Hello again Everyone,

Looking back through the history of our region, it seems that selector farmers were unexpectedly hesitant to take up allotments on the plains west of the Campaspe, despite claims that the country could be ideal for cropping and farming generally. The area had been made more accessible by the construction of the Melbourne to Murray railway line in the early 1860s, but the serious droughts and episodes of flooding that had occurred in the meantime, may have caused prospective settlers to think twice about such a venture. However, by 1870, prospects of doing well on the goldfields would have faded, and a decrease in the amount of land to be taken up for farming near the settled parts of Victoria, meant that the northern plains might appear more attractive.

The heavy rains and consequent floods of late 1870 no doubt effected the harvest in the following summer. January 1871, saw rust having "made sad havoc with the grain," with the *Bendigo Advertiser's* Goornong correspondent stating, "Not one farmer who has threshed, but has been grievously disappointed." However, he went on to suggest that the "European war will raise the price of grain very materially" so that even a small yield could be worthwhile. "At Corop and Lake Cooper there was scarcely any crops saved," but in noting that, the comment made in the *Advertiser* of 10 February, 1871, was that "the vast area that has been under crop in some way makes the returns a fair average". From the *Riverine Herald* came the report that the weather at Echuca had been "alternately fine and wet... The grass is very high on the plains, and feed is abundant."

The cycle of droughts and floods had brought the realisation that projects for water conservation and irrigation needed to be given serious consideration. On 18 May, 1871, a deputation waited upon the hon. Minister of Lands, to lay before him the particulars of a scheme called the Grand Victorian North-Western Canal Company. "According to the statements of the deputation, the proposed canal, with its branches, would run through the districts of Rodney, Bendigo, Gladstone, Kara-Kara, Borung and Karkarook, and its entire length would be about 500 miles. The projected line of the main canal was stated to be from a commencing point on the Goulburn River between Murchison and Tabilk, thence in an easterly direction passing the township of Waranga to the south of Lake Cooper; it would afterwards intersect the Campaspe River between Rochester and Elmore, passing the Victorian Railway line fifteen miles from Echuca, and thence it would run by way of the head of the Mount Hope Creek, the south side of the Terrick ranges, the Loddon River near the Durham Ox, the Avoca River near the Jerule, through Lake Buloke, and westerly through the Wimmera district to Lake Hindmarsh, which lake it would

connect with Lake Albacutya. The branches, which would be of equal size to the canal, would connect other districts adjoining the main canal, the whole length as stated being 500 miles. The canal was projected to a fall of nine inches per mile, to be sixty feet wide and ten feet deep, and to have sides equal to two to one in the dip." According to the *Argus*, "The estimated expenditure of the company would be £3,000,000, and it was stated that the whole of the money had been promised in this market. After hearing what the deputation had to say, Mr. Macpherson promised to lay the particulars detailed to him before the Cabinet."

It was a great plan and drew comment from all quarters. On 20 May, the *Bendigo Advertiser* had this to say: - "Our contemporary the *Daily Telegraph* [the Sydney newspaper] has taken the people of Victoria to task for not going forth into the wilderness, and "swarming" in industrious, and improving, and prosperous communities... In allusion to this subject, we would direct attention to the magnificent district of Corop and adjacent agricultural areas. In that part of the country there has been some very promising "swarming." But the farmers, on the whole, notwithstanding that they are industrious, and their works improving, are not prosperous. They want water in times of drought, and drainage in seasons of floods. A canal through their district would at once place them in such a position that it would be a thousand to one if any of them would change places." However, it would be decades before anything resembling Grand Canal project could become a reality.

In the meantime, Corop and Goornong and Rochester continued to thrive and, in August, "upward of 12,000 acres were applied for by selectors at the sitting of the Local Land Board at Echuca. By 28 September, the *Bendigo Advertiser* could report that "Land Selection in the Echuca district has of late been making wonderful progress. Upwards of 80,000 acres have been selected since February 1870, or equal to 4,000 acres per month."

On 13 November, 1871, the Surveyor General published a report on the quantity of land available for selection throughout the colony. It included: - "To the north of the county of Bendigo lies that of Gunbower, which "extends along the Murray, 70 miles downstream from Echuca." This county consists chiefly of dry plains and river flats, which are subject to inundations, but some eligible sites for farms may be found in it. The great drawbacks to agriculture there would be the distance from market. ...[and] the selectors might suffer much inconvenience from want of a sufficiency of water."

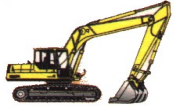

Community Grants

Round two of the Community Grants Program is now open with \$75,000 available to support community groups, clubs and associations with a broad range of projects. A maximum of \$4,000 can be applied for to support the delivery of programs, projects and activities that encourage local residents to become more involved in their community.

Business Assistance Grants

Round one of the Business Assistance Grants are now open with \$25,000 available to support businesses in four categories:

- Start up/new – Maximum \$3,000
- Small business – maximum \$5000
- Medium business – maximum \$10,000
- Large business – maximum \$15,000

Ongoing Grant Programs

The following funding programs are open across the year:
Responsive grants – maximum \$1,000, supporting community groups with urgent needs
Donations – maximum \$500, supporting community groups outside other funding programs
Junior development grants – funding to support individuals aged under 18 selected for state and international representation
Community event sponsorship – maximum \$5,000 cash and in kind support, to support groups and organisations in coordinating local and regional events
Business and commercial events sponsorship – supporting events which charge an admission fee
Criteria applies for each funding program with full details available on Council's website including an online application form.

Rural Tree Scheme

Rural landowners can now purchase native seedlings for a subsidised cost through Council's annual Rural Tree Scheme. The scheme is a great way for rural landowners to improve their property's landscape. Orders will be taken up to 1 November, or when the allocated funds have been exhausted. Pool and spa registrations extended

The Victorian Government has extended the deadline for the mandatory registration of private pools and spas due to the impacts of coronavirus. All private pools and spas must now be registered with Council by 1 November 2020. Registrations can be made online through Council's website, or by calling 1300 666 535. Failure to register can result in a fine. More information is available on Council's website.

The Victorian Government has instructed that people wear a mask as from Monday 3rd August 2020.

! Wearing a face mask protects you and your community by providing an additional physical barrier to coronavirus (COVID-19).



Wash your hands before putting on the mask.



Make sure it covers your nose and mouth and fits snugly under your chin, over the bridge of your nose and against the sides of your face.



Do not touch the front of the mask while wearing it.

If you do touch the mask, wash or sanitise your hands immediately.
Do not allow the mask to hang around your neck.



To remove the mask wash or sanitise your hands first.

Carefully remove your mask by grasping the ear loops or untying the ties. For masks with a pair of ties, unfasten the bottom one first, then the top one.

If your mask has filters, remove them and throw them away.
Fold the mask and put it directly into the laundry or into a disposable or washable bag for laundering. Single use surgical masks should be disposed of responsibly.

- Keep 1.5 metres from others
- Get tested, even if you have mild symptoms
