Hello again Everyone,

In this issue of the *Locky News*, I'm returning to the Kyneton *Guardian* article, written in August, 1873, about the "landhunger" or "land-fever" that had gripped the colony of Victoria, particularly districts in our part of the country. It was stated that since the beginning of 1873, and up until August, there had been 496 applications to select land, lodged at the Echuca Land Office, with yet more applications being made at other land offices. Applicants sought the allocation of property to the extent of 170,000 to 180,000 acres within the Echuca district, and almost all were being recommended for approval. Selection sizes varied from 6 acres to 320 acres, but it was said that the average block was of 250 acres. Initially, the squatter pastoralists had opposed selection but having been allowed to secure 640 acres around their homesteads, they had "given up the contest."

I found the Guardian article interesting because it focuses on our district but, more particularly, because it told something of the people who were involved, our forerunners in this district. In stating where the applicants for land had come from, the writer of the article said that few localities in the colony of Victoria were unrepresented, and he went on to name some places; Melbourne, Richmond, Inverleigh, Baringhup, Geelong, Williamstown, Learmonth, Brown's Camperdown, Hill, Ballarat, Castlemaine, Sutherland's Creek and Kyneton. As the writer was from Kyneton, it isn't to be wondered that he found it remarkable that so many applicants actually came from there.

He writes: - "The lists of applicants are crowded with Kyneton names. The Yeaman's of Carlsruhe (nine) have selected 2,880 acres in Pannoomilloo and Wanurp. The Ryans of Barfold (four) have selected 1,050 acres in Wyuna. The Watsons of Greenhills (five) have gone for 1,600 acres of Pannoobamawm. selected in the same parish, and in Terrick Terrick, Cochrane of Barfold, and Orr of Woodend, are also ambitious of holding a portion of the Terricks. The Archibalds of Barfold have selected 880 acres in Bamawm — still keeping among the Bars. Castles, Harrison, Breen and Sam Smith, of Bavnton. select in Koyuga, Samuel Windridge in Pannoobamawm; Moses Watson, of Kyneton, in the same parish ; Anthony Watson, of Highbank, selects in Timmering; Hughes, of Malmsbury, (3), Milloo and Pannoomilloo; Pethybridge and Saunders, of Malmsbury, and Lucardie, from Drummond, in Timmering; Bingham, of Drummond, in Mooroopna ; David Rannard, in Pannoomilloo; Wm Hodge and Geo. Piggins, in Wanurp; Brereton in Wanurp. A whole colony of Hipwells, Sims, Cant, Rigby, Wright, M'Lean, from Spring Hill, go to Wanurp and Pannoobamawm. From

Tylden, Chanters (2) and Heeps (2), have taken land in Pannoomilloo. James Mills and James Stowe represent Piper's Creek amongst the selectors. The Pavnters selections are at Wharparilla. George Watson, of Spring Hill, has selected in Koyuga; Edward Steed, of Green Hill, in Timmering. Geo. Campbell of Carlsruhe, Runnymede, Tweddles of Gisborne in Koyuga. Of other Kyneton names are to be found Robert Wilson, John Kurtzweil, Pat Halloran, William Murrell, James Smith, Chas. Wall, Pell (2), Jonathan Hamilton, John M'Pherson, Mary Ann Vickers, John M'Auliff (Redesdale), Charles Southby, Robert Marshall, George Jones (Redesdale), John M'Kenzie (Monument Creek), James Gilligan (Newham), William Murray, (Rosebank), William James senior and junior, Reddropp, Pickering, Fitzsimmons (4) of Woodend, Burns, (3) of Woodend, Squire of Carlsruhe, Forge of Kyneton, and several others. Added to those who have already settled along the valley of the lower Campaspe in Nanneella and Timmering on the east and Turrumbarry on the west, Kyneton will be largely represented in the newly settled country.'

While many of these people selected property on the other side of Rochester, a good many actually settled right here. Many of those surnames are still represented among us though, for some we might need to go back a generation or two to find these names among the mothers or grandmothers of the present generation. Yet others are represented among those at rest in the Pannoobamawm (Pine Grove) cemetery, or at Mitiamo, Rochester, Elmore or Echuca. There was a time when district roads were so badly affected by wet weather that the local cemetery was not an option. In thinking of roads, some of those early district names will remain with us in the local streets and roads that commemorate them. Some of those people listed didn't stay in this district. They may have gone further, to the Mallee or The Crawfords of Malmsbury have across the Murray into New South Wales, or they may have gone with the drift to the city. Perhaps they even returned to Kyneton. I find it interesting that so many were from there, were very definitely though there quite sizeable representations from the Ballarat and Geelong areas, to name just a couple.

There is a little more of this article to share with you, but I'll leave it for another time.





The club will soon be able to decide on various items relating to Presentation evening, plus anv Championship games to be completed. Also the




