1. Offer to go grocery shopping or pick up a prescription.




2. Leave a note with your phone number on their door.

Hello again Everyone,

On reading newspaper reports from the early 1880s, one realises that the selector farmers on the Terricks Plains faced the future with feelings of trepidation that had not troubled the settlers of a decade earlier. These early settlers had arrived in the region, full of optimism. but recurrent droughts and a succession of disappointing harvests had since whittled such feelings away. The year 1881 brought more hardship. Rabbits had caused devastation on properties in the Lower Avoca region and, by January 1881, they had crossed the Loddon and were making their way towards the Terricks Plains. Hares were also presenting problems. There was an ongoing, ever-present worry due to the infrequency of rainfall and, early in the year, there were fires; some in the stubble and the grasslands, as on the farm of Mr David Scott at Pine Grove, and on Mr D Graham's property at Rochester West. Tragically, there were others within, or close to homes. At Pannoomilloo, at New Year, a girl named Mary Regan suffered serious burns when her clothing caught fire as she cooked breakfast. In March, two young children died from burns – a little boy named Stewart at Terrick Terrick, and seven-vear-old Amv Royle at Milloo.

The saga of the local people's campaign to have a railway constructed through the district continued. After the railway Commissioner's tour of inspection in October 1880, hopes were high that the Kerang line would have its starting point at Elmore, and would take a route through Pannoobamawm to the north. However, a decision had since been made that the line should commence at Eaglehawk and go through Raywood, too far west to be of any more assistance to our local farmers than was the existing Bendigo-Échuca line, which was too far east. Local Railway Leagues still kept abreast of progress, or the lack of it, in the construction of the Kerang line. They hoped that plans would allow for a railway station to be located at a point on that line which would be convenient to farmers from Pine Grove, Pannoobamawm and Pannoomilloo. Progress with the line was slow, but there was "a degree" of satisfaction in reading the Bendigo Advertiser's announcement, on 18 November 1881, that the Government intended "to push on with the construction of the line to Kerang as early as is possible."

Mr Archibald Yeaman, of Pannoobamawm, was in the news on 15 January 1881, when the Leader published a notice that he had "a very interesting display of grasses, sedges, and other native plants in the Victorian court of the International Exhibition, for which he has deservedly received an award of the first order of merit." A week later, Mr Yeaman featured again; this time when a Bendigo Advertiser reporter visited his farm, "Errington" in the Parish of Pannoomilloo, to observe the new "Haines's header at work." The reporter praised "Errington" extensively as being "one of the largest and best conducted" farms in the district. He then went on to describe the workings of the header, the labour-saving qualities of which impressed him most: - "The hands required for cutting and conveying

the grain to the threshing machine, or stack, are three waggon drivers, two loaders, and one man to manage the header, making in all six men by whom the same amount of work can be performed with the aid of the header and ten horses, as would have required by the old method of reaping and binding, stooking and carting, forty-two men and twelve horses, allowing three reaping-machines, each having a driver, sheafer, eight binders, and two stookers, in all thirtysix men; then the carting-in would require three waggons, each having a pair of horses and a driver, while there would be two pitchers and one loader required in the field."

Obtaining farm labour was difficult, and the selectors were keen to learn of innovative ideas. The Bendigo Advertiser, of 29 March 1881, carried this report from its Pannoobamawm correspondent: - "A public trial of Cockerill's patent rotary harrow was held at Pannoomilloo, on Mr. Heep's farm, on Wednesday last. There was a large number of practical farmers present. The piece of land chosen to be operated upon was stiff plain, which had been fallowed in the winter and then scarified, and consequently presented a very rough and uneven surface. Notwithstanding this drawback, the implement did excellent work, and those present were unanimous in their opinion, that it was one of the best pulverisers yet introduced." The favourable impression of this machine's work stayed with this reporter and, in the 18 August 1881 issue of the Advertiser, he added the following: - "as labour-saving machinery comes into more general use, less men are required to do the farm-work, and these in turn will have to seek employment of another kind. For instance, Cockerill's rotatory harrow seems to do the work of harrowing, and cutting up into fine mould, land that has been fallowed a long time, and it appears to do its work very well indeed. I do not know whether there will be a very great sale for them as yet, for very few [farmers] seem to take to new ideas if they can help it."

The opportunity of inspecting new implements at Ploughing Matches had diminished, perhaps due to a busy season, but the following announcement in the Advertiser, on 7 July 1881, looked hopeful: - "A correspondent at Pannoobamawm writes:- "About three years ago a ploughing match was got up here, and it was hoped that it would be made an annual affair, but last season it fell through. However preliminary arrangements are now being made to re-establish the society. Many farmers have attached their names to the subscription list." Cricket was the district's major source of recreation, as the local correspondent stated: - "As to cricketing, we do not do very much in the proper season, for the harvest and other things interfere, therefore we always play during the winter months. Every Saturday one or more of the clubs adjoining contest matches, and these are conducted with the best of spirit, for we are favoured with numbers of the fair sex, who grace the grounds with their presence."






Safety improvements

Intersection Lucas Crescent and Clare Avenue

Council is completing safety works at the intersection of Lucas Crescent and Clare Avenue, Lockington.

As part of these works, Council will be installing four 'Give Way' signs, as shown below. These signs will improve safety advice to motorists when using the intersection.

There are several T-intersections in Lockington which do not have signs or lines. *Victorian Road Rule 73 – Giving way at a T-intersection* covers this situation and additional signage is not required. Giving way at a T-intersection is the responsibility of the driver who is turning into the continuing road in line with the Road Rule.

Brown, Gay Indian who was brought up in a white Australian Dutch family since I was ten months old in a what was a semi small town in the south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne in the 80s and 90s. Now a rather large town in the south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne which is extremely cultural and diverse.

Making the choice to move to the very small beautiful country town, Lockington, I knew I might be facing some issues.

To my surprise I have not faced issues I thought I would have.

It's EVEN WORSE in many ways.

The issues I face in a small country town is the fear of change, The fear of making head waves.

The fear of calling out things when they happen.

The fear of no one standing up and calling out bullies.

The fear of taking on social issues because everyone is of a certain age, and they may not like it therefore "we won't do it."

The fear of "if you were not born in town then you won't really belong, and you'll never be known as a "local".

The fear of speaking up against people who you admire and respect.

The fear of having new ideas knowing they will never go anywhere.

The fear of ANYTHING DIFFERENT of what they know.

Change is a scary thing. For everyone, there are people who will refuse to buy a mobile phone in this day in age. There are people who still refuse to use a computer.

If I'm being honest, I'm a bit jealous of those people. It's like watching 90s movies and you don't see them using mobile phones. I liked those movies best. Those people are not forced to use technology to live. Everything evolves around technology these days. We had to adapt to it. There was no choice for us. It became social suicide. We don't have to use it, however, if we don't, we miss out on knowing what's going on in the world and with our friends. Facebook and social media has connected people far and wide however it has disconnected us from reality and what's important. Like everything it has a good side to it and a bad side. I've seen both side of social media where it has worked for me and against me. I miss the old days sometimes. Life was much simpler. However, we do not live in the old days. We live in the year 2021. The older generation are meant to be our leaders and are meant to

lead the younger generation into the future and help them learn. Instead, the tables have turned. It's the younger generation that are trying to lead and learn from the MISTAKES the older generations made. It's hard to admit when you make a mistake, I know from personal experience. Sometimes failing is the only way we learn from our mistakes. I've failed many times and each time I've learnt from my mistakes and tried new ways so I don't make the same mistakes again. You learn from them.

Being in a small town for 8 months has opened my eyes to the great injustice and all the mistakes that are happening over and over again. Of course people will give the run around of "you haven't been here long enough to know what really happens". The thing people don't know about me is that I take notice, I listen to the unheard, I think outside the box so much so that there isn't even a box in sight. I smashed that bastard long ago. It's no secret that I am a human rights advocate and I'm very passionate about standing up for what I believe in and stand up for those who haven't found their voice yet. Those who know me know I do a lot of work internationally for human rights. I'm not afraid to speak up, stand up and fight for justice and fight for people and communities. I see a real problem in our community. I see a real injustice in this community. The injustice taking place is the lack of voices being able to stand up and create change, being able to stand up against generations not willing to make changes and move a community forward into 2021. There are so many beautiful people in this town, and there are so many with so many great ideas looking forward to the future sadly held back by heritage and history, however, heritage and history is what made this town and we should preserve that history and heritage to the highest form of respect we can have. However, it's called heritage and history for a reason. It's what was, not what should still be. Heritage and history is not a life style. We should always remember and never forget how this town was made and who took part in making this beautiful town of ours we live in, we should take pride in that and always respect that.

We live in the year 2021. Don't fear it. Live in it.

CAMPASPE RESIDENTS ENCOURAGED TO HAVE THEIR SAY ON HEALTH 13 July 2021

Campaspe residents are being encouraged to take part in online conversations aimed at understanding local health care needs.

Murray Primary Health Network reviews regional health data annually, to help guide its funding decisions to Contact details support and improve the primary health system.

Every three years, Murray PHN conducts a major Health Needs Assessment with expert health data analyses supported by community consultation to provide a complete picture of local needs.

Population health figures show that the Campaspe region has higher than state average rates of people living with jones_2_2021/ chronic conditions - such as diabetes, heart and lung disease - resulting in preventable hospital stays.

Campaspe also rates high on the index of relative socioeconomic disadvantage, which is based on things like

unemployment, low income or education levels and lack of internet access. All of these can be barriers to people accessing the care they need.

Murray PHN CEO, Matt Jones says that while data analysis offers strong insights, it is local experience that provides deeper understanding, context and perspectives to the figures.

"People who use and work in local health services are best placed to share what is or isn't working well," he said. "We want to hear about the things that make accessing services difficult, as well as any ideas for improvement.

"The more people who participate and tell us what is important to them, their families and community, the more meaningful our planning will be.

"Having a comprehensive view of health helps us work towards making the local primary health care system as effective, efficient and equitable as possible," Matt said. An online conversation for community members will take place from 10-11am on Tuesday 27 July, while health professionals can attend one on the same day from 12-
