Lockington IS Open for Accommodation

With the "Birds of a Feather" accommodation now taking guests, I thought it may be interesting to fill everyone in on the early days of what was then known as the Coffee Palace. It is nice to see the building looking so cared for and looked after.

Joy Weller

August 1918 - John Weller arrived at Bamawm Railway station (later renamed Lockington) to take up the closer settlement block Allotment 16 Bamawm - abutting the east side town boundary, there was a house on the allotment, but other than the railway station there was, one house in Barton street (Dycers)(and a tent (Cummins) in Burns Street. Mrs Dycer invited him in for a cup of tea.

John's wife Clara, and their 9 children arrived later, the family had been advised to move north from Gippsland for health reasons. Ruby and Cliff both died later from tuberculosis.

By 1920 the irrigation district was developing, and there were a number of itinerant workers about .Clara purchased two blocks in the township, at 11 and 15 Hopetoun Street, she contracted Northern Timber from Rochester to build a coffee palace at no 15, this was

built with poured cement, the sand coming from a pit on the farm The building comprised shop front, dining room, kitchen, several bed rooms and utility rooms, as well as providing much needed accommodation this would also provide

A further weather board annexe in the back yard housed 6 sleep- outs. It was opened for business in 1924. Although the channels by then provided fresh water, there of course was no drainage or sewerage, the night cart made extra calls, this was taken to the council sanitary depot in a paddock at the east end of the present recreation reserve, attempts were made to drain the sullage water to block 11 to grow fruit trees (The drain can still be seen) All vegetable and food scraps were taken to the farm for the pigs.


A Chinese man Willie Goon had a vegetable patch on the farm in the vicinity of the water tower and he keep them in vegetables.

By 1930 Cora and Mabel had found other interests, the demand for accommodation had passed and Clara was ready to retire, the premises was leased out to (the first of many) the Scott family, who ran it as a barber shop with billiard room and dining room.

Clara passed away in 1936 and in 1938 the premises and no 11 were sold to finalise her estate.

George Harrison bought both at 11 Hopetoun St he built two shops one a café/ newsagent and in part 2 Lilian Harrison and Ivy Kelly ran a baby/ childrens wear shop.

The weather board annex was removed to construct a house at 11 Mc Coll St.





We have had a crazy busy few weeks here at LCS, with excursions, camps and awards.


WICKED Awards


T20 Cricket Competition

PRESERVING THE PAST **LOCAL HISTORY GRANTS NOW AVAILABLE**

Local history groups looking to preserve, record history are and share their town's being encouraged to apply for the Public Record Office Victoria's Local History Grants Program.

Applications are now open for grants of up to \$15,000 to assist local community groups and organisations that collect and preserve the stories of our region.

Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh said the grants aimed to support local historical groups planning or currently working on projects to secure their stories for prov.vic.gov.au/community/grants-andgenerations to come.

"The Murray Plains electorate has a vibrant history with many important local stories to share and preserve," Mr Walsh said.

Projects previously supported through the program include the digitisation and preservation of newspapers, cataloguing of objects and records, the development and production of exhibitions and the purchase of high standard storage and display cases.

Last year, the Echuca Historical Society successfully secured \$15,000 to digitise and archive past editions of the Riverine Herald through the grants program.

Mr Walsh said it was important to preserve our local history for future generations to enjoy.

"I encourage all local historical societies, schools, sporting clubs and specialist interest groups to apply for this grant to help share their stories," Mr Walsh said.

The Local History Grants Program is now open to all notfor-profit community groups. Applications close at midnight on 8 January 2020.





LIVESTOCK AND SNAKES

By Dr Jeff Cave, District Veterinary Officer

As the weather moves into warmer spring days, snakes become more active.

effects of snake venom.

The severity of a snake bite depends on the size and species of the snake; the period since the snake had last bitten prey; the time after hibernation; the size of the animal it has bitten; and the location of the bite.

There are several clinical signs that may occur, however these can be inconsistent and variable. In general, snake venom paralyses muscles.

muscle tremors and have a weak, staggery gait.

Affected animals may dribble saliva and lose the ability to swallow. Paralysis of the respiratory muscles will lead to respiratory depression and death resulting from asphyxia.

These signs may appear very quickly or be delayed.

If an animal receives a small dose of venom it may recover after an illness of one to five days.

Snake bite can be difficult to diagnose at post-mortem as All livestock, particularly horses, are sensitive to the the small puncture wounds and local swelling can be difficult to find in a large animal. Diagnosis is often based on the sighting of a snake and the exclusion of other diseases.

> If you suspect your animal has been bitten by a snake, seek veterinary assistance immediately, even if your animal is not yet showing any signs of envenomation.

> The correct antivenom for the species of snake involved needs to be given and most veterinary clinicals will have anti-venene that covers one or more species of snake.
