Kotta Station platform restoration, Part 1 done!

The first part of the restoration of the Kotta railway station platform wall was completed this week by David Johnson (project manager, chief engineer, hole digger, concreter, artisan wall builder) with help from Andrew Christian (clown, entertainer, heavy lifter), Ian Haines (another comedian, fully tooled up) and me, David Hammond (a generation older than the other three, tractor driver, safety officer, union rep). I would have been pleased if we had completed half of the wall but it was all done in one day! This will be the site for the start of the fun runs on the rail trail. This project is the first stage of restoration of the Kotta Railway Station which is also a WW1 war memorial. Progress reports as work continues. We are a band of brothers (and sisters) here. Hello again Everyone,

We've been reading early newspaper reports of the conditions endured by the farming families who lived in our district 150 years ago. After experiencing yet another poor harvest in 1884-85, some of the selector farmers found they were unable to continue, listed their farms for sale and moved away from the district. Others stayed and persevered, being able to enlarge their own holdings by purchasing those abandoned by their less fortunate neighbours. With more land, they were able to diversify and provide an additional source of income; something that could be vital, should the crops fail again.

As Spring began in 1885, the weather was described as "alarmingly dry," by the Bendigo Advertiser's Mitiamo correspondent on 9 September, "and great anxiety is felt for the crops." But it wasn't just the weather that the correspondent reported as causing anxiety, stating that the "so-called fog fever ... visited nearly every house in the district, with more or less severity." There do not appear to have been reports coming from others of the northern plains' correspondents at that time, but it is very unlikely that Mitiamo suffered alone. I 'Fog fever' was the common term applied to a great epidemic that swept over a large part of Australasia from May 1885, according to reports in issues of the Australian Medical Journal in October 1885, and in September 1890. It was a severe form of influenza, occasionally misdiagnosed as typhoid, and it was sometimes Even so, on 11 February 1886, the Bendigo Advertiser reported that accompanied by serious complications. Although no local deaths were reported, elsewhere there were some fatal cases. The illness also occurred in Europe, where it was known as Russian Influenza, though to obtain a railway line through the district, their push to have this medical authorities believed it to have originated in Australia, where it particular siding on the Eaglehawk-Kerang line was now shown to be recurred several times, though less extensively, during the justified. Better facilities were needed there, and the Advertiser went next few years.]

In mid-September 1885, "steady rain set in" across the plains and on 19 September, the Weekly Times reported "The farmers are jubilant ... The early crops are looking remarkably well There is ... now a fair prospect of a good harvest." A month later, the Argus reported: -"Throughout this district, it is patent that we are on the eve of an abundant harvest. In the Diggora district there are many acres of wheat fully 5ft. and in some cases 6ft. in height, and extending even as far as the eye can reach What has been said in regard to the Diggora district applies with equal force to Bamawm, Milloo, Pannoomilloo, Pannoobamawm, Bonn, Nanneella, Timmering, Park's Plains, and Corop." Over the next three months the rainfall continued to be all that the local farmers could desire, the papers recording such comments as "a good yield will be assured" and "appearances most certainly indicate that the harvest will be an abundant one" and, a little more cautiously, "the prospects of the present harvest are very fair, as

far as it is possible to judge from the appearance of the crops." The Bendigo Advertiser of 25 November, was probably correct in saying that "Ten years' experience has proved that farming on the dry Northern Plains is to a very large extent a lottery, and the farmer is never sure of his crop till the grain is in the bags."

In the meantime, throughout the district, dances, concerts and picnics came and went, and cricket was played enthusiastically. On 7 August 1885, the Bendigo Advertiser reported that a new Post Office would be opened at Wanurp on the 10th, and on 28 November, came the announcement that the name of the Post Office at Pannoomilloo West would be altered to Tennyson on 1 December 1885. As the year's end approached, the district suffered the loss of two of its long-time residents, announced by the Bendigo Advertiser. On 23 October, a 97 -year-old "lady named Stewart" who came originally from Scotland, died at Milloo, after an illness of just one week. Then, on 10 December, Mr Stephen McIntyre died at his residence at Terrick East. Mr McIntyre's health had been failing for the previous two years but, until then, he had taken "an active part in all public matters, and was very favourably known to all" in the Terricks region, and in Tylden in the Kyneton district, from which area he had come ten years earlier.

Hot winds prevailed in the region in October and November, causing the actual harvest yield to be much lighter than had been anticipated. over 10,000 bags of grain were despatched from the Prairie Railway Station in January. Though local residents had failed in their struggle on to say: - "Extensive alterations and improvements have been made to the platform. A goods-shed will shortly be erected. A weighbridge is now a much felt want."

In the meantime, the need to campaign for a massive scheme of irrigation for Victoria's northern plains had not abated. On 23 January 1886, the Leader carried a full report on the irrigation conference held at Rochester, during the previous week. "A large number of delegates representing the various local governing bodies, water trusts, irrigation leagues, farmers' unions, &c. assembled to discuss the irrigation question" and to press for the Government to proceed in the construction of an "irrigation scheme from the Goulburn to the Loddon River." It would be a very lengthy process.

EULOGY

ELIZABETH ELSIE "BETTY" CUNNINGTON 29.08.1942 ~ 23.09.2021



Betty, born 20 August, 1942 in Rochester hospital, was the third child of Robert & Lilian Cunnington, and was a sister of Ken, Dot and younger sister, Beryl. When she was 3 years old she wandered away from her mother and headed for the paddock where Dad was cutting a high painting houses, cooking, mulching and cleaning. We crop with a mower and blade pulled by a team of horses. Dad was unaware of her being in the crop. The horses suddenly stopped when the blade cut into something hard. It was Betty's legs. Doctors who saw her legs said they should amputate, but there was an ex-Army surgeon in Echuca, and it was he who saved her legs, which ultimately took her up and down hills and mountains in PNG, and before that in other aspects of her nursing career. When she became of school age we no longer had to ride our bikes to school but went by horse and cart, because of Betty's legs. At that school there were 4 girls in Betty's class: Dot (Evans) Pearse, Margaret (Glasson) Ross, and Jean (Bennie) Pedretti - all born in 1942. This was the start of a lifelong friendship with each other.

Betty did her primary schooling at Bamawm Central, and secondary at Echuca High School. She got involved in the community, as was the practice of our parents. Church life, a Brownie, then a Girl Guide, and played tennis for the Bamawm Methodist club. She took on a Nursing Career, which suited her personality – a Carer, and friend. She trained as a theatre nurse and as a midwife. During this time she felt a nudge by God to be involved with The Leprosy Mission. After nursing in Mooroopna, Echuca, and Melbourne hospitals she took on a challenging job of working at Torana Boys Home in Melbourne, then studied at Melbourne Bible Institute. She went to Papua New Guinea in 1974 to work for the Mission for 30 years, mostly with an English co-worker, June, and they developed a life-long friendship. They were well known throughout PNG missionary circles as a very welcoming pair whose home was a retreat where you would be accommodated, fed and entertained. When Betty first applied to work with The Leprosy Mission she was rejected - she failed the medical test. Her kidneys were the problem then. In time that problem was overcome and she passed the test, consequently spending many years with the Mission. It was the same kidneys that took her in

the end.

When Betty retired from Papua New Guinea in 2004, she lived with Mum in Lockington, who passed away in 2007. Betty remained in Lockington, in the house which Mum & Dad had built to retire into in 1970's, and after she could bear the cold no longer, she moved to a retirement village in Carbrook, Queensland. There she got involved by driving friends to church, appointments, etc. She went and spent a winter in England to nurse her very sick friend June, tolerating the cold which she hated. She was very giving of herself, never wanting for thanks or praise.

Whilst in Lockington Betty became involved in community activities, helped with the Locky News, was a valued member of Lockington Bush Nursing Centre, operated the Business Centre's fuel outlet, and was very involved with the Bamawm Uniting Church.

With technology she picked up the skill very well from its beginnings and helped many people. Betty, in younger years, enjoyed a game of tennis, and golf. She enjoyed watching cricket on TV. She said one day that in order to see the score board, she looked through binoculars she kept beside her chair! She loved classical music and her favourite was Handel's Messiah.

Betty, with Beryl, Graeme and Fay Haines, enjoyed the great experience of a working holiday to Thailand in 2013 with a team of 20 volunteers to help the McKean Rehabilitation Centre, a former Leprosy Colony, by remember the delight on Betty's face when she had a real coconut to drink, her first since PNG!

Since her passing, so many people have commented on her sense of humour and happy disposition. She often had a smile on her face – except in the last few months when she was so tired and life was an effort. Now we are separated by death, but grateful for her, and our love for her will never die. We thank God for Betty.



NEXT EXHIBITION: POLAR OPPOSITES 12TH - 28TH NOV


