# PAT MITCHELL RECEIVES THE APSA FELLOW'S AWARD AT THE 2021 APSA CONFERENCE

The purpose of the Australasian Pig Science Association (Inc.) is to provide a forum for excellence in science related to all aspects of the pig industry. APSA was established in 1987 to bring together people from a range of disciplines with a primary interest in pig science.

The aim was to provide a forum for scientific discussion that would ultimately provide an impetus for further research and ultimately improve overall pig productivity. Since that time APSA has met every two years, and the conference has developed to a point where it has a world-wide reputation for science excellence and as a forum for the exchange of ideas relating to the pig industry.

The APSA Fellow Award was first presented in 2007. This prestigious award is offered in recognition of past and present members who have made an outstanding contribution to APSA as well as their contribution and commitment to pig science.

Nominations for the APSA Fellow Award are received from the current APSA Committee and the initial nominations are supported by a verbal statement addressing the selection criteria, weighted to assist the Committee in its deliberations.

The selection criteria for deliberation of APSA Fellow nominations cover contributions to:

- The APSA Committee (President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, ordinary Committee member)
- Technical content contribution (Editor, referee, scientific authors, etc.)
- Membership development (students, national and overseas)
- Contribution and commitment to pig science (research, involvement in post-graduate training, etc.)

All past APSA Fellows were significant contributors to APSA and pig science, and given both their professional and personal commitments at the time, their substantial contributions are more utterly astonishing and valued.

Hello again Everyone,

We've been reading early newspaper reports of the conditions endured by the farming families who lived in our district 150 years ago. The harvest of 1885-86 had been less successful than anticipated but the yield was sufficient to keep up the spirits of the selector farmers on the Terricks plains. However, there were always problems of some sort occurring among our families way back then. On 12 March 1886, the Pannoomilloo correspondent to the Elmore Standard wrote that whole families throughout the district were suffering from "the blight. There is no school which is not suffering more or less from its attack, and though in a comparatively mild form, yet in any stage it is most undesirable." This was probably what we call conjunctivitis, known then as 'sandy blight,' and was exacerbated by the harsh conditions in which the settler families lived.

About that same time, a more serious problem was occurring for a Milloo farmer, Mr William Mellen. He had injured his hand in a chaff cutter accident, and consulted a practitioner of Chinese medicine rather than attend a doctor. Some time earlier, Mrs Mellen had attended this same Chinese practitioner, who had then cured her illness. The family had great faith in his abilities but unfortunately, he failed badly in his treatment of Mr Mellen's hand. Tetanus set in and the aid of qualified doctors was then sought, but it was too late to save Mr Mellen, who died on 5 April 1886. The Kyneton Observer recorded the story on 10 April, expressing sympathy for Mr Mellen's distressed family and friends in this district, and for former neighbours at Green Hill where the family had run a hotel before coming to Milloo.

Encouraged by the slightly better rainfall figures for the previous year, in 1886 the local farmers cultivated more land than usual. However, the early part of the year was hot and dry, and though the crops at Pannoobamawm made headway, "rabbits and hares were becoming numerous" according to the report in the Weekly Times on 4 June 1886. Some light rain fell later in June, but the Pannoomilloo correspondent wrote to the Elmore Standard on 23 July, that much more rain was wanted "as the crops are famishing for it." Luckily, the Standard received a more cheery report from Diggora on 27 August: -"I am greatly pleased to note a grand change in the weather ... There has not been such a steady downpour for a long time, and it will do an incalculable amount of good. New ground will be able to be broken up, and fresh hopes will be entertained as to the incoming harvest." On 11 October 1886, the Bendigo Advertiser reported enthusiastically, "The prospects of the coming season still continue to look cheering" and on 6 November 1886, with a little more caution, "The crops that are heading show good [heads], and if the weather keeps favourable for a few days, the yield will be up to the average." The correspondent

added to this last report that "The Education department have at last got some of the much-needed underground tanks completed [for the local schools]. Though too late to catch the regular rains yet we may be fortunate enough from thunderstorms to get a supply for the summer."

Whilst the rainfall was short of that expected, the year had not been a bad one in other respects. Cricket remained a favourite pastime with the young men of the district, and attracted a good following. School picnics had drawn crowds of 250, in Milloo in March, and 400 at Pannoomilloo in April. This latter was followed by dancing for the older local residents, and the crowd was so large that two venues were needed. The Elmore Standard of 23 April 1886, reported that one party danced at the school, while a second group made its way to Mr J Archibald's barn. A new Church of England, Saint David's, was opened at Milloo on Sunday 1 August, as reported in The Church of England Messenger and Ecclesiastical Gazette for the Diocese of Melbourne and Ballarat on 8 September 1886. "Notwithstanding the threatening weather the church was crowded .... The preacher concluded an impassioned and eloquent exhortation by entreating his hearers ... to reverence the house of God, and not convert it into a concert hall or a gambling saloon, ... to preserve it as a sacred place to worship in, to baptise their infants, solemnise the marriage ceremony, and bless the remains of the dear departed."

On 23 July 1886, the Kyabram Union reported that a major irrigation meeting was held on 20 July, at the Tatura Mechanics Institute, to discuss the provisions of the Irrigation Act, then before Parliament. On 25 September 1886, the *Leader* reported that "The Irrigation Bill was finally passed through committee in the Legislative Assembly shortly before midnight on Tuesday [21 September], and reported to the House "with amendments," after having monopolised the almost undivided attention of the Chamber since the 24th of June [1886], when it was introduced by the Chief Secretary in the now historical four hours' speech."

Despite the high hopes expressed earlier, the harvest prospects were "not particularly bright" according to the Leader on 4 December 1886, though "a few irrigated crops near the Murray are looking splendid." By 18 December, the Illustrated Australian News stated that: - "the results in the wheat crop in some parts of the colony have caused considerable disappointment.... so poor are the crops that it is estimated the yield will be insufficient to pay expenses on some farms in the country, between the Loddon and the Terricks."

We hope our year ends on a better note. 'Bye until next time, Marg O'Brien.



Barbara worked as a teacher's assistant at Wandiligong primary School.

Barbara attended many Dances. At Harrietville she met Alf. Marriage soon followed on 6/04/1953. They were blessed with six children Joy, Shirley, Ken, Don, Brian & Wendy.

Barbara and Alf started a hardware and building supplies business at Market St Lockington. The business grew and they rented a shop space in Hopetoun St. for paint, giftware and toys. Barbara kept the books, cared for the growing family and in the early days also cared for her Father-in-law.

With the hardware and building supplies business failing Barbara and Alf took on the local Café and newsagency and continued in this for many years until retirement.

They moved to Mt Terrick Rd Echuca where they enjoyed spending time in their large garden.

After Alf's death, Barbara moved to Rochester where she lived for 20 years.

Over the years Barbara cooked for many events including the birthdays of her six children (marshmallow cake. yum) and many families in need.

In later years she became affectionately known as "The Scone Lady", cooking for community and church events. Scones were not her only claim to fame, ginger fluff, sponges, gem iron cherry cakes, and not to forget the fruit cakes that appeared for Christmas and birthdays. There always seemed to be something to eat any time you Barbara was educated at Wandiligong and Bright includ- dropped in, and you daren't ring to say you were coming because there would be a supply to take home with you.




# FIELD'S CACTUS GARDEN Royal Botanical Gardens Melbourne







### WALSH DESPAIRS AT FARM SAFETY AND BIOSECURITY RISK FROM LABOR DELAYS

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says Victorian farms have been left exposed to fringe activists for almost two years because New onthe-spot fines for trespass still have not been put in place - almost two years after they were recommended.

Mr Walsh said some of these activists can actually threaten the safety of farm families because they don't understand how farms work; or all the equipment and chemicals found on many farms.

He said in June 2020, the Andrews Labor Government committed to introducing hefty on-the-spot fines for biosecurity breaches in response to pressure from The Nationals.

But during an embarrassing admission in Parliament last week, Agriculture Minister Mary-Anne Thomas confessed she still hasn't done the work to deliver laws that better protect farmers.

A disappointed Mr Walsh slammed the lack of progress, saying it left farmers and their families exposed to theft and people illegally entering their property.

"The Agriculture Minister has bizarrely claimed the delay doesn't matter because farmers are protected by existing laws - but flaws in existing legislation are exactly why these reforms are needed," Mr Walsh said.

"When current laws see criminal actions by extreme animal activists resulting in a fine of just \$1 it's clear the system isn't deterring illegal trespass or protecting hardworking, law-abiding farm families," he said.

"But what it does show is this government's disdain for anyone not living in the state of Melbourne.

"The Minister's failure to introduce this important legislation only emboldens extreme animal activists to trespass on and steal farmers' private property."

In January this year, the Minister told media: "Despite the challenges of the coronavirus pandemic ... engagement across government and industry will take place this year".

But last week, the Agriculture Minister would only say that "work is well underway" and legislation will be introduced "in due course".

Mr Walsh said the new laws were not ready because the Andrews Government had not made them a priority.

"Other states have already done the work to draft, introduce and pass legislation for on-the-spot fines," Mr Walsh said.

### WALSH SAYS SHORT-SIGHTED POLICIES WILL **CAUSE CHRISTMAS CHAOS IN REGIONAL VICTORIA**

Leader of The Nationals and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says regional Victoria's Christmas has been thrown into chaos because the supply chain has run out of pallets.

Mr Walsh said it might sound laughable that the most basic item; such as a few pieces of wood nailed together; can have such an impact but he said the massive loads carried daily by the transport industry.

But he said the system was structured so everything – from chocolate and beer to vital medicines - have to be carried in bulk on something so they can be moved, lifted and loaded.

"And that," Mr Walsh said, "means wooden pallets".

"Regional Victoria will be hardest hit by these disruptions because suppliers will cater to the biggest markets first and we will get anything left over," he said.

"And the longer the nation's largest timber pallet manufacturer is denied access to timber; the longer - and the worse - this crisis will ao."

At the weekend, Mr Walsh visited Dormit, the Dandenong South business which would usually be providing 70,000 timber pallets per month to the supply chain for the transport of food and beverages, fresh produce and pharmaceuticals - within Victoria and interstate.

But he said access to the timber the company – and the state – needs has dried up with the Andrews Labor Government's policies limiting access to timber' along with multiple court injunctions that have locked out harvest and haulage operators in Gippsland and north-east Victoria.

"On top of that, another 40 regional jobs are now on the line in coming days if Labor fails to make timber available," Mr Walsh added.

"The factory would usually be working up to six days a week to produce 70,000 timber pallets per month, but that's dwindled to next-to-nothing and will come to a halt in days without a supply of new logs," he said.

"Demand is through the roof for timber pallets, particularly over Christmas, when supermarkets increase their orders for food and drink.

"But the shortage has also got our farmers worried with the harvest of grapes and stone-fruit requiring a steady supply in the next few months to get fresh produce from the farm to wholesale markets in Melbourne and interstate."

Without production of new pallets, the supply chain will grind to a halt.

The biggest demand for the pallets comes from food and beverage companies like Carlton & United Breweries (CUB) and Mars confectionary, along with all the major supermarkets.

Court injunctions and industry uncertainty, driven by Labor moving early to limit access to timber a decade ahead of its 2030 ban on native timber harvesting, is already stopping the supply of new logs.

### SACK THE SUITS AND GIVE US **MORE BOOTS ON THE GROUND SAYS WALSH**

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Pere Walsh, said "heaven help regional Victoria" if there is another bushfire this summer to match the disaster of 2019/2020.

Government has cut Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) field staff by 133 people.

He said in their place; the Government has introduced 444 new staff - in office positions.

"That money should have been available for seasonal firefighters; who actually save lives; not for yet more bureaucrats shuffling paper around their office, never being available on the phone and having absolutely no relevance when the chips are down," Mr Walsh added.

"We need more boots and fewer suits in regional Victoria - and once again we are being ignored, treated with the usual Andrews' contempt," he said.

Reviewing the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) annual 2020-21 report, Mr Walsh said "this report shows the true focus of Labor's environment management was to cut field staff but increase the number of office-based public servants".

"While this Department also looks after energy, planning and other matters, it is truly alarming the agency which is most responsible for managing our public land; is reducing the focus on work on the ground to instead favouring more office staff," he said.

They also hold a monthly meeting on the second Tuesday of the month at the Rochester Showgrounds from 7 pm that often involves a byo BBQ.


