Hello again, Everyone,

If there was to be a year which would encourage new settlers to begin farming the plains country west of the Campaspe, the early part of 1870 seemed promising. It had been expected that the completion in 1864 of the railway trunk line between Melbourne and Echuca, on the Murray River, would provide more ready access to the Northern plains, and would lead quickly to an influx of selector farmers taking up land It didn't. Those who did come into the region, there selected allotments not too far from existing settlements like Goornong or Runnymede. Or they settled on well-watered areas like those near Lake Cooper. They might well have been deterred by the long and harsh drought of 1865-66, and the floods that occurred in 1867, might have worried them. While the following two years had not been so extreme, they had been sufficiently hot and dry at times that the fear of a return to drought had lingered.

However, in early 1870, the weather seemed ideal. The rain that fell then was just enough to keep the waterholes filled and maintain adequate grass for stock. Saint Patrick's Day, when the Corop Races were held was described as "exceedingly fine" by the Bendigo Advertiser, of 21 March It reported that there were "500 persons on the course", most having come from Sandhurst and Echuca. "There was not a single accident, and although there was only one policemen present, the utmost order prevailed throughout the day." In mid-April, the Riverine Herald reported that "Fine rains have fallen generally throughout the country, and a splendid spring of grass is taking place;" and that "Such a season has not been experienced for many years past." Though, in May, heavy rains which led to some continued to go well on the Victorian side of the Murray, at least until September. Then it rained.

In its "Summary for Europe" on 10 September, 1870, Melbourne's Argus newspaper stated: - "Not for more than 20 years has such a wet and inclement season as the present been experienced. An enormous quantity of rain had fallen up to about a fortnight ago, when the weather sickly, began to exhibit a very considerable improvement. At the commencement of the present week, however, rain, heavy and continuous, again set in. Nearly three inches [75 mms] fell in two days, and as the creeks and rivers were already running bank high, the result has been most yet begin to appeal to potential settlers. extensive and severe floods. Nearly all the low-lying lands in the colony are under water, an immense amount of damage has been done, and over a great extent, the crops have been entirely destroyed. The weather is still very unsettled, and if

we have more heavy rain the consequences will be most disastrous."

The rain continued to fall and, at Runnymede, Rochester, Echuca and Moama, the consequences were as serious as had been anticipated. From Runnymede came the report that the Campaspe was higher there than it was ever known before; "It was miles wide in places." Added to that came the news that "a terrible and destructive flood" was rolling down the Goulburn and, from accounts that had been received by 10 September, the Bendigo Advertiser saw "the border town of Echuca" as being "placed in more imminent danger than it has ever stood in within the memory of white men." On 11 September, 1870, the Murray was described as being "three or four inches higher than it was in the great flood of 1867", and it was still rising. North of the Murray, the Moira Lake had overflowed its southern bank and a vast stream of water was pouring through the box forest, completely flooding the town of Moama. On 16 September, the Advertiser reported a huge loss of sheep, the greater portion of them belonging to "Mr Chapple of Restdown." Fortunately, by 19 September, it was able to report that the level of the Murray was stationary, having reached a height of 34 feet, being 8 inches above its summer level. "The worst seems to have passed."

But the flooding wasn't over yet. On Saturday, 29 October, the Advertiser's Goornong correspondent stated that "The old tale has again to be re-told - houses are inundated, the water running in and through the rooms knee-deep. In some instances, homes are abandoned for the present, and refuge taken on higher ground. So completely are some families surrounded that their homes look like cottages in, not by, the sea. It commenced to rain early yesterday evening, and flooding, were experienced in New South Wales, all during the night it came down in torrents. The lightning was the most vivid, widespread, and continuous we ever remember having seen." Whilst, at Echuca, the flood was "ten inches higher than the September flood, and it continues to rise. .. The water from the Murray is running across the road to the Campaspe. The postboy from Wharparilla, while coming in to Echuca last night on horseback, was carried away, and both he and his horse were drowned.

Echuca Civic Centre

Rural Tree Scheme

Rural landowners can now purchase native seedlings for a subsided cost through Council's annual Rural Tree Scheme. The scheme is a great way for rural landowners to improve their property's landscape. Orders will be taken up to 1 November, or when the allocated funds have been exhausted. Order forms, including a full list of available species, are available on Council's website, at customer service centres, or can be mailed out on request.

Seniors Program Grants

Applications are now being accepted to support older residents through this year's Seniors Program Grants. The program provides funds of up to \$1,000 to deliver programs or activities to older citizens. Projects must effectively address social isolation for seniors while adhering to social distancing requirements issued by the State and Federal Governments. Applications are now open, and will close on Friday, 7 August with announcements of successful applicants expected to be made by Friday, 4 September.

Pool and spa registrations extended

The Victorian Government has extended the deadline for the mandatory registration of private pools and spas due to the impacts of coronavirus. All private pools and spas must now be registered with Council by 1 November 2020. Registrations can be made online through Council's website, or by calling 1300 666 535. Failure to register can result in a fine. More information is available on Council's website.

WALSH DEMANDS JACINTA SHOW US THE MONEY TO IMPROVE VICTORIA'S SLOWEST TRAIN JOURNEY

Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh is looking for the millions, even hundreds of millions, of dollars that have been spent on upgrading the Echuca-Bendigo train line.

But he said he can't find them anywhere.

In April 2017 the Andrews Labor Government announced a \$91 million spend on the Echuca-Bendigo line so it could go at 130km/h instead of the current 80km/h.

"And the trains still run slow because the track is not safe enough," Mr Walsh observed.

In May 2017 a \$3 billion deal was announced between Canberra and the Andrews Labor Government for regional rail improvements - including the Echuca-Bendigo line.

Victorian Transport Minister Jacinta Allan said at the time "it's the next step of our regional rail revival, investing in the public transport that regional Victorians deserve and can rely on".

"And the trains still run slow because the track is not safe enough," Mr Walsh observed.

In July 2018 we heard from the Andrews Labor Government of the commitment that regional passenger rail services on the Bendigo/Echuca line were set to become quicker and more reliable.

The Andrews Labor Government claimed the project was also expected to increase frequency and capacity of rail services ... allowing trains to travel quicker, reducing travel times and getting local passengers where they need to go sooner.

Construction works were set to begin in late 2018.

"And the trains still run slow because the track is not safe enough," Mr Walsh observed.

In October 2019 the Andrews Labor Government announced two consortia had been shortlisted to deliver signalling works as part of the Bendigo and Echuca Line upgrade.

VicConnect comprises UGL Limited, Decmil and Arup, and the other consortium comprises CPB Contractors, John Holland, WSP and SMEC. Jacinta Allan said "we're getting on and delivering the infrastructure needed to run more trains more often".

"And the trains still run slow because the track is not safe enough," Mr Walsh observed.

On July 6, two weeks ago, it was like Groundhog Day, because yes, Jacinta was bag, with another bag of cash, releasing a public statement saying the Echuca-Bendigo line is set to benefit from "faster and more frequent train services as part of a \$300 million regional rail funding boost".

"This extra funding will get shovels in the ground faster delivering more trains, more often," Ms Allan said.

"And the trains still run slow because the track is not safe enough," Mr Walsh observed.

"The Andrews Labor Government in general, and Transport Minister Jacinta Allan in particular, have had untold millions to splash around on the Echuca-Bendigo line – and nothing has happened," he added.

"We have been shovel ready, we have had tenders called, we have had bazillions of dollars guaranteed for more trains and faster trains.

"However, as of today, we still only have one train a day to Melbourne (and two on Saturday and Sundays) and those trains still run slow because the track is not safe enough.

"Minister Allan, where has all the money gone and if you still have some tucked away in your bottom drawer, could we borrow it for a while, and we will get the job done."
