Hello again Everyone,

We've been reading early newspaper reports of the conditions that faced the farming families who lived in our district more than 130 years ago. The year 1888, though it began inauspiciously, seems to have been an event-filled year. There were happy events like weddings, parties, balls and sports meetings, but there were also crop failures, sicknesses and deaths. Excessive summer heat, wind and lack of rain emphasised the region's need for a massive irrigation scheme to deliver an adequate and reliable water supply. Plans for such a scheme were under consideration, but its cost appeared prohibitive to a government already overwhelmed by the expense of providing education facilities, and railway and communication systems, in the State's rural districts.

A rail link was the other great need for the Terricks plains west of the Campaspe River, and for more than a decade the residents had campaigned steadily for the provision of a line to serve the district. Time and again, their efforts met with disappointment but in 1888, they were ready to try once On 5 May, the Bendigo Advertiser reported: - "A more. petition is about to be taken round for signature, praying for a line of rails, from Gunbower to Elmore. The line is proposed on behalf of the farmers lying between those places, and would serve Bamawm, Pannoobamawm, Pannoomilloo, Torrumbarry, Diggora, and other places on the route, in some cases saving thirty miles of cartage. The Minister of Railways has unofficially admitted the reasonableness of the proposition, and were it carried out, it would certainly be a great boon to the farmers of a large and fertile district."

The Elmore Standard, on 11 May, carried a report of a large and influential meeting held at the Pannoobamawm State School, to seek support for the construction of the Elmore to Gunbower railway line. Mr Joseph Watson chaired the meeting, and the Pannoobamawm Railway Branch League was formed, with Mr G G Orchard being elected as The sub-committee consisted of Crs Hughes, secretary. Rankin, and Allan, and Messrs Jos. Watson, J Orchard, A. Munro, C. A. Yeaman, C. Raper, J. Anderson, J. M'Gregor, John Watson, J. Kidd, J. Crawford, John Steen, J. Winfield, F. S. Reigel, H. Ham, W. Elliott, J. Henderson, P. M'Intyre, G. Turvey, James McAuliff, and R. Nankerville. A subsequent meeting was attended by Mr J T Brown, M L A, who promised his co-operation in the project, and letters were read from Messrs McColl and Highett, M's L A, promising their assistance.

A difficulty, which had very likely contributed to the lack of success experienced by those who led earlier campaigns, lay

in the fact that there were always those people in some part of the region who would mount an opposing campaign; nominating a different starting point, an alternative destination, or a different route altogether. So, it probably did not surprise local district residents to read in the Argus on 19 May 1888, that "A successful public meeting has been held at the Tomara State school, Terricks, for the purpose of advocating the construction of the proposed Boort to Echuca railway.... via Pyramid hill, Terrick Terrick, and Tomara." Once again, there would be divided loyalties, and a division of effort and resources from across the region. On 25 May, the Elmore Standard commented on this latter meeting, noting with surprise that the three Members for Mandurang, having already given support to the Elmore to Gunbower rail campaign, were now reported to have voiced their support for the Boort to Echuca proposal. The Standard's editor commented, "We could have nothing to say against the Boort to Echuca line, if it could be expected that both lines would be conceded in the same bill, but this certainly cannot be dreamed of by anyone who has properly studied the country proposed to be traversed by the two routes." The Pannoobamawm and Elmore Railway Leagues decided to send a deputation to the Minister of Railways on the subject, laying before him their "claims of a sound commercial project."

For the next few weeks, the two railway proposals were widely discussed, with each having its enthusiastic supporters. The Bendigo Advertiser of 26 May 1888, stated that the Elmore to Gunbower line "would pass the whole way through agricultural land of the finest quality, every acre of which is within the irrigation area of the colony... there are no engineering difficulties in the way ... the line would be one of the most inexpensive in the colony, both in construction and maintenance; and the statement concludes with an assurance by the petitioners that it would pay well." In support of the Boort to Echuca line, it was suggested that this could ultimately supply a link to connect Ballarat to Sydney! Some put forward a compromise to the Elmore to Gunbower proposal; an Elmore to Wee Wee Rup line should be provided, and should include a branch line from Tomara to Echuca. Then, there were those who advocated that the various Leagues should combine their efforts and advance the cause of both of the lines being proposed. By the end of May, the people of Drummartin, Minto and Kamarooka had joined in the action, asking that the line start at Bagshot rather than Elmore so that their transport needs might be met.

Campaigning had begun and was far from being over. There'll be more next time,



EULOGY OF MAUREEN ANNE WHITE 02.04.1939 ~ 29.01.2022

Maureen Anne Hendy born on the 2nd April 1939 is the second child to Stanley Charles Hendy and Mary Eileen Hendy. She had an older sister Dorothy who she absolutely adored and a younger brother Clive who passed away as an infant. 5 months after Maureen was born her father was sent to war and she would not see him again for 6 years.

Their family home was at 58 Hornby Street Windsor and the girls were fortunate enough to have their cousins living just down the road at number 44 and they spent many days having adventures and enjoying each other's company every chance they got.

Maureen attended St Mary's Primary School in St Kilda. School was never one of her favourite places she would much rather be off playing with horses, cows, dogs, cats and any other animal she could get her hands on. Maureen had a real love for animals and it didn't really matter what animal, she wanted to take them all home.

Christmas was a special time of the year waking up around 5.00am seeing what Santa had left then Maureen & Dorothy would run down the road to see what Barbara & Gloria received. Dorothy & Gloria were the older siblings with a little more responsibility or maybe more sensible approach to life. Maureen was adventurous and care free, her love for life was unmeasurable approaching life with "it will be alright"..

Barb told me, one day Maureen had a great idea to grab some empty milk bottles, she said they could take one side of the street each and knock on all the neighbourhood doors and say they were collecting money for the red cross. Barb questioned her and remembered what Maureen says, "It will be alright". They knocked on the doors and filled their bottles with money they went home and hid them under a hedge. After many trips to the milk bar eating lollies, chips, milk shakes and anything else they desired the dream life was about to come to a rude holt. Maureen's mother Mary went to the milk bar late that afternoon for some milk and the store owner enquired if it was the girls birthday. Mary replied, "No". "Did you give them some money?" "No". He proceeded to tell her that the girls had been coming in and out all day spending up big. She went home furious and nearly died when the truth came out about how they acquired their riches. Maureen & Barb were told that they would be sent to boarding school, the poor people will have no money to buy for their families. "Go and give the money back now!" A bit hard when you've spent it all. Needless to say they never did it again.

Pop would take Maureen & Barb rabbiting with his ferrets. Once the ferrets were sent down the hole the baby rabbits would run out and the girls would throw handkerchiefs over them and catch them to play with.

The war ended and Maureen's father returned and the carefree life that once was would change forever. Mary, Dorothy, Maureen and Pop moved to live in Daylesford and she loved the wide open spaces of the country. There were many animals and life was good. This only lasted a couple of years as pop became ill and they had to move back to Melbourne.

Maureen left school at 14 and worked in the local milk bar. One day she went to the Glaciarium Ice Skating Facility, City Road, South Melbourne to watch the Raiders play. This is where she would meet a young man named John Raymond Shaw. There was an instant attraction and he asked her out and she said no. John was determined, often visiting the milk bar and said it was love at first sight and, "I'm going to marry you".

At 16 they got married. They had to ask for their parent's permission and they were married in 1955. They lived in a couple of houses in Prahran, one on Williams Road and the other was in Primrose Street.

1957 their first child was born Kerry Anne Shaw, and 2 years later in 1959 a son John Raymond Shaw. They had some wonderful times with sister Dorothy & brother-in-law Werner as these were the first grandchildren.

In 1961 the family decided to have a sea change and move to 34 Bayfield Road, North Bayswater with Maureen's parents. There were only 5 houses on the street so back to country living once more.

In 1965 a bit of a surprise their third child Melinda Ellen Shaw was born

Family holidays were spent in Lakes Entrance and lounging in the beautiful Warrandyte River

Maureen got a job at Robinmond Shoe Factory where she met her beautiful friend Mareta. They had a special bond and often talked about sitting in their rocking chairs on the porch when they were older.

John & Maureen shared a love for breeding and showing German Shepherds travelling to shows many weekends of the year shared with their youngest daughter Melinda. They met many lifelong friends but two in particular that were very special John Borg & Barry Crimmins. There were countless adventures full of love, fun and loads of mischief. It was a great family to be a part of where lifelong friends were made.

Maureen's father passed away in 1983 which saw the family move to 465 Johnson Road, Lockington. Wow! Maureen had finally purchased her own piece of land and it was massive. All 2 acres! You think that way when you come from Melbourne. Cows! There were cows everywhere and she was in her element.

They soon got to meet their neighbours John & Alan who she adored. They taught Maureen how to milk cows and she loved it and would often go over and help. Plus, they had 4 million kittens. Living the dream! Many of the kittens were taken home to become part of the family.

Bootscooting! One thing Maureen loved to do was dance and sing, she was always first on the dance floor and the life of the party. Her boot scooting family have played a big part of her life since moving to the country and she made many wonderful friends. She would often take her children and grandchildren to share her love of dance.

Sadly in 1998 John passed away after a 2 year battle.

A few years later Maureen was at a family gathering and met Paul White. It was secret squirrel for a while there but finally she worked up the courage to introduce him to the family. Paul & Maureen married in 2002 with family and friends attending at John & Melinda's family home in Rochester under a beautiful rose Arbor. The pink rose held such fond and special memories Paul took a cutting and created their own Arbor that still stands in their front garden today.

Maureen introduced Paul to the boot scooting family and they had many years of fun dressing up at annual events and special occasions. They would talk about the costumes they had purchased and plans they had for dressing up the table with great excitement.

Maureen spent many years working for Leo Lyons, and Boots the dog, who used to stand on the roof doing the mail run and she thought he was the best boss ever. She enjoyed his sense of humour and he became a good friend. Paul started helping and they worked great as a team. They enjoyed their involvement in the community. Paul continued working after she left and only finished up recently.

The Jazz Food & Wine Festival in Echuca has always been a highlight that Paul & Maureen shared each year with all the amazing bands, singers & food. She loved to dance & sing and would often ask if we would like to attend. Maureen also loved her garden often propagating plants to share with the family. In their retirement they have enjoyed each other's company and all their fur babies. Jake the dog and 45 cats. Not really, only 4.

Paul on behalf of the family we would like to thank you for the love & support you have shown to our beautiful mother, gram & Nan especially in the past year when her health hasn't been good.

After mum passed I had the privilege of reading a diary she had written documenting facts and many memories years. My car for my birthday was the best present ever that brought her heartfelt joy & the hardships she faced in her life.

Maureen was born in 1939.

In January that year Australia had the Black Friday Bush Fires burning approximately 2 million hectares.

Devastatingly in September World War 2 started and she lived the first 6 years of her life without a father. Her darling mother, Dorothy & herself left alone with no man in the house like so many other families at that time.

fighter planes knowing their location and lived on rations feel and see them for ourselves. Be grateful for what we for 6 long years.

She remembers her brother Clive passing away during the war, a son and brother born, lived & died, their father never getting to meet him.

Mum wrote of her unconditional love for animals "I was animal mad".

On a family day out to the beach she hid a dog in the back of the car under her towel. Halfway home the dog whimpered and her mother turned around and asked what the noise was, she said, "Just me," only to find a dog in the back. Mum said it was lost and sad, "It wanted to come home with me". This happened on numerous occasions throughout her life and until the end her animals were still her babies.

She borrowed (not stole) 3 horses in her life. Her mother would go out in to the backyard and find the horses, lucky they didn't hang horse thieves in my day.

Sunday nights were spent in the loungeroom, Dad played the violin, Mum & Dorothy on the piano and me singing. They were some of the happiest days.

She loved her house and how they knew everyone in the street. Her Gram & Pop only lived 5 houses away with her cousins Barbara & Gloria. Also cousins Margaret, Julie & Anne. She talks about the hardships her Gram faced how she never complained and she approached life with a heart full of love & kindness. She would give all the grandchildren a full moneybox to buy presents for everyone.

The family spent Christmas playing the pianola and lots of singing & dancing.

Her Great Grandmother Maria Murphy was the first white baby born in the Grampians in the 1800's also owning the Shamrock Hotel in Bendigo.

Her grandparents owned a tobacco farm at Pomonal, no wonder I smoked it was in my blood.

Barbara wasn't only my cousin she was like my sister and to this day I hold her dear in my heart.

She talks about the many loved ones that she has seen pass particularly her darling John, mother Mary & sister Dorothy.

Her mother's caring and kind heart and for always loving her just the way she was.

Beautiful Dorothy you were always a lady and the best sister I could ever ask for. You loved me and understood me. We shared a special bond and my heart was never the same after your passing. She will always be in my

Paul you came in to my life and took away the loneliness. We have shared some fun & loving memories over the and I felt like a Queen every time I drove it.

Many of mum's stories are about the unconditional love she felt for us all. If you had the privilege of knowing her you will have felt her love and open heart. The joy it brought to her heart to see us all happy & healthy. That's all she ever wanted for us. She noticed the little things in life that are important and that we should cherish always.

Reading mum's stories of how life was and the hardships they faced has really brought home to us all the importance of nurturing those nearest and dearest to us They had to blacken the windows out at night in fear of all. Elmore Tractor Pull

Saturday March 19th 2022 **Elmore Events Centre**

Gates open from 3pm, for a 4pm start.

The first Australian modified tractor pull was held at the Elmore Field Days in 1976. The Events Centre are excited to be bringing the tractor pull back to where it all began on the 19th March 2022.

The Elmore Field Days committee and St Joseph's Contact: Primary School Rochester are partnering to present this great event, along with Down Under Modified Tractor Pulling Association.

The event sees a modified tractor pull a weighted sled along a 11metre wide, 100-metre long dirt track. As the tractor pulls the sled further along the track, the more forward the weight goes on the sled causing the sled to get harder to pull. When the tractor 'pulls' the whole 100-metre track it is called a full pull.

Tractor pulling is known as most powerful motorsports, due to some tractors in the event having

Japanese encephalitis virus detection near Lockington

Agriculture Victoria is urging farmers to report any unexplained pig deaths, especially in unborn or newborn piglets, following a confirmed detection of Japanese encephalitis virus (JEV) at a single piggery near Lockington.

This mosquito borne disease has also recently been confirmed in piggeries in New South Wales and Queensland.

Victoria's Chief Veterinary Office Graeme Cooke said JEV has not been detected previously in pigs on mainland Australia.

"Japanese encephalitis virus causes reproductive failure in pigs, primarily through stillbirths and piglets that may show signs of central nervous system disease," said Dr Cooke.

"Japanese encephalitis virus can also be transmitted to humans through infected mosquitoes so we are working closely with the Department of Health to understand the implications and risks of human exposure. There is no risk to humans from eating pig meat.

"Horses can also be infected so owners should take precautions to protect their horses from mosquitoes.

"Extensive surveillance activities are underway as well as testing of previously collected samples to better understand the disease situation, and we will also be engaging veterinarians in the pig and horse industries, as well as industry peak bodies, to drive awareness of the disease."

Japanese encephalitis virus is not spread directly from pigs to people, and it also cannot spread from pig to pig.

Symptoms to be on the lookout for include stillbirths and the birth of weak piglets that may exhibit signs of central nervous system disease.

In horses, symptoms include lethargy, nervous signs or sometimes hyperexcitability.

Steps that pig and horse owners can take to protect their animals from mosquitos include the use of mosquito repellents and removing mosquito habitats.

Agriculture Victoria is working closely with animal health authorities nationally and the Victorian pig industry to determine the extent of the spread of this disease, and the appropriate way to protect the Australian pig industry.

Dr Cooke said farmers and veterinarians should remain vigilant for signs of Japanese encephalitis and should report any concerns to the Emergency Animal Disease Watch Hotline on 1800 675 888.

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says a Liberals Nationals government will pour \$30 million into a new Local Shopping Strip Recovery Plan.

"We want business to thrive and our local shopping strips to hum once again, and that's what our plan is all about," Mr Walsh said.

"Only a Liberals and Nationals Government will give businesses the confidence and security to rebuild and recover," he added. "Our program will be a big boost to local jobs and employment to all of Victoria, not just Peter Walsh, right, with Tesla owner Garry Busowski, who businesses in metropolitan Melbourne.

government's 'outrageous' tax on electric cars

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says fuel prices are at record highs - and headed higher - so Daniel Andrews decides to smack electric car owners with more taxes.

Mr Walsh said he has been gobsmacked as concerned owners of electric cars are going to face growing and inescapable tax burdens per kilometre because of the Andrews Labor Government's greedy tax implications.

He said in Parliament, The Nationals have called for the Victorian Government to immediately remove the road tax for driving electric vehicles in Victoria.

"But as usual, with this tax-hungry government, looking to claw back anything to offset the billions it is wasting on major infrastructure project through scandalous financial mismanagement and cost overruns, nobody is listening,' Mr Walsh explained.

"And surprise, surprise, Victoria appears to be the only jurisdiction in the world to tax electric vehicles," he added.

"One minute this mockery of a government is encouraging, even subsidising, Victorians to produce and use renewable energy, and the very next minute is actively discouraging the use and purchase of electric vehicles.

"We recently spoke with a regional family which had purchased a Tesla electric car to do their bit for the environment.

"This family use the electric car on a daily basis; and even though they charge it using their own solar panels; even that cops them a tax from Daniel Andrews Inc."

Mr Walsh said since July 1 last year the Victorian Government implemented a modest distance-based charge applying to Victorian registered zero and low emission vehicles.

He said now electric car users are encumbered by another rapacious grab by the Victorian Government; one that makes them pay for not only road user tax, but now includes an additional tax per kilometre to the Victorian Government – even if you are not travelling in the state of Victoria.

"This isn't just unfair for our electric car owners, it is unconscionable; it is outrageous; and it is so typical of this inept government, which has showed, even to blind Freddie, it has no idea how to be financially prudent and no idea how to manage the state's finances," Mr Walsh said.

"The Nationals will continue to raise these taxation concerns for electric car owners in Parliament," he said.

"Only late last year I was taken for a drive in a top-end Tesla and everything about the electric car ticked the right boxes - its owner Garry Busowski told me he averages a comfortable 400km to the charge but can do much better in the right condition.

"With no emissions either, why would any government try to tax this next-generation transport and force people back onto the finite fuel resource?

"There is no doubt sustainable energy will be just as important to the transport industry as it will for solar powers on the roof of your home - stay tuned, there's a taxation opportunity Daniel Andrews will almost certainly turn to in the near future."

Only days ago, Consumer Affairs Minister Melissa Horne issued a media release that conceded: "Home buyers are finding it increasingly difficult to enter the [property] market with significant demand and rapid rises in property prices providing more barriers than ever before".
