Hello again, Everyone

This week we're returning once more to the story of the Victorian Railways; particularly the project that was underway in 1860, to provide a rail link between Melbourne and Sandhurst [Bendigo]. Ultimately, the intention was to then extend the line to Echuca. This latter proposal was being strongly contested by representatives of the people of the goldmining districts northwest of Melbourne, particularly Castlemaine, Maryborough and Dunolly. These people contended that they were the major contributors to the occasion, and a grand ball was given at Woodend on Victorian economy at that time, due to the amount of gold then being produced on the various diggings. Because Castlemaine, Maryborough and Dunolly were large centres of population, there seemed much greater justification in providing for their transportation needs than could be said for the regions north of Bendigo.

Throughout 1860, a battle of words was conducted by the various regional newspapers of the day. There were public meetings and rallies, and a constant stream of delegations approached the various members of parliament to demand an adjustment to the government's plans for the Melbourne to the Murray River rail link. The *Bendigo Advertiser* took up the challenge on behalf of the people of Victoria's northern plains, and the Riverina Districts of southern New South Wales, emphasising the point that had been a major consideration of the government in its initial decision – That the riverboat trade on the Murray and its tributaries was handling most if not all of the transport needs of the people of northern Victoria and southern New South Wales, and that the economic benefits from this trade were all going to South Australia!

To quote the Advertiser of 15 November, 1860: - "The colony is asked indefinitely to postpone the realization of the idea of connecting the metropolis with the natural highway of the interior, and to allow South Australia to monopolise all its trade, and even to take from the Melbourne merchants some of that which they now look on as their own, in order that the exaggerated ideas of their own importance entertained by the people of Maryborough and its neighbours may be fully gratified!" In answer to some remarks that had been made at a recent public meeting in Maryborough, when it had been suggested that the provision of the rail extension from Sandhurst to Echuca would suffice only to meet the needs of "just a few shepherds", the Advertiser went on to make the following sarcastic retort: - "The only remark that has struck us as original is the profound observation, that Bendigo is the last place where civilization existed. It is the ultima thule--the world's end. Thus far and no farther north does the stream of civilization extend, and beyond us is a waste. It is all a fable

about the steamers on the Murray, and such places as Wahgunyah, Wagga Wagga, Echuca, and Deniliquin, do not exist."

On Saturday, 20 July, 1861, the Brisbane Courier reported that another portion of the Melbourne and Mount Alexander railway was officially opened that day. From the following Monday, the line would be available for general traffic from the metropolis to Woodend, a distance of nearly 50 miles. A large number of persons travelled on the line on that Monday night, in commemoration of the event. Unfortunately, this piece of good news was followed by a less satisfactory report coming from the Argus on 24 August, 1861: - "Throughout the month, the state of matters on the Melbourne and Murray River Railway works has been unsatisfactory. The opening of the line to Woodend, recorded last month, was followed almost immediately by a determination on the part of the contractors to lower the rates for day labour from 7 shillings and 8 shillings, to 5 shillings and 6 shillings. This course seemed to be justified by the forward state of the works, and by the condition of the labour market... Hundreds were willing to accept the reduced terms, and the repairers of the line between Sunbury and Woodend at once resumed work, at wages varying from 6 shillings to 8 shillings, but the turn-outs swept the whole line in force, compelled the repairers to withdraw from the works, forced the unwilling to join their ranks, threw down the travellingcranes, pitched the wagons down the embankments, assaulted two of the sub-contractors - one of them to the danger of life - and placed the township of Kyneton for a time in fear of being plundered. A strong body of Melbourne police, under the personal command of Captain Standish, proceeded to Kyneton, the centre of the disturbed district, and it was found necessary at once to place the steam stone -breaking machines, and the whole line between Sunbury Woodend, under their immediate and armed and protection... The strike still continues, but the sub-contractor on the Woodend section, Mr Randle, having offered 7 shillings and upwards per day to those who will resume work under him, the outrages, have ceased, though labour has not yet been resumed, the men demanding that work on the same terms shall be resumed simultaneously over the whole line between Sunbury and Sandhurst."

Once again, that's it for now, but we are coming closer to Bendigo!

<u>Water hyacinth – don't buy,</u> sell or give it away

Water hyacinth is a highly invasive weed that is choking lakes, rivers and water ways around the world and Agriculture Victoria is encouraging Victorians to report it to prevent it from taking hold in Victoria.

Water hyacinth may look pretty but has a well-deserved reputation for being the world's worst water weed.

An advertising campaign,

'Water hyacinth – don't buy, sell or give it away', targets the illegal buying or selling of the State prohibited weed - the highest category of declared noxious weeds in Victoria.

The campaign will run on social media and online advertising sites in English, Mandarin, Khmer and Vietnamese.

Agriculture Victoria Biosecurity Manager – High Risk Invasive Plants, Angela Constantine said water hyacinth (*Eichhornia crassipes*), was very harmful in aquatic environments.

Ms Constantine said water hyacinth could rapidly affect water quality, native aquatic plants and fish, and have an impact on recreational activities such as fishing and boating.

"We are asking people, if they see water hyacinth, to contact Agriculture Victoria and we will remove it before it can spread further," Ms Constantine said.

It is illegal to buy, sell, display, propagate or transport State prohibited weeds.

Ms Constantine said in recent years Agriculture Victoria had prosecuted people for selling water hyacinth on Facebook and Gumtree.

"It's important to know what you are buying, selling, or giving away," she said.

Last financial year, Agriculture Victoria detected 21 cases of water hyacinth being traded online, and nine of these were in Victoria.

Ms Constantine said water hyacinth was easier to recognise during summer when it was flowering.

"Water hyacinth can be identified by its distinctive mauve flower and bulbous spongy stems," Ms Constantine said.

"It is often kept for its very attractive flower but owners may be unaware of the profound threat it poses.

"In just one season, a single plant can produce more than 3000 seeds that can survive for more than 20 years."

If you see or have any water hyacinth, or any other State prohibited weed, report it to the Agriculture Victoria Customer Service Centre on 136 186 or email weed.spotters@ecodev.vic.gov.au.

Looking after your best work-mate - dogs on utes

There is no argument that working dogs are an enormous asset to farmers and it stands to reason, if your dog travels on the back of your ute, you need to take extra care to avoid exposing it to heat stress on hot days.

While it is legal to allow appropriately restrained dogs to travel on the back of utes, dogs left in the sun for long



periods can quickly dehydrate or even die from heat stress. Adequate shelter, for example a fixed canopy, needs to be provided to protect tethered dogs from extreme temperatures.

A lot of utes and tray backs these days are made of metal and will heat up quickly and could easily burn dogs' paws. It is now a requirement to ensure metal floors in utes are covered on a hot day.

Ensure dogs kept in cages have adequate ventilation, particularly when the vehicle is not moving, and ensure all dogs are given regular access to cool water.

Victoria's Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act requires dogs travelling in the back of utes, trailers or open tray trucks to be tethered or caged in a manner that prevents them from falling from the vehicle. The only exemption is when dogs are actively working livestock.

The tether should only be long enough to permit the dog to stand, lie down and move about but not so long that it could potentially let the dog fall off the vehicle and be dragged or strangled.

Tethering dogs should always be regarded as a temporary, short term method of restraint.

NLIS management workshops for livestock producers

Agriculture Victoria is holding practical, hands-on workshops in February and March for sheep, goat and cattle producers on how to use the National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) database.

The workshops will walk producers through their NLIS requirements and navigation, completion of movement transactions and reporting functions on the NLIS database.

Participants will also learn how to update their Property Identification Code (PIC) details.

All sheep, goats and cattle tagged with an electronic NLIS tag must be transferred on the NLIS database when they are moved between two different Victorian Property Identification Codes (PIC).

Agriculture Victoria Technical Specialist Kirstie Anderson said the aim was for producers to understand their livestock traceability requirements and how to manage their NLIS database account.

The recent bushfire events across Victoria has demonstrated just how important it is to keep PIC details up to date.

Both programs target farm businesses and farming families in the Wellington and East Gippsland shires, dryland farming in the Millewa region and irrigation farming in the Goulburn Murray Irrigation District (GMID).

On-farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate



Apply dairy effluent before winter

As winter approaches, now is the time to ensure the farm's effluent ponds are emptied before the possible wet winter months.

Using the nutrients contained in the dairy effluent can provide a boost autumn to pasture growth.



required by legislation to keep dairy effluent on-farm and out of waterways.

Ensuring your ponds are empty before winter will assist you the wet months.

Effluent systems are generally designed to have the storage ponds empty going into the wetter months of the year.

These are the months when rainfall exceeds evaporation making conditions unsuitable for effluent application due to increased risk of nutrient run off and waterlogging.

In the Goulburn Murray Irrigation District, this is generally four or five months depending on your location commencing at the start of May until the end of August or September.

Effluent is a valuable source of nutrients containing large amounts of nitrogen and potassium along with smaller concentrations of a number of other nutrients.

Ideally effluent should be tested to understand the amount of nutrient being applied.

Average figures are available, however, there is significant variation in nutrient concentration between farms and seasons.

This is due to a number of factors including herd size, milk production, amount of time spent on yards, water use in the dairy, catchment area contributing rainfall to the system and the length of time which has passed since the ponds were last cleaned out.

The nutrient contribution from the applied effluent should be factored into the farm nutrient budget and fertiliser application should be altered accordingly on paddocks where effluent has been applied.

For best response rates, effluent should be applied to actively growing pastures or crops.

Be mindful that effluent often has a high salt content making

Post application pastures should not be grazed for at least three weeks to allow the plants to utilise the available nitrogen applied and reduce the potential risk of pathogens

If possible, apply effluent to areas of the farm with lower soil These applications will be assessed on a case-by- fertility. Regularly rotate the areas where effluent is applied and undertake regular soil testing to monitor nutrient levels and avoid excessive accumulation of nutrients.
