Hello again Everyone,

We've been reading newspaper reports from the early 1880s, to learn what life was like for the farming families who were living in our district at that time. The seasons varied, but usually tended to drought conditions, and the availability of water for stock and domestic purposes was a constant worry. However, on 4 February 1881, the Pannoobamawm correspondent of Bendigo Advertiser reported that, despite excessive heat. "Water is everywhere plentiful." Nonetheless, the ensuing weeks were dry and sultry and, on the McGregor Family of Pannoobamawm lost two of their 21 March, the Age relayed a report from Echuca that the "scarcity of rain is telling severely on the farmers." This continued and, in its "Notes from the Terricks" column, the Apart from the end-of-year school functions, only the regular Kyneton Guardian noted that "Wild turkeys have been exceedingly numerous on the Terrick plains this season, owing no doubt to the scarcity of water which prevails across the Murray". In its issue of 23 April 1881, that newspaper added that "The majority of the dams and tanks in the [Terricks] district are now almost and in some cases, quite dry. Fortunately, however, numerous deep wells have been most unpleasant one we have spent in these northern sunk in the district, and from these abundance of water for districts." The yield from the crops was said to be insufficient present requirements is obtained."

Only light and infrequent rain fell during the winter months and "Notes from the Terricks," in the Guardian on 13 August, stated that "The majority of the crops in this district are very backward this season, owing to the want of sufficient Terricks plains over the previous decade; particularly, the moisture and the long continuation of frosts we have development of the villages of Mitiamo and Terrick Terrick. experienced during the past few weeks ... all over the The reporters marvelled at the courage and tenacity of the district." By September, the Bendigo Independent noted that selectors who persevered, and noted that recurrent adverse "sheer starvation" was the cause of some deaths amongst seasons had forced many to move away with their hopes stock on the northern plains. Though a few showers fell in and their assets seriously depleted. mid-October, giving hope to the farmers in Pannoomilloo and reverted to gold-seeking, at the recently discovered Mount Pannoobamawm, in the open country such as the Terricks Browne diggings in outback New South Wales. The settlers "the crops are so backward that no favourable result can be looked for," said the Argus on 14 October 1881. Fortunately, wells had been sunk on many of the selections, so the water needs of farm households were not as desperate as had been the case some years earlier.

A new State school had been erected at Pannoomilloo. was described as being "a most commodious edifice, 'Bye until next time, capable of holding from 50 to 60 scholars," and according to the Bendigo Advertiser on 22 July 1881, it was to be Marg O'Brien. provided with an underground iron tank to keep the water cool and more palatable to drink. Within weeks of the school's completion, the presence of measles in the district forced its temporary closure. The outbreak was first reported in late July at Pannoomilloo and by early August, several "very dangerous cases" were reported from the Terricks. As

relayed in the Advertiser on 30 August, the illness spread quickly to Pannoobamawm and to Rochester, where unfortunately, "one or two deaths occurred...the patients having caught cold." Cases continued to occur throughout September and October and even into November, when measles had caused attendance at the Milloo East school to drop from "over 40 to under 20" by 15 November, according to the Advertiser of that date. Without local access to qualified medical attention, childhood illness could have tragic consequences as had occurred in June 1881, when children to diphtheria.

cricket matches gave light relief to the dismal reports submitted to the newspapers by the local correspondents. Dry windy weather, rabbits, and caterpillars added to the farmers' woes and on 19 December 1881, the Pannoomilloo correspondent to the Bendigo Advertiser wrote that the summer which was beginning, promised "to be the driest and to provide enough seed to sow for the following season. At the end of the year, travelling reporters for the Leader and the Australasian, visited the district to assess the seasonal crop yield. With more land they could then diversify into grazing and no longer needed to depend totally on their crops, but even for them, the prospects for 1882 did not seem encouraging.




