Hello again Everyone,

We've been looking back at early newspapers to learn the story of our district from the Selection Era until Lockington was gazetted as a township. From 1876, the local people campaigned for the provision of a railway service which would be vital to the over-all development of the region, and of particular significance to Lockington. It seemed they were close to success when the Elmore-Gunbower railway extension was included in a Railway Construction Bill before Parliament in mid-1890, but the Bill did not meet with support. Another Bill was passed on 8 October 1890, to appoint a Railways Standing Committee to take expert evidence on the question of the cost and merit of the lines contained in the Construction Bill, and of other lines which were not included but which had been surveyed by the Railways department. These latter included a line from Huntly via Kamarooka to Tomara, and one from Bagshot to Warragamba, so it seemed there was still a chance that a rail service to and through our district might yet While the farmers were proceeding with their work, the newlybecome a reality.

So 1890 passed and life continued much as usual. Though not a drought year, 1891 brought with it anxiety about the weather and the coming harvest. Initially, it was hot and dry, but April brought sufficient rain to enable tilling and sowing. Crop growth was set back by frosts in the mid-year, but welcome showers fell throughout late June and all of July, with beautifully fine weather to follow in early August. Heavy rain later that month and into September caused problems to the district's roads, but the crops continued to do well. Despite some unseasonably hot days in late September, good rains then fell throughout October and November, but they brought a drawback. In Diggora, Warragamba and Pannoomilloo, a little too much rain damaged advanced crops and, once again, the year's end saw the district's grain-growers feeling uncertain of the season's outcome.

However, for some there was an alternative. The Bendigo Advertiser 's Tennyson correspondent had been among the first in the district to note local developments in the dairy industry, in a report he wrote on 13 January 1891. By 13 April, he could report to the Advertiser that trade at the local creamery was increasing and that "others are on the tapis in various parts of the district." The Elmore Standard noted that several creameries in the Tennyson district were "generally giving every satisfaction," and on 24 April, the Standard reported that "Messrs. Brown and M'Intyre have now in working order, and in course of completion, creameries at the following places:-Terrick Terrick, Nanneella, Corop, Milloo, Bullock Creek, Diggora, Mitiamo, and Macorna, in addition to two other parishes." A longer report appeared in the Australasian, on 2 May 1891. "Rural Topics and Events -Creameries are starting in every direction.... The Mitiamo

correspondent of the Bendigo Independent narrates how "Mr Pentreath has for almost 12 months had a De Laval separator, and all the latest machinery for dairying, but yielding to the request of his neighbours he has decided to give them all the advantages of a creamery, and is about to increase his plant, with the object of buying milk from all comers. Mr Sims, of Pine Grove, has a very large steam creamery, and ... is doing well. Mr Jewell is a believer in the Alexandra separator, but has had bad luck so far, as the machine pulley broke soon after starting, and he has had to come to a standstill... A still larger creamery is being built for a company at Terricks East, and as there are a number of dairy farms (in winter) in the vicinity ... it will prove a boon to the people and a successful speculation for the promoters." On 11 June, the Tennyson correspondent wrote to the Bendigo Advertiser that the local creameries were "doing a thriving and very satisfactory business."

appointed Standing Committee on Railways had also made progress and, on 10 April 1891, the Bendigo Advertiser announced the schedule for the committee's inspection of the rail routes proposed for our local region. Arriving in Echuca from Melbourne on the evening of 14 April, the committee would take evidence at the Borough Council Chambers, Echuca, at 9 a.m. The plan was to then travel to Cohuna, back from there to Gunbower, to Tomara, to Pannoobamawm, to Elmore and to Sandhurst, gathering evidence along the way, but it rained and the roads were in such poor condition that the committee cancelled their itinerary and returned to Melbourne from Echuca on the 11 05 a.m. train on 15 April. Another plan was drawn up and I'll tell you about that, and the evidence they gathered at Echuca and the other centres, in a future Locky News.

In the meantime, news on the local front had been mixed Parishioners of St David's Church of England, Milloo, had successfully held the district's first-ever "Sale of Gifts" in Mr Gladman's granary; Mr Moseley, who had been in charge of the St David's parish had left for England; Mesdames Lyons and Monahan of Terrick Terrick, were taking up a collection for an altar to be erected in the Terrick Terrick Catholic Church in memory of Father McGillicuddy, who died in 1889; and Tennyson could report that an "enjoyable entertainment and ball" had been held at Mrs O'Brien's large hall. Other local news was of a sad nature -Typhoid had taken the life of Mr Moriarty of Terricks East, leaving his grieving wife and a large family of young children; and Charles Spence, the son of Mr A. Spence of Milloo, had died as a result of injuries he received while participating in the Drummartin Races.

Eulogy Betty Mustey (nee Chapman)

Betty Helen Chapman was born at Mrs. Blacks in Rochester on the 18th of July 1933 to Bill and Emma Chapman. She was the second child born to the family, being a younger sister to her brother Geordie. Bill and Emma ran the family farm in Lockington, that is now owned by Steve Prewett.

When school beckoned, Betty attended Lockington Consolidated up until the completion of the 8th grade, before going on to spend a year at the Echuca Technical School.

After her schooling was completed, Betty started work, at the tender age of 14 years, in a café owned by Al and Glad Rose and later in the same year, Betty started working at Parson's grocery store, where she remained for 6 and $\frac{1}{2}$ years. Parson's store is now known as Giddings Foodworks.

It wasn't all work for a young Betty; she loved her sport and her sporting club involvement. Betty enjoyed tennis and basketball, now known as netball, for Bamawm.

Fit and active, Betty would ride her bicycle to her cousin Jean Haines home, whereupon they would take her to the venue for playing netball. It was not unusual for Betty to also ride that bicycle to Bamawm from Lockington.

In 1954 Bill and Emma Chapman sold the farm and moved to Melbourne. They bought a tennis court hire business, near Moreland Road in Brunswick and it was in this business that Betty commenced working for them.

There was a twinkle in a young Bill Mustey's eye when he met Betty in Lockington

They commenced a courtship, and the wedding bells were rung in Echuca in the October of 1954. Married life for the newly married Musteys started out in a house built by Bill's brother Ray in Lockington; a cream three-bedroom aluminum clad home with an outside toilet. It boasted a

large shed out the back for the truck and a beautiful camellia bush at the back that Betty loved, but that Bill often threatened to cut down.

This house would become the mainstay of Betty's life in Lockington, having occupied it for almost 60 years.

Betty and Bill welcomed their first child, a daughter Lynette in the May of 1958

And a son, Trevor, who completed the family circle, arriving in May 1960. As a young family, Lyn can recall all of them piling into the family car, a cream Ford Falcon and heading off to a rented house at the seaside, sometimes Warrnambool, sometimes Frankston and even the long haul to Queensland.

Often a friend was invited to join them, so there was lots of energy and lots of noise, when Bill tired and needed a spell, that is when the kids would play up; poor Bill did not get much sleep on what was supposed to be a restful vacation.

Bill operated a transport business and Bet was always front and centre with Bill with all aspects of the business operations. Bet would attend to all of the paperwork and the organizing and coordination, and Bill would do the driving. But Betty's involvement didn't end there. Betty used to help Bill picking up the cattle by driving a truck, without a semi license, which, of course, would be illegal now. Every Sunday in the calf season, she assisted Bill with loading calves at Bamawm –in all weather conditions, even if it was raining.

Bet made sure that everything ran smoothly, alongside the hard-working Bill. Their great friend Brian Malone recently informed me that Bill would often complete two or even three loads on end to Melbourne and upon arriving home finally, he would find out that Bet had organized a load of sheep to be brought back from the middle of NSW for Bill Fielder. Was Bill fussed? He would just shake his head and smile, saying "the old woman is trying to kill me"

Bill and Bet were both so well respected in the industry for their organization and reliability. They certainly made a great team! And Bet was a whizz at the problem-solving.

Even without that endorsed licence, Bet went out in the tray truck one day to Tennyson to bring back a load to Lockington. In order to get her load, Bet had to go down a very wet, slippery clay track, with the very likelihood of betting the truck bogged. How would she manage this? Easy! not impressed with the condition, Bet simply phoned Bill Fielder, telling him that, as it was his load, he could do the honours and drive the truck out. To which, Bill complied with Bet's direction.

Another of Bet's great friends, Bill and Pat Roberts, also made mention of another example of Bet's driving prowess. This time, it was at the Winton Raceway in 1966, driving the Lockington Racing Partnerships' newly acquired Formula Vee at a test day. If truth be told, Bet was both terrified and pleased that her experience in a race car was over and, we will add, no lap records were broken on this day.

Bet and family were very involved with motor sport as son Trevor was an active participant as a motorcycle race rider. After Bill retired in 1988 this enabled Bet and Bill to spend a lot of time each year travelling to Queensland to holiday with Trevor and to visit Megan, their granddaughter. Trevor then welcomed into his family -Judie. Betty and Bill were made to feel so much a part of the Townsville family when they visited. In 2001, Trevor was killed in a motorcycle accident in Brisbane, leaving Bet and family heartbroken.

It was of great comfort that, in the ensuing years, Judie remained close to Bet and, along with her new partner Greg, they welcomed a daughter Katariina, and Bet was proudly and lovingly known as Grandma.

The love of Bet's life, her husband and partner in love, life and business, Bill Mustey, passed away in 2005.

So much can be said of Bet's involvement with her community. It is easy to describe Bet as being a "pillar" of the community, but Bet was even more than that. Bet was the pillar, but also the spans that bridged the groups and formed the social connections and the foundation of those thanks to the Lockington Bush Nursing Centre nurses, the groups who worked tirelessly to support and connect others in true community sense.

Having been a member of the Lockington Bush Nursing Ladies Auxiliary in 1986, Bet was duly recognized with Life Membership in 2007 for her ongoing work and contributions to the group.

As member and then secretary of the social club for the Lockington Hall, Bet saw the value and the importance in providing a venue for groups, clubs and individuals to run events in the local area and this was further enhanced by Bet's involvement with the Lockington Football Club as a member of the Ladies Auxiliary. Bet also undertook the role of secretary of the auxiliary and also President of the catering committee. Once again, and rightly so, Bet was made a life member of the Football Club.

In 2011, Bet continued her community involvement by becoming a member of the local Lions Club, where she settled in so easily and became, as we would only expect, a very active and much loved and valued member.

With her keen sense of giving and her awareness of supporting, nothing much would ever get past Bet! Fellow Lions will remember the sponge cakes that Bet would produce for your birthdays and her keenness in sourcing and searching out items for the Lions raffles and other door prizes.

And Bet was a member of the local Senior Citizens club, having become President in 2014 until very recently. Bet handed over the presidency so that she could go out and enjoy her retirement - as if Bet would ever, truly, stop...

It would be remiss of us to not give more attention and recognition to Bet's cooking. I'm sure that each and every committee member will be familiar with the following: Bet's apple cakes; sometimes Bet would be making up to 10 dozen at a time for a good cause; those sponges, the pies, the slices and the pasties that were always enjoyed at meetings, on cake stalls, fund raising ventures and by Bet's friends and especially, her family. Family members would gloat to each other when they received little treats,

like Bet's sponges, whom they would then provide to tease. However, you were connected to Bet, if you were in her company, you would always be well-fed!

But I am going to tell you that it was her family that also got to savor Bet's many other culinary delights. The ginger fluffs, the Christmas fruit cakes, the pavlovas and the cakes for special days like weddings and 21st birthdays will long be remembered and will enhance Bet's lasting legacy.

When Bet did get of her kitchen, take off her apron and do something for herself, she loved to head to Rochester every fortnight with the other ladies to play bingo - I'm told that she didn't win much, but she made up for that with the loads of fun that she kept in her friend's company. Bingo was also high up on Bet's agenda when she would visit Lynette in Albury.

As Bet's general health began a decline, following a diagnosis of lung cancer in the May of 2021, it was her daughter Lynette who was there by her side, as carer, provider, nurturer, confidante and supporter of her Mum going over and above to make sure that her mum was able to be afforded a continued quality of life. Net told me the other day, that she and Bet shared a special and unique bond; so close, but they would still have their "tiffs", nothing major as Net reassured me "I haven't killed her yet!"

It is at this point in time that family wish to extend their team at Echuca Palliative Care and the Symptom and Urgent Review Clinic staff in Bendigo for the treatment, the assistance, the love and the care that they provided for Bet during her illness.

During the evening of Monday 8th August 2022, surrounded by family and close friends, and with her loving daughter Net holding her hand, that Betty Helen Mustey passed away peacefully and is now free of any pain and also at eternal rest.

As was put so beautifully to me the other day, Betty lived a long and fruitful life. She was a caring wife, a very loving mother and grandmother, an astute businesswoman, a good friend and someone who gave everything of herself to better the lives of others.

Betty leaves a lifetime of loving family memories, and years of happy times and stories for every person that had the pleasure to meet her. Betty will be so greatly missed by all who had the immense good fortune to know her, to

be related to her, to be her friend and to be loved by her.





Public health unit seeks volunteers for JEV project

Date: 23 August 2022

The Loddon Mallee Public Health Unit (LMPHU) is calling on Campaspe Shire residents to volunteer for a blood screening project which aims to paint a clearer picture of the Japanese Encephalitis Virus (JEV).

JEV is a rare but potentially serious mosquito-borne illness first detected in Victoria this year. The virus affects the brain and is most commonly spread to humans from pigs via mosquito bites; it cannot be spread from human to human, nor by eating pork. However, in many people there are few or no symptoms making it difficult to map the extent or impact of the virus locally.

LMPHU Director Bruce Bolam said from a community wellbeing perspective, it was essential the Department of Health and Loddon Mallee Public Health Unit broaden their understanding of Japanese Encephalitis.

"With mosquito numbers expected to increase as the warmer months approach, the results of this study will be vital in planning JEV vaccinations and other preventative activities," Dr Bolam said.

To better understand how many people have been infected with JEV in the Campaspe region, residents are encouraged to present at one of two Dorevitch Pathology clinics for a free blood test. The results will be provided to each individual.

"While we understand that COVID-19 remains front and centre in the community's mind, threats such as Japanese Encephalitis should not be overlooked," Dr Bolam said.

"We already know that residents in the Campaspe Shire are at a heightened risk of contracting the virus because of the region's agricultural activities. Therefore, every snippet of information we can piece together will help to protect our community's future health."






