Hello again, Everyone,

We've been looking at newspaper reports of the time to learn how our families were coping as they settled in this district more than a hundred and twenty years ago. At the beginning of 1890, they were probably feeling optimistic, despite the weather being particularly hot. The harvest just completed had been the best since 1875 and, for many of the selector settlers, the best since their arrival on the Terricks Plains. During the past fifteen years, conditions had sometimes been so harsh that many of the selectors had been forced to abandon their dream of farm life. Of those who persevered, some were now just holding on, in the hope of finding a buyer for their properties so they too, could leave the district.

On 14 February 1890, the Diggora West correspondent wrote to the *Rochester Express:* - "As is general at this time of year, sales are numerous, for, from various causes or reasons, people, like birds, migrate now and then. Some who, through honest toil, have, by studious attention and stern endeavour secured by industry and thrift a pittance for their waning years, break up their homes, and betake themselves to various centres of population, there to endeavour to obtain a much-needed and well-deserved rest from active toil. Others, from a desire to try their fortune in other places, where, with a milder summer climate, they hope to be able to do better than in these northern parts of our far-famed colony. To all I wish "Good Luck" and may each horny-handed son of the soil obtain as a reward, that fortune which honest industry always deserves, but does not always meet with."

Among those who left the district in 1890, was a Mr Fraser of Mitiamo, who had leased his property to a recently married young local man, Mr Robert Gamble, and who intended to go into business "in town," according to the Bendigo Advertiser on 23 January. The Advertiser, on 6 February, carried news that Mr George E Poyser had left Milloo, where he had been teaching, to take up a promotion in Ballarat. That paper also reported on the funeral of Mr Andrew Allen of Pine Grove. The report that "The attendance was the largest ever assembled here" attested to the depth of sorrow felt in the district at his passing.

On 7 March 1890, a correspondent from Piavella wrote to the Rochester Express that January had brought to the district the highest temperatures on record for that month, and owing to the voracity of the invading locusts, which leave "February was but little better." Action was in hand to urge nothing green behind. Many of the paddocks will have to be that a Council dam be sunk on the road leading from Piavella re-sown." Here was yet more to worry the farmers. to the Prairie Railway Station, "which would prove of incalculable benefit in a dry season." February brought cooler weather and a little, though not enough, rain. The

report from Diggora West in the Express on 14 February, stated that "Rain is much needed, as the supplies of water are fast becoming scant, and many hundreds of cattle and horses are daily being driven to the council tanks." On 21 February, there was news of a fire scare in Rochester, caused when a Diggora farmer took the chance of burning off his stubble despite the heat. It was not until 18 March that relief was obtained when there was a fall of rain, patchy unfortunately, but in excess of 1 inch [25 mms] in some places.

Roads were a little wet but not impassable, and social The Pannoobamawm Mutual activities went ahead. Improvement Association now had more than sixty members on its roll, and regular meetings were well attended, mostly by the young men of the district. The Mounted Rifles were also well supported, and members of the Pannoomilloo group took part in a parade at the Back Creek butts on 26 February 1890. The Elmore Standard reported on 28 February, that "The men were put through a number of skirmishing and other field movements, which, on the whole, were very creditably executed."

Agitation to acquire a rail service through the district seemed to have stalled, and many of the residents of Diggora and surrounds had recently submitted a petition to the Railway Commissioners, requesting provision of a siding on the Bendigo-Echuca line between Elmore and Rochester. In the absence of a line through this district, they thought such a siding could reduce the distance they were presently obliged to cart their produce for dispatch to market by rail, but their request was denied, according to the Elmore Standard on 4 April 1890. On 18 April, a correspondent from Pannoobamawm, wrote to the Rochester Express that members of the Railway League in Cohuna were reactivating their campaign, as were those people interested in promoting the campaign to construct a line from Boort to Echuca. The writer urged prompt local action, feeling that, having almost succeeded in having the Bendigo-Kerang line "carried from Elmore instead of Eaglehawk, some years ago," a push for provision of a line from Elmore through the Terricks districts should now "have a prior claim."

Weatherwise, the "few refreshing showers" of rain reported by the Pannoobamawm correspondent to the Rochester Express on 16 May 1890, were welcomed "but more rain is badly wanted. In many places the young crops were above the ground, but ... they have in many instances, disappeared

A better deal

Murray

SAYS WALSH - YOU PAY MORE TO GET MUCH LESS The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains,

Peter Walsh, says Victorian households and small businesses are once again set to pay the price for the failures of the Daniel Andrews Labor government.

Mr Walsh says Victoria has been taken from lockdowns to now blackouts as our failed energy system struggles to keep the lights on.

He says the impact of rolling outages will be bad enough in homes but will be crippling for small and medium sized businesses across his electorate of Murray Plains.

"In January three years ago, 200,000 Victorian households had their power cut off during heatwave conditions due to insufficient energy generation," Mr Walsh explained.

"Yet here we are, three years down the track, and headed for a similar scenario - except this time we get to freeze instead of swelter," he says.

"Even worse, warnings from the energy market operator of impending blackouts come as Victorian households and small businesses brace for a power bill increase of almost 20 per cent in the next few weeks."

Mr Walsh says Daniel Andrews' mismanagement of the energy market will result in classic Labor party economics - we will be paying more for less, higher power bills for "By locking up gas supplies and mismanaging energy less reliable power.

"For years Daniel Andrews has failed to act to shore up Victoria's energy supplies and Victorians are now left paying the price," he added.

"Victoria will never recover and rebuild if we can't even keep the lights on and power bills low - we're being left behind and left in the dark."

Mr Walsh says by locking up gas supplies and mismanaging energy production, the Andrews Labor Government has pushed the Victorian power network to crisis point.

"Instead of blaming everyone else, the Andrews Labor Government should take responsibility and act to keep power prices low."

WALSH SAYS POWER SOLUTIONS ARE RIGHT IN FRONTOF THE PREMIER'S FACE - AND HE CAN'T SEE THEM

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says the Victorian Parliamentary Inquiry into Renewable Energy has failed to acknowledge the positive contribution waste-energy and hydrogen can be for Victoria to achieve its net-zero commitment by 2050.

Mr Walsh says the Liberals and Nationals released a minority report in Parliament to address the shortcomings in the Inquiry Committee's majority report.

"That's why it's so disappointing to see Labor and its Independent lapdogs failing to consider all renewable energy options and outcomes other technologies can make," he says.

"Our minority report recommended Victoria should be leading the way when it comes to manufacturing components for wind and solar.

"At the same time Victorian households and small businesses are set to pay more, for less reliable power, as Daniel Andrews' failed energy system struggles to keep the lights on."

Mr Walsh says currently just 11 per cent of the components of these technologies are manufactured in Australia, with the remaining 89 per cent being imported.

He says this narrow focus is pushing our renewable energy production outside Australia and leaving our local manufacturing behind.

"It's time we replace imports in a sensible way to transition communities impacted by power station closures.

"I genuinely hope the Federal government works within its means to ensure in the future, our children and grandchildren and the generations to come can all live in a stable and sustainable environment."

Mr Walsh says there is a structured and sensible way forward and the Liberal Nationals have spelt it out.

"That's why we are calling on the Andrews Government to introduce bonds for large-scale solar energy facilities," he added.

"Victoria is being threatened with widespread blackouts, just as we head into a cold winter, when so many people, including our older neighbours, the income stressed and, let's be honest, small business, will all suffer and pay the price for these failures.

'So how does this Premier and his government explain that to the millions of Victorians who will be the losers because he gambled on the state's future and got it so horribly wrong?

"Victoria will never recover and rebuild if we can't even keep the lights on and power bills low.
