Hello again Everyone,

We've been looking at the story of settlement on the Terricks plains in the 1870s. Selector farmers had begun the decade full of optimism, having experienced a succession of two or three very rewarding seasons, but by the mid-1870s, recurring episodes of low rainfall were causing concern. In 1877-78, a severe drought in the region struck a blow to the season and hoped the heavens would open as need be.

The idea of constructing a 'Grand Canal' system to carry water from the Goulburn River to irrigate the dry plains of northern and western Victoria had been advanced some was reason for the scheme to be considered in a more favourable light. In April 1878, Mr T E Rawlinson, engineer of the North-Western Canal Co., submitted the third of a series of reports of studies he carried out in the Goulburn valley. As reported in the Mount Alexander Mail on 25 April 1878, it was his contention that "the question of the barrage cost and commercial profit," but the benefit it would confer on the plains "would be more than a sufficient justification for a very large outlay." He felt as yet, unable to comment on the

the Terricks to link Bendigo with Kerang, was still being widely discussed; regular meetings were held, deputation after deputation waited on the Minister of Railways to urge the importance of the proposal. On 24 July Bendigo Advertiser reported that "rival routes" proposed for the line, and added that "a more opportune time for his visit could not have arisen, for the roads are in such a terribly boggy state that he will see for himself the difficulties that have to be encountered in the transport of merchandise and grain." It was not until 18 October, that the eventual decision was made known, the Kerang Times and Swan Hill Gazette reporting its opinion that "the Government have acted wisely in fixing on Eaglehawk as a starting point, as by that route the greatest wait for next time. number of selectors will be accommodated. No doubt this decision will cause a little heart-burning and disappointment Bye until then, to those advocates of rival lines." [Indeed, it would have done so in Milloo and Wanurp and Pine Grove!]

Early in 1879, there was other news on the wider scene that probably caused concern among some of the residents of the Terricks plains. An indication of seeming progress in the district had been the opening of a local branch of the Australian and European Bank at Terrick Terrick, though the branch had been removed to Mitiamo by April 1879. This particular bank business was generally well regarded, as reported in the *Herald* on 1 May 1879, "In every locality there settlers from which many would not recover. Those able to was a reasonable profit on their transactions, and the new remain on their selections put in seed for the following properties at Sandhurst and in other up-country towns, gave very satisfactory evidences of prosperity." Unfortunately, it didn't remain so and, on 6 June that year, the Kerang Times and Swan Hill Gazette reported that the Australian and European Bank was closed, noting that "the effects of the failure will not be felt directly in Kerang, though around the years earlier but now, the severity of the 1877-78 drought Terricks and Mitiamo, we fear much suffering will ensue." On 20 June, a further item on the subject appeared in that same newspaper which stated that "although one or two of the suburban, and the Sydney branches would be closed, the Mitiamo branch would most probably continue to carry on business."

of the waters of the Goulburn and Campaspe" was "one of Despite whatever worries were being caused by the crops, the banks, or the weather, there were other distractions that would lift the spirits of the residents of the Terricks plains. When they were not far too busy on their own farms, and "suitability of Lake Cooper and the Waranga Swamps as when the soil was sufficiently moist "to show first-class possible reservoirs" but he earnestly recommended that ploughing to good advantage", they held ploughing matches. Matches took place on local farms which volunteered for these events. Local Racing Clubs were also formed, and meetings were held for such special occasions as the Queen's Birthday. Then, there were church luncheons, school picnics, concerts, and the like, and at the the end of almost any event it seems, as reported by the Commissioner of Railways had made a tour to inspect the Bendigo Advertiser on 7 June 1879, "After the entertainment was over the followers of Terpsichore kept the dancing up into the small hours, many not getting home until the morning star had shown his face once more on this side of the sphere."

RUNNERS AND WALKERS ON THE ROADS SAFETY FIRST.



Do...

- Pay attention to traffic
- Walk on the sidewalk whenever possible
- Walk single file
- Remember that motorists might not see you

Don't...

- Walk with your back to oncoming traffic
- Forget to watch for other pedestrians and cyclists
- Wear dark colors, especially at night
- Listen to loud music or look at your phone

Please, people who walk or run on roads which do not have footpaths go along the side facing the traffic, so you can see them and they can see you, and make sure the sun is not dazzling for the drivers. You aren't breaking the law by doing this. Wearing a safety vest or similar coloured clothing is also a good idea. Dark colours can make you hard to see.

Walking comprises the largest transport mode because almost everyone is a pedestrian at some stage in their journey. Walking and cycling can provide many benefits, including improved health, and reduced pollution and congestion. However, pedestrians and cyclists are vulnerable road users, as they have little or no protection in the event of a collision. Certain groups of pedestrians are particularly vulnerable, such as the elderly, the young and those who are impaired (for example by alcohol or drugs). There has been a steady decline in the number of pedestrian fatalities over the last decade. However, in 2016 there were 182 pedestrian fatalities (14% of all fatalities), an increase for the second year in a row. Pedestrian fatalities and serious injuries are most common in major cities and towns (including on local roads, and higher volume roads with mixed traffic use), but also occur in more remote locations.

EULOGY OF ALYS KATHLEEN EDWARDS by Lynette Whaley, daughter

As her daughter, how would I describe her? Well, it's a bit tricky so the best illustration I can come up with would be that to me she was like a block of Carmello chocolate - a bit hard on the outside, but very soft inside. She was hard working, feisty, impatient, tenacious, competitive, creative, a sportswoman, musician, cook, but primarily, she was a perfectionist. She liked to take charge, no matter the setting, and her way was the right way! If she was able to analyze herself, I am sure she would have recognised that setting such high standards for herself was a very stressful way to live.

Mum's early life on the family farm at Durham Ox was a difficult one. She had four sisters and two brothers. With the death of her eldest brother, Toby, due to a cricket injury in 1934, her father took Mum to be his farm hand when she was 9 years old. Before and after school, Mum and the girls milked the cows by hand and tended to the pigs. She learned a lot about farming and Pa relied on her help. Her mother died in 1953 and her father in 1965. My only memory of the Durham Ox farm was the firm instruction from Pa Edwards to keep well away from the ferrets!

In her single days, Mum worked as a Postal Driver in Pyramid Hill and joined the Air Force during the War serving as a driver.

Mum married Arthur in May 1948 at Pyramid Hill and they lived in Lockington. Mum knew a lot about farming and "tutored" Dad. Dad and his brother George were growing tomatoes on the farm at that time, but later on Mum and Dad developed it into a dairy farm. Mum didn't know much about housekeeping, so she set about learning to cook, sew, and maintain a home. She was a quick learner and her cooking skills were outstanding her cream sponges were legendary. All the grandchildren looked forwarded to visiting Nana as her fridge and cupboards were always choc-a-block with yummy slices, biscuits, and cakes.

She learned to sew and knit and made most of our clothes. She always had darning on the go - a dying art these days! Her patience was sorely tested when she was teaching me to knit right-handed instead of my natural left-handedness! I learned quickly to avoid being yelled at!

She hated having a debt on the farm and it was decided that Dad should go out contract hay baling while she would take over the milking and farm duties. Kevin and I were little tackers then and she took us to the dairy and stood us in the corner of the dairy in large cream cans - water in the can in summer to keep cool and blankets in winter to keep warm. In summer she would ensure we were in the cans while she went about killing snakes before the cows came in to milk! I honestly don't know how she did it!

She was a very good sportswoman excelling at tennis, golf and lawn bowls. Again, she was very competitive and liked to win. She established a lawn tennis court next to the house at Locky and there were lots of very keen competitions held there. However, when the younger brigade started winning games, she couldn't put up with that, so she planted trees on the court and established a garden featuring her favourite plants - Red Hot

Pokers and Gladiolas. Her granddaughter Rachael remembers Nana when each time they were playing the board game Ludo she would say, "Now I have read the rules and we play it this way" - always to Nan's advantage! Rachael was also amazed at how fast she could shuffle a deck of cards. She played cards at the Anglican Church in Locky each week and if she had a bad night, we would hear all about the cheats!

Later on Mum worked away from the farm at a factory making uniforms, on a tomato picking machine plus training and working as a herd tester.

Her involvement in the community was quite staggering. She was an active member of the Lockington Anglican Church and all the tasks involved with that. She was a Leader of the Anglican Girls' Friendly Society. She helped with the Lockington publication of Community News, delivered Meals on Wheels, was a member of the Country Women's Association, she performed at local concerts playing her piano accordion and singing and yodeling. She also just quietly went about assisting anyone in the community who needed help. When my husband Richard was working with Prison Fellowship Mum organised many ladies to bake biscuits for gifting to prisoners at Easter and Christmas. Mum held leadership positions at the Golf Club and Tennis Club, but a lot of her time and energy went into the Bowling Club. She held leadership positions there and was awarded Life Membership. Further afield she served as President of the Campaspe Valley Ladies Bowls Association.

She loved all her grandchildren and they bought her great joy. They were fortunate to know her while she was still in her prime. She didn't stand any nonsense, but she was so very generous to them all. When Damien, our first child was born in 1975, Mum insisted on driving to Melbourne a couple of times to babysit this treasure as nobody could do it as well as her! We really appreciated this generosity knowing it was a great sacrifice for Mum because she was terrified of Melbourne. Sadly, however, by the time great grandchildren came along, she wasn't quite as "with it".

Mum suffered many health issues both physically and mentally over the years, but she was very stoic and on recovery, just kept Sadly dementia started to affect her and she was regularly hospitalised then returned home and tried to do all her normal chores, but kept falling. Dad could not care for her any longer, so she was admitted to Tongala Aged Care Facility in 2008. Initially, she didn't like the restrictions to her lifestyle, but over the 12 years she was there she slowly deteriorated. It was so very sad to see such a vibrant woman cut down by this horrible affliction. She hasn't known any of us for the last 6 years, so there has been a long period of mourning for us. I believe that death for Mum was a "blessed release" and death marked the moment when the restrictions of this life ended and Although we didn't know it, we she became free at least discovered that Mum had a deep faith and her trust in Jesus gave her the assurance that she was going to a new and better world to be with her Lord and Master.

To close, I would like to share a poem that is just so Mum:

God Saw You

God saw you getting tired, when a cure was not to be. So he wrapped his arms around you, and whispered,

"Come to me"

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

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
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
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GOVERNMENT CASHFLOW INCOMPETENCE **IS STARTING TO COST THE SAFETY** OF REGIONAL DRIVERS SAYS WALSH

Billions of dollars wasted on botched major tunnel projects; millions of dollars wasted defending Daniel Andrews and his gang from fatally botched hotel before her, turned up at his office door as a last resort. quarantine and now regional Victorian drivers will pay the penalties.

Nationals Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says with no money left in the Labor Government's crippled economy, the latest solution to the decaying regional and country road network it cannot afford to upgrade is a potentially pathetic compromise.

Mr Walsh said the RACV, rather than urging the Andrews Labor Government to put money into fixing roads, is advocating for speed limits to be dropped.

He said a RACV spokesperson said lowering speed limits money, on back roads in the country might encourage drivers to importantly, no safety. use better standard highways.

"Unfortunately, highways in rural areas often aren't up to scratch either, and more often than not, the 'backroads' are the only way for people to get to where they need to crime for which the system must be held responsible. be," Mr Walsh said.

"RACV comments that it would take too long and be too expensive to make country roads safe, shows the citycentric thinking that is leaving rural and regional Victorians behind," he said.

money to fix roads and improve safety is lazy policy and treats country people with contempt.

"The Andrews Labor Government has spent more covering cost blowouts on city infrastructure projects than it has spent in regional Victoria.

"The government must use the upcoming State Budget to fix this disgraceful imbalance and commit a significant spend on rural and regional roads to bring them up to a standard which motorists deserve."

Mr Walsh said Labor has been in government for 17 of the past 21 years and had clearly failed to maintain Victoria's regional road network.

He said the continued neglect of regional roads; while spending hand over fist in the city, is a slap in the face for Victorians who work and live in the regions.

"Regional Victorians deserve their fair share," Mr Walsh added.

"As more people leave Melbourne after continued lockdowns, our road network is only going to decline further, hampering the liveability of our country centres," he said.

"Country drivers pay their RACV membership expecting the group will lobby the government on their behalf, but the RACV's latest thoughts on country roads don't go anywhere near doing that.

"Country people deserve to have roads the same standard as their city cousins - they deserve to be able to go about their daily businesses without being slowed down because of government incompetence.

"The best way to make our roads safer is to invest in fixing them - and not just installing wire rope barriers and lowering speed limits - by actually rebuilding road surfaces and clearing vegetation from road sides."

ABUSED WOMEN GET SHORT SHRIFT FROM ANDREWS LABOR GOVERNMENT

The Nationals Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, said his office has again been confronted by the human face of our domestic violence epidemic.

Mr Walsh said he could recount this woman's details; "but we have heard them all before".

He said the equally frightening outcome for this young woman and her child was to find somewhere they could feel safe and protected - and that's why she, like many

"Because in my electorate there isn't anywhere; no built, secure facility and no ongoing purpose accommodation support, for these women to use," Mr Walsh explained.

"We are seeing women with children being shunted from motel room to motel room, or sent a long way from their home town, to find short-term respite," he said.

"And very quickly they are shunted out the door and left to fend for themselves and their families; often with no foreseeable income and no

"That some of these women feel they have no alternative but to go back to their abusers so they can at least put a roof over the heads of their children, and feed them, is a

Mr Walsh said social housing must be a priority on any government's agenda - absolutely for victims of domestic violence but also for the people who, often through no fault of their own, find themselves homeless.

He said he knows in his electorate there are people living "Simply slowing down country drivers and not spending rough, and as the chill winter weather is starting to be felt; the lives of those who have slipped through the cracks in the system is about to get a lot worse.

> "The Andrews Labor Government would rather blow billions of dollars on the over budget, over schedule projects that it mismanages, one after the other, such as the tunnels in Melbourne that go nowhere – except down the drain," Mr Walsh said.

> "But the ultimate insult to the victims of our soaring domestic violence plague was the Andrews Labor Government being forced to admit it had spent \$12 million on lawyers to defend itself from its own inquiry into its failed hotel quarantine program," he said.

> "That was more than double the budget made available to actually conduct the inquiry.

"That \$12 million was wasted on defending the indefensible.

"Instead of spending countless millions of taxpayer dollars on lawyers in shiny suits to defend its failing in hotel quarantine, this government needs to focus on the very real needs of too many Victorians.

"The \$12 million would have provided at least 40 housing units for battered women instead of paying for the Chateau Lafitte at lunch with the lawyers – or perhaps the absent Premier his and forgetful friends still can't




