"Lockington - Lines in Time"

Hello again Everyone,

We've been looking back at the newspapers of the day to Year. On 10 January 1896, the Elmore Standard reported learn how people fared in our district, from the Selection Era of the 1860s and 70s until the township of Lockington was formed. conditions prevailed. On 19 November 1895, the Piavella correspondent wrote to the Bendigo Independent that the district was in a "deplorable condition" and since early October, some of the farmers had been driving their stock to water. It was expected that there would be very little crop worth harvesting, and the writer added that that season was the worst by far of any that had been known by the oldest local residents. The Tennyson correspondent, who wrote to the Independent ten days later, seemed a little more optimistic, stating that wheat crops between there and Rochester had "held out well," and might give a fair yield, but better and, as the Terrick Terrick correspondent wrote to the no such hopes were held for the crops to the north and west. Water and grass were very scarce, and stock sent to market was being sold at very low prices. Regular cricket matches provided the only excitement to be had.

A series of violent thunderstorms brought a little rain across the region in early December. From Rochester, it was reported that the hail had been the heaviest experienced in the district for some years. According to the Bendigo Advertiser on 3 December 1895, hail stones, "larger than pigeon eggs," were expected to have caused a great deal of damage to those crops that had survived so far. At Tennyson, according to the Elmore Standard on 13 December, "the lightning was very vivid, and several narrow escapes are recorded. Mr R Jones was driving a two-horse dray, and the wheel was struck, and at Mr Martin's a large tree was split, giving Mr Martin and Mr O'Brien, who were close at hand, a severe shock.'

Hot weather and drought conditions continued into the New that the 1895-6 wheat yield in the Tennyson district had been the poorest on record, while "not a bushel per acre" had As 1895 drew to a close, extreme drought been harvested on many of the farms in the Terricks district. Many of the dams and tanks in the region were completely dry, and well-sinking and boring for water were engaging much of the landholders' time. Stock feed had become so scarce that, according to the Bendigo Advertiser on 13 February, farmers had begun sending cattle and sheep to the boiling down works that had been established at Pannoomilloo. Then, on 14 February, right across the region, rain fell. Initially, it was less than half an inch [12.5 mms], but there were further showers in the coming weeks and the settlers were "jubilant." The country was looking Bendigo Independent, by 21 April 1896, farmers had begun putting in their crops for the coming season.

> Since the mid-1870s, the farming communities of the northern plains had waged a campaign for the provision of a railway line from Cohuna, through Pannoobamawm, to Elmore where it would connect with the main trunk line. In the intervening twenty years, their hopes had been raised many times only to be dashed again. On 19 May 1896, the Bendigo Advertiser reported that, on the previous day, members of the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Railways, Messrs., E. H. Cameron (chairman), A. Harris, D. Melville, A. Craven, J. B. Burton, Ms.L.A., and Mr. T. G. Watson (secretary), and Mr. Webb (reporter), had arrived at Rochester in connection with the "proposed narrow gauge railway to Cohuna." It was the intention of the Commissioners to inspect proposed routes along which the might be constructed, and to interview rail line representatives from the various localities which the line would service. As well as checking for any engineering difficulties that might be encountered, they hoped to estimate the extent to which the proposed service would be utilised, and to ascertain its paying potential. Mr. J. H. M'Coll, M.L.A. for Gunbower, would accompany the committee over the proposed routes.

> On 18 May, the group travelled from Rochester to Pannoomilloo, where they met with local farmers, Messrs Reigel, A Munro, H Ham and Raper. That evening, at Pine Grove East, the commissioners took evidence from Messrs Bishop, John Watson, Jos. Watson, J Kidd, Nankivell and Zealley. All interviewees favoured a line from Elmore and believed that, as the route would cross highly productive agricultural land, it would do well. On 19 May, the tour group visited Tomara, Gunbower and Wee Wee Rup, and in the morning on 20 May, they met with the residents of Cohuna. They then drove to Macorna, where they boarded the afternoon train to return to Melbourne. At each centre that they visited, the committee spoke with farmers and graziers who claimed that, if a line was constructed, it would result in increased cereal cultivation and production of livestock, and would certainly be a paying proposition. However, almost all those interviewed were strongly opposed to a narrow-gauge line, as stock and goods would need to be re-trucked when they arrived at the main line at Elmore, and could be damaged in the process. As all the proposed routes would be through level country, few if any engineering problems were likely. The completion of the tour of inspection was announced in the Melbourne Argus on 23 May 1896, and once more the residents of the northern plains waited and hoped for a successful outcome.

A TRIBUTE TO ANDREW RANKIN

I've had a long association with Andrew - a very unique character!

He built six sheds and provided railway line for a seventh on our dairy farm.

I found out fairly quickly, when working with Andy there is only one way of doing things.... Andrew's way!

Three particular incidents occurred when he was building our herringbone dairy in 1981.

I wanted to put mesh in the concrete yard but Andrew wasn't having it. In fact he said to Dad "Let him get it and then chuck it in the bloody channel. There's enough reo in the concrete itself." This concrete has stood the test of time with very few cracks.

Andrew purchased corrugated iron from Milnes in Bendigo. There were 7 sheets 43 feet long. He brought it home on his 2 wheel trailer with a telescopic pull pole and how he got around the fountain in Bendigo I'll never know! You couldn't get away with that now.

I was very keen to put the new Larsen Pendulum exit gates in the dairy, but of course Andrew wanted to use his guillotine gates. I was insistent, so he finally agreed with the proviso that when he got his version going these gates would only be good for patching up holes in sheep yard fences. This was one of the very few times I won!

Andrew's workmanship was second to none, he was a wonderful engineer.

His Rankin Effluent pumps were famous,

His love of oil engines was intense and

His views on life were...interesting.

I fully enjoyed my time working and learning from Andy.

My condolences to the Rankin family






