Hello again Everyone,

We've been looking back at early newspapers to learn the story of our district from the Selection Era until Lockington was gazetted as a township. The provision of railway services in the region was vital to its over-all development, and of particular significance to Lockington, but the rail lines took many years to arrive. However, the situation was looking very hopeful when the Elmore-Tomara railway extension was included in the Railway Construction Bill in June 1890. The Bill was presented for its second reading in the Legislative Assembly on 15 July 1890. Writing to the *Elmore Standard* on 23 July, the Tennyson correspondent said, "The local residents are in ecstasies at the inclusion of the Elmore to Gunbower line in the amended schedule. (Gunbower had replaced Tomara in the second reading). That a railway is needed in these districts none can deny. The starting point, however, is the crux. Elmore is the scheduled point, but Rochester, Bagshot, Goornong, and Huntly all lay claim to the honour of having the junction.

However, beyond our district not everyone was ecstatic, or even pleased with the Railway Construction Bill. Mr Gillies' tone as he introduced it was one of confidence and optimism, but he was proposing that the Government borrow £12,000,000 to cover the cost of building the new lines. Already, £34,000,000 had been borrowed to pay for railway lines, and it had been found that many of them were not warranted, were under-utilised, and were not paying. Across the State, this latest Bill caused concern, and it was hotly debated in Parliament for weeks. The people of our district must have realised that their hopes might be dashed again, but they could only wait for the outcome. In the meantime, in August 1890, unsettled weather prevailed on the Terricks Plains, in a year that had been the wettest since 1875. Nevertheless, social activities were still taking place.

On 1 August, a very successful bachelors' ball was held at Pannoomilloo, with about a hundred couples present. Reporting on the event, the Tennyson correspondent to the Bendigo Advertiser of 9 August, noted that a return ball sponsored by the married men was "spoken of" and a military ball was also "on the tapis." On 30 August, "a largelyattended meeting was held at the (Pannoobamawm) State school to consider the advisability of erecting a public hall, and forming a library in connection with the Mutual Improvement Association. Cr. R. Allan was voted to the chair. It was resolved that a hall should be built. A site was chosen (kindly given by Mr Seiersen) adjacent to the proposed line of railway from Elmore to Tomara." committee was appointed to begin the process and a Marg O'Brien. subscription list was opened.

On 5 September 1890, the Elmore Standard reported on a "dismounted parade of members of the 1 Company Victorian Mounted Rifles," held at Bendigo on 3 September, and attended by members of the Pannoomilloo group. "Several officers from headquarters were expected, but owing to their being detained in Melbourne in connection with the strike, they were unable to put in an appearance. The men were kept hard at work for about three hours, during which time they were exercised in the new form of attack, skirmishing and company drill. Subsequently they held the usual company dinner ... The men returned to their homes in the evening." The strike mentioned in that news item was the Australian maritime dispute. A meeting of the strikers had been arranged to take place in Melbourne on 31 August, and some of the Victorian Mounted Rifles had been held in reserve there to provide support if the gathering became violent. Fortunately, the meeting remained orderly and the forces were not called in, but the officers had still been unable to be present at the Bendigo exercise.

The Pannoomilloo Mounted Rifle Club held its annual Ball at the Old Mill in Tennyson on 8 September 1890, as reported by the Elmore Standard on 19 September. The venue was "appropriately and tastefully decorated with flags bearing various devices and mottos, and evergreens. The attendance was very good, numbering between 80 and 90 couples, including visitors from Rochester and Dingee and all the surrounding districts. The music was in the hands of Messrs. Joyce and Humphries, and the catering supplied by Mr. H. Barrett, of Rochester, while Mr. J. Hodge acted as M.C. in his usual able style." However, the Mounted Rifles still had a serious role to play as the strike continued, and September 1890 saw more than 28,000 workers taking part. On 15 September, the Bendigo Advertiser reported that more than thirty members of the Mounted Rifles - including some from Pannoomilloo - "passed through Sandhurst by train on Saturday morning en route for the metropolis where they will replace a number of men from the western district who have been on duty in Melbourne in connection with the strike."

Apart from the slight involvement of the Pannoomilloo Mounted Rifles, the strike appears to have made very little impact locally. On 4 October 1890, the *Leader* noted that, despite there having been "an impression that shearing had barely commenced in Victoria, it may be of interest to know that on several of the larger station properties in this [Northern] district, shearing is nearly finished.... No intimation of any strike has been received.... Nothing has been heard of a strike." That must be all for this time. 'Bye



After October 1991 after a long period fighting the big 'C'. finishing schooling, Bruce worked for the Carnation Milk Company at Merrigum for a time.

In 1963 Bruce married Rita Ross from Lockington and they purchased a dairy farm not far from the family property at Bamawm. Margaret married Rita's brother, Ken, and both their first born were born on the same day. All the children were born at the Rochester Hospital, three boys and one girl. While here on this dairy farm they purchased a 4WD, and with Rita and the 4 children we

joined up with some friends from .S.A. on a camping trip around the eastern part of Australia and Queensland.

While on this farm at Bamawm there is one incident I can recall. Most farms had overhead fuel tanks near their dairies then, at this time rumours were rife regarding fuel thieves in the area. Well, this night Dad heard a vehicle go past the house to the dairy, it could not be the Carnation milk tanker as he had picked up the milk earlier. Dad thought it must be a fuel thief and picked up his shot gun, let off two shots in the air and ran to meet it as it drove out. HOWEVER, as the truck approached, he could see it was a Murray Goulburn tanker who had pulled into the wrong farm. The driver stopped and carefully exited his truck, then said 'it's not my day, I have just arrived from New Zealand, I've been bogged, I got lost and then some silly fool in underpants tries to shoot me!

Another story worth telling is about our holiday to Kingston SA by the sea. We took our speed boat to do some skiing and fishing. We had a very good few days fishing, netting many gar fish. My uncle Don, who had a pilot's license, together with other in the family decided to fly to Kingston to spend some time with us. When it was time for them to leave, we gave them a large bag full of garfish to take back with them, we had too many to store ourselves. They placed the bag of fish in the aeroplane and took off East. As they approached Charlton, they came across a bad thunder storm and had to find a place to land. After three years here, he moved back to the Barossa Valley in SA, with his new friend from Echuca, Myrtle Taylor. They both loved country music and decided to join the Barossa Valley Community radio station to play and promote Australian Country Music. Their program became very popular, it was suggested they form a committee to organise a series of country music events to raise money for Cancer Treatments. As a result of this they were able to donate \$20.000 to the Anti-Cancer Foundation of S.A.

After several years here Dad and Myrtle decided to return to Victoria to retire. Not long after they arrived in their new home in Rochester, Myrtle and Dad set off on a caravan holiday. Travelling north through central Australia and then to Queensland, down through NSW and back home. Bruce's first long stay on this holiday was at Mataranka in NT, where he got a position working on a water melon farm driving tractors for a couple of months. Next they travelled to Darwin where they did some fishing, which he loved. After a few weeks they headed for Normanton in Queensland for a tour on the Gulflander railway. Their next stay over was at Borumba Dam to fish for Bass. They caught up with us in Brisbane, before making a B line home to Rochester.

After returning from this holiday Dad decided to become a volunteer member of the Rochester State Emergency Service. He continued with the SES for ten years, and awarded long service medals. About this time he decided to expand his interest in radio communications. After some study he obtained his Amateur Radio Licence enabling me to talk to various other amateurs all over Australia and the World.

Darren lives in Kyabram and is also involved in this hobby. Each year Darren and Dad assisted the committee of the Southern 80 Ski Race by operating the two way radios in the control room at the finish line, to communicate with the safety boats stationed at various locations along the river.

Unfortunately, after a prolonged battle with illness, Myrtle passed in 2019. Dad never really got over this loss and struggled with depression in the years that followed.

He loved to visit his three sons, daughter, grandchildren and the 3 great grandchildren when he could, but it was not easy visiting one's family interstate during the COVID lockups.

Dad went on a Probus outing some time last year where he met Merle. He took on a new hobby and together with Merle he loved playing indoor bowls. He was an active member of the RSL Bowls Club and enjoyed the social life at various clubs around town. He still went fishing and touring when he could and he looked forward to the occasional visit to Merle's farm, at Elaine near Ballarat.

24 July 2022 Hydrogen master plan lifts hopes for sustainable future says Walsh




