development of Victoria's railway system in this issue of the Locky News but instead, we're going to look at some memories recorded some years ago by Mrs Wilma Humbert (nee Batt). Wilma's Dad was the Postmaster at Lockington from 1928 until 1946, and she and her family were very much involved in the growing-up years of the still-fairly-new Lockington township. In some respects, the town of which Wilma writes was very different from the Lockington we know today. Some of the places she recalls have totally disappeared; others now fill a different role. We no longer have three Blacksmiths like "'Daddy' Gee, Arthur Bacon and [Tom] Conroy". However, we have a regular veterinary service staffed from Rochester whereas Wilma recalls that Mr Roy Park "was often called out to sick animals." We no longer have a drapery store, but Wilma remembers two - One was part of Fiedlers' General Store and was run by Stan Thomas; the other was operated by a Mr Greenhalgh. Charlie Thompson managed the Coffee Palace which "was a real going concern", and Tim Keogh, Stock & Station Agent, lived opposite Johns' Bakery and "ran a very successful business from his home."

These particular recollections were included in some brief notes that I received from Wilma, but she has also recorded her own story of her family's life in Lockington. It reads as follows: - "It's 1928 in Lockington and, after changing trains three times (an all-day trip by steam train from Melbourne), Margaret Batt, her husband William, and baby daughter Eileen, have arrived. They are here to operate the Post Office, now located in the old Bank of New South Wales building, having been moved from Fiedlers' Store.

At that time, the telephone exchange had 88 subscribers, plus direct lines to Bendigo, Elmore, Echuca and Rochester. Margaret, the new Postmistress, was highly qualified as a "Morse Code" Telegraphist in Ireland and Morwell. William was a former R A F pilot in England. Work was hard to obtain, as there was a Depression in Australia. He often untangled the telephone lines by 'shinning' the poles, and he slept under the continuous exchange.

Lockington was a big change; no conveniences and flat country, plus the heat was a big contrast. The Post office had a staff of one - Pat O'Brien (later Gray). Extras were Bessie Flaherty (later O'Brien) and Hazel Kidd (later Clymo), and later came Eileen Batt, Beryl Golden and Wilma Batt.

Dr Quinn from Echuca did a life-saving operation on Margaret, so William then took over the duties of Postmaster. Mail Bags were sent each day to Melbourne, Bendigo and Elmore, and William met the train from Cohuna each morning, and again in the afternoon. Rochester Mailmen, Taylor and Henderson, called daily.

The exchange was a very busy one. It handled throughtraffic from Kotta, Pine Grove, Tennyson, Piavella, Mitiamo and Diggora, plus automatic exchanges at Bamawm and Bamawm Extension. Fiedlers' Store had a big staff and they, as well as O'Briens' Store, kept the exchange busy. The Water Bailiffs used to ring in the early hours (4 am and onwards) and we'd see them on their bikes; Aitken, Hubble, Porce, Partington and Ellis. The Linesmen's shed and Technician's shed came next door. Joe Brennan, Jim Lyons, Vince McMahon and Geoff Marsh were Technicians – early ones

There was a lot of hardship. William handled payment of the dole/sustenance of five shillings a week, and this planted a lot of trees in Lockington. As Postmaster, William was always filling in Pension forms of all descriptions, and he filled in forms for the Italian migrants when the Second World War broke out.

Martin Moriarty, an old pensioner, taught a lot of children to swim in those channels. They were wonderful in the hot weather. We always had plenty of channel water laid on.

When the War broke out, the Church of England bell tolled. The gas lights were switched off. Margaret helped servicemen with her Morse Code expertise. Lockington wasn't quite the same. Telegrams were always a big part of the Post office; for weddings and bereavements. In the War years, any notice of soldiers killed or missing in action had to be handdelivered by the Postmaster; often a few miles of walking

Petrol rationing in the war years, and shortly afterwards, saw the Post Office kept busy issuing ration tickets. Private Boxes at the Post Office were a big help to country people. If there was a fire anywhere, William organised help to attend as quickly as possible. He was also quick to respond to any emergency with whatever assistance he could muster. If, for example, someone rang and said that they were having a heart attack, he would have the doctor there promptly.

In 1946, Wally and Fay Keown took over the Post Office, and William opened the Lockington Hotel in 1947. Life seemed easier after eighteen years operating a continuous exchange. As a family, the Batt children were given a great training, and Wilma and her sister had a great knowledge of many people whose names they still remember around Lockington. " (Signed) Wilma Humbert.




SURVIVAL SKILLS



NATIONAL PLAN TO COMBAT CLIMATE CHANGE IN AGRICULTURE

Agriculture ministers from around Australia came together in Melbourne last week to endorse a national program, led by Victoria, that will see governments work together to help farmers meet the challenges of climate change.

Much of Australia is facing severe drought and dry conditions are set to become more frequent and extreme as a result of climate change.

It is vital that governments across Australia work together to build the country's response to droughts and our farms' preparedness for ongoing difficult seasonal conditions, through a coordinated national approach that gives Australian producers access to support that will provide relief immediately and well into the future.

Victorian Minister for Agriculture Jaclyn Symes welcomed the decision of the Agricultural Ministers' Forum to commit to the national climate change work program, which will provide certainty to the agriculture and business sectors while supporting producers to build resilience against Lead researcher Steve Henry from CSIRO, Australia's changing conditions.

Victoria led the development of the program, which focuses on four priorities:

- Delivering information and tools to improve on-farm decisions and risk management
- Driving research and innovation to support adaptation and mitigation technology
- Strengthening market opportunities and farming business models to build resilience
- Preparing for increasing biosecurity risks as the risk of pests, diseases and weeds changes

A new Climate Change Task Group will oversee the delivery of the program, regularly reporting to the Agriculture Senior Officials' Committee and Ministers on its progress.

Farmers across Australia know too well the challenges caused by climate change.

While they are good at adapting to difficult seasonal conditions, they need further support to thrive for "In South Australia, mouse numbers are low across the northern decades, not years, to come.

HARVEST CLEAN TO KEEP Mouse Numbers Lean

Minimising grain on the ground after harvest will assist in maintaining current low populations of mice across Australia's grain growing regions.

That's according to pest experts who are encouraging growers to harvest as cleanly as possible and practice good farm hygiene, especially around grain storage facilities, to reduce the availability of food for mice.

national science agency, says food resources left in paddocks after harvest could sustain mouse breeding and lead to higher mouse numbers when next year's winter crops are sown.

"Given it has been a variable season right across the grain belt, we know that many growers will be conscious about getting as much grain as possible into the silos so that will certainly help to reduce the potential for any buildup in mouse populations," Mr Henry, whose mouse-related research is through a Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) investment, said.

"We also recognise that some crops may not be harvested at all, and in those situations it would be advisable to consider using livestock where possible to remove potential food for mice."

Mr Henry, who recently completed a spring monitoring exercise with his colleague Wendy Ruscoe, said mouse numbers remain low across all grain-growing regions in Australia, largely because of the continuing dry conditions in many parts.

Adelaide Plains, the Mallee, Eyre and Yorke Peninsulas, while the situation is similar in Victoria where abundance is low in regions such as the Mallee and Wimmera.

"In northern, central and southern New South Wales, there has been no mouse activity, while numbers in Queensland are very low throughout the Darling Downs and around Goondiwindi. In Western Australia, mouse abundance is also at a low level."

Mr Henry said to further assist with monitoring efforts, a new benchmark site and a further 10 rapid assessment sites have been set up at Parkes by the NSW Department of Primary Industries.

Benchmark sites at Mallala in SA, Walpeup in Victoria, the Darling Downs in Queensland and now Parkes in NSW involve the collection of live trapping data for use in population modelling.

"I urge growers to report and map mouse activity presence absence MouseAlert and using (www.mousealert.org.au) so other growers can see what activity is being observed in their neighbourhood and via Twitter using @MouseAlert.'

Mr Henry said weather events, such as hail, intense wind and late spring or early summer rains can damage mature crops and also produce a flush of summer weeds which can contribute to mouse food sources over summer.

The GRDC's major mouse-related research, development and extension program is continuing to reveal new insights about mice in Australian broad acre cropping systems.

As part of the suite of GRDC investments, CSIRO researchers have been undertaking bait substrate trials to determine what is driving a perceived reduction in efficacy of zinc phosphide bait and testing potential new bait substrates that might be more attractive to mice.

Researchers are testing the willingness of mice to transition from one food to another and then determining whether mice will continue to eat that alternative food . source once zinc phosphide bait has been applied.

The Board Chair of Rochester and Elmore District Health Service (REDHS), Associate Professor Carol McKinstry, announced this week that a total of \$2.6M will be spent on refurbishing the residential aged care facilities at REDHS. Funding for the project comprises \$800K from Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and \$1.8M from REDHS capital reserves. The scope of the project includes significantly expanding the size of the residents dining room, splitting the six double bedrooms into single bedrooms each with their own ensuite, and upgrading the hostel including replacing the heating, expanding the dementia garden and replacement of handrails. Hughes Cartwright Design Group Pty Ltd, Bendigo, has been appointed as architect for the project and it is expected that the refurbishment will commence in June 2020 and be completed in March 2021. Associate Professor McKinstry concluded by stating that she was delighted the Board of REDHS was able to confirm the \$2.6M investment into its residential aged care facilities, a highly valued community service and a core service of REDHS. This investment will be of significant benefit to the residents and staff of the Nursing Home.


