Hello again, Everyone,

After looking at the Rochester Tornado of 1918 in the last Locky News, we're back on the rails again in this issue. We have been recounting the story of the construction of the Melbourne to Murray Railway line, particularly, the final section which would link Sandhurst [Bendigo] to Echuca on the Murray River. Though the first contract for the line had been let in March 1863, it was not until October that year that work was properly underway. However, by January 1864, the line had almost reached Bagshot and by 8 April, the Melbourne Herald reported: -"At present the line is absolutely laid and ballasted nearly as far as Rochester, or say 30 miles from Sandhurst — no mean progress, considering the few months the contract has been their part in the day's festivities. The bridge over the commenced by Messrs Collier, Barry, and Co."

On 1 June 1864, the Bendigo Advertiser stated that the line had reached within nineteen miles of Echuca, and the contractors were praised, not just for the "speedy execution of the contract," but for the efficient way the line had been Several new features had been constructed so far. introduced into the project, and the Advertiser described them: - "For instance, longitudinal beams are first laid down, then the sleepers are placed on them, and the rails bolted down....the laying down of the line is considerably in advance of the party ballasting; so that no delay is caused ... [gravel] is filled in under the sleepers first, and then the latter covered afterwards. The ballast used is gravel from the White Hills, which is said to be superior to the stone metal usually used, it being firmer, at the same time affording a better spring. Another feature is that, instead of constructing permanent culverts, bridges, &c, in the first instance, huge logs are thrown across, strongly bolted and secured, in order to allow the engines to move ahead with material; and they are permanently built as opportunity subsequently offers. Instead of the old and slow method of breaking ground up by the pick, strong iron ploughs are used, drawn by four to eight powerful horses; and it is scarcely necessary to point out the immense advantage of this novel idea, in the shape of quick and economical work."

The Age reported on 16 June, that "The [railway] stations at Echuca have begun to be erected. They will consist of a passenger station on one side of the line, and a goods station on the other... Bricks are being made in every direction in earthworks between the Campaspe and Echuca are in a very forward state, so that no delay need be experienced, except that of ballasting the line after the building is completed."

The last rail was laid on Saturday, 17 September 1864, "and the journey from the southern to the northern boundary of Victoria has become but a six or seven hours' trip" according Marg O'Brien. to the report in the Age, on the following Monday. A train,

"conveying the contractors and their friends from Bendigo to Echuca, started from the Sandhurst Station shortly before ten o'clock on Saturday morning, and reached its destination on the banks of the Murray, exactly opposite the Government wharf — which by the way, is not a very imposing structure a little before one. The train consisted of thirteen carriages, and besides the friends of the contractors, conveyed, also, a large number of the navvies to the scene, where ample preparation had been made for their refection. Several stoppages were made on the way up, in order to allow the visitors an opportunity of inspecting the works, and also to take up numerous parties of workmen who had congregated at various portions of the line, waiting to be conveyed to take Campaspe commanded more than ordinary attention, as it is the first and only wooden one in the colony constructed on the same principle, which is known as 'Warren's patent.' At some future day it is intended to erect a permanent stone bridge in its place."

"The weather on Saturday was most auspicious, and the excursion appeared to be thoroughly enjoyed by everyone... The train, which was not inappropriately drawn by 'The Echuca,' the first locomotive constructed in the colony, and which was built by Mr Enoch Chambers, having arrived at its destination, the passengers rapidly dispersed about Echuca, the great majority also crossing the pontoon bridge and visiting the colony of New South Wales...The arrangements having been previously made, the [final] rail was at once laid, and, the last key having been put in by Mr Higginbotham, the Engineer-in-Chief, the great work of railway communication between the metropolis of Victoria and the Murray was completed. Mr Higginbotham paid a high compliment to the contractors for the unwearying energy and perseverance which they had manifested in pushing forward their operations, and expressed the most complete satisfaction at the manner in which the work had been performed. Mr Collier, on behalf of the contractors, gracefully acknowledged the compliment, three hearty cheers were given, and the ceremony was over."

There followed a Monster Picnic at the Murray, given by the contractors in celebration of the opening. Nearly a hundred invitations were issued to friends and supporters from Melbourne and Sandhurst, and recognising the work crews Echuca to meet the demand for the stations ... The who played a major role in the formation of the line, a large number of the navvies were "feted," too. The completion of the rail line made Victoria's northern plains more accessible, and next time we'll see what was next required to bring settlers to our part of the State.



#### **EULOGY EDWARD JAMES (TED) WRIGHT**

Edward James (Ted) WRIGHT was born at 10am on the Ted also enjoyed going fox hunting with the Jack 14th of March, 1929 to Eddie & Jean WRIGHT at Torrington, a small maternity hospital in the centre of Rochester. He weighed 8 pounds - a big healthy boy. His proud parents and big sister Gwen would later welcome Melva, Avis, Don & Robert home to the farm at Diggora brothers come along!

Ted attended Diggora West State School - riding his bike with his siblings each day from the farm. There were only a handful of children from the district: 4 WRIGHTS, 3 HONEYS, Merv MURNANE & little Billy GRAHAM.

Ted & his school friends enjoyed heating homemade pies over the open fire in the school, with a little help from the teacher. A little smokey in flavour, but a delicious treat with home made sauce. Every Friday Ted & the other boys had the job of emptying the toilets. While they were out busily digging holes, the girls threaded string through torn up pieces of newspaper for convenience. Ted said he Ted would grin from ear-to-ear with pride. Then would didn't mind toilet duties - it meant missing a bit of come the lessons in the delicate art of skinning a pelt. Ted classroom time.

One day Ted & Merv MURNANE wagged school to go rabbiting. It was a well-planned mission. Tall crops provided plenty of cover for the boys and one of the farm dogs. Things went somewhat awry when the dog helped himself to their lunches. Hungry bellies are no good for a day of rabbiting so the long row of wheats bags in the paddock seemed appealing. After helping themselves Ted & Merv set off again with the trusty canine in tow. Now, rabbiting on a hot day made the lads thirsty, so the next dam they came across they lay down on their bellies & had a good long drink.

When the end of the school day arrived, Ted re-joined his siblings for the ride home to ensure his parents were none the wiser. Ted ate his dinner that night & all seemed well until the belly full of swollen wheat took its toll. Melva & Avis heard an awful wailing noise coming from the from the bedroom & ran in to find Ted leaning against the wall expelling his lunch. There would be no lectures or punishment from his parents - that lesson had well & truly been learned.

Early memories of life at Diggora West were of a big, happily family. There were no fights, no mod-cons and at times, the basics were scarce - particularly during the war vears. There was no shortage of love and the children never went without. Ted recalled seeing the search lights in the distance during the war, and the headlights of the family's Dodge had to be blackened out for concealment.

Ted left school after Grade 8 at the age of 12 to work on the farm. He enjoyed rabbiting & yabbying. There wasn't a lot of formally organised sport - particularly through the war years, but picnic race days were a chance for families to have an outing. There wasn't a lot in the way of proper sports clothes either, but everyone had a lot of fun. Ted & the other boys would compete in the running events with their long pants rolled up, and bare feet. He enjoyed playing tennis & of course going to the dances at Lockington & Hunter.

Ted was among a group of young men from around the district to help build the Lockington Hotel. Whilst Ted, like many of the other lads, had no formal building skills they came together as communities did in those days to get the job done. Working bees were how churches and halls were built. Ted was thrilled to hear recently that a group of locals once again had banded together to save the Locky Pub from financial difficulties.

McDONALD & the HONEYS. Over the years Ted's inlaws, nieces & nephews would also come along on the hunting adventures. Freezing nights in the back of the ute, or Saturday afternoons in winter. The highlight for Ted was undoubtedly the company, and the gathering in the West. Ted was somewhat relieved to have two little kitchen at the farm afterwards. Jean would make sure everyone had a warm drink to thaw out by the fire. Hot pies - "Nelly Blies" or "Nellies" as Ted would call them were still by far his favourite treat. He said the best ones were from Favaloro's Bakery. Ted would stock up at Favs whenever there was a trip to Bendigo.

> Another favourite treat was a cup of black tea and Gingernut biscuits. Eddy & Jean always had a large tin in the kitchen - "Bingernuts" Ted would call them when he was little. There a many in the family who still enjoy Uncle Teddv's staple.

> When the nieces & nephews honed their hunting skills, was also a patient driving instructor. The old Holden Ute, a cushion to prop up the learner driver and the wide open spaces of the Diggora paddocks were the perfect setting.

> His enjoyment of hunting aside, Ted loved animals & would never tolerate cruelty. Cats were a constant fixture at the farm. The famous "Honeybunch" - a stray British Blue kitten Eddy brought home from a church meeting at Milloo - was followed by generations of cats. Most of them didn't have names, but to Ted they were "Darlin Old Puss". Ted also loved the farm dogs. There were the hunters (the greyhounds & staghounds) & the working sheepdogs. Ripper, Jock, Rover - Ted loved them all. Ted even had a soft spot for local wild life. He would keep up a supply of carrots and Malt-O-Milk biscuits to the possums who had taken up residence in the un-used chimneys and the smithy.

Ted remained at the farm with Robert and Donny as their sisters moved away gradually for work and to start families. Teams of Clydesdale horses were replaced by tractors & machinery. Robert's unexpected passing in 1968 was a time of terrible sadness for the family. Eddy passed away in 1977 & Donny only 6 weeks after, leaving beside Ayres Rock. Ted loved to talk about his travels & Ted to run the farm. Nana (Jean) and Ted at the farm that's how it would be for many years to come. The friendship and support of Neil, Peter and the extended WRIGHT family; the HONEYs, FIEDLERs, Colin HOLLAND and many others meant so much to Nana and Ted.

Gwen, Melva & Avis were always unwavering in their support and their families have many cherished memories of weekends at the farm. It was a wonderful place for the family to gather and always felt like home. Nana and Ted made sure of that. Horses, bikes, animals, hunting and driving the ute - a magical place for a child. In the days when the train still ran on the Diggora line, the driver would make a special stop at the front gate where Ted would meet the excited passengers. One of Nana's magnificent roasts in the wood fired oven would often await. The train was eventually replaced by a bus & Ted would wait for his passengers up on the Locky Road corner in the Kingswood. Trips to Locky for fish and chips were also a favourite treat.

Family visits would always end the same way - a gathering of WRIGHTs at the front of the house. Ted would be in the background smiling - his arm raised & finger pointed upwards. "Safe Home" he would say. If the family drove slowly enough out the gates, Ted would make his way over to the gap in the pepper trees. "Safe Home" was the call again through the car windows.

Ted was active in the Lockington community. He rarely missed a Sunday service at St.Mary's Church and would participate in working bees. He was proud to be a lifemember of the Lions Club which opened the door to many wonderful experiences & friendships. Ted was also a member of the Lockington Bowls Club & particularly enjoyed "lemon time" referring to afternoon tea. This was a term used by football commentator Dick Turner to describe the 3 quarter time break. Ted was no football fanatic, but followed Melbourne as local lad Hugh MURNANE had played for them. Ted didn't mind watching them "put the slipper into it" as he would say.

Ted always had an interest in aircraft & travelling. His knowledge of world history and geography fuelled his interest & he enjoyed a number of overseas trips. In 1978 an visited Russia, Ted considered adventurous

destination for Australians as it was still under the rule of the Soviet Union at that time. It was a world away from Diggora West. Ted inadvertently left the country with a quantity of Rubles in his luggage. He often mused that the consequences could have been dire had this been detected!

Ted also travelled to Japan, and in later years enjoyed a trips to America. It was here that he formed wonderful, lasting friendships with some of his hosts which he cherished. They would remain in contact until the very last. A trip to Central Australia was also a highlight & Ted was thrilled when he took a flight which landed right had many amazing stories to tell. Ted enjoyed Country & Western music. He could sometimes be found stretched out on the rug on the lounge room floor by the record player. Tammy Wynette and Johnny Cash were favourites, but Ted also loved listening to yodelling!

Ted had incredible local knowledge & a memory to match. He could tell you about a particular piece of land, how many points it rained when it was sown, and how many "bags it went" (or how much it yielded) in any given year. Gwen, Melva & Avis were always amazed at Ted's memory about local families & their respective history.

Ted was a gentleman & a gentle man. He had unwavering morals, he was honest and asked for nothing. He rarely had a bad word to say about anyone, and it was rare that anyone can recall him raising his voice. He rarely swore. If a person or an animal was frail, injured or otherwise downtrodden Ted would say "poor boog." Ted was also extremely generous. He never asked, nor expected, much in return for a good deed. He also had a good sense of humour & would start to giggle uncontrollably when telling a funny story. The giggles would turn into belly laughs & often the story could not be finished. It was impossible not to laugh along with him.

In 2011 Ted moved into a unit in Lockington. The Locky community spirit still at the fore, he was embraced by his neighbours and the church. There was no shortage of companionship & hot meals to share.

In 2016 Ted moved to Golden Oaks Aged Care in Golden Square. He instantly endeared himself to the other residents & staff with his gentle ways. His incredible memories intact, everyone loved hearing Ted's stories of early days at Diggora West & of his travels. The family are very grateful for the wonderful care Ted received during his time at Golden Oaks. The love for him was evident when he passed away last Sunday. "A wonderful man with a wonderful heart" one of the nursing staff said unprompted. "Ted, we all just loved Ted" said another through tears.

Ted was dearly loved by his family and will be so sadly missed by everyone who knew him. At 91 years of age he has earned his rest. "SAFE HOME TEDDY."

A reminder to stay home, and stay safe. Even once some COVID19 restrictions are lifted, we won't be straight back to "normal" We will need to continue with a lot of the distancing rules for some time yet. This is not a bad thing, it will even reduce the number of regular coronavirus cases within our community. Please continue to keep yourselves and others safe, by your actions.

## AGRICULTURE VICTORIA

#### Monitor your farm business performance

Agriculture Victoria is offering sheep and beef producers the opportunity to participate in the Victorian Livestock Farm Monitor Project (LFMP). The LFMP has been collecting detailed physical and financial farm information from producers for fifty years and providing them with a thorough and independent report of their farm's performance. Participants have said they use the report's data for such things as obtaining or extending loans or to make short, medium and long-term business decisions. Farm Business Economist Sam Henty said for a farm business to achieve its goals it must first establish whether it can pay the bills, understand how efficiently it uses its resources and determine whether the owner is increasing their net worth. "The Livestock Farm Monitor Project provides producers and decision makers with this information," Mr Henty said. "It's a good opportunity to step back and look at your figures and input costs and review these elements." Participating producers will receive an annual individualised report with graphs and data from the reporting year. "A participating farm or sam.henty@agriculture.vic.gov.au

business can use the results from this report to compare its performance over time and help identify the critical variables to inform and provide confidence for on-farm decision making." Data collection occurs in July and August each year, to coincide with the availability of data from the previous financial year. Data collected includes farm income and costs for the financial year, trading and breeding details, feed input and production, fertiliser and labour inputs and a complete stock, feed, land and farm machinery inventory, including all farm assets and liabilities. Limited places are available for individual farms and farm discussion groups across Victoria to participate in the 2019-20 LFMP. There is no cost for participants, and all information is treated as strictly confidential. Previous reports are available on the Agriculture Victoria website

#### One-year game hunting licence extension for 2021

Victoria's 50.000-plus recreational game hunters will be Government set to extend all current game licences by one year.

In recognition of the unprecedented impact on Victoria's game hunters caused by mandatory social distancing measures, the expiry date of all current game licences administered by the Game Management Authority will be extended by 12 months, allowing hunters to get full value of their one- or three-year licence fee.

Health directives and restrictions as a result of the coronavirus pandemic have already impacted game hunting seasons for hog and sambar deer, stubble quail and gamebirds.

In response to public health advice, the GMA has also postponed all waterfowl identification tests and hound hunting tests until further notice. Anyone who has already

booked a test will have their booking fee refunded.

Victoria's Chief Health Officer has advised that to help slow compensated for lost hunting opportunities with the Victorian the spread of coronavirus, people must not leave their property to go hunting.

> Current State of Emergency measures to slow the spread of coronavirus remain in place until 11 May.

Duck hunting season opens on 2 May.

From that time, duck hunting other than on a property that you live on will not be able to be conducted until relevant

restrictions are lifted.



#### On-farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate

The On-Farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme is now available for the purchase and installation of emergency water infrastructure for livestock.

The scheme is available to eligible farm businesses in a number of local government areas, including Campaspe, Gannawarra, Greater Bendigo, Greater Shepparton, Loddon, Strathbogie, Swan Hill, Mildura and Buloke.

Farm businesses outside of the above local government

areas can make an application if they can demonstrate a critical water need for livestock resulting from current seasonal conditions.

These applications will be assessed on a case-bycase basis.

The scheme is available for water infrastructure purchased since 1 July 2018 – guidelines and application details can be obtained from Rural Finance, call 1800 260 425 or visit <u>ruralfinance.com.au</u>.


