Hello again Everyone,

We've been reading early newspaper reports of life in our district in 1889. For the first time since 1875, the seasonal conditions that year were living up to the expectations of the earliest of the selectors. So much rain fell that, at times, the roads were almost impassable, but the residents were so relieved to be without fear of drought that no-one was complaining. In the Rochester Express of 9 August 1889, the Minister for Water Supply, Mr Alfred Deakin, advertised for tenders to contract for the first stages of construction of the "Western Main Irrigation Channel, Goulburn District," so it seemed the dream of a massive irrigation scheme for the change "caused the fire to spread across the properties of plains of Northern Victoria might yet come true.

Winter that year was quite cold, but the crops continued to do well, until October brought a couple of severe thunderstorms which damaged some of them. In the meantime, the social life of the district went on unimpeded. From Tennyson, it was reported by the Elmore Standard on 25 October, that the local Mutual Improvement Association continued to hold successful weekly meetings with a membership now exceeding forty. It was also reported that Private H Scurrah had won a handsome trophy in a recent rifle competition held at the Pannoomilloo butts, reinforcing his reputation as a "promising young shot." On a sad note, the death of Mr. James Scott, a former councillor of the Echuca Shire on 7 January 1890, as "the best experienced for many Council, and a highly esteemed and respected resident of Milloo for the past 10 years, was announced in the Bendigo Advertiser on 8 October, 1889.

Perhaps the major local social event of the year was reported by the Kerang Times on Friday, 13 December 1889. The young people of the Pannoobamawm district had all been caught up in the excitement of preparations for the celebration on 31 October 1889, of the marriage of Mr Around Mitiamo, instances of illness among the district's William Rigby to Miss Sarah Yeaman of "Shadyside." Both children about that time, including an outbreak of 'sandy well-known and popular throughout the district, they were married that day at the residence of the bride's parents, in the presence of a few of the nearest relations. Then, in the evening, the guest numbers swelled "until about 100 ladies and gentlemen were present," and dancing, dining, and general merriment continued "until the eastern horizon showed signs of the coming day.'

The weather damage caused by October's storms was not general but, by 15 November, as reported by the Bendigo Advertiser, prospects for the harvest that season did not look as promising as had been hoped. Weather-damaged crops were already being cut for hay, and others had been infested More of 1890 next time, by rust and/or take-all. On the other hand, conditions for livestock appeared excellent. A report from Mitiamo, in the

Advertiser on 2 December 1889, read: - "Not for many years has the grass grown so luxuriantly, and it is almost impossible, in consequence, to obtain store stock." The writer added: - "There will be great danger of bushfires as the summer advances; indeed, the first bushfire of the season started last Wednesday to the north-east of Mitiamo, but I have not heard that any very serious damage was done."

Two more fires occurred in the district three weeks later; one in Tennyson on 23 December, which started in Mr Patullo's paddock and "spread with lightning rapidity into Messrs Pritchard's and C A Yeaman's grass paddock." A wind Messrs. Martin Bros., J Watson and C A Yeaman. Great difficulty was experienced in saving Messrs Martin's homestead and haystacks." All those named lost pasture and fencing, and C A Yeaman also lost about ten acres of "a splendid crop of wheat." On the morning of 26 December, the second fire broke out on the farm of Mr Thos Davies of Terrick Terrick, and "destroyed the whole season's produce, including haystacks, wheat stacks, standing crop, etc., together with a stripper and winnower." Both fires were reported by the Bendigo Advertiser on 27 December 1889.

With harvesting now completed, the yield of wheat from the Terricks district had been reported in the Melbourne Argus. years," adding that "the quality is also very good." The summer was a particularly hot one, with Tennyson's Bendigo Advertiser correspondent describing the conditions as "day after day, being one continual wave of heat," in his report of 6 February. "The oldest residents declare they do not remember ever experiencing such a long continuation of hot dry weather without a change of some kind."

blight,' were being attributed to the excessive heat, as reported by their local correspondent in the 23 January edition of the Advertiser. He also reported briefly on the wedding "at the Terricks, [of] Miss Jane Davies, daughter of Mr. Thomas Davies, an old and greatly respected resident of the district, [and] Mr. Robert Gamble, son of Mr. Fred Gamble, also a well-known and highly respected farmer of Mologa. ... Owing to family bereavements during the past year, the wedding was very quiet; nevertheless, the young couple carry with them the best wishes for their future welfare from their many friends on the Terricks."



Septic tank cleanout scheme to continue

We are pleased to announce that voting for the Septic Tank Effluent Disposal (STED) system ballot closed on 15 April 2022. With 58% of the votes, the preferred choice was option 2: Coliban Water pays for a septic tank cleanout every three years.

Five customers attended the community meeting held on 6 April 2022. We discussed the history of the STED system and its implications on customers today and addressed concerns about inadequate water pressure in Lockington.

The response was strong, with more than a third of Lockington customers responding. Thank you to those who participated and provided feedback. We will review the program again for the 2028-2033 pricing period.

If you have not had your septic tank cleaned out in the past three years, we encourage you to contact our Customer Support Team on 1300 363 200 to make arrangements.

New booster pump is coming this year

Lockington has experienced water pressure issues, particularly during periods of hot weather when there is increased demand on the network. We are installing a booster pump at the water tank site to improve your water pressure by the end of 2022. The pump is designed to regulate pressure in the network.

To prevent damage to the network, pressure will gradually be increased to an optimal level. We anticipate the pump will be commissioned in late 2022. This work will include looking at how to limit interruptions to the Lockington community in the event of a burst occurring. We encourage the community to report leaks, faults, and emergencies anytime on 1300 363 200.

ANDREWS LABOR GOVERNMENT ROAD SAFETY CUTS CAN ONLY COST MORE LIVES SAYS WALSH

A better deal

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says Victorian parliamentary committee hearings have exposed a savage \$50 million cut to road safety in the Andrews Labor Government's 2022-23 Victorian Budget.

With more cuts on the way.

Mr Walsh says the funds were slashed from the budget despite the state's road toll increasing to 99 lives lost, up from 87 deaths at the same time last year.

He says the Public Accounts and Estimates Committee (PAEC) also heard road safety spending in 2021-22 plunged to \$86.6 million following an expected outlay of \$136.9 million – a 37 per cent cut on projections.

"Concerningly, targets for road safety initiatives have been cut from 73 to 34, pending Federal Government investment," Mr Walsh says.

"With the road toll rising, now is not the time to cut road safety spending - this short-sighted penny pinching does nothing but ring alarm bells and risk more lives," he says.

"Every road death is a tragedy and so many of them are preventable. We need strong investment to drive down the road toll and keep Victorians safe.

"We have no clarity on what crucial projects will not be funded as a result of these broad cuts to funding and the delivery of initiatives.

"Road safety is everyone's business and I urge the government to council elections. reverse these cuts and re-invest in road safety."

Mr Walsh also pushed the Government to take a multipronged approach to road safety, including proper investment in road maintenance and management.

He said Labor has carved big cuts from road asset management for the past two years, to the tune of more than \$200 million.

"The Andrews Labor Government refuses to acknowledge the pivotal role safe and properly maintained roads play in keeping road users safe," Mr Walsh added.

"Human error is a major factor in the road toll, with too many Victorian roads plagued by crumbling shoulders and massive potholes that are a daily danger to motorists," he said.

"Safe country roads save country lives. These budget cuts don't make sense as we watch our road network fall into a state of disrepair.

"The Auditor-General first warned the Labor Government about the declining state of our road network in 2017, these cuts must be reversed and road safety re-prioritised to the benefit of all Victorians.

GOLDEN OPPORTUNITY FOR WOMEN TO PLAN POLITICAL CAREERS SAYS WALSH

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, is urging women across his electorate – and the state - to get involved in the Women Leading Locally: An Opportunity To Step Up program.

Mr Walsh says the program is being delivered by the Institute of Community Directors Australia in partnership with Women for Election.

He says the initiative aims to support more women to step forward and stand for local government elections in October 2024, including in Campaspe, Gannawarra and Swan Hill, which fall within his electorate.

"This is such a vital first step on the path to getting more women to stand for Parliament - state and federal - and I

cannot over emphasise how important it is for the whole community," Mr Walsh says.

"The Institute is the country's leading membership and training body for community leaders, and is an Our Community enterprise, while WFE is a non-partisan, not-forprofit that aims to inspire and equip more women to run for public office," he says.

"Their partnership will begin with a series of face-toface and online seminars to explain more about the program, highlighting the often-invisible work of women leaders across the state and encouraging them to get involved in local politics.

"Seminar participants will also hear how they can play a role in supporting other women into power."

Mr Walsh says he cannot think of a better way to introduce women into the opportunities and possibilities of politics than through a program as diverse and extensive as this one.

He says building a strong group of equally diverse women to contest the 2024 elections will "without doubt" contribute to building stronger councils for Campaspe, Swan Hill and Gannawarra.

"Even better I would look forward to some - or all - of these women considering joining The Nationals to help us ensure we give regional Victorians the support and representation they deserve," Mr Walsh added.

Applications are now open for the 2022 Women Leading Locally Fellowship, which will provide 60 women with the skills, tools, and support to stand for the next local government elections.

With another 60 fellows to be selected next year.

Institute general manager Adele Stowe-Lindner says WLE is targeting applicants from the 30 local government areas where women were most under-represented at the 2020

Ms Stowe-Lindner says they are looking for women from all ages and backgrounds - young women, First Australians women, women who live with disability, from diverse cultural and linguistic backgrounds, and LGBTQI+ women are all encouraged to apply.

"Help us to help you tap into your unexplored potential as women leaders in your community; and like Mr Walsh we encourage you to step forward, step up and help break the bias," she added.


