Hello again Everyone,

We've been looking back at early newspapers to learn the story of our district from the Selection Era until Lockington was gazetted as a township. Much hinged on the provision of a rail service to the region but, despite constant campaigning that had begun in 1876, by early 1892 there was still no railroad. A Railways Standing Committee had visited the area in 1891, to investigate the likely cost of constructing a line along one of several routes that had already been surveyed, and to ascertain the potential for such a line to be profitable. While the outcome of that visit had not been determined, the Government was known to be short of funds and hopes that had been high in 1890, were fading.

Since the Terricks plains were thrown open for Selection in the late 1860s and early 1870s, weather patterns had been variable, but they tended most towards dry conditions. Settlers had excavated dams and sunk wells but, by the early 1890s, their best chance of dealing with recurrent water shortages seemed to lie in proposals to channel water from the rivers for irrigation or, at least, for stock and domestic purposes. In early 1892, the weather was dry once again. On 29 February, the Milloo correspondent wrote to the *Bendigo Advertiser* that water was becoming scarce and some of the neighbouring farmers were driving their stock long distances "to obtain the necessary element of life." On a brighter note, the writer told of the district's newly formed cricket club – The Northern Cricket Club – and their upcoming match against Mitiamo.

As well as a water problem, the settlers on the plains had difficulty accessing adequate timber for fencing and firewood, so a proposal in 1891 to throw open for selection some 7000 acres of the Terrick Terrick State Forest caused dismay. They petitioned the Minister for Lands to allow the Forest "to remain in its entirety," and he had promised to look into the matter. The Secretary for Mines, Mr Howitt, who was an expert in his knowledge of Victorian trees and woods, had investigated the situation and, on 5 March 1892, the *Bendigo Advertiser* announced his report: - "It is highly desirable to retain the forest as a State forest, on the ground that it contains most valuable Murray pine timber." For the present the forest seemed safe.

Another difficulty for the settlers on the northern plains was the distance that separated them from medical assistance. It could mean the difference between life and death but, in a rare instance that occurred in this part of the northern district, in late April 1892, there was a successful outcome and history was made. It was reported in the *Rochester Express* and in the *Elmore Standard* of 20 May. "Mrs Patullo, of Pannoomilloo, was taken suddenly ill, during the absence of her husband in Melbourne, and nearly bled to death. Dr Watson

[Rochester] was called in, who, recognising the imminent danger of the patient from the extreme haemorrhage, performed the operation of transfusion of blood, taking the blood from a vein of her second son (a healthy lad) and transfusing it into a vein of the mother. We are glad to be able to say that Mrs Patullo is now on the high road to recovery, being able to get about again. As far as we are aware, this is the first time that the operation of transfusion of blood has been performed in this part of the northern district." It was about this same time, that a little girl named Chappel, from Pine Grove, was kicked by a horse and sustained a fracture to her leg. Coincidentally, a child from Bamawm whose name was not recorded, was also injured in being kicked by a horse. The *Riverine Herald* reported on 16 May 1892, that both children were successfully treated by Dr Watson.

The Tennyson district lost two of its esteemed residents in early May 1892, and the local correspondent to the *Elmore Standard* on 13 May, commented on the unusual experience of both funerals having taken place on the 10th. Mrs M Cochrane, of Pannoomilloo, was just 33 years old, and mother of three young children. Mr Thomas Goad Snr., of Wanurp, was aged 80, and was much respected as a pioneer of the district. At about that same time, the Terrick Terrick correspondent of the *Kerang Times* regretfully recorded the death of Mrs Kelly, wife of Mr A F Kelly, of Terrick Station. She had been ailing for some time from consumption, brought on through influenza.

The weather was bleak and cold, but the district was still in want of rain on Friday, 6 May 1892, when "two children, aged 5 and 3 years respectively, son and daughter of Mr D O'Gorman, farmer, of Diggora West, wandered away from home, and a vigilant search was made. It was, however, unavailing, and the parents spent a night of terrible suspense, which was relieved on Saturday morning when information was received that the children had been found three miles from home, after having spent the night in the open air." The *Rochester Express* reported that "The little ones do not seem to have suffered greatly from their night's exposure to the bleak, cold weather."

Rain finally fell on the plains and, on Friday 13 May 1892, the *Kerang Times* published a report from its Terrick Terrick correspondent. "We have had a nice shower, about 80 points [20 mms], not enough to do much good yet ... The dams are still dry, and many of the farmers are driving their stock to water... Mr Scott, manager for Mr J M Highett, M.L.A., has made a pit of ensilage, which the cattle seem to relish very much. The process of making is very simple — a hole scooped in the ground, long and narrow, then filled in with green feed and covered with the earth.... The sowing is about finished."

That must be all until next time,

PRESIDENT/EDITOR'S REPORT **OCTOBER 2022**

I'm happy to report that this past twelve months has seen the paper maintain a high number of pages each edition. All except one of the 26 editions were 20 pages or more, with our first 28 page edition published in March which was followed up with another two 28 page editions in May.

I consider my role as Editor not just to produce our fortnightly paper, but more one of Community Support. We have been advertising free design of adverts/fliers for community groups and have produced a few over the year, these include the Vintage Rally, Lions Swap Meet, Country Music Festival, Brian Letton and Joy Bickford Rose Bowl. I've also got some new designs in the wind. The fliers have been used for Facebook advertising along with some simple short videos that I developed. This is something that I will continue to focus on for any community groups that would like some help.

Our Facebook presence has continued to make a good impact, with 1117 followers. Our posts of edition headlines/front pages regularly reach around 1500 people with our more popular posts reaching 2000 plus people. The Vintage Rally Video Advert reached 2,851 but by far our most popular post was the Country Music Festival Video Advert which reached 4,607!

The year did not go without hiccups though... with our lockynews@bigpond.com email address being compromised and having to roll over to @lockynews.com.au email addresses. This roll over has been reasonably smooth with only a few emails still coming to the old address, we will continue to monitor the old address.

Our dedicated volunteers have continued to support the production and distribution of the paper, which has been much appreciated by myself and the community. It was a loss to the team when Richard (Rhain) Dennis ceased volunteering with us in July due to personal reasons, Rhain was a valuable addition to our publishing team as Vice President/Assistant Editor and was also picking the papers up from the printer each fortnight to bring back to Lockington. The passing of Betty Mustey in August, was also a sad loss to the team, she had been a long time volunteer with the paper, most recently helping with the subscription mail outs.

I believe there is definitely a need for The Locky News publication into the future, it's a crucial element in keeping our community connected and informed. Thank you for the opportunity to play a key role in this for the community.

THE COVID-19 LONG-HAULER CONUNDRUM

Ex-local resident Diana Crumpler has had an article published in a US medical journal. Titled "The Covid-19 long-hauler conundrum", it explores the links between CFS (chronic fatigue syndrome, which is also triggered by an infection) and long-haulers, those who, despite having recovered from the initial infection, go on to develop multiple symptoms – including debilitating fatigue – unrelated to the triggering infection. 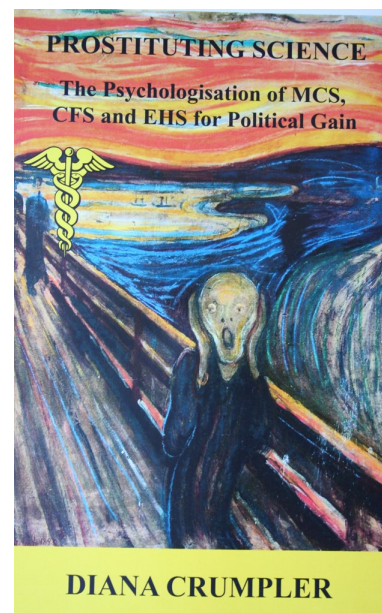
Infection raises levels of cytokines, inflammatory products of immune response.

Through a succession of knock-on effects this results ultimately in elevated brain levels of nitric oxide, thereby setting in motion a vicious cycle that renders the condition chronic.

If CFS and Covid-long haul should prove to be not only similar but the same syndrome, then the CFS model also offers a potential treatment: the neural protocol, a regimen of supplements that breaks the vicious cycle and so restores wellness.

On the strength of her two books on CFS and MCS (multiple chemical sensitivity), Diana was in 2017 the only

non-American invited to submit a paper to a landmark MCS-EHS (electromagnetic hypersensitivity) feature issue of another medical journal that created interest worldwide. As a consequence, she now receives regular requests for articles from international peer-reviewed medical and scientific journals.

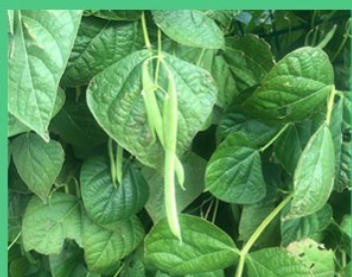

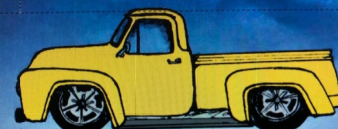

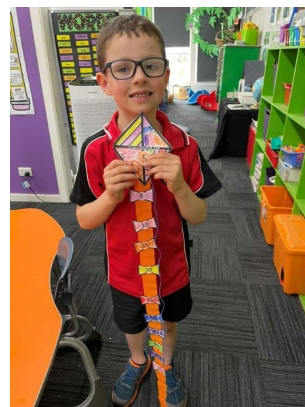

Walsh says fuel app will cut costs on your bottom line immediately

28 September 2022

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says an elected Liberal Nationals Government will immediately introduce legislation to run "a simple piece of digital technology" that could save Victorians as much as \$800 in fuel costs every year.

Mr Walsh says the Liberal Nationals government in NSW has provided its residents with a fuel check app.

And he says it's not like some other private fuel check apps which can direct people to higher petrol pricing.

Based on the NSW fuel check app, we will direct people to what is the lowest petrol pricing and save people hundreds of dollars every year.

"This app will be run by the government and legislation will mandate that all stations must update their data on the app at the same time as they put up changed prices on the boards at their stations," Mr Walsh explains.

"That means Victorians will get price changes in real time, allowing them to access the best prices at stations near them," he says.

"Based on the NSW experience with this app can save people up to \$800 a year.

"This week's reintroduction of the full excise levy on fuel puts another 22 cents per litre back on the cost of fuel at the bowser.

"That's 22 cents per litre, for every litre – that is a big hit to people's household budget, it's a really big hit and it's going to impact people quite dramatically. And we need to make sure fuel pricing and people have got the best information when they've got fuel pricing."

Mr Walsh says it is fine to talk about cost of living initiatives in the year 2035, as the government's doing right now, but petrol prices are about to go up right now and that's going to impact people's household budgets right now.

He says a Liberal Nationals government would do something about that right now.

"We will do that, and in the first 100 days of a change of government I'll make sure the laws are changed so petrol pricing information is mandatory, it's online, it's there for all Victorians to see," Mr Walsh added.

"And again, I say, this is needed at a time when cost of living pressures are going through the roof, I mean, we all know this, I know this, we all know this: petrol prices are going through the roof and they're going to get higher," he says.

"We need to do the stuff now that helps people, helps Victorians today, not just in 2035 but today, and that's why this fuel price app, really successful in NSW, will, we are confident, be just as successful in Victoria.

"It's going to help people's bottom lines, it's going to help their household budget, it's going to save them a lot of money, and it's such a sensible, low-cost plan to put in place – just \$400,000 to put the app in place and just \$1 million over four years to run it.

"I reckon it's money well spent to help Victorians cut the cost of fuel prices as they start to go up."

Health crisis must be cured now and a change of government will do it says Walsh

28 September 2022

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says people across his electorate will be major winners from the Liberal Nationals sweeping restructure of how healthcare is delivered – immediately and in the future.

Mr Walsh says a key part of the plan to fix the health crisis is a new \$325 million Future Health Workforce Plan to "recruit, upskill, better manage and support the staff we need to return confidence to our health system".

He says in total, the plan will deliver an additional 18,000 new and upskilled nurses and midwives across the public and private sectors – "and that's on top of the 22,000 promised by the Andrews Labor Government".

Furthermore, he says this plan will overhaul the way in which healthcare staff are mentored and developed by utilising existing clinical skill and experience.

"One of the challenges in regional Victorian centres is getting people to embrace what a regional/rural lifestyle can offer outside the workplace," Mr Walsh says.

"A big part of that will be informing and working with the proposed Health Workforce Accommodation Taskforce to examine appropriate accommodation options, to not only attract health workers to rural and regional Victoria, but to also help retain existing workers who are finding it difficult to secure housing in the current tight private rental market in many areas," he says.

"If you can help people to have a settled home in a new environment, it gives them a much better base on which to build a life in a regional hub, and those places have so much going for them."

Mr Walsh says the Liberals and Nationals' \$325 million Future Health Workforce Plan, will deliver:

- 25,000 scholarships of \$16,500 to fully offset the upfront HECS debts of nursing and midwifery students – including 20,000 for public health positions and 5,000 for the private health sector.

- 10,000 scholarships for existing nurses and midwives to upgrade their skills with postgraduate and specialist training fully paid to upskill to roles such as becoming registered nurses, nurse practitioners, nurse unit managers and maternal and child health nurses, to be delivered by leading health education providers including the Australian College of Nursing.

The immediate recruitment of 5000 new nurses and midwives and 2000 new other health workers by funding re-training fees and establishing a new visa subclass for international health workers.

In addition, we will immediately establish a Victorian Ministerial Health Workforce Council which will be tasked with:

- Conducting a state-wide public and private sector workforce and skills audit to inform the mix of newly funded positions.

- Developing a robust and flexible surge workforce model to assist in managing future emergency events and pandemics.

- Expanding 'full scope of practice' workforce programs, including better utilisation of the existing clinical skill and expertise base, as well as expanding specialist roles such as Nurse Practitioners, Allied Health Generalists, Community Paramedics and Maternal and Child Health Nurses.

- Developing ongoing health workforce recruitment campaigns, staff retention measures and incentives in consultation with all stakeholders to mitigate future attrition.

- Supporting the creation of, and assisting in informing negotiations with the Commonwealth, for a Designated Area Migration Agreement (DAMA) specifically focused on urgently addressing Victorian rural and regional health workforce shortages.

- Informing and working with the proposed Health Workforce Accommodation Taskforce to examine appropriate accommodation options, to not only attract health workers to rural and regional Victoria, but to also help retain existing workers who are finding it difficult to secure housing in the current tight private rental market in many areas.

Mr Walsh says this "significant and urgent" step forward matches the Victorian Liberals and Nationals' commitment to build or upgrade at least 20 hospitals across Victoria, with money reprioritised from shelving Daniel Andrews' \$35 billion Cheltenham to Box Hill rail line black hole.

He says this is a critical real solution to fix the health crisis.

"Nurses, midwives and other vital healthcare staff are the glue that holds our health system together. By better supporting them we will deliver better health outcomes for all Victorians."

"Not only will we deliver at least 20 new and upgraded hospitals across Victoria but we will put the best trained and supported healthcare staff in them."

"Only the Liberals and Nationals have real solutions to fix the health crisis without new taxes or more debt."

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says a grassroots campaign in partnership with state and regional sporting organisations has restored shooting for the 2026 Commonwealth Games.

And not just shooting, it has also included shooting para sport, to fully reverse what he says was an ill-advised decision to drop this popular, broad-based competition from the Birmingham Games schedule earlier this year.

The next step, Mr Walsh says, is to immediately confirm the trap shooting will be staged in Echuca – which was the other half of the campaign to get the sport back in the Victorian Commonwealth Games.

He says once that is locked in, work can begin immediately to upgrade the already excellent facilities at the Echuca Gun Club to world class to better host the shooting in four years.

"Like so many others, I was appalled to see the Games executive agree to drop shooting, a sport in which Australia excels," Mr Walsh says.

"From the minute we realised that had happened, The Nationals joined forces with organisations, clubs and the thousands and thousands of shooters across the state and country, to make sure they did not miss out in 2026," he says.

"And Echuca's facilities are already second to none, so with a few projects between now and 2026, the infrastructure already there will be brought up to scratch.

"It would also enable the facility, at Echuca West on the Echuca-Mitiamo Rd, to do some dry-runs before the Games by hosting some national and international shoots.

"This is an exciting opportunity for Echuca, and I am urging everyone to get on board to make sure that's what happens."

The Commonwealth Games are forecast to add more than \$3 billion to the Victorian economy as well as creating more than 600 fulltime equivalent jobs before the Games, almost 4000 jobs during the Games and a further 3000 beyond the Closing Ceremony.

Murray-Darling Basin Ministerial Council must provide water certainty

October 10, 2022

Federal Member for Nicholls Sam Birrell says Federal Water Minister Tanya Plibersek faces a crucial test on Wednesday when the Murray-Darling Basin Ministerial Council meets for the first time since the Federal Election.

"The new Albanese Labor has continued to feed anger and uncertainty in Basin communities by refusing to rule out damaging water buybacks to take an additional 450 gigalitres of water from irrigation communities for the environment," Mr Birrell said.

"If Water Minister Tanya Plibersek leaves the Ministerial Council meeting on Wednesday still committed to rushing headlong to the finish line using any mechanism available, it will only be because she hasn't listened."

An update of the social and economic impact of the Basin Plan commissioned by the Victorian Labor Government has been released ahead of the Ministerial Council meeting.

"This is credible analysis that clearly outlines the damage that would be done across Northern Victoria and especially in the Goulburn Murray Irrigation District, a critical system that is the lifeblood of the electorate of Nicholls," Mr Birrell said.

"The nationals fought for a neutrality test for water buybacks, which the basin states agreed to, it is there to protect our regional communities from social and economic harm but under federal Labor it is under threat."

"There is a very good reason why the additional 450 GL was not going to be achieved under the previous Liberal Nationals Government, because we refused to inflict further social and economic pain on basin communities".

The updated social and economic impacts report states that if buybacks are used to complete the plan, including the 450GL, would result in:

- drying 95,00ha of irrigable land in the southern MDB — the majority in the Victorian GMID
- 50,000 ha of irrigation being dried off in Northern Victoria - 45,000 ha in the GMID and 5,000 ha in the Mallee
- In a repeat of the millennium drought 3,700 hectares of perennial horticulture – mature productive trees - would be lost
- An annual reduction in Gross Value of Irrigated Agricultural Production of around \$300m (\$200m in GMID and \$100m in the Mallee)
- approximately 900 farm jobs lost plus additional job losses in down-stream industries and Basin communities

"If water minister Tanya Plibersek won't listen to the Nationals, irrigators, or basin communities maybe she will accept the evidence commissioned by the Victorian Labor government and say no to damaging water buybacks in the basin," Mr Birrell said.

"The Basin Plan needs to be about achieving environmental outcomes – not enforcing timelines and targets that will inflict untold social and economic damage on basin communities.

"The Ministerial Council is a chance to listen, learn and adopt a sensible, measured approach to completing the plan."
