



THE RELEVANCE OF CHRISTMAS

Christians believe that most triumphant moment in all of human history was the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ for the salvation of the world. Christmas is important because it observes the moment when that divine rescue plan began. Jesus, though God, also became a man.

But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons (Galatians 4:4–5).

Christmas is important because it reminds us that our religious life cannot be reduced to meditation, introspection, or sentimentality. Our faith is not merely the stuff of a spiritual realm. The birth of Jesus, foretold by prophets, is God entering time and space. Christmas is history. Christmas is the divine in 3-D.

And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth. ... For from his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. For the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God; the only God, who is at the Father's side, he has made him known. (John 1:14, 16–18).

That first Christmas escaped the world's notice, yet momentarily focused the cosmos on little Bethlehem, just as the Hebrew Tanakh had predicted:

But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times (Micah 5:2).

In a lonely field outside Bethlehem, only a few shepherds heard that night that the promise of the Messiah had been fulfilled. Yet its glorious announcement signaled just how important Christmas would become to planet earth.

The angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger."






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SAVE THE CHRISTMAS POSTAGE STAMPS

Now is the time for all livestock owners to be prepared and have a clear strategy to carry out in the event of a fire emergency on their farm.

A key factor in minimising the threat to livestock during a bush fire or on extreme fire danger days is to identify safer areas on-farm where livestock can be moved to.

The area you choose will depend on the type of livestock and their expected behaviour during a fire.

Low risk areas should not be next to areas of scrub or bushland and should be large enough to allow livestock to this planning stage ensures irrigators avoid costly move around and away from a fire.

Horses should not be locked up in small areas or stables but rather should be moved to an open paddock with minimal vegetation, so they can move freely.

Horses are good at moving themselves to safe open areas.

If equipment such as rugs, halters and flyveils remain on horses, the plastic may melt, and metal buckles can burn the animal, so consider using rope halters for easier handling and management.

It's crucial that gates remain closed that may allow livestock access to public roadways, as any animals will present a hazard to traffic in smoky conditions.

Livestock owners are urged to act early and not get caught trying to move stock as a fire approaches.

Listen to weather forecasts and observe your own environment to help you decide when to put your plan into action.

DUNG BEETLES AND LOCKINGTON LANDCARE

On Sunday 8th December 16 colonies of dung beetles were collected from John Feehan, Mr Dung Beetle expert of Australia based in Canberra. The transfer took place at Gundagai. These colonies consisted of two varieties, Alexis and Pecuarius, that have been bred especially for the climate around the Lockington district. Each colony had 850 dung beetles. John, pictured (right) with beetles.

16 farmers agreed to cover the cost of these beetles and then to release their given colony onto one cattle paddock on their farm. This will give a wide infestation of these summer dung beetles in our area. Instructions on the release and care of the beetles was provided. The colonies will be monitored over the next three years to



establish how they thrive in this area. It is hoped that they will multiply over this time, providing a natural means of taking dung deep into the soil. Aeration of the soil from the tunnelling system together with buried dung creates microbial activity which in turn stores massive amounts of carbon. The dung beetles relocates nitrogen and phosphorous in the dung to the grass root zone providing habitat and a food supply for earthworms. An added benefit is that when it rains, water penetrations and ground water retention is improved. Wendy Sims meets Rodney Bacon (left) to begin the distribution of the dung beetle colonies. The best benefit to our district will be the reduction in flies - no dung means less source of food for flies!!

It is hoped that the Lockington Landcare group will obtain funding in the future to enable more dung beetles to be purchased at a subsidised cost.
