Hello again Everyone

My computer has a bit of a glitch this week - not the coronavirus - so I can't access my story about the Sandhurst -Echuca railway line. Instead, we'll have another look back at Lockington. Before Christmas, we had a peek at 1933, with photographs. This time it's 1922, but no photos unfortunately. The description comes from the Riverine Herald on 9 October, 1922: -

"A stranger visiting Lockington for the first time would find it hard to realise the fact that the first building on the town site was only erected 12 months ago, but such is the fact. During recent months the building of business houses has gone ahead with rapid strides, and a fine little township is springing up round the railway station that taps the fertile lands in the vicinity. One of its latest acquisitions is the Memorial Hall. This building is a brick one, 80 feet in length, and has a seating capacity for 500 people. It is lofty, well ventilated, and has a fine stage, with well appointed dressing rooms. A special operating room has been included for the purposes of moving pictures, which will, no doubt, be availed of in the near future. The cost of building and furnishing the hall was 1,700 pounds, a sum that was guaranteed by 12 of the residents. This sum is being raised by the holding of entertainments and sports meetings. The ladies' committee have recently handed in the sum of 150 pounds, and at a sports meeting held at Lockington the sum of 130 pounds was added to the building fund. A crescent-shaped plantation is being laid out, and this will be planted with palms and flowering shrubs. This work, when completed, will be a fine set off to the hall.

As showing the possibilities of Lockington as a business centre in the near future, one has only to look at the vast amount of work that comes into the shop of the local blacksmith. His premises are overtaxed with farm implements, wagons, buggies, etc., that are waiting repairs. To cope with the rapid increase in business he had to have Post Office, School, With three cafes and other good shops power installed to drive his huge hammer. machine, emery wheels, and forges are power driven, and a more up-to-date smithy would be hard to find. This modern village blacksmith effects repairs to vehicles of all descriptions, including motor cars, besides shoeing of horses, and it is a far cry from the blacksmith of Longfellow to this smithy of modern times.

Like many other townships that are springing up in the North, Lockington has no water supply for domestic use, except that which is drawn from the tanks. Recently, however, they have received information that a water tower will be installed, and the householders are eagerly looking forward to its installation."

My other find for this week was Fae Stevens' winning poem, "As Time Goes By", which was published in the Locky News more than twenty years ago. Some of our readers might not have seen it before and others of us will enjoy remembering it: -

"In 1841, the land was called Pinegrove, with 40,000 acres far and wide.

In 1845, the settlers came to stay, and native tribes began to move aside.

Bullock teams and horses were used to do the work, with wheat and wool for profit at that time. Then, merchandised machinery began to make its way, and dairying was suited to that clime.

The crying need was water, and 1910 the year that an irrigation scheme was first proclaimed. An urgent need was people, and gradually they came, Bamawm, the first new place by them was named.

Growing fruit, the first idea, so orange trees were grown, a packing shed erected in the town. By then, the town of Lockington was growing to be sure, but floods and drought still kept the progress down.

Some settlers tried the stone fruit, and some to lucerne changed, but dairy herds were soon to prove their worth. New settlers kept on coming, from lands across the sea, upholding still the country of their birth.

In Tennyson, the country there was first known as Pannoo, the irrigation soon was on its way. The farmers out there first preferred to keep to wheat and wool, but dairy herds quite soon were there to stay.

At last, long railway lines came snaking through the bush, with Lockington the station and the name. Passenger trains each day, and goods trains now and then, the township had at last a claim to fame. It soon began to prosper, with Hotel, His drilling too. A baker and a chemist, a fine Memorial Hall, three churches and the Bank, to name a few.

> All sports are represented, and the Lion's Park is new, A new Community Centre, and many new homes too, The channels have been shaped to beautify the place, A Centre for our Heritage, that corner soon to grace. Alas! This little town, like others in the State, has lost its railway, chemist, and its Banks, but the spirit of the pioneers will never quite be lost, and for that, at least, they'll always have our thanks."





Also we ask people to avoid coming up to the Centre between 12pm and 1pm as the staff will be doing another wipe down. We have been extremely busy and appreciate your patience at these times.

Medications: Anyone living locally can get there medications delivered to their front door rather than coming into the Centre. Anyone out of town can do a drive through service if they phone ahead we can meet you at the door. Those that pay on collection can phone the Centre or the pharmacy to discuss payment options.

The ways to reduce your risk of coronavirus are to:

Wash hands often with soap and running water, for at least 20 seconds. Dry with paper towel or hand dryer.

Try not to touch your eyes, nose or mouth.

Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. If you don't have a tissue cough or sneeze into your upper sleeve or elbow.

Isolate yourself at home if you feel sick. If you take medication ensure you have adequate supplies, but please DON'T hoard these.

Buy an alcohol-based hand sanitiser with over 60 per cent alcohol. Although supplies are scarce, hot water and soap will be fine.

Avoid shaking hands and practice social distancing of 1.5 metres

How to self-isolate:

STAY AT HOME !!!- This means no work or quick trips to the shops and no visitors.

<u>Get essentials delivered</u>- or get help from family or friends. Supplies should be left at the door to avoid contact with others. The local supermarket can assist with this.

<u>Avoid sharing rooms</u>- Where possible stay in a well ventilated room away from other housemates or family members. Remember social distancing

<u>Don't share household items</u>- this includes towels and toiletries, high touched surfaces like doorknobs and remote controls. They should not be shared be cleaned at least once a day.

Flu Vaccination clinic at the Centre



Campaspe Shire Immunisations


Immunisation team will commence their flu vaccination program in May at a cost of \$30. They will come out to Lockington on 25th May - with a commencement time of 11.30am.



Don't misdiagnose eye cancer

There are several eye conditions that cattle can suffer from and one of the most common seen in Hereford or Poll Hereford cattle or white-faced Friesians is eye cancer.

Eye cancer, a tumour on the eyelid or eyeball, is the most common form of cancer in cattle, and in the early stages, can be misidentified as pink-eye.

Eye cancers may cause losses for producers due to condemnation at the abattoir and loss of potential production of affected stock.

The tumour begins as a tiny growth and steadily increases in size and will cause suffering if left unchecked. It may The Victorian Government's fox and wild dog invade surrounding tissues and spread to other parts of bounty has resumed. the body.

The severity of eye cancers can be reduced by the early integrated approach using all available management identification of growths and prompt action by either seeking veterinary treatment or culling.

The incidence can be reduced by genetic selection by Hunting can play an important role in supporting an selecting animals with pigmentation in the sclera 'white' of integrated management approach. the eye and the eyelid.

The course of action that should be followed depends Bendigo collections (fox only) largely upon the size and severity of the cancer.

Small eye cancers may be readily cured by prompt Address: Cnr Midland Hwy and Taylor St, Epsom veterinary treatment.

However, if the owner elects to cull the affected animal, the following guidelines should be used:

If the cancer is smaller than a five-cent piece, clean, and not flyblown, the animal can be sold through a saleyard for slaughter only.

If the cancer is sized between a five and 20-cent piece, clean, and not flyblown, the animal can be sold directly to an abattoir only.

If the cancer is bleeding, infected, flyblown or larger than a 20-cent piece, the animal should be immediately disposed of on-farm or via a knackery.

Owners who fail to take reasonable action to prevent suffering in their animals may be considered for prosecution under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act 1986.

Effective fox and wild dog management requires an practices including poison baiting, trapping, exclusion fencing, fumigation and appropriate animal husbandry.

Collection Fox type: only Time: 10.30 am - 12.30 pm Dates:

- Monday, 16 March 2020 .
- Monday, 14 April 2020
- Monday, 11 May 2020
- Tuesday, 9 June 2020

Please note:

No entire fox scalps or entire wild dog skin pieces will be accepted at any public counter or state government office. The sites indicated on the schedule will only accept bounty applications during designated collection times.

No ducking hefty penalties For hunting without licences

Two men have been forced to pay \$5,000 each and have had their firearms seized and destroyed for committing a number of hunting and firearm offences in northern Victoria.

Both men recently pleaded guilty in Shepparton Magistrates Court to, using toxic shot and being in possession of a firearm while hunting game ducks without a Firearm or Game Licence, in March 2019.

Game Management Authority (GMA) Director of Compliance and Intelligence Paul Stevens said authorised officers from the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) intercepted the men in their vehicle off Guy Road in Wanalta South west of Shepparton.

"Officers conducting a routine patrol intercepted the vehicle and on inspection found seven shot ducks, two shotguns and a leather gun belt holding ammunition," Mr Stevens said.

"When questioned, the men admitted to hunting without a Firearm or Game Licence."

"Further infield testing of the shotshells also showed they had been illegally using lead (toxic) shot for duck hunting, which is prohibited in Victoria."

Mr Stevens said people who hunt game duck in Victoria need to make sure that they hold a valid Game Licence, are familiar with the laws and are not hunting illegally.

"Those who break the law may face significant fines and penalties, be prosecuted, have their equipment confiscated and lose their Game and Firearms Licences," Mr Stevens said

The GMA works closely with its partner agencies to regularly conduct enforcement and compliance operations across Victoria.


