

"Lockington - Lines in Time"

Hello again Everyone,

We have reached 1898, as we look back at the newspapers of the day to learn how people fared in our district, as the end of the Nineteenth Century approached. The end of the year was approaching too, and it had become clear that once again the harvest would be disappointing. Right across the district, hot dry winds had left crops with a withered appearance, and in the more north-westerly areas, as reported by the *Kerang Times* on 22 November 1898, locusts were swarming "in millions." Tennyson and Milloo farmers were hoping to have harvested their crops before the plague arrived, and strippers, harvesters, and binders were "in great requisition."

On 9 December 1898, the *Elmore Standard* carried a report from Pine Grove that harvesting operations were "in full swing," despite the yield having been considerably reduced by grasshoppers. The local correspondent remarked that it was interesting to see the thrashing plant of Mr Gale, of Lancefield, drawn by a traction engine, "moving along as steadily as if drawn by bullocks." The Melbourne *Argus*, on 19 November, reported that at Bamawm, a farm accident had claimed the life of a young man named John Johnson. An employee of a farmer named McDowall, he had been unloading hay when the horses took fright and he slipped and fell under the wagon.

December 1898 brought extremely hot weather to the region. *Elmore Standard* on 6 January 1899, that Mr Sam Windridge, At Pyramid Hill, on 5 December, it was 108 °F [42° C] "in the shade," as published in the Melbourne *Age* next day, while the *Elmore Standard* indicated that the temperature at A bright news item to emerge in the early part of the year, Warragamba, had reached as high as 112°F [44°C] that came from the *Standard's* Pine Grove correspondent, same day. Residents' health was being affected but no announcing on 21 February 1899, that Mr R Jones of that cases of heatstroke had yet been reported. The *Age* reported district, had won £6000 in Tattersall's Sweep on the Hobart

on 6 December, that a serious bush fire had broken out in the Bald Rock and Terricks district on 3 December, burning acres of wheat, a quantity of grass, and at least 10 chains of fencing, before being brought under control on 5 December, by "a large army of fire fighters."

On 2 December 1898, the *Elmore Standard* recorded the death on 25 November, of Mrs Margaret Isdale Trewick, the wife of Cr Thomas Matthew Trewick, of Diggora. Mrs Trewick was 48 years old and had been ill for more than six months. Sincere sympathy was expressed for Mr Trewick and his family. On 23 December 1898, the *Elmore Standard* relayed the sad news, from its Pine Grove correspondent, of the death of Pannoobamawm farmer, John Anderson. Mr Anderson, who was aged 63 years and had appeared to be in good health, had collapsed and died at Hanley's Creamery on 9 December, having gone there to deliver milk. He was well liked in the community and great sympathy was felt for Mrs Anderson and her family.

On 21 December, the Pine Grove correspondent wrote to the *Elmore Standard* that foxes had reappeared in the district, being responsible for killing thirty turkeys on Cr Allan's farm. The New Year began, hot and troubled by flies, but the harvest which was drawing to a close, was considered to have been fair. The residents of the district, particularly the many with an interest in cricketing, were sorry to read in the *Elmore Standard* on 6 January 1899, that Mr Sam Windridge, the veteran cricketer, of Tennyson, was very ill with rheumatic fever. All wished him a speedy return to health.

A bright news item to emerge in the early part of the year, announcing on 21 February 1899, that Mr R Jones of that district, had won £6000 in Tattersall's Sweep on the Hobart As the sweep did not fill, Mr Jones received £2200 Cup. only, but that had enabled him to purchase a farm at Mologa. Other news was not so good. On 22 February, a bushfire broke out in Pannoomilloo, and burnt about 250 acres of grass and stubble, as well as nearly two miles of fencing, owned by Messrs Pitts and McAuliffe. [Later in March, it emerged that police action was being taken in regard to this fire.] Sad news in the Bendigo Advertiser on 3 March 1899, was the announcement of the death of Mrs Jessie Trigg, the wife of Mr Charles Trigg of Mitiamo. Mrs Trigg was well known locally as the daughter of Mrs Eliza Wilson and the late Mr Henry Wilson of Milloo, and was survived by her husband, and nine children, the eldest being 16 years old, and the youngest just one month. [Sadly, Baby Jessie Trigg died just two weeks after the death of her mother.]

Early 1899 brought two local weddings of note. On 14 February, Miss Julia Watson, of 'Beanly Park' Tennyson married Mr John Murphy in St Patrick's Catholic Church at Tennyson, with Rev Father Mulqueen officiating. Guests, "to the number of 120," according to the report in the *Elmore Standard* on 3 March, then retired to the residence of the bride's parents, where an excellent wedding breakfast awaited them. On 29 March, Miss Jessie Stewart, fourth daughter of Mr John Stewart of Milloo, married Mr George Windridge, eldest son of Mr Sam Windridge of Tennyson. That ceremony took place at the Presbyterian Church, Tennyson, with a wedding breakfast to follow at the Old Mill. The report, which appeared in the *Elmore Standard* on 7 April, stated that the happy couple left by train for Kyneton, where the honeymoon was to be spent.

Circumstances in the region improved, as reported in the *Bendigo Independent* on 2 March 1899, when good rain set in on 25 February, establishing conditions that were better for that time of year than had existed for some years past. 'Bye until next time,






