"Lockington - Lines in Time"

Hello again Everyone,


We have reached 1898, as we look back at the newspapers of the day to learn how people fared in our district, as the end of the Nineteenth Century approached. That year began very hot and dry but from late February, there was adequate rain to encourage the settlers to sow their crops for the been found at Mrs Godfrey's farmhouse at Diggora, about upcoming season. By 12 August, the Tennyson correspondent to the *Elmore Standard* could write that almost two inches [50 mms] of rain had fallen in July, crops her experience." and grass were doing "fairly well," and a good season was Fortunately, the favourable weather conditions enabled "almost a certainty now."

Winter had brought measles and influenza to the district, especially in Pannoomilloo and Warragamba, and the region experienced some accidents. Mr Thomas Pitts of Tennyson, was injured when crushed against a wall as he attended to his horses; and 3-year-old Leslie, youngest son of Mr John Oliver of Warragamba, had a piece of jagged metal lodge in his eye when he ran into the smithy "to help his father." Both iniuries were successfully treated at Rochester. Unfortunately, Mr Daniel O'Gorman of Diggora, was unable to reach Rochester in time to save the life of his 7-year-old daughter, Margaret. The Bendigo Advertiser, on 18 August district and its surrounds "a musical treat at the annual 1898, reported that the young girl had seemed quite well, but suddenly took ill on the evening of the 15th, suffered "convulsive spasms," and died as her parents were driving her to the doctor.

On the wider scene, most of the news of the day concerned the campaign to achieve Federation, but there were incidents closer to home to claim the attention of the people of the northern plains. On 6 September 1898, the Bendigo Advertiser carried the story of a 5-year-old girl named Bradford, from Rochester, who had become lost at Diggora, when she wandered away from her father who was trapping

rabbits there. It was late afternoon and, when he was unable to find her himself, the father raised the alarm and a search party formed. They looked for her all night without success and in the morning, the fire bell was rung to gather more searchers. Fortunately, word was then received that she had five miles away from where she had last been seen. She was brought home that afternoon, "none the worse for

everyone to relax a little; winter cricket was enjoying its usual popularity, the Tennyson Cycling Club was flourishing, local members of the 1 Company of Mounted Rifles were producing some excellent results at The Butts, and some popular and successful dances and socials took place. As reported in the Elmore Standard on 19 August 1898, the members of the Tennyson Philharmonic Society held a "delightful and enjoyable" social on 11 August, to honour their conductor, Mr Haslam. In the meantime, society members were "busy practising the pretty operetta 'Sherwood's Queen," and would give the residents of the concert on the 27th October." As always, activities within their local church communities played a significant role in the lives of the settler families in the region. The anniversary of the Warragamba Sunday School was celebrated on 21 August in the Pannoomilloo Wesleyan Church. "The day was a lovely one, and the congregations were large, the church (the largest in the district) being filled to overflowing." In mid-September, there was also a good attendance at a tea meeting and concert in connection with the Milloo Church of England Sunday school, held at Mrs O'Brien's Tennyson Hall.

At least, two notable local weddings took place in the Spring that year. On 16 August 1898, the marriage of Miss Nellie Cox, youngest daughter of Mr William Cox, and Mr Alfred Raper, youngest son of Mr Charles J Raper, was celebrated in the Bible Christian Church at Diggora. On 19 August, the Elmore Standard recorded that "As the party left the church, they were deluged with showers of rice by those who had come to witness the ceremony. The happy couple left Rochester by the evening train en route for the metropolis, where they intend spending the honeymoon." On 9 September 1898, the Standard reported the wedding of Miss Annie Lees, eldest daughter of Mr John Lees of Diggora, and Mr James William McKenzie of Corop West. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. T. Neilson at the residence of the bride's parents, and afterwards the bridal party sat down to an elaborate wedding breakfast laid out in excellent style. "A very pretty centre-piece representing wedding bells, the work of Mrs. G. McKenzie, was greatly admired." After the breakfast, friends drove into Elmore, where the happy pair left by the evening train for Melbourne.

People across the region were saddened by the death of Mr George Hanley of Pannoomilloo, reported by the Elmore Standard on 28 October 1898. He was aged only 33 years, and was a "general favourite," who would be "greatly missed." The high hopes for a successful season, that had been entertained in July 1898, were fading fast in late October. The weather was dry, and hot winds had "a disastrous effect" on the crops. The rain which fell in November was not general, and was too late to be helpful. Grasshoppers were numerous and caused damage to vegetables in the settler families' gardens. On 5 November, the Leader quoted Mr Court, sen., a resident of Pine Grove for 27 years, as saying that the prospect that year was the worst he had ever seen. We will know more about it next time.




