#### Hello again Everyone,

We have reached early 1893, as we look back at the newspapers of the day to learn how people fared in our district, from the Selection Era of the 1860s and 70s until Lockington became a township. There had been a satisfactory harvest, but in other respects, the early months of 1893 could have been better. Residents of Bamawm were dismayed at news of the death on 7 January, of local farmer, Mr John Edney, following emergency surgery in Bendigo for a serious infestation of hydatids. He was just 30 years of age and left a widow and two young children. Then, on 2 March, the district suffered the loss of Mr John Archibald, Snr., one of its early settlers. Mr Archibald, who died aged 79 years, had failed to regain complete health after contracting influenza eighteen months earlier. He and his wife and sons had come to the district from Barfold, near Kyneton, in 1872 and had taken up land in Bamawm.

Social events that took place early in the year, centred mainly on the local schools and churches; like the Harvest Thanksgiving at St David's, Milloo, on 12 February; the church picnic held there on 15 February; the Pine Grove State School picnic which was held in Mr C W Sims' paddock in mid-April; and the Pannoomilloo State School concert, held on 25 May 1893. The Piavella Mutual Improvement Association also held a concert on 25 May; an event that was so successful, that they planned to give another three such concerts, in Milloo East, Mitiamo and Dingee, at the end of June.

On 1 June 1893, the Milloo correspondent reported to the Bendigo Advertiser that the steady rain that had been falling for several days would "do a vast amount of good to the farmers and graziers, as both water and grass were scarce," and that farmers who had not yet finished sowing their crops would now be able to do so. Occasional showers fell over the ensuing weeks, limiting the attendance at the Piavella M I A's planned concerts. The weather "was not over propitious" when the Torrumbarry Bachelors held their annual ball on 21 June, but they were happy with the 120 guests who braved the elements to attend, as reported by the Riverine Herald, on 27 June. According to a report in the Bendigo Independent on 8 July 1893, a very successful 'return' social was held by the young ladies of Terricks the Melbourne Punch on 17 August 1893. The bride, Miss Ellen East on the 4<sup>th</sup>.

In other news, the *Independent* reported on 4 July that fresh tenders were invited for the erection of a Catholic Church in Tennyson, and many local residents had "subscribed liberally to the building fund." The local creameries had re-opened after having been closed for four months and a good supply of milk was forthcoming according to the Independent on 8 July. The Kerang Times of 18 July, noted that crops

around Piavella were growing well, and stock was generally improving. It was also reported that foxes were about, and that the district's cricket season was underway again. The next issue of that paper, on 21 July, carried the sad news that Mr Joseph Helms, of Terrick Terrick, had died suddenly on 19 July 1893. He and his family had come from the Barrabool Hills, near Geelong, and had taken up land at the Terricks in 1873.

Throughout July, showers continued to fall and at Piavella, all low-lying ground was under water and many crops were submerged. Nevertheless, regular cricket matches continued unabated, and the various Gun Clubs across the region were gathering to renew their battles with the hare and rabbit pests. At Terricks East, another type of battle seemed likely to ensue; the tri-weekly mail service between Echuca and Mitiamo had been altered, causing great inconvenience to numerous residents. A petition was being prepared, requesting that the Postmaster General renew the previous service or make some other provision to remedy the situation.

By August the weather had improved, and the roads were drying up nicely. The next concert given by the Piavella M I A, at Milloo, was very successful, and the group then began preparations for a debate -"Which is better for the country? Mining or Farming?" On the cricketing scene, a rather novel cricket match took place on 12 August 1893, when the Tennyson Cricket Club played against a Yeaman Family team. The Yeamans, with a score of 69 runs, were only narrowly defeated when Tennyson scored 71. Reporting the event to the Bendigo Advertiser in its issue of 18 August, the Rochester correspondent commented, "It is not often that a single family can produce a whole team of cricketers."

On 18 August 1893, the bachelors of Tennyson, Pannoomilloo, and Pannoobamawm, hosted a dance at the 'Old Mill,' with an attendance of ninety-five couples, according to the report published on 24 August by the Bendigo Independent. The arrangements were excellent, and the event was a great success. Also high on the local social calendar that year, was the Looney-Lyons Wedding, which took place at St Luke's Catholic Church at Terrick Terrick, on 9 August, as reported by (Nellie) Lyons was the daughter of Mr Laurence C Lyons of 'Lignum View,' Terricks East, and the groom, Mr Thomas Looney of Parkes NSW. A large marguee was erected at the Bride's family residence, twelve miles distant from the church, to accommodate guests who enjoyed the "dejeuner" which followed the wedding ceremony.



#### **DOREEN ARCHIBALD'S LIFE STORY**

Doreen Archibald, known to many through her visitors. Unfortunately, she her visitors. Unfortunately, she fell off a ladder in the early 60s heavy at Illoura on November 10. She had been an active member of Emmanuel Uniting Church and was farewelled there on Wednesday November 16, 2022.

Doreen was born at Mitiamo on the 5 November 1933 to Ernest and Minnie Aird as the younger sister to Phyllis and Harold. It was the time of the Great Depression followed by World War II and there were many hardships, but they all loved the farming life. Doreen had to ride four miles along terrible dirt roads to a single-roomed classroom and said there was a steady stream of raw teachers who found the rural isolation difficult. She left school aged 13 to work on the family farm. In 1951, she was among the first group of women to attend Dookie Agricultural College for a farming course and she was secretary of the first Young Farmers Club which was formed in Lockington in 1952.

Doreen married Jim Archibald in 1953 and they worked on several dairy farms in the Lockington district before buying their own dairy farm in 1963. Doreen worked hard on the farm, including milking 100 cows by hand as well as the household duties and raising their three children, Ron, Peter, and Christine. She also served for four years as Cub leader in the Lockington Scout Group, taught Sunday school at the Presbyterian Church, and joined the choir.



In 1967, Doreen left the marriage and moved to Bright to raise the children on her own with little to no support. She worked various jobs including tying tobacco, cleaning, cooking, waitressing and working at the TAB. They didn't have much but Doreen provided a happy home full of love and laughter. Doreen moved the family to Wangaratta in 1971, where she was a member of several church groups and also joined Parents without Partners where she held office and did welfare for the organisation.

With her dad's encouragement, Doreen traced his relations in Scotland and was able to visit them.

She helped many others with tracing their family history and was one of the inaugural members of the Wangaratta Family History Society. As well as her love of music and dancing, Doreen was a great fan of Peter Brock and car racing. She often attended races at Winton or the Hume Weir and was thrilled to buy her own Orange Holden Torana in 1974 which she still drove right up until a few years ago.

Doreen was accomplished in many arts and crafts. She did oil landscape paintings, China painting and also learnt the art of bark painting.

She sewed and repaired many garments for her family, and also enjoyed knitting, crocheting and embroidery. Doreen was self-taught at playing the guitar and piano, and was a member of the Wangaratta Uklele Band. She was part of the Sing Australia choir and loved singing with the choir at Carols by Candlelight.

Doreen enjoyed her garden and was always repotting plants from cuttings that she would kindly bestow upon her visitors. Unfortunately, she broke her back when she fell off a ladder in the early 60s, so was unable to do the heavy lifting in the garden, but she usually found a way around attending to most tasks.

Doreen met Peter Ham in 1984 and he brought much happiness and love to her life. They both just enjoyed the simple things in life, family gatherings, meals out together, travelling, going to air shows, and most of all, each other's company. He was patient, kind and caring to Doreen in the early stages of her dementia, and cared for her right up to his sudden death from cancer in September 2019.

Doreen's greatest love and joy was her family and she was thrilled to become a grandma to Nicole, Lisa, Daniel, Jarrod, Melissa and Sally, and then later a great grandma to Hayden, Ella, Lucy, Ivy, Zachary, Adele, Xavier and Lucas. They have many wonderful memories of visiting Grandma, playing in the garden or in the cubbyhouse under the kitchen table, dress-ups or shops, making shanghais and bow and arrows, or riding on the handcrafted rocking horses made by Peter Ham.

Doreen was a volunteer with palliative care for 21 years and followed her interest in alternative healing therapies to study hypnotherapy and also become a reiki master, sharing her healing gifts with many in need. Whenever you met Doreen, you were sure of a smiling face and a quick hug, whether in her home or up the street. When you felt down or had worries, Doreen was the one who always listened.

She had the gift to make people feel comfortable in her company and it is that gift that made her so easy to talk to. She was the listening ear and confidante to many. She had a heart of gold and was a truly remarkable woman.

#### 11 January 2023 **ROUGH RIDE ON REGIONAL ROADS GETTING** DANGEROUS SAYS WALSH

The Nationals leader and Member for Murray Plains, Peter Walsh, says travelling across his electorate doesn't require driving skills as much as it demands being an expert slalom skier.

Mr Walsh says so many roads are badly damaged and degraded, the Andrews Labor government's decision to not deal with the failure of the system is now coming home to roost and the safety of country drivers and there is no sign of the magical hundreds of extra passengers is increasingly at risk.

And that, he says, does not begin to take into account the growing cost of damage to cars especially tyres and wheels.

"The numbers are very plain here - there's more than 70.000km of roads across regional Victoria that need to CAPTION: be maintained and there's nowhere near enough money being made available to get the job done," Mr Walsh says.

"Apart from a few half-baked repairs, the best solution this bankrupt government can come up with to try and cut roads have become as lack of maintenance and costs is to lower the speed limit anywhere and repairs create life-threatening situations. everywhere there is a potential traffic hazard – and there are plenty of those," he says.

"When you think about the billions and billions of taxpayer dollars being blown on cost overruns and failed deadlines for the much-hyped Andrews 'big build' anyone could be forgiven if they thought this government does not give a damn about their safety and wellbeing.

"I drove the Prairie-Rochester Rd the other day - and I have driven down a lot of fairly ordinary country roads over the years - and on this occasion you could be taking your life in your own hands. It is in appalling shape and there are some stretches that are genuinely scary and some with absolutely no warning."

Mr Walsh says you can chart the impotence of the 'quick fix' of the majority of running repairs on some roads, with

bitumen waves on the sides of roads everywhere, as increasingly heavy traffic, particularly B-doubles and heavy farm machinery, quickly destroys shoddy repair work.

He says if contractors in the real world delivered such shabby results, they would get sacked and sued.

But because it is the government, the issues are being hidden behind media spin, the endemic secrecy which has become the signature feature of the Andrews government and, as a last resort, blame shifting.

"Daniel Andrews has once again fooled the people of Victoria. He keeps promising to repair the messes he is making – and never does," Mr Walsh added.

"He promised he would fix our healthcare crisis now all of a sudden it is Canberra's fault, Medicare's fault," he says.

"He promised he would fix the teaching crisis but teachers promised.

"Even as he axed our Country Roads and Bridges Program, he promised he would ensure the quality of our country roads and now look where that's landed us."

"This isn't a pothole; this is a tank trap." Standing on the Mitiamo-Echuca Rd, west of Kotta, is a classic example of just how dangerous country
