And so, we have the Pump Track! This would not have been possible without the gift of land from Brendan and Leanne Pentreath. There was a strong influence of youth involvement from the community on design. This day will also be acknowledging the participants of the Mural competition, which was held in May 2021, and awarding the prizes.

What a stunner of a vision that provides a recreational area for young people and families in the centre of town. The area has landscaped walk tracks and grass areas, trees for shade, benches and of course the track itself! This is a



great complement to the Channel recreational area, Lions Park, Travellers Rest and of course our Heritage Complex - which was our founding community initiative in 1997.

The Pump Track's key features are that it is relocatable and extendable. This is another major investment into the sustainability of the Lockington district community.

Hello again Everyone,

We've been reading early newspaper reports to learn what life was like for the farming families who lived in our district 150 years ago. The region must have been looking its best fifty years earlier when the explorer, Major Mitchell passed through it in June 1836. He described it in highly favourable terms. Several pastoralists took up extensive sheep runs in the area in the ensuing thirty or so years, when they experienced weather conditions ranging from extreme drought to flooding rains. It was not until the late 1860s-early 1870s that the 'powers-that-be' decided that using the plains country for solely grazing purposes was wasteful and consequently, the region was opened up for selection. With the intention of increasing the population of the area, it was stipulated that the farmers who took up allotments of about 320 acres must use their properties for agriculture. The pastoralists, with years of experience behind them, warned that overall climatic conditions were not conducive to support farming of that type, but they were disregarded in the belief that they simply wanted to retain the land for themselves.

Press reports of the excellent potential of the area attracted hundreds of farming families to settle here in the early 1870s, and the almost-immediate success enjoyed by the first-comers, encouraged even more people to come. Sadly, the good times didn't last and throughout the ensuing decade, the settlers experienced seasons of drought and near-drought, the worst being the 'water famine' of 1882. Fortunately, the 1883-84 season was more favourable, though not yet favourable enough, and all hoped for a better season in the coming year. In the meantime, the succession of failed crops had forced many selectors to leave the district with their spirits broken and their wallets empty. Those remained who had sufficient resources to purchase the allotments abandoned by their less successful neighbours. They were able to extend their own properties to a more workable size, and many took up grazing as an alternative In its issue of 31 October, the Colac Herald quoted the Bendigo source of income in case their crops should fail.

The summer of 1883-84 was hot, sultry and at times, excessively windy and by March, the district was once again crying out for rain, though not just for the farms. Pannoomilloo correspondent reported to the Bendigo Advertiser of 12 March 1884, that residents hoped that "timely rain" might stop the spread of ophthalmia in the district. The rain was slow in coming but fortunately, families were able to enjoy the Pannoobamawm State School picnic on 15 March, and the St Patrick's Day celebrations on the 17th. On 26 April, as reported in the Bendigo Advertiser, Wanurp children enjoyed their turn for picnicking and, "when the 'shadowy gloaming' at length drew nigh, many of those present accepted Mr. J. James' kind invitation to a social party at his homestead, where dancing and other kindred amusements were made the order of the night, and were kept up with unflagging energy until 'the Marg O'Brien. wee sma' hours.'

Cricket got under way again, giving the local communities something to take their minds off the constant rain question will it or won't it? And, if it rains, will there be sufficient? A little rain fell in April, and a little more in May, and on 13 June 1884, the Elmore Standard even reported "bountiful rain," though "just in the nick of time." Fortunately, it didn't spoil the Pinegrove State School concert which was reported in the Bendigo Advertiser on 18 June: - "A picnic for the school children and their friends was held during the afternoon prior to the concert" and in the evening, despite "the heavy state of the roads owing to the recent rains, the attendance was very numerous." Once again, "after the termination of the concert the room was cleared for dancing, and the votaries of Terpsichore were afforded an opportunity of indulging in their favourite pastime. Messrs. Royle, Seierson, and Joyce were violinists, and Mr. Winfield, M.C.'

On 3 July 1884, the Argus reported that farmers in Diggora, Bamawm, Pannoobamawm and Pannoomilloo predicted a "good season" for their wheat crops, but the Rochester correspondent to the Australasian, writing on 12 July, felt it "unsafe" to make a prediction so early in the season. He was right to be cautious, but for a while the crops continued to look satisfactory though "very backward," according to the report in the Bendigo Advertiser on 14 August 1884. (That same paper reported the annual ball of the Wanurp Cricket Club, which was held in Mr R Bray's granary, where all went "merry as a marriage bell.") By late September, the district began to receive rain, which most residents hoped would be a boon to the cereal crops, but the Leader of 4 October, quoted some farmers as saying that such rains could "only make the yield half a one." Later that month, when Hugh McColl MLA visited the area, he informed the Bendigo Independent that the crops on the plains would be a failure.

Independent, saying that "the Terricks and Durham Ox districts are being over-run with what are classed 'travelling sheep.' It is estimated that there are at present no less than 70,000 of these quartered on those districts, ostensibly on their way to market, but in reality, being kept moving from place to place in order to obtain feed. Some of the flocks are very large containing as many as 12,000 or 15,000 sheep. They are clearing away the grass before them like so many swarms of locusts and the selectors and squatters in the neighbourhood can find no redress. The travelling sheep nuisance is a serious one, and though there is an Act of Parliament on the subject, it might as well be a dead letter."

More problems for the settlers!

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

"Scrap the border bubble" says Walsh

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, wants the border bubble shelved.

Mr Walsh said residents of the communities along the NSW border want to see all the cross-border restrictions removed.

They want, he said, to return to being one community again and not live in fear that draconian rules from the Victorian Premier will cause more chaos for their families.

"These communities have suffered 18 months of constantly changing rules, different types of permits, you need a permit this week; but it changes for next week, students can cross the border for school one week and then they're locked out the next," Mr Walsh explained.

"Whole Local Government Areas are excluded from the cross-border bubble for no logical reason, creating havoc for families who, for example, operate farms across more than one LGA," he said.

"Just as businesses have staff available one week; but then a rule change excludes them from crossing the border for work the next.

"Even worse, the police who are tasked with scenarios enforcing these constantly-shifting struggle to keep up with the endless changes, the government websites struggle to keep up to date

with the rules changing constantly; and often have conflicting or confusing messaging.

"We are up to the 32^{nd} or 33^{rd} set of cross-border rules since the pandemic started - even we have lost count."

Mr Walsh said these communities have some of the highest vaccination rates in the State - but that's not getting them anywhere.

He said the Victorian Government has finally followed NSW and is using targeted lockdowns by LGA; and not whole-of-state lockdowns for areas with high COVID case numbers; so the reasons for cross-border restrictions have diminished.

"Enough is enough; give these border communities their lives back, they have suffered too much.

"They are one community, we are supposed to be one country. Why keep dividing people and forcing them to live in fear?"

Mr Walsh took his demand for scrapping the border bubble to the floor of Parliament this week, raising it in his Member's Statement.

"My office has been inundated with calls from people who don't know, from one day to the next, if they are coming or

going, in business or have the 'closed' sign in their front window," he said.




