

Hello again Everyone,

We've been looking back at early newspapers to learn the story of our district from the Selection Era until Lockington was gazetted as a township. From 1876, the local people campaigned for the provision of railway services which would be vital to the over-all development of the region, and of particular significance to Lockington. Time after time their efforts met with disappointment, but the situation was looking amended to Elmore-Gunbower) railway extension was included in the Railway Construction Bill introduced in Parliament in June. The Bill was presented for its second reading in the Legislative Assembly on 15 July 1890, but it did not meet with the support it needed. For weeks afterwards the matter was debated in Parliament.

On 17 September 1890, after lengthy discussion, another Bill was passed through the Assembly. This time, it was to appoint a Select Committee to take expert evidence upon the question of the cost and merit of the lines contained in the Railway Construction Bill, and possibly on the cost of other lines which had been surveyed by the Railway department, but which were not included in the Bill as introduced in June. This new Bill was then sent to the Legislative Council where further debate took place. The Bill, to appoint a Railways Standing Committee, was eventually passed and returned to the Assembly on 8 October, to await the assent of the Premier and the Minister of Railways), moved to relegate the proposals – as stated in the original Bill – to the Standing Committee, and this motion was carried. It was also proposed that the Standing Committee investigate the potential for other railway lines, including one from Huntly via possibility, but it would not happen soon.

In the meantime the local people got on with their lives. On 14 October 1890, the Milloo correspondent wrote to the Bendigo Advertiser, "I am glad to be able to chronicle a nice fall of rain that was much needed by the farmers to refresh the crops. The rain will also do good to those who have not finished their fallowing. At present grass is abundant everywhere, and stock is in good condition." Favourable weather continued through to the year's end, and early in January 1891, the Milloo correspondent wrote to the Bendigo Advertiser describing nice cool conditions such "as has not More about 1891 been experienced for some years past." Hopes of a successful harvest were dampened by the appearance of locusts in the district, first reported to the Advertiser on 26 November 1890, by correspondents from both Milloo and

Tennyson. Then, on 10 January 1891, the Tennyson correspondent wrote again to say that "A large proportion of the crops were cut with the reaper and binder, on account of the locust plague, by which a considerable amount of damage was done." He added that "The orchards and gardens have suffered greatly ... In some gardens not a green vestige being left by the pests."

Once more, hopes of an abundant harvest had been dashed hopeful in mid-1890, when the Elmore-Tomara (later and, as the Tennyson correspondent wrote to the Advertiser on 13 January 1891, farmers on the northern plains at last realised that they must diversify if they were to make farming a paying proposition. In evidence of this, the writer mentioned that there was a growing local interest in dairying, given impetus by the fact that "Several cream separators are now in use in the district, and recently Messrs. Brown and Chambers started a creamery at Tennyson." To further illustrate where diversification was occurring, correspondent added that "Most of our local farmers are devoting considerable attention to pig and poultry raising, and with very satisfactory results."

Yet another alternative was suggested by the Advertiser's Rochester correspondent on 22 April 1891, when he wrote: -"The possibilities of profit to farmers out of their ground are by no means confined to wheat or other cereal culture. I have just returned from a tour through the districts of Milloo and Pannoomilloo, in the course of which I observed that some On 22 October 1890, Mr. Gillies (Victoria's settlers are paying considerable attention to the growth and preserving of apples and other fruits. Notwithstanding the havoc made amongst the trees by locusts during the past season there is still a large crop of apples, which at their present market price it would not pay to send to Sandhurst or other large centres of consumption, and which in their natural Kamarooka to Tomara, and one from Bagshot to condition it would be almost impossible to preserve for any Waragamba. So, a railway line through our district was still a length of time. Mr A Munro, of Pannoomilloo, seems to have got over this difficulty, and by the use of an ingenious machine the apples are pared, cored, and cut up into long spiral ribbons, which are then threaded on strings, and hung up in any convenient dry place. In this condition the apples will keep for any length of time, and still retain their flavour, it being only necessary to place the ribbons in warm water to restore them to their original softness. That fruit can be so easily and inexpensively dried and preserved may be news to some of your readers who can find no present profitable market for the produce of their orchards.'

the 2nd child of Edwin and Natalie Chappel (nee Harry), with Edwin (known as Eddie) and Natalie having 5 children as follows, Shirley, Patricia, Jean, Joseph and Douglas (with dear Uncle Doug passing on only a few weeks ago).

Mum grew up in Pinegrove on a farm with cropping, cattle grazing and a few pigs. Horses back then were also valuable in farming life. Life on the farm was busy for mum in her early years where she spent a lot of time outdoors, in particular milking the cows, often before and after school.

Growing up in the depression and WWII era was a difficult time for the Chappel family and Mum used to and having to go back to horse and gig to get around.

Mum did her primary schooling at Pine Grove and then Mum served as a: went on to Echuca Technical School where she boarded in Echuca. There, she went to year 10 and spent the final years of her schooling learning how to sew. That was how it was back then, Mum tells us, there weren't many other options available for girls.

Mum always had a mischievous side and she tells of a situation in her younger years she and her siblings thought their postman was too late, too often. They would ride their bikes down to the post box to wait for the mail. So, one day they decided to teach the postie a lesson about timeliness and poked his hat off with a stick. Anyhow despite the prank somehow the mail still got delivered.

Mum enjoyed playing sport, especially tennis and also worked at a general store in Mitiamo. Then she got a job in the telephone exchange in Rochester and boarded with her Aunty Clara (Grandpa Chappel's sister). Mum did very well at the Rochy telephone exchange and also worked on the telephone exchange in Melbourne during the 1956 Olympics.

A certain Joseph Glass came on the scene when Mum by the way. was in her 20's, they noticed each other at Badminton and after a somewhat long courtship, were finally engaged. Mum and Dad were married on 31 August 1963 at the Kotta Methodist church. Soon after children arrived

(Wesley in 1964, Murray 1966, David 1969 and me in 1971).

Mum was well equipped to cope with the harsh demands of farming and young family life having experienced the hard work required to work a farm in her childhood. She was always very approachable and while our house was very much "lived in" with a lot of stuff around our home environment was good, as Mum and Dad worked well together.

We enjoyed visits from friends, relatives and neighbours who would pop in. Mum would always have enough to go around if someone dropped in at a meal time and was very hospitable, often making cakes and casseroles for others, with plenty for everyone. Christmases too were always fun with Mum's big extended family and we always enjoyed meeting up with other Chappel or Harry descendants in various reunions and get-togethers.

Mum loved shopping and especially enjoyed the Op shops. One time she bought a pair of shoes at the Op shop and proudly showed them off to me (when she got home). However unbeknown to Mum at the time they were the same a pair of shoes I had donated a few weeks ago. When I mentioned this Mum didn't really mind as it was also about supporting charities anyway.

Patricia Jane Chappel was born on 14 November 1932, We had several visits from Dad's extended Glass family coming out from England which always caused much excitement. Mum very much loved to see her English relatives as well, and loved everything about England.

> In the hot summer months Mum (along with all of us family) enjoyed getting in the irrigation channel at home to have a cool off or swim. One day Mum decided she would cool off and left her kit on the channel bank, thinking she would be really quick so she would just go in the "raw prawn". A few minutes after Mum had got into the water, the water Bailiff turned up in his ute. Luckily for Mum there were some long reeds nearby so she was able to take cover, although she had to wait there longer than she would have liked.

All drums for disposal must be plastic or metal, one litre to 205 litres in size, at least triple rinsed until free of any visible chemical residue, clean and dry, punctured if metal and have all lids removed.





<u>Labor plans to phone a friend</u> for November's election says Walsh

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says while many areas across regional Victoria remain trapped in mobile blackspots, some forced to live with no mobile coverage since the switch from analogue, the Andrews Labor Government is happily subsidising mobile phone upgrades in Melbourne suburbs.

Mr Walsh has described the subsidies as a slap in the face for all regional Victoria and he is appalled Daniel Andrews would be focused on shoring up inner city votes by once again dipping into taxpayer funding when improving regional coverage is far more urgent.

He says pretending there is a need to get more city voters onto 5G coverage when large parts of the rest of the state – in some of the world's most fire-prone locations – have no reliable coverage is a disgrace.

"It is just not right that Labor has allocated much of its \$300 million Connecting Victoria mobile service program to city areas when country communities are still crying out for any mobile phone coverage," Mr Walsh says.

"Any reasonable person would think the bushfires in 2019/20 demonstrated only too well the many examples of telecommunications failures and black spots," he says.

"It will be galling to many who live in black spot areas that the government is investing in city coverage upgrades when they have none at all.

"In my electorate, for example, just the 20-minute drive from Echuca to Rochester leaves a handheld phone with no service for at least a third of the trip, that's just

ridiculous in this day and age that a short trip between two towns should mean a communications blackout."

While telecommunications are a Federal concern, State Governments in recent years have provided some subsidies to help leverage further investment from the Commonwealth and telecommunications companies in regional Victoria.

But Mr Walsh says it is astounding the Labor Party thinks we need to subsidise mobile phone coverage upgrades in places such as Werribee and Point Cook over and above country areas with no coverage.

He says a quick glance through the government's Connecting Victoria tender documents indicates a significant bias towards city areas that should be highly commercial for private companies to invest in, and taxpayer funds should be saved for those areas of country Victoria that don't attract commercial attention.

"The Andrews Labor Government has tender documents that indicate precincts of strategic importance to it, and these include places such as Richmond, Brunswick and East Melbourne," Mr Walsh says.

"I'm on the road all the time and like many regional people, I know where the blackspots are but you can't avoid them all," he says.

Mr Walsh says The National's 25 per cent Regional Infrastructure Guarantee will ensure taxpayer dollars are spent fairly across regional areas and Melbourne.

"The Nationals will ensure country people get their fair share, and we need to remember this November that Labor will only ever focus on the city," he added.

"And it struggles to get that right."


