The Elk lifting cushion operates at a low air pressure offering a stable and stress-free lift that can be performed with the assistance of one carer only.

The product is extremely compact making it ideal when someone has fallen in a confined space both indoors and out.

The Bush Nursing Centre expect to take delivery soon and Centre Manager Kim McDonald said this will be a great asset.

Ambulance Victoria use this type of equipment frequently to assist patients without having to manually lift them.

The gorgeous autumn weather allowed Lodge members to present the funds in the Centre's front garden.

The Board of Management and staff thanked the donors and all in attendance agreed that this type of equipment should be available in all rural communities.

Hello again Everyone,

We've been looking at the story of settlement on the plains west of the Campaspe in the 1870s. During that decade, hundreds of new settlers had come to the district, taking up allotments of varying sizes according to their means, and all having high hopes of establishing homes and becoming successful farmers. While the most encouraging seasons occurred in the early 1870s, even then, those who had taken up allotments furthest from the Campaspe and the Bendigo-Echuca rail link, faced other hardships. There were no made regards another important component in establishing a roads along which to bring their families and their possessions, their farming or household equipment, or their building and fencing needs; no small communities where schools, halls or churches would provide opportunities to meet with neighbours. However, while roads were still much needed, by 1877, there were small settlements developing, as described by visitors to the area that year.

Among the earliest settlements were Mitiamo and Terrick Terrick, described by the Leader, 3 March 1877: - "Mitiamo, the principal township ... is very pleasantly situated at the base of the southern Terricks, right on the banks of the Piccaninny Creek, and is well supplied with fresh water." It comprised "three stores, one blacksmith's shop, butcher and baker, post office, State school, one very well-appointed hotel, two other public houses, and several private dwellings." The travelling reporter was less favourably impressed with Terrick Terrick township, "situated upon a hill of sand and granite, distant from the creek fully a mile, and badly off for a water supply. There is nothing to invite one to prolong their stay here, although it boasts of one hotel and store, with post office included; one store, which used to be a public house, police camp, large Catholic church, State school, black-smith's shop, with plenty of selectors' homesteads around at distances of one-half to one and two miles."

The Weekly Times reporter, who visited the region and described it in the issue of 28 April that same year, paid less attention to the townships but was much impressed by the "wonderful proportions of agricultural greatness" which he saw on the "great expanse of Terrick country ... an Australian By 27 April, the Mount Alexander Mail stated there had been Kansas." However, not all observers were convinced of its future potential. To some, it seemed that a good proportion of the selectors had no intention of remaining on their report on the many splendid native grasses which, like some allotments "on getting hold of their certificate of title," but would dispose of it "as soon as possible at a good profit." According to the Kyneton Observer of 31 May 1877, they complied with the conditions required by the Land Act, but "the huts erected ... are of the poorest description, and can scarcely give shelter to anyone, and the other improvements are much in keeping with the dwellings."

However, when the Bendigo Advertiser reporter visited Mitiamo township later that year, he too was impressed by its progress, noting that a branch of the Australian and European Bank was soon to be opened there. However, he also noted that the town was in want of a daily mail, a telegraph line, and a railway. On 10 September, the Advertiser stated that the residents of Mitiamo were "petitioning for a burial ground of their own," as the nearest cemetery was 30 miles away. Mitiamo was well situated as township – the provision of a school – but many other places still waited. Settlers' children at Pine Grove were being taught in temporary accommodation that was "too small and very dilapidated," so the announcement in the Advertiser on 14 November 1877, that the Education Department had accepted tenders for a number of new wooden schools, including one to be provided at Pine Grove, would have been very welcome.

The final months of 1877 were dry, and it was not until the second week in February that some rain fell on the Terricks plains. On 26 January 1878, the Weekly Times reported that the drought, the most severe experienced since 1865-66, was so harsh in the Terricks that many of the settlers were "said to be actually abandoning their homes in despair, having no prospect of keeping their stock alive." The effect of the drought went beyond the farmers, and caused the failure of the flour mill that had been established at Pannoomilloo a year earlier, by Mr Rannard of Kyneton.

Throughout the summer there had been none of the thunderstorms that, in other years, had brought an occasional downpour to replenish the waterholes. Any rain that fell had been scarcely enough to settle the dust. On 9 February 1878, the Bendigo Advertiser noted that "Selectors had been doing a considerable amount of prospecting for water, and abandoned heaps of earth surrounding tolerably deep shafts, told of unrequited effort in that direction, but ... all around the Terricks, a considerable quantity of sinking for water had been carried out, and in most cases successfully." increasing interest in the activities of the Grand North-Western Canal Company, and the Leader carried a lengthy American, African and South Asiatic species, were nutritious and simultaneously heat-resisting. The opinion was expressed that these "should be encouraged in their growth and spread, particularly in the drier inland pastures."

Some rain fell on the Terricks plains in April, and a little more in July, but as 1878 progressed the situation was not looking bright. 'Bye until next time,



Coincidentally Phill, at 92 years young, recently played in the fourth division lawn bowls pennant premiership team for Lockington and happened to play against Bill's brotherin-law Mr Renn Ritchie.



The Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, will be taking two hits for the team this year.

And said he wanted everyone else in the electorate, the state and the country, to do the same.

The first one was today, when he rolled into Echuca pharmacy Coburn & Reid for his flu vaccination.

The second will be when it is his turn for the COVID vaccine.

Mr Walsh said with so many COVID restrictions now shelved, or more relaxed than at any time for the past year, flu once again becomes a significant threat to at-risk groups.

He said that includes:

Children younger than five, but especially children younger than two.

Adults 65 years of age and older.

Pregnant women (and women up to two weeks postpartum). Residents of nursing home and other long-term care facilities.

"The at-risk group also includes people with underlying health conditions, but your GP would provide the best advice for individual cases," Mr Walsh said.

"But it is important people be aware that with much more population movement now, in the streets, at retail precincts, sporting grounds, theatres and so on; flu might be back with a vengeance," he said.

"We haven't had anywhere near as much flu in the past 12 months because of all the COVID hygiene measures – but that's all about to change and some of us might be a little more vulnerable because of that.

"Which is why I am encouraging people to make sure they don't forget this vital protection as we head into winter and the flu season.

"If you are due for your COVID vaccine it apparently doesn't matter which one you have first and as COVID requires two injections, you can have them either side of your flu shot.

"And as pharmacies are now able to deliver flu shots it makes access even easier to get yours."

Here's why regional Victoria's getting short-changed again says Walsh

Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh said if you think the Andrews Labor government is short-changing post COVID regional Victoria – and it is – you just have to look south to Melbourne and see where it's all going wrong.

Mr Walsh said at a government briefing today, after months of smoke and mirrors, major projects authorities have finally been unable to hide the disaster of deepening problems on the West Gate Tunnel.

He said if you wondered why the government has had work crews going overtime to rip down its wildly optimistic 2022 'completion' banners it is because 2024 is now the year being bandied about.

"That's two years – and I suspect in the end, billions of dollars worth of planning, implementation and oversight failure by the Andrews Labor government in general and Jacinta Allan, the Minister for Incomplete and Over Budget, in particular – down the track and I will take any odds it's a wild hope rather than a set in concrete occasion," he added.

"For goodness sake, Jacinta Allan, who is also Minister for Messed Up, hasn't even got the issue of the toxic soil worked out yet - and she has mountains of that looking for a home somewhere.

"Right now her preferred address – and she has a permit for it – is the High Quality site at Bulla; almost next door to local communities.

"In what world does Jacinta imagine that one is going to cut the mustard?

"Dumping toxic, contaminated soil near urban communities – I mean, what could possibly go wrong with that?"

Mr Walsh said although the Bulla site has a government permit, Jacinta Allan and her team have yet to facilitate the construction of the works associated with this facility.

Not surprisingly, he added, Labor's toxic dumping site does not have the support of those impacted local communities.

"But why would that worry this arrogant Labor government; they'll just fallback on their playbook and steamroll both the local government authorities and the residents," he said.

"And don't think for a minute the West Gate Tunnel is the only failure by the Premier of Melbourne's desire to distract your attention from his other complete failures – hotel quarantine and contact tracing.

"No, the tunnel is just one of Labor's many major projects that is in trouble. Almost every major project is either late, massively over budget or otherwise botched.

"The only consistency here is Madam Mayhem, with everything Jacinta Allan touches turning into a disaster.

"The West Gate Tunnel project has been a debacle from beginning to end. It's been a special deal for Labor's mates. It is wildly late, with time slipping further."

Meanwhile, Mr Walsh said motorists are paying through the nose every day on the CityLink roads for a tunnel that is not even built – and they may never use.

"I would say that completes the trifecta for Ms Allan – overdue, overbudget and the paying public being screwed over."

Inquiry into COVID impact on tourism must hold regional hearings: Walsh

Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh said the Victorian government inquiry examining the devastating impact of COVID-19 on Victoria's tourism and major events sector must conduct a hearing in Echuca and Swan Hill.

Mr Walsh said the Murray River-based tourism industry has been smashed by lockdowns, snap border closures and the repeated failure of the Andrews Labor government's hotel quarantine system and contact tracing.

He said in other areas, such as East Gippsland, everything there, not just tourism, copped the double whammy of the summer bushfires and then coronavirus.

"If there is any good news for industry to come out of this crisis it will be the recommendations this inquiry is going to make – if, of course, the government decides to accept and implement them," Mr Walsh said.

"But it must get the facts right – and the only place to do that is to come here and meet the people who were the hardest hit, to hear the stories and see their damage," he added.

"While tourism has shown signs of a strong rebound; nothing but government support will make up for the massive losses caused by confusion and mass cancellations in peak seasons.

"And many of these businesses had not qualified for any of the government supports due to the criteria being too narrow and as a result have received nothing at this stage." support.

Mr Walsh said it was something The Nationals have repeatedly raised in Parliament so he is calling on Martin Pakula, the Minister for Tourism and Major Events, to "very strongly" push for the committee to travel to his electorate and across regional Victoria for hearings.

He said since COVID started he has been contacted regularly by business people who are "seeing their investments, their years of hard work; their very livelihoods, disappearing before their eyes".

"Government supports are announced but so many in my electorate are exasperated to find they do not qualify," Mr Walsh added.

"If we are really going to have a serious look at the impacts of COVID-19 on our tourism sector, Echuca, Swan Hill and regional Victoria should be at the very top of the list," he said.

"If this government is really keen to get the answers, we should be the first port of call as it is the only way to understand what we have been through.

"I have a number of business people who would be prepared to front the inquiry and explain their experiences and hardships, I simply await news a hearing will be held locally."

Mr Walsh said his Party has also written to committee chair, Enver Erdogan, a Labor MP, to suggest regional hearings.


