Hello again Everyone,

We've been following the development of our district from the time our selector forebears arrived here in the early 1870s. Initially, the seasons were kind; crops were successful, and enthusiasm ran high. Rumour even had it that the seasons were becoming more mellow as selector settlement took hold. The harvest of 1875-76 had been a satisfactory one and travelling reporters visiting the region on behalf of such publications as the Weekly Times and the Australasian, commented very favourably on developments taking place. The Australasian of 15 January 1876, carried a highly commendatory article about a visit to the Pannoomilloo property of Mr Archibald Yeaman. "Several of Mr. Yeaman's relations have settled near to him, and they are thus often enabled to render each other assistance in busy times that is mutually advantageous. Among them, they hold four 320-acre blocks, and 230 acres have been under cultivation this season." Writing to the Geelong Advertiser on 3 March, 1876, a correspondent, also farming at Pannoomilloo near Rochester, - "The crops about here were harvested and threshed long ago, and, as a rule, the yield was very good. ... Ploughing is now general, but the ground is very hard, and a little rain would be much appreciated, even if only sufficient to half-fill our dams." As the year progressed, water supplies dwindled further but still, any fear of drought was short-lived, and the settlers turned their minds to other things.

Across the Terricks plains, few roads had been made, and the grid pattern formed by the recently surveyed properties resulted in fence lines crossing, and blocking access to, the beaten tracks that had been used by the pastoralists and their workers. Travel in any form could be difficult, and the transport of farm produce to market was seriously impeded by the poor condition of such roads as were available. There was ongoing agitation for the formation of a new shire, with Rochester to be its administrative centre. On 6 April 1876, the Riverine Herald reported that a deputation of representatives from the Terricks had waited on the Commissioner for Railways and Roads to urge the formation of a new shire comprising portions of the existing shires of Echuca and Waranga. In support of their request, it was stated that the Echuca Shire had been neglectful of its duties in respect to the Terricks region. In the Echuca Shire's defence, its secretary, Mr Shackell claimed there had been no such neglect and that, in the previous twelve months, almost half the shire's revenue had been spent in the territory concerned. The newspaper report of the deputation went on to state that, in light of the allegations and contradictions that were being made, the Commissioner, Mr Jones was unable "to see his way in the case" and could not comply with the request.

So, the campaign to divide the shire had been halted, at least temporarily, but a transport problem remained to be solved. Farm allotments within easy distance of the rivers and/or the main Melbourne to Murray railway line, had been taken up by the selectors who were earliest to arrive on the northern plains.

Thus, in order to access markets, those farmers who arrived later, and had taken up selections in such places as Pannoomilloo, Wanurp or Terrick Terrick, had first to cart their produce by wagon to the nearest railway station. Depending on the condition of the roads, or tracks, this could be a lengthy process and the settlers sought some alternative. On 9 March 1876, the Bendigo Advertiser published an item, written by the Mitiamo correspondent, indicating that agitation had begun for the construction of another rail link; this to be between Sandhurst (Bendigo) and Swan Hill. Local residents felt that the least expensive and most advantageous option would be the provision of a branch line from Runnymede, following the route of an existing 3-chain road from there to Swan Hill. "The road is level, direct, and without any engineering difficulties. It intersects the whole of the Terrick district, passes close to the Pyramid and Mount Hope, and through Kerang. This road would traverse an immense area of good agricultural country, which is either taken up or being taken up and is not secured to any extent by squatters." It would provide better and closer access to the transport and the marketing facilities that the settlers needed.

Meetings, like one at Mitiamo on 28 April, which was reported in the Bendigo Advertiser on 4 May 1876, were held throughout the region. Committees were formed, and groups calling themselves Railway Leagues were established in many of the districts involved. Unfortunately, there were strongly-held differences of opinion about the route to be taken by the proposed railway line, so that for much of the time, these groups worked "at cross purposes". Most agreed that the line should proceed via the Terricks and Kerang and on to Swan Hill. However, some felt that a line commencing at Eaglehawk and proceeding via Raywood and Mitiamo before reaching Kerang, would serve more people and provide a better option than would a branch line from Runnymede (Elmore). And so began a series of contesting meetings, committees, and deputations that continued throughout the year.

In the meantime, the season was not turning out as well as had been hoped. On 10 July 1876, the *Bendigo Advertiser* reported that crops in the Echuca district were considered "backward. Rain did not set in until late in the season." Lack of moisture had caused considerable anxiety, as the ground had been too hard to plough, and the seed had been put in later than usual. However, in September that year a correspondent from the Terricks was able to write to the *Bendigo Advertiser* that the area had enjoyed "a copious downfall of rain" and that, with "a few showers at intervals up to harvest time... a fair, average yield may be expected." Fortunately, such rain arrived, as reported in the *Riverine Herald* on 14 November, and was "the salvation of the settlers in this locality."







Parliamentary inquiry to help us all breathe a little easier says Walsh

An inquiry has been launched into the health impacts of air pollution on Victorians according to the Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh.

He said exposure to common air pollutants can exacerbate respiratory and cardiovascular conditions, lead to premature death and cost the Victorian economy hundreds of millions of dollars per year.

Identify statewide practical, real-time. cost-effective mitigation strategies

Determine how they ensure Victorian air quality tracks to meeting or exceeding current international best practice standards and is enforced

Determine the impact of economic and population growth on air pollution and health outcomes

Strengthen commitments across all Victorian Government portfolios to reduce air pollution and minimise the impact on the health of the Victorian population and environment.

Submissions are due by Friday, April 2, with public hearings to be held in May and June.

Walsh launches urgent campaign to stop Wyuna road closure

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, is calling for people to join him in a campaign to stop the closure of a road vital to local farmers - and people trying to cut travel time between major hubs in the region between Shepparton and Echuca.

Mr Walsh said Regional Roads Victoria and Campaspe Shire appear to have a done a deal between themselves to, as they say, "improve safety for all road users".

He said the problem with that is they forgot to talk to anyone else about it until the deal was done.

"And even then, the letter RRV letterboxed to everyone in the area was wrong, announcing the road would be closed where it joins the Murray Valley Hwy near Wyuna," Mr Walsh said.

"When in fact the closure will be at the intersection of Trevaskis and Hawdon roads." he said.

"Trevaskis Rd is not just essential to the constant movement of farm produce and heavy machinery, it has developed into a major thoroughfare for people heading from one regional hub to the next.

"Farmers who use it multiple times a day will be going several kilometres thousands of dollars, and others have told me they fear it will have a negative impact on property values."

The Trevaskis/Hawdon intersection is a dangerous one, and desperately needed some changes to traffic flow and speed limits - but simply rolling in the COVID experts to stop restricting community organisations from and closing it does not do anything for all the people who use it, Mr Walsh added.

He said with work set to begin on March 8 the clock was ticking.

"I have already written to Roads and Road Safety Minister Ben Carroll, calling on him to intervene urgently and stop this before the proposed works start," Mr Walsh said.

"This is a move that has sparked outrage amongst locals and the lack of consultation has made them even angrier," he said.

"After meeting with some of them, and receiving calls and emails from others, I sent off the letter to Ben Carroll and then went to the site and met with some of the farmers who had contacted me.

"This is a Campaspe Shire road but I am told there has not been any consultation about the plans here and that itself is a formula for disaster.

"No-one knows local road conditions better than the locals – that's obvious and that's why consultation is so important in these decisions," he said.

"And those locals tell me is this road - and access to it - is important for more than just those living along it; they say it is also regularly used by people from a much wider footprint.

"There has been a total failure of process by RRV on this issue and on behalf of all the people who access Trevaskis Rd from the Murray Valley Highway I am calling on Minister Carroll to take some urgent steps to stop

19 February 2021 Andrews government determined to wreck regional sport says Walsh

Government coronavirus restrictions, has been pushed into the spotlight by the Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh.

He said The Nationals took their concern to the floor of the Victorian Parliament this week to get the government to reconsider its 1000 crowd cap at local sporting venues.

"The numerous leagues across my electorate are some of regional Victoria's premier competitions and as such regularly draw crowds in their thousands, not hundreds," Mr Walsh added.

"Apart from all the local heroes there are also ex-AFL players signed up and ready to play for respective clubs, it is simply wrong that crowd numbers are restricted to 1000 people," he said.

"Social distancing is not a problem because clubs have plenty of room to ensure a safe distance is kept by all."

Mr Walsh said the first game of the season was also a gilt-edged opportunity for local clubs to attract sponsors and to kick off fundraising for the year. And he confirmed this year fundraising will be especially critical - but it's

not going to happen if the Andrews government locks fans out.

"Many clubs had basically zero revenue for their 2020 season; but were still responsible for ongoing costs such as maintenance, keeping ovals and courts in tip top shape and other routine costs," Mr Walsh explained.

"And many of the major sponsors, the big social clubs, have had their revenue smashed by not one, but three, lockdowns and have told me they will be lucky to have 30 per cent of their usual funds available for sponsorship - there are going to be huge financial gaps and now Daniel Andrews seems content hammer the nails into the regional sport coffin," he said.

"And if a club has the temerity to ask for increased capacity; the Andrews government will send them an 18-page submission document to complete justifying the request for more fans."

Mr Walsh said clubs north of the border have a crowd limit of 3000.

He said just take Echuca-Moama for example. United can play home in Echuca before a maximum of 1000 while the same day, just 3km away, Moama can play before a maximum of 3000 at its ground.

"A lot of derbies the length of the river involve teams from twin towns. It would be a real shame to deny major local fixtures that support and revenue potential.

"Imagine the impact in a setting such as Albury-Wodonga.

"This really doesn't pass the pub test. This is political grandstanding to justify its sledgehammer approach to COVID control because the Andrews further than necessary each time - over a year that will cost them government has now had three goes at quarantine and contact tracing and failed every time - so its response is to make everyone pay the price for its incompetence," he said.

"I am calling on the Minister for Community Sport, Minister for Sport and making a buck and being financially viable.

"By all means; set the social distance parameters but don't put a cap on numbers when it is unnecessary. These games kick off at Easter and it's fair to say local markets and streets will be full of tourists, which do not have capped capacities.

"Give our communities the chance to survive while still honouring social distancing measures."
