Hello again Everyone,

We've been reading early newspaper reports of the conditions endured by the farming families who lived in our district 150 years ago. The year 1885 was off to an inauspicious beginning with a disappointing harvest for the season. The Leader of 31 January held out hopes that "before another season a large portion of the [Terricks] district will be irrigated" but, though several small scale schemes had been instigated, a massive irrigation project was needed and it was still a long way off. As the Geelong Advertiser reported on 14 February, "At the Terricks, agricultural matters look so serious that farmers are selling their holdings, and others are prepared to do so when they can find purchasers." The feeling expressed in the Weekly Times on 28 February, was that the campaign for irrigation would be more successful if the public, particularly those living in the large centres of population, were more aware of the "wants and woes of the selectors on the plains." The recommendation was that parliamentary candidates be selected, favourable to irrigation, and "with ability and enthusiasm enough to make their influence felt in legislation on the subject.'

In the meantime, a Milloo farmer wrote to the Kerang Times and Swan Hill Gazette on 17 February, "The want of water is sorely felt this summer, farmers having to drive their stock many miles to water. With reference to rabbits, we have not many here, but I think that pest, as well as hares, will be allowed to multiply if the Dog Act is enforced ... Native companions [Brolgas] are here in thousands; they eat wheat but discard oats, and then retire to the swamps..." However, he added "for all that, picnics and tea meetings in aid of various objects, such as buggies for ministers, and other requirements, are the order of the day." Bearing out this last statement, on 17 February, the Pannoobamawm correspondent wrote to the Bendigo Advertiser about the picnic held in Mr Phillip Mitchell's paddock at Milloo that week. Events included two footraces of which the Milloo Handicap was won by Alfred Yeaman from a field of eight runners; ex-champion, Jos Chappel of Pine Grove, "being in the ranks of the defeated." The writer remarked on "spooning" having appeared as a favourite pastime among the young and rising generation, "and as a natural consequence of this, several cases of 'matrimonialism' have lately come under notice." Cricketing was under way again, with "S Windridge and Chappel" playing well for Pine Grove.

Only light rain fell over the ensuing weeks and, though some farmers summoned up sufficient hopes to begin preparing land and sowing seed for the next season, it was noted that there was an overall reduction in the area put under crop. Throughout 1885, the campaign for the irrigation of the northern plains was earnestly pursued. On 31 July, the *Bendigo Advertiser* reported that "A monster deputation from the Northern, North-western, Sandhurst and adjoining districts waited upon the Premier today, to urge upon the Government the desirability of initiating extensive irrigation works, of maturing a scheme for utilising the

waters of the Goulburn, the Loddon, the Wimmera, the Campaspe and other streams in connection with the same, and of raising a loan for that purpose." Addressing the deputation, the Premier, Mr Service said that the Government was aware of the need and intended to do everything possible to deal with it. "It had been proposed to borrow a large sum of money for this purpose, but he would remind them that the Treasurer had no more an uncontrolled supply of gold, silver or bank notes, than any other person in the community." With that they had to be content.

At mid-year, the whole local district was saddened by the untimely death of Mr Patrick O'Brien who, in addition to his small farm, owned and operated the hotel/store and post office at Pannoomilloo. Mr O'Brien died on 29 June 1885, some ten weeks after he was seriously injured when the horse bolted as he was climbing into a trap, dragging him for a considerable distance. He was a popular, highly respected, and very active member of the community, whose premises were frequently used for public meetings and gatherings of various types. Aged just 39 years, he left a widow and five young children, for whom the deepest sympathy was felt.

Until June 1885, only light rain had fallen in the district, dams dried up and wells were in high demand. On 19 March, Pannoobamawm's Bendigo Advertiser correspondent had noted that "the drought has one good effect, for it gives the council time to get the various shire tanks cleaned out, and the mud that accumulates is something wonderful, over 3 feet being found in some, according to the situation." Then, on 8 July 1885, the Advertiser published this report from Mitiamo: - "The well-worn saying "It never rains but it pours," is literally verified in the North -Western district this year, as downpour follows downpour with scarcely a day's intermission. The land is thoroughly soaked, the swamps full to overflowing, and much more heavy rain would result in a flood .... The wisdom of the surveyors in fixing the site of the railway station where they did, is now made very manifest, though most strenuous efforts were made at the time of the survey to get the site fixed a mile south of Mitiamo, the latter site is now a very "slough of despond," while that where the station stands is high and dry on the side of the sand hills ...." On 5 August, a visitor to Mitiamo wrote to the Bendigo Advertiser that "The old township of Mitiamo has almost disappeared, being reduced to one hotel. The new town at the railway station has assumed quite an important appearance, and is doing a very steady business.'

Please, if you're not involved with a local group, find one that suits you, your skills and interests, and stick your hand up to pitch in and help our community to thrive.



#### **EULOGY FOR ANNICE MAY JENSEN**

Our mum, Annice, was a warm, loving and compassionate woman who always went out of her way to help others — no matter what. She had a passion for life and a wonderful sense of humour which endeared her to everyone she came in contact with. Mum's caring and kind nature allowed her to form many long-lasting friendships over the years.

Mum, Annice May Hickson was born on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of May 1928, the sixth and youngest child of William James (Jim) Hickson and Christina May Stoddart. Mum and her brothers and sisters, Maud, Cecil, Ron, Grace and Lloyd grew up in Muskerry East near Toolleen.

Mum and her siblings went to school at Muskerry. Mum didn't love school with playtime, boys and sport being her favourite subjects. She achieved her leaving certificate when she was 14 years of age and then went on to perform home duties for her dad and brothers.

Mum was brought up with traditional values and learnt the skills that a woman of her era did—cooking, sewing, knitting as well as helping with chores around the farm including feeding the horses.

Mum taught us many things as young kids that hold us in good stead today— good manners, respect and sound moral values. These values have made us who we are and we will always thank her so very, very much.

Mum and Dad, Len, met through Dad's sister Jean. They married in February of 1958 and moved to set up the family farm at Tennyson. Mum and Dad milked cows and raised chickens for their eggs. Mum worked tremendously hard to support Dad around the farm. Cousin Ann remembers coming to stay at the farm to help Mum with us and thinking how hard Mum and Dad worked with their 36 cow herd. Darryl remembers Mum washing all the eggs before sending them off to Bendigo. She would sit there for hours until she finally reached the bottom of the last basket.

Peter was born in April 1959, Darryl in October 1960 and Robyn arrived in November 1961. Mum was our friend, confidante, cheerleader, sense of reason, our #1 supporter and alarm clock. Peter has the memory of mum waking up him up by running her knuckles along the boards outside his room to get him up out of bed. She taught us to

be fair, kind and to work hard for what we wanted. Mum encouraged us to have a go at new things and to always try our best. Mum loved her sport, playing tennis, golf and bowls and she was always our biggest fan, no matter how successful we were.

We have many, many fond memories of our childhood:

- Attending Church and Sunday School each Sunday, coming home to a roast with vegies.
- Porridge for breakfast every morning, all year round
- Mum cheering us on when we played sport. Driving us and our friends to our games, working on committees (Football, Tennis, Netball) to make sure that we could play the sports we enjoyed. One of Robyn's favourite memories is playing alongside her mum when she was a teenager so that we had enough players on the court – she had never played netball before!
- Mum loved the Locky Cats, she was so proud of the club and rarely missed a game. She adored watching both her children and her grandchildren play for the Cats. Mum was awarded a Life Membership for her contributions to the Lady's Committee.
- Mum supported the Essendon Bombers and had a ball with Peter, Darryl, Ben and Vincent going to watch an actual game down in Melbourne. She came home with a truckload of scarves and umbrella hats.
- Sunday picnics and drives
- Summer holidays spent in the caravan in Torquay
- The delicious smell on baking days
- Endless home-made crafts
- Family Christmases

Mum was very community minded. Mum:

- Helped to establish the Milloo CWA branch, serving in many leadership roles
- Loved music and performed with several choirs
- She enjoyed singing with friends at Christmas concerts at Milloo
- Worked as cook/kitchen hand on school camps
- Volunteered for the Blood Bank, St.Vinnies and the Red Cross Op shops
- Cooked biscuits and slices for the Rochester High School canteen
- Committee member for Brownies, Guides, Cubs, Scouts, Mother's Club to allow us to participate in a range of social activities and groups

They lived on this farm for a further 18 years before building a new house in Lockington and enjoying town life for approximately 3 years before the move to Wharparilla.

Mum and Dad loved to travel. They travelled extensively around Australia with family and friends with Mum having quite the collection of souvenir teaspoons to help remember their trips away.

Mum and Dad entered Wharparilla Lodge near Echuca in February 2018. It was becoming increasingly difficult for Mum to care for Dad and so the decision was made for them to make the move to assisted living at the Lodge.


They enjoyed the simplicity of living there, making some beautiful friends and being looked after by the supportive and caring staff. They were happy there together until sadly, Dad died on June 21, 2018. The staff often commented on how they sat together and held hands.

Over the next two years, mum's health had some ups and downs. Mum's sight and hearing diminished substantially which made it difficult for her to communicate, she suffered a minor stroke and could no longer walk independently.
