Hello again Everyone,

We've been reading early newspaper reports of the campaign waged in 1888, by local farming families, in an effort to obtain rail facilities to service the plains west of the Campaspe River, our district. Pressure was kept up in the form of petitions, public meetings, deputations and, finally, a demonstration of public support, Pannoobamawm on 5 October 1888. At the year's end, It became a regular occurrence for a small one-day exercise matters had advanced so far that a survey party was due to commence surveying the proposed rail route at the end of December. In the meantime, there were other events taking place in the district.

On Monday, 4 June 1888, the Bendigo Advertiser reported that a cricket match had been played at the weekend "in Mr. Anderson's paddock," at Tennyson, "between a picked eleven from the clubs of the district and 18 mounted riflemen." A later report, in the Kerang Times and Swan Hill Gazette on 13 July 1888, told of a return match, played on 7 July, when "The 'rifles'" - this time playing with a team of 15 men - "were under orders to play in full uniform and the appearance was a novel one. The civilians scored an easy win thus reversing the verdict of the former match."

The recently formed Pannoomilloo Mounted Rifles now competed with the local cricket clubs for the attention of the young men of the district. Similar groups existed at Elmore and Rochester, with regular 'Parades' taking place in all centres. The report about the cricket, which appeared in the Kerang Times and Swan Hill Gazette on 13 July 1888, also stated that an event styled a 'military social,' was to take place to raise funds to enable the newly formed Mounted-Rifle Corps to purchase a target, and continued: - "When it is taken into consideration, the vast utility of this branch of the defence force, as proved at the Langwarrin encampment, the refusal of Government to purchase even a target seems to be savouring of too great parsimony [miserliness], especially in such troubled times as the present undoubtedly are. The breakage of the cables, in itself, seems to have caused a war scare in 'marvellous Melbourne.'

The following details (taken from "History Monash") may explain the 'Langwarrin encampment,' the 'troubled times' and the 'breakage of the cables.' It reads: - "From the early 1860s when Victoria's Volunteer forces were themselves new, there had been concerns that an 'invader' – at different So far, the year 1888 had been a busy one. More next time. times imagined to be French or Russian - could attack Melbourne overland from Western Port. By 1888, as the fortifications at the 'Heads' of Port Philip Bay continued to strengthen, an attack through the Heads became more problematical for any invader, and a theoretical overland

approach to Melbourne became a more likely alternative to attacking through the forts at the Heads. It was partly in response to this thinking that Langwarrin, squarely positioned between Western Port and the Dandenong track access to the inner approaches to Melbourne, gained prominence as a training ground from 1887 when encampments were first held there."

in November of each year to be held on ground over which a potential enemy might be expected to traverse. "In June 1888, it seemed like the real thing was going to happen when the telegraph lines to Europe were suddenly and inexplicably cut off - rumours of war in Europe flew about, fanned by local media. The Victorian Navy and garrison forts stood to their posts and the Militia was alerted. When the reason for the cables being cut - volcanic activity in the Netherlands East Indies [now Indonesia] - became known, the alert subsided." It was a false alarm on that occasion, but in light of such an alarm, the significance of the newlyformed Mounted Rifles becomes more obvious, and it is understandable that one news editor at least, felt that the Government should make some contribution towards the purchase of a target!

Through June and July, the weather on the Terricks Plains turned "bitterly cold, and winterly in the extreme," but little rain fell. On 13 July, the Kerang News and Swan Hill Gazette carried a report from Pannoobamawm, that "The plague of mice and rats has reached us. Many of the hay and straw stacks are completely riddled by the pests." The next edition of this paper, on 20 July 1888, expressed the hope that Spring would bring the much-needed rain. It also reported that the "grand ball and supper to be given by the members of the mounted riflemen of [Pannoomilloo]" would be held "at the granary known by the name of the 'Mill,' belonging to Mr Raper." Then, on 14 August, the *Kerang* Times and Swan Hill Gazette reported that the Military Social had taken place on 30 July. "There were about 130 persons present.... Dancing was kept up till daylight. At midnight an adjournment was made for supper. To add to the enlivening of the proceedings, the riflemen danced in uniform, and their dusky brown clothes formed a pleasant contrast to the black dress worn by the civilians. The ball was a success socially and financially.'

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


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
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
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Celebration of the life of Annice Jensen

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
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In August 1920 an Event was held in Victoria called the Second Peace Loan Aerial Derby, an air race from Serpentine to Melbourne with four competitors, all from the airforce, all serving pilots and all flying identical aircraft, Avro 504K's and officially sponsored by the Australian Federal government. The Peace loan was a fund to support returned service personnel from all three military services.

The East Loddon Historical Society, a small group of motivated, well organised and capable members decided, in the time leading up to the centenary in 2020, that they should organise a reenactment of the event to celebrate the centenary.

Two years after it was first scheduled, the day finally arrived on March 20th 2022. The weather was almost perfect for such an event, light Southerly breeze, high thin cloud and very good public support of around four thousand people. For four days only, a temporary airfield was set up in Russel Mountjoy's paddock 11 kms South of the Serpentine township. Paul Bennett from Brisbane was contracted to run the air show which he did with great professionalism and co ordination. A large contingent of de Havilland DH82 Tiger Moths from all over Australia turned out for the re enactment of the air race. A very fancy trophy was presented to the winning pilots, Graham Bunn and Murray Gerraty after the group of Tiger Moths flew the triangular, 70 mile course. The Royal Australian Air Force, RAAF, was represented by 100 squadron (historical Squadron) and hot air balloon which conducted up and

down rides for the public all day and was extremely popular! The high light at any air show in Australia is always the RAAF aerobatic team, The Roulettes. Flying the Swiss made Pilatus PC21, these most accomplished pilots displayed their amazing flying skills. The Roulettes are based at RAAF East Sale in Victoria. The opening of their display begins by overflying the audience from behind the flight line at a right angle to the runway so that you hear them before you see them! This startled a little group of very small children to their great delight! Their excitement was palpable! Witnessing this brief scene was the highlight of my day. It was also a test of nerve to fly into Serpentine early in the day because of the number of aeroplanes arriving in a short time. About 70 aircraft of various makes flew in for the day. Vintage cars, trucks, motorbikes and tractors were displayed as well. The day went almost without incident. There was a case of heatstroke, the sun was out all day. The catering was very busy. To the organisers, and there were many helpers, congratulations! It was a wonderful success. I know that they are temporarily burnt out ,but this will always be a great credit to them and look good on the resume! Legacy will be the beneficiary of this day.

WALSH SAYS ANDREWS LABOR GOVERNMENT **NEGLIGENCE IS RUINING REGIONAL ROADS**

Peter Walsh, said a new report has confirmed what The Peter Walsh, Nationals have been saying for years - Victoria's statewide road network is a disgrace and makes a mockery of Roads Minister Ben Carroll's claims our road network is now 'safer and smoother'.

Mr Walsh said Infrastructure Australia's Regional Strengths and Infrastructure Gaps report zeroed in on an urgent need to invest more into our state's neglected and crumbling roads.

He said the report showed beyond doubt our road programs are suffering from a "profound lack" of adequate investment in maintenance, which is hampering the freight feet after the implications of Covid-19." transport supply chain, with the network in some regions "not designed to support larger freight traffic".

"Even worse, while we watch our transport network decaying, regional communities are also missing out on the benefits of increased post-Covid tourism and population growth - simply because the country network isn't up to scratch," Mr Walsh explained.

"Any way you look at it, this report should be seen as the blueprint for better connecting communities across the state, defining specific issues in key regions across regional Victoria, such as parts of Victoria including Campaspe, Barwon-South West, Gippsland, Loddon Mallee, Hume and the Grampians," he added.

"The neglect of the rail freight network by the Andrews Labor Government is forcing more truck movements onto local roads, as if they didn't have enough problems without so much more heavy traffic; which are already at the cost of commuter safety.

"Regional Victorians are rightly fed up with the state of our roads. Dodging potholes and crumbling road shoulders, while facing oncoming B-Doubles, is a serious safety concern for motorists and truckies alike."

Mr Walsh said in some regions, and Loddon Mallee is a classic, economic growth and agricultural productivity is being held back because the Labor Government has badly botched freight rail upgrades.

Amendments to double the maximum fine for illegal farm invasion have been blocked in Victorian Parliament by Labor, Greens and Independent MPs.

The Liberals and Nationals proposed two amendments to the Livestock Management Amendment (Animal Activism) Bill 2021 to double the maximum fine for individuals in line with New South Wales' hefty penalty scheme - which is the toughest in the nation - and to protect a farmer's river frontage land.

But late last night, Labor teamed up with the Greens and Independents in Parliament's Upper House to block the changes and instead implement a fine that's among the lowest in the nation.

He said the Murray Basin Rail Project should have been Shadow Minister for Agriculture Peter Walsh slammed the

The Agriculture Minister had two long years to get this right, but with the support of the Greens and Independents, Labor has implemented fines that are among the lowest in the nation."

"Massive Research Project has Uncovered a MASSIVE FAIL IN CHILDCARE ACCESS" SAYS WALSH

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains says ground-breaking new research has confirmed what most families have known for years - childcare services across rural and regional Victoria are a massive failure.

Mr Walsh said new data from Victoria University's Mitchell Institute shows large gaps in the provision of childcare is creating crippling financial and emotional pressure on young families.

He said major hubs across Murray Plains have all the signs of struggling to juggle work/family time.

"Kyabram is the hardest hit community in my electorate - there is barely one childcare place for every five children aged four and younger - the research labelled 96.8 per cent of the community as a childcare desert," Mr Walsh explained.

"Kerang does the best of all - it has a place for almost every second child and its childcare desert percentage is a meagre 3.7," he added.

"In Echuca it is three children for every one place but a relatively low 16 per cent in a childcare desert while Swan Hill, also three to one spot available, struggles with a childcare desert of 73.5 per cent.

"Cohuna is simply a childcare black hole - it has 10 children for every one space and an 87.6 per cent childcare desert according to the research.

"Some of our smaller communities have absolutely no childcare at all - although in some cases, group of enterprising mothers have banded together to offer some private, ad hoc support."

Mr Walsh said the study, which classifies communities as a childcare 'desert' or an 'oasis', depending on the availability of care, shows most local communities are deserts, with either no childcare service or too few places available to meet potential demand.

In the first research of its kind in Australia, the Mitchell Institute has examined access to childcare in more than 50,000 neighbourhoods across the country; and found when it comes to access to childcare, where you live matters.

And, he added, no-one will be at all surprised to see Melbourne and the big cities have the best access to childcare.

"The research confirms what we already knew; to many parents in our region are having to drive their children long distances to access childcare," Mr Walsh said.

"Even our larger towns often don't have enough childcare services to cater for the number of children who live there," he added.

Mr Walsh said while the region was fortunate to have some great childcare providers, many parents could not return to work because they couldn't get care.

"At my office, and when I am out and about the electorate. I often talk to women, in particular, who are struggling to return to work because they can't get their child into care," he said.

There is a direct correlation between the accessibility of childcare and the participation of mothers with a child aged under five years in the workforce.

"Access to childcare is important not only for parents but also to giving children a great start in life.

"Research shows that children who have high-quality early childhood education and care are more likely to succeed later in life," Mr Walsh pointed out.

"It's also an important plank in ensuring we can grow our regional economy. If we don't have these services, young people who want to raise their family in the country will struggle.

"I am committed to working with our communities to improve the access local people have to childcare - that will be a fundamental part of our plans to rebuild and recover."
