RURAL AID ARRIVES IN LOCKINGTON FOR OUR TOWNS WEEK

Tuesday May 17

Rural Aid's "Our Towns" makeover week has begun in Lockington, with dozens of volunteers starting work on the town's nominated projects.

Lockington is one of 10 towns across Australia chosen to receive \$100,000 to help deliver a range of community-building projects.

Small town expert Peter Kenyon from the Bank of IDEAS worked with Lockington's local leaders and Rural Aid staff to create a Community Development Plan to guide the town's priorities and projects.

43 Rural Aid volunteers are now helping to deliver the plan by completing a number of dedicated projects.

The Rural Aid team is this week working on Lockington's bowls club, Senior Citizens Hall, tennis club, rail trail, heritage centre, boardwalk and pony club.

Lockington local and Our Town coordinator Wendy Sims said the town was buzzing.

"It's wonderful for the Lockington community to see this project arrive," she said.

"It's so satisfying to know that other people have belief in us and see us as important."

Rural Aid works coordinator Grant Miskimmin said the team has been welcomed with open arms by the Lockington community.

"It's a pleasure to help the Lockington community with this project," Grant said.

Hello again Everyone,

We've been reading early newspaper reports of life in our district in 1889. From an agricultural perspective, the weather conditions in the first six months of that year were ideal, and it seemed this would be the first season since 1875 to live up to the expectations of the early selector settlers. According to the *Elmore Standard* on Friday, 5 July 1889, a light fall of snow took place at Pannoomilloo on the accompanied by lightning," on 26 September 1889, as previous Sunday. July was cold but still wet and the crops, though checked by the cold weather, continued to look well.

The social life of the district was looking well, too. On 9 August 1889, it was reported to the Rochester Express by the Pannoobamawm correspondent, that a Mutual Improvement Association had been formed with an initial enrolment of 21 members and, at the local rifle butts, members of the Pannoobamawm Mounted Rifles participated in a contest for a five guinea trophy. Recent weather had been "beautiful," and they hoped that would continue so as to ensure the success of the military ball they planned to hold on 7 August 1889. Presumably, their hopes for that evening were realised but, two days later, the Bendigo Advertiser looked "splendid," though there were rumours of rust and "terrific reported that hailstorm" occurred а Pannoobamawm on 8 August. Otherwise, fine conditions were maintained until the end of the month when heavy rain commenced falling on the evening 29 August, and it was followed by a steady downpour on the 1st and 2nd of September. As a result, the Advertiser reported on 2 September, parts of the district looked like small lakes. The 'lakes' were considerably larger further north.

Early in the morning on 2 September 1889, the Campaspe River overflowed its banks at Echuca and water spread across the plains, "in some places to a depth of several feet," according to the report that was published in the Argus that another railway demonstration, similar to that held in October In fact, severe flooding continued to affect the dav. countryside around Echuca for the following two weeks, with reports appearing in all of the Melbourne daily newspapers. At Pannoomilloo, the steady rain was appreciated but it left the roads "in a pretty plight," according to the report in the Elmore Standard on 13 September. Sadly, that paper also reported the district's most recent loss to diphtheria, the John Anderson Family's youngest child, George.

The weather continued to be bleak - "Wintry in the extreme," wrote the Tennyson correspondent to the *Elmore Standard* More of 1889 next time. on 20 September 1889, but "the prospects were ever brighter from a farmer's point of view." He then went on to say "As Marg O'Brien showing what may be accomplished by energy, perseverance, and good management, even on these

despised arid northern plains, it is very gratifying to notice that the first prize and also the Grand Champion Prize of Australia for the best 140 lbs. of salt butter (suitable for export), was awarded to Mr. C. Yeaman, of Wanurp, at the late National Agricultural Society's Show at Melbourne.'

It was not rain but wind that next struck the district, in a "fierce thunderstorm" that "broke ...with tremendous force, reported in the Bendigo Advertiser. It left a trail of damage in its wake. The chimney of the Terrick Terrick State School was blown down. At Pannoomilloo, trees were "uprooted and torn off about halfway up the stem," and the verandah of Mr Walker's house was lifted and carried 50 yards away, with loose sheets of iron being blown even further. Two tiers of bricks fell from the chimney, which was pulled so much out of line that it would need to be rebuilt. Some local crops appeared as if flattened by a roller. In Pannoomilloo, trees of eighteen inches in diameter were levelled like twigs for a width of about 8 or 9 chains. However, the situation could have been worse, and a report in the Bendigo Advertiser on 16 October, stated that, in most parts of the district, the crops at take-all occurring at Pine Grove.

For a while the campaign for railway facilities in the district had faded from the headlines, but some progress was reported by the Rochester Express, on 9 August 1889. "The flying survey party at present engaged on the route of the proposed railway to Cohuna has got as far north as the [Pannoobamawm] State School. The track has been marked out from Elmore, Bagshot, and Huntly, which are the different points at which it is desired to effect a junction with the main line." Then, on 14 October, the Vigilance Committee at Elmore discussed a proposal from Pannoobamawm that 1888, be held to arrange "for the completion and despatch to Melbourne, of the Heathcote to Elmore Railway petition." If completed this line could provide a shorter route between the Murray River, at Echuca, and Melbourne. This meeting, reported in the Elmore Standard on 18 October 1889, also discussed the provision of cool storage facilities at railway stations in northern Victoria, and cool railway trucks "for the purpose of conveying perishable produce from the sheds to Melbourne.

Like many youth in the area, Bev was a member of the local Social Club going on trips such as to the snow.

Although she didn't like snakes and lizards, frogs were a real phobia and the subject of many gifts - magnets, tea towels etc.

In 1956 it was off to Melbourne to see the Olympics where she had her photo taken with a member of the Hungarian team.

With cousin Margaret and aunt Jessie Dinsdale, they went on holidays to the Sunshine Coast and Tasmania.

Sport was limited in those days but Bev, with Edna, played Basketball/netball in the Bamawm Extension Basketball League playing at Country Week in Melbourne. Bev attended many social dances winning a Belle of the Ball for the Echuca Football League.

The Echuca Memorial Pool had a fundraising queen competition to build the pool. Bev won the fundraising with more than 50% of the total money raised by all entrants. Mr Cliff Spiers was a driving force behind the Bamawm Extension entrant and she always respected him.

Bev was asked to enter the Miss Australia competition, again raising monies. Some of the funds raised were from selling calves and a pony raffle.

As was the trend, Bev made her deb with John Stuart as her partner.

Bev became a nanny looking after local children in their homes; amongst them the Williams', Jaspers, Clymos, Fiedlers and the Coghills. When she first started at the Coghill's she asked a very young Wayne (now known as Pooh), "Where does Mummy keep the tea towel." The answer was pretty definite, "Behind the fridge you bloody The nurse then said, "That's a nice name," so Beverley idiot." That story kept getting told, and laughed at, for decades.

Categorising displays at the Heritage Centre


Finding the 'leak' in the watering system at the Bush Nursing Centre




