Hello again Everyone,

We've been looking at the story of selector-farmer settlement in our district from the early 1870s. Up until the completion of the 1876-77 cropping season, the new settlers enjoyed considerable success. Though there was frequently some concern around about mid-year, when rains failed to meet expectations, there was usually enough shower activity in the spring and early summer to ensure at least an average return. Some individual farmers were making provision to conserve water on their properties, sinking wells or constructing dams, but the great majority were kept busy in other ways. They relied on rain to fill streams and water holes sufficiently to meet their needs. There was no effort on the part of the Government to provide a longer term solution to the water problem, though there were people who were giving the matter considerable thought.

One of these was Benjamin Dods, who in the mid-1870s, advanced an idea for establishing a 'Grand North-Western Canal'. This canal would convey water from the Goulburn River, which had a reliable catchment in the foothills of the Victorian Alps, across the dry plains of northern Victoria and thence to the Wimmera. A company to be known as the Grand Victorian North -Western Canal Company was formed to investigate and promote Mr Dods' proposal. Its secretary was Mr Hugh McColl, a native of Scotland, who had become interested in water conservation before he came to settle in Australia. In May 1876, Mr McColl took the opportunity to introduce the idea of this "gigantic scheme" to a gathering of local farmers who were meeting at Mitiamo to consider the advisability of agitating for a railway, through the Terricks to Kerang and Swan Hill. A report in the Bendigo Advertiser on 4 May 1876, says that "Many questions were asked, and consequent upon them some disorder arose. However, most present signed Mr. M'Coll's petition, and, while wishing him success, feared that the scheme was not practicable in the present state of the colony. Few, if any, shares were sold.'

The matter of the proposed new rail link was of much greater concern to the local residents at that time. Throughout 1876 and into 1877, meetings were held at such places as Mitiamo, Terrick Terrick, Pannoomilloo, Durham Ox and Kerang, with Railway Leagues being formed at these and other centres. The Deniliquin and Moama Railway was completed and officially opened on 4 July 1876, but the line through the Terricks, which could be of so much assistance to the settlers on the plains, was still a hopeful dream. One major obstacle blocking the progress of the campaign was likely to have been the fact that the various leagues were not presenting a united front. As explained in the Bendigo Advertiser on 24 July 1876, there were two contesting routes being proposed; "1st, From Runnymede, by the threechain road, to Mitiamo, by Mount Pyramid, Mount Hope, and Swan Hill; 2nd, From the junction of the line near Eaglehawk, through Raywood, to the Terricks and Mount Hope, and through Kerang to Swan Hill." On 4 August 1876, the Bendigo Advertiser

reported that "A large and influential deputation waited upon the hon. the Commissioner of Railways today for the purpose of asking for the survey and construction of a line from Sandhurst to Swan Hill.... Messrs. W. Douglass and R. Allen, of Pine Grove, attended, for the purpose of advocating a route via Runnymede, Mount Hope, and Pine Grove. They were informed that the route would be a matter for after-consideration.'

Trials of the recently introduced Reaper and Binding Machine, reported by the Kyneton Guardian on 21 February 1877, impressed those who witnessed them in the early part of 1877. Lack of available labour was a problem often encountered at harvest time by the northern plains' farmers, and it seemed that mechanisation might provide the solution. The harvest of 1876-77 was a satisfactory one, and the reporter for the Riverine Herald, writing on 27 January 1877, saw it as "a good sign" that some local farmers had already invested in the purchase of this wonderful new machinery, and that the nature of the crop was such as warranted the purchase.

Another sign of progress in the district was the acquisition of a flour mill at Pannoomilloo, the initiative of Mr D Rannard of Kyneton. On 17 March 1877, the Riverine Herald reported that the "first-class machinery" at the mill was "working in perfect order," and that its produce was "of the finest quality and equal to the best Melbourne flour." The district's post office and mail facilities were improving, too, with a money-order office opened at Wharparilla on 12 March, a post office at Terrick Terrick on 28 April, and another at Terrick East on 7 May, but it was not until August 1877, that a post office was opened at Pannoomilloo.

Agitation for the railway to Kerang and Swan Hill via the Terricks resurfaced in mid-1877, with a well-attended meeting being held at Boyle's Homebush Hotel, Mitiamo, on 7 June. This was followed by a conference held at Raywood, and involving representatives from the various municipalities concerned. The outcome was that a "numerous and influential deputation waited on the Commissioner of Railways" on 21 June, to urge that "the construction of a line of railway from Sandhurst to Swan Hill, passing through Eaglehawk, Raywood, the Terricks and Kerang," be included in the upcoming Railways Construction Bill. The submissions of the deputation were heard by the Commissioner, in the presence of a number of other members of Parliament. However, while it was reported by the Melbourne Age next day, that the Commissioner had expressed himself in favour of the proposed rail line, "He was sorry that he could not include their great national undertaking in the present bill, but he would again promise that as soon as he got the funds, he would have the necessary surveys made."

EULOGY

GEORGE CHAPMAN (GEORDIE) 16/05/1929 ~ 18/02/2021

Geordie was born on Sunday 19th May 1929 in Rochester to Emma and William Chapman. A loving brother to Betty, Geordie also enjoyed the company of his cousins. When school beckoned, Geordie attended primary school in Lockington before going onto Echuca Technical School. Geordie met and married the love of his life Phyllis Aird at the Presbyterian Church in Echuca on 9th May 1951 and then they raised for 4 children together.

Geordie always had an amazing work ethic, a hard and always reliable worker. In the early married life, Geordie and Phyllis just knew how to work in a team. Geordie as a linesman for Victorian Railways and Phyllis as the Station Mistress at Kotta, where the family lived in the house, as part of the railway station.

After moving to Lockington in the 1960's, Geordie and Phyllis ventured out into their own business, as G + P.I. Chapman General Carriers. With their Bedford or Mercedes trucks, they would be carting cattle along the many roads to farms and then onto the Saleyards in Echuca, Bendigo and Brooklyn in Melbourne. Very soon, farmers learned that, if you needed cattle transported or hay carted, Geordie and Phyllis would be there – safe, punctual, reliable and dependable. With Geordie, "nothing was ever half done" – such was his commitment to everything in his life.

Commitment to the love of Geordie's life, Phyllis, for whom they have shared 69 years of marriage together. Commitment to all of the sports that Geordie loved; playing tennis, even competing in Country Week in Bendigo. Playing football for both Bamawm and the Union; also becoming a committee member, timekeeper and many other roles too numerous to mention.

Commitment to community wellbeing and safety as a member of the Lockington Fire Brigade. As we have already said, for Geordie, nothing was ever half done. We know that, as a true Lockington local, Geordie was a Cat and he was on his way to living those 9 lives — being a Life Member of the Tennis Association, a Life Member of the Fire Brigade and a Life Member of the Football Club.

As the years have passed grandchildren have arrived – Paula, Scott, Michelle, Janine, Jason, Travis, Emma and Tegan, who all have wonderful memories of Pop and who now have 8 great grandchildren as well. Geordie loved his family and his friends. Geordie and Phyllis were, simply the best - the perfect team.

And great teams are built on great partnerships. In 2017 both Geordie and Phyllis moved into BUPA Aged Care in Echuca, to be cared for together. A wonderful, shared life, shared memories, but I suspect whatever was under the lid of his walker was not to be shared, particularly the lollies.


For Geordie's other simple, guilty pleasures, he was one who loved a beer. On a Saturday night after a hard week's work, he would walk down to the Locky pub and chat with anyone and everyone, discussing the important stuff first – like the football, the cricket or the tennis news. Politics and the weather just had to wait. Geordie had a lifelong love for football. As much as he loved the Essendon Bombers, with his idols being Dick Reynolds and the Danihers, the LBU Cats were his team. Incidentally, Phyllis also loved Saturday football, for slightly different reasons – as Geordie would head off with Jack or Norm or Bev and Les, Phyllis could then have a lovely day in the garden.

Geordie had a once in a lifetime love for Phyllis and for Lockington and the community of Lockington simply adored Geordie. It came as no great surprise for the community, and family, to comprehend that Geordie had become unwell over the last few weeks and it was in the early hours of Thursday 18th February 2021, that Geordie Chapman left this land peacefully and is now at rest.

Family, friends and the Lockington community say – "Rest easy dear friend, we will love and miss you"

Geordie Chapman leaves a bounty of family, of friends, a myriad of happy times, memories and stories for every person that had the pleasure to meet him. Geordie will be greatly missed by all who had the immense good fortune to know him, to be related to him, to be his friend and to be loved by him.

TRIBUTE TO GEORGE CHAPMAN

Having been asked by George's family to speak at this solemn event, celebrating the life of a wonderful contributor to our community, I feel humble and honoured. On behalf of all those who cannot make this day I offer their condolences to all the family.

Kathi and I have known the Chapmans in excess of 40 years which is only a relatively short time compared to many however in that time we've known them as great family friends, farmers, livestock carriers, clients, and generous contributors to the community. I've just picked up I've used the word "they" in that sentence however rather than remove it I think it pertinent it be left in there as George and Phyllis were a great team, often seen together, never more so than in the truck or on the farm. Not so much at the footy.

George was an excellent carrier. He understood stock, was usually calm and never rushed, sometimes to the frustration of livestock agents if we were looking for him to get to another job or just getting home to our families instead of sitting on a fence waiting for George. In saying that they (there's that word again) were rarely later than expected. With their experience, they knew what they could do in what time and wouldn't take on any more. Always had a clean truck and never got lost.

George loved to reminisce about his carrying days especially the old days and his trips to Melbourne, whether it was Newmarket or abattoir's in Brooklyn, pigs, calves or cattle in his Dodge (I think) "shit it could go". I understand there was a lot of competition between him and his brother in law Bill Mustey.

He was also known to be a real traffic hazard in his later days as the speed of the truck, loaded or unloaded wasn't fast. In fact frustratingly slow to any body that got stuck behind him. Especially those travelling between the Mitiamo turn off on the Northern highway to the roundabout. Nothing for there to be a line up of frustrated drivers longer than any at a COVID inspection point that we've seen lately.

In between carrying football and family, George found time to run a tidy farming operation where they turned off well nurtured vealers and bullocks. Hated Bathurst Burr with a vengeance.

George's involvement in sport obviously started very early in his life. Although his involvement at the Bamawm Tennis club had finished by the time I knew George, he spoke of those years fondly.

His contribution to the LBU Football Netball Club is well known and rewarded with a life membership. He spent many hours at the club over many years as a spectator, supporter, vote giver and time keeper. Peter Collins remembers the time clearly when he changed the locks on the time keepers box to keep vandals out without telling George. George gave Peter a severe dressing down about not letting George know of the issue or change.

He's been sadly missed around the club for a short number of years now although friends and family continued to take him when they could.

I know when I was president it was not uncommon for

George to make me aware of something troubling him following it up with "I know it's none of my business". He'd got his message across. He loved all the players and followed their successes and failures religiously.

George and Phyllis were renowned for having an open house for many and varied young people of Lockington inc. friends of Shirley, Russell, Lois & Jenny who'd drop in for a feed, a drink or both, and a chat, between school and training or any other reason. They never left thirsty or hungry.

George and Phyllis never missed an occasion to help celebrate a milestone. Be it a birth or a special birthday, a deb ball, engagement, wedding or anniversary. A truly well respected and wonderful duo. He loved and was very proud of his family. I'm not sure he ever told them how much, or how much he appreciated them and their sacrifices for him as I think at times he might not have been the easiest person to be around while he was helping everyone else. As much as he'll be sadly missed in the community his loss to the family will be much greater.

As a family through to the great grand children you can be very proud of George and how much he modestly contributed to the community over his nearly 92 years. I never heard a bad word spoken of George. Sometimes a word of frustration, but not a bad word.





GET ON-BOARD THE SCHOOL BUS INQUIRY

The Nationals Leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, is encouraging everyone in rural and regional Victoria to participate in a new public inquiry into the use of school buses by the wider community.

Mr Walsh said the Legislative Council's Economy and Infrastructure Committee inquiry is focused on whether the use of school buses in rural and regional areas should be expanded to give more members of the community access to travel.

"It is great to see this issue being looked at," he said. "Members of many of our rural communities have little or no access to public transport; while some school buses have plenty of room for extra passengers.

"I am aware of many situations where young people have caught the school bus for years but are not able to continue to do so after they finish school to get to their new job or tertiary education, even though they are still too young to get a driver's licence.

"If we can ensure child safety and school students are not disadvantaged in any way this may be an option that could work well for our community, giving residents access to at least some form of public transport.

"We need to hear feedback from the community on issues of student safety and the risks and rewards of allowing adults onto school buses."

Mr Walsh encouraged all parents of current school bus users and potential users of the school bus to make a submission.

"This is your opportunity to have your say – please make a submission. The more information presented, the more beneficial the inquiry will be. I look forward to hearing the evidence brought forward and the views of the community."

Public hearings will be held after submissions have been received and will hear from witnesses to gauge the views and experiences of people in rural and regional areas.

Submissions can be made via the Committee's website www.parliament.vic.gov.au/eic-lc-article/4616.

The inquiry is set to hand down a final report before the end of this year.

LABOR'S PROMISED COVID-19 SUPPORT FAILS TO MATERIALISE

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, wants to hear from local businesses who have been denied, or are still waiting for, Victorian Government COVID-19 support grants.

Mr Walsh said despite Daniel Andrews and the Labor Government spruiking businesses recovery support,

desperately needed as a result of lockdowns and restrictions, the majority of impacted local businesses are being told they are ineligible.

"The farce of these promised Labor Government grants continues; while local businesses have their livelihoods destroyed by unnecessary snap lockdowns and restrictions," he said.

"Many businesses across my electorate, and across all regional Victoria, are doing it particularly tough as people are choosing to cross the border to access supplies and services as the impact of restrictions is much less in NSW.

"Daniel Andrews has completely failed to acknowledge businesses cannot shut down for five days, with a few hours' notice, simply by flicking off a light switch.

"Now, to make matters even worse, many local businesses have found they don't meet the Labor Government's criteria for funding support meant to help those impacted by the lockdown."

Mr Walsh said The Nationals this week had have taken their concerns about the failure of this vital funding to Parliament.

"The Andrews Labor Government continues to demonstrate its complete inability to support local small businesses that have been decimated by repeated lockdowns," he said.

"Four out of five Victorian businesses were not even eligible to apply for these spruiked government grants.

"Only \$12 million of the Government's \$100 million allocated to sole traders was allocated by December last year."

Mr Walsh said the party has also written to Industry Support and Recovery Minister, Martin Pakula, seeking answers.

"With these Labor government grants it appears to me the same businesses get most of the available grants, while those who fail at the last hurdle miss out every time – it's simply not fair."



LOST LOCKINGTON AND SURROUNDS

I noticed in your article ISSUE #886 -March 13, 2020 of Locky News in an article by Joy Weller "Lost Lockington and surrounds" and it rang a memory bell.

My mothers maiden name was Scott and for some generations, members of her family have lived and worked in the central districts of Victoria. With Great Great Grandfather and Great Grandfather Scott (Father Samuel Baird Allan Scott) working in the church in Euroa and Violet Town, (Father Reginald Allan Scott) in Seymour, Violet Town, Bendigo and in the Wangaratta diocese, my Great Great uncle Henry Forde Scott was a minister in Footscray, Prahran and a padre in Pentridge prison for a number of years and was described as having a fiery manor. My mother who went to school at Girton grammar school in Bendigo as a child and lived in a house in Forest Street Bendigo for a number of years whilst her father trained to be a minister after he had been a clerk for a number of years working for the State Electricity Commission and had been involved in the administration of building the Eildon Dam. My mother (Judy Cooper nee Scott) later became a teacher at both the Wangaratta High School and later at the Technical college and lived on a farm and later in the city of Wangaratta where she connected more with the Cathedral in Wangaratta. She also had some success as a poet. My Grandfather George Baird Allan Scott was the minister at St. Peter's Elmore in the late 1950's and early 1960's and travelled widely in the community also holding services at Rochester, Lockington, Raywood, Colbinabbin and Goornong. I remember taking great pride as a very small child (maybe 7 or 8 years of age) 'helping' him take his regional services at these regional churches by being a stand-in altar boy on occasions. I remember the connection he had with his parish congregation and the Cheers, Peter Cooper. polite, honest, hard working and respectful rural community of country Victoria. I remember the town of

Elmore and loved going to watch the printer, when the Reverend 'Grandpa' Scott needed things printed, there the printer sat setting his type manually into the blocks ready for printing the pages that were needed and the smell of the ink. "Look but don't touch or we'll be scrubbing with the pumice stone on your hands till the ink comes off again". Reverend Scott had many interests and needed many things printed. Church printing, and he had been connected to the Scouts for a number of years in the days when scouting was really popular with boys and was at one time district commissioner at Castlemaine, he was a JP and he was part of an ammeter theatre acting group to name just a few. On one walk I had with him on a hot summers day we walked along the Campaspe River where I went for a swim in the river and that water was so icy cold. Further down the river there was a boy crying this cut the swim short as Grandpa needed to investigate what the trouble was. He found that the boy had managed to hook his finger with his fishing hook and it had gone right through coming out the other side. The skilful scouting training kicked in as the reverend Grandpa Scott whipped out his trusty pocket knife that he always carried and cut the eye from the hook allowing it to pass back through the finger with little damage.

Rev. George Baird Allan Scott lived in the Vicarage in Elmore with his wife Marjory and Roly the Boarder Colley Kelpie cross who just loved chasing and sometimes stealing the tennis balls players being hit by the players at the tennis courts behind the church. Roly would steal the ball and drop it in his water bowl but was always friendly and loved a tummy rub. In many ways life was more simple but really the work done by everyone was much harder than it is today. Still it's nice to remember and to look back at the pictures.
