#### Hello again Everyone,

We've been reading early newspaper reports of life in our district in 1888. It was not an easy life but, in general, our predecessors rose to meet all of its challenges. Though the lack of rain caused worry, it also inspired efforts to seek the provision of a massive irrigation scheme. Similarly, the poor condition of local roads, and the difficulties encountered in transporting produce and supplies into and out of the region, motivated efforts to obtain rail facilities. The need for an adequate defence force in Australia also caught local attention, and led to the formation of the Pannoomilloo Mounted Rifles. Closer at hand, woes were increased by outbreaks of serious illness like typhoid and diphtheria, and residents of the Terricks Plains experienced their share of burns and injuries due to house fires and accidents. All too often these involved young children.

The early part of 1888 was hot, dry and quite windy but rain in May made prospects more cheerful. Light rain fell spasmodically through late winter and early spring, but late September brought a few thundery showers, some of them reasonably heavy. Hopes for a successful harvest brightened but, by 9 November, the outlook seemed bleak once That week, the Elmore Standard's Piavella correspondent again. reported that "a number of the farmers have already turned their stock into their crops, as they are too poor to expect a profit from them. The dams are drying up fast, and I think in most instances the people will have to depend on deep wells."

Circumstances did not improve. On 20 November 1888, the Bendigo Advertiser reported that the Terricks district was "experiencing heat only to be expected in the middle of summer ... The creeks have ceased running, the farmers' dams in many instances are dried up; many of the tanks which ought to contain water for domestic purposes have been empty for weeks ... The crops can be described in one word - failure ... This season will be a disastrous one, not only to the farmers, but also to the tradesmen and store-keepers." These sentiments were echoed by the Weekly Times of that same week, adding that the situation was made worse by the presence of California thistle, and numerous rabbits except where "Stead's rabbit exterminator" was being used "with great success." [At this stage, it has not been possible to learn just what Stead's exterminator might have been, though it was a machine and is likely to have involved piping poisonous gas into rabbit warrens. It may have some connection with a "David G Stead," who wrote at least one book on the subject of rabbit control in the early 1900s, and who contributed to various other publications concerning the rabbit pest. At one time he was "special rabbit menace commissioner to the Government of New South Wales."]

On 30 November 1888, the Kerang Times and Swan Hill Gazette, made mention of increasing problems for the Terricks Plains: - "Grass is Marg O'Brien.

becoming scarce" and "The district lanes are being eaten down by travelling stock from New South Wales. The course taken is shown by the numbers of sheep that are lying dead at the camping places. Bush fires are raging some miles away; one near Elmore has destroyed about 1000 acres of grass and some fencing." In the Weekly Times on 22 December, the Pannoomilloo correspondent declared: - "What we will have to endure till the end of the summer, if rain does not come in the meantime, is beyond conjecture....There is not a vestige of green herbage to be seen anywhere. ... There is scarcely a drop of water anywhere in the dams or water holes. Water carts are travelling all day to the Pannoomilloo water tank for water for domestic use, and there are also, being driven to the dam, about 400 head of cattle." Just a month earlier, the same correspondent had noted, "I am pleased to hear that the Echuca council has determined to fix a pump on the Pannoomilloo dam — a boon which I am confident the farmers will fully appreciate."

That pump would certainly have been appreciated, but the year still held a surprise. On the 29th and again on 31 December, it rained and correspondence from Pannoomilloo and Tennyson was published in the Bendigo Advertiser on 1 and 2 January 1889. It was too late to help the harvest in any way, but local residents were more than thankful to relate that "the dams and tanks have been well replenished, and all fears of a continuance of the water famine are at an end for this summer." The writers added that "Christmas Day passed off very quietly, the social reunions being most pleasant, the usually absent ones being present at this joyous season of the year, making the homes bright with their presence once again."

Though the reporter for the Weekly Times wrote, on 19 January 1889, "The crops in this district, taken on the whole, are about the poorest I ever remember," local residents embarked on the New Year on an optimistic note. With the survey party commencing their work on the proposed route/s, the dream of having a railway line through the region seemed closer to being realised than it had ever been before. Water worries had eased, at least for the time being, and furthermore, the campaign for a national scheme to provide irrigation for the region was making progress. A large, well-attended, and well-supported meeting, held at Mountjoy's woolshed, Torrumbarry, and reported in the Bendigo Advertiser on 23 January 1889, was chaired by Mr J T Brown M L A, and addressed at considerable length by his colleague, Mr H McColl M L A. Facts and figures put forward indicated that the proposed scheme was practical and feasible. The task now was to convince the Government, and the wider community, of the need and importance of the work, and to urge its early completion. Maybe 1889 could be a year of achievement.





He said he is urging his constituents to submit road "We'll be seeking reports direct from local communities, condition reports as they travel the region via an online portal in an effort to build a list of the roads most in need of maintenance.

"Decades of neglect have left our roads rough and potholed, risking the lives of motorcyclists, car drivers and truckies every single day," Mr Walsh said.

"There have been 76 lives lost on Victorian roads already this year, but Labor is spending less on maintaining and repairing the state's roads network," he said.

"Meanwhile, the Andrews Labor Government has found To more than \$24 billion to pour into plugging its cost overruns on poorly managed major projects.

"If they put aside just \$1 billion of the billions and billions of dollars they have wasted on overruns and delays on Melbourne projects, it would go a very long way towards making so many of our roads so much safer."

Mr Walsh said only a change in Government in November will stop the waste and mismanagement, with a bettermanaged budget delivering savings that can contribute to




