We've been looking back at early newspapers to learn the story of our district from the Selection Era until Lockington was gazetted as a township. The provision of railway services in the region was vital to its over-all development, and of particular significance to Lockington, but the rail lines took many years to arrive. In the meantime, the weather and its effects provided the main topic of local conversation. On 27 June 1890, the Pannoobamawm correspondent to the Rochester Express wrote: - "Less than four months ago we were grumbling loudly about the heat and want of rain! Now the complaint is that the roads are almost impassable on account of mud and slush.... Crops are coming on nicely on high and dry land, but all swampy ground is under water, and so is the young crop. The paddocks are just like a pulp." The wet weather continued, which was something unusual on the Terricks Plains. More than an inch [25 mms] of rain fell in the first week of July, and the Tennyson correspondent to the Elmore Standard commented on the situation in his report published on 11 July, stating that they had recorded "a total of 11 inches and 18 points [283.97 mms] since the beginning of the year ... June, 350 pts [88.9 mms] - the highest June rainfall recorded for fifteen years ... Crops of all kinds are, generally speaking, looking well, and are making good progress. Feed is also plentiful, and all kinds of stock as a rule, are in forward condition."

The "heavy" roads did disrupt the social scene a little. The quarterly elections for the Pannoobamawm Mutual Improvement Association had to be rescheduled, but there was an attendance of "upwards of 30 members' when they were held on 28 June 1890. There is also a large area of good land beyond the end of the line, the owners of which would be accommodated thereby."

Everyone waited anxiously for the outcome of the Railways Construction Bill's passage through Parliament, but there had been a hitch. There will be more about that next time.




